

Service Charge May be Upped 50%

at their March 24 meeting heard the results of a study on the county's ambulance service. The county is losing \$380.00 a run. The study was done on the 181 runs in a 12 month

Academy conducted the study at the request of county manager. Truman Billingsley, District Attorney Steve Sanders will draw up a brief, which will be filed with the New Mexico State Corporation Commission The brief will request an increase in ambulance patient fees by 50 percent This move will decrease the county's loss to \$261 per run.

At present, a Carrizozo resident requiring ambulance service to Alamogordo's høspital is charged \$111.50 without "extras". Extras include oxygen use (\$7.50), special handling (\$7.50), restraining devices

The current base rate charged by Lincoln County Ambulance Service is as follows: First patient mile-\$30.00. second through 50th patient mile \$1.50; all patient miles over 50-\$1.00. call cancelled-\$30.00 plus .25-mile There is a discount on multiple patient charges. A corpses call is \$15.00 plus \$1.00 per mile.

Heart attacks and vehicle accidents heads the list of all ambulance calls. An emergency medical training course being conducted by Capitan's Devil Bill Adams concentrates on the assistance needed for these medical situations.

The girls who placed and brought in points were Annette Hill, Debbie K. Gallacher, Christetta Chavez, Lisa Crenshaw and the 440 relay team.



At Smokey Bear last week, all fuelwood areas were open. There was not enough snow for snowmobiling, cross-country skiing or tubing. Three Rivers Campground is open and the snow in the high country was melting quickly. Trails are mostly clear. 


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CAPITAN VILLAGES "Birthplace of Smokey the Bear"

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
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
