## News Briefs...

The Mescalero Apache Community Center in Mescalero is the site for the Eastern New Mexico Emergency Medical Services Corporation Board of Directors' meeting April 8 at 1 p.m.

Highlights of the meeting include a report from the Planning and Development Committee regarding criteria for the purchase of EMS equipment with some \$73,000 in federal funds and an opportunity to meet and talk with the new EMS Bureau Regional Coordinator from Santa Fe, Gene Gilbert. Legislation regarding EMS will also be discussed.

Eastern N.M. EMS Corporation is the contracting agency charged with the responsibility for developing a regional system for emergency medical services. Counties combined to form New Mexico's EMS Region III are Chavez, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Guadalupe, Harding, Lea, Lincoln, Otero, Quay, Roosevelt, and Union.

Region III EMS Board members include Robert G. Brooks, Clovis; Lewis Spere, Alamogordo; Glenn Jones, Artesia; Andres Hernandez, Santa Rosa; Dr. Fred R. Holzworth, Clovis; Scott Jackson, Tucuman; Nick Pappas, Roswell; Robert Finley, Sr., Alto; Bob Gallagher, Hobbs; Leland Tillman, Clovis; and Anita Lester, Mescalero.

## Class of '81 Top Honors go to C. Hill and D. Gallacher

The Carrizozo board of education announced at their regular March meeting that Crista Bell Hill is the valedictorian for the graduating class of '81. Debbie Gallacher is the salutatorian. Hill and Gallacher are two of 10 seniors whose scholastic average is 3.0 or above. Diplomas were signed at the board meeting for 29 graduating seniors.

The March agenda included the business of reorganizing the board. Every two years a president, vice-president and secretary are elected. The three board members holding these positions were re-elected. Retaining their positions for another two years are: Sterling Spencer, president; Wally Ferguson, vice-president; and Gail Stackpole, secretary. Ferguson was re-elected to the board this past February.

Don Wall, elected to a first term, served this month at his first regular board meeting. Wall attended a board member training session on March 6 and 7. Carrizozo superintendent, Dr. James P. Miller, Jr. accompanied Wall to the Santa Fe event which featured his father, Dr. James P. Miller, Sr. as a guest speaker. The senior Miller is superintendent of Santa Fe schools.

Prior to the regular meeting the board met for a special meeting with a representative of Quinn and Co., Mr. Paul Cassidy. The special meeting, conducted by Cassidy included the board's adoption of a resolution to begin bond sales in connection with the renovation of the high school building. Bond bid opening will be held during the regular April meeting. Cassidy will be present to recommend best offers.

The board entered into contract with the architectural firm of Hunt and Associates from Albuquerque. The agreement will extend 36 months and will include five phases for the immediate renovation of the high school building. The phases are: (1) schematic design, (2) design development, (3) construction documents, (4) bidding, (5) construction.

Hunt and Associates will be present at the April meeting to present the board with preliminary drawings for the renovation of the high school building. Superintendent Miller told the board about the staff proposal for building a greenhouse at half the cost of the architectural firm's charge. The greenhouse, to be located off the science room, will be used for the instruction of botany and related subjects.

Local attorney Bill Payne, representing Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. went before the school board to

ask them for their help in financing the facilities now under their management. Arriba, a non-profit corporation, in particular would like for the school district to take control of the Rec Center and swimming pool.

Payne said that the recreational facilities under Arriba management are utilized by the financial support of individuals, county, town and other municipalities. Arriba plans to promote golf and tennis. They would like to sub-lease the indoor Rec Center at Spencer Park.

The school district will find out if there is staff interest for the operation of the pool for a summer program. A study will be made from a budget stand point to see if such a venture is feasible. Arriba will turn over the pool to the school in operating condition if an agreement is reached. Pool repairs begin within the next three weeks.

The board reviewed budget-program priorities for the 1981-82 school year. Priorities include "core subjects" such as employee salaries and benefits, the library and the vocational program. Budget discussion included the possibility of assuming operation of the swimming pool. A committee will begin April 9 to draft the '81-82 budget. The board will review the proposed budget at their regular April 21 meeting.

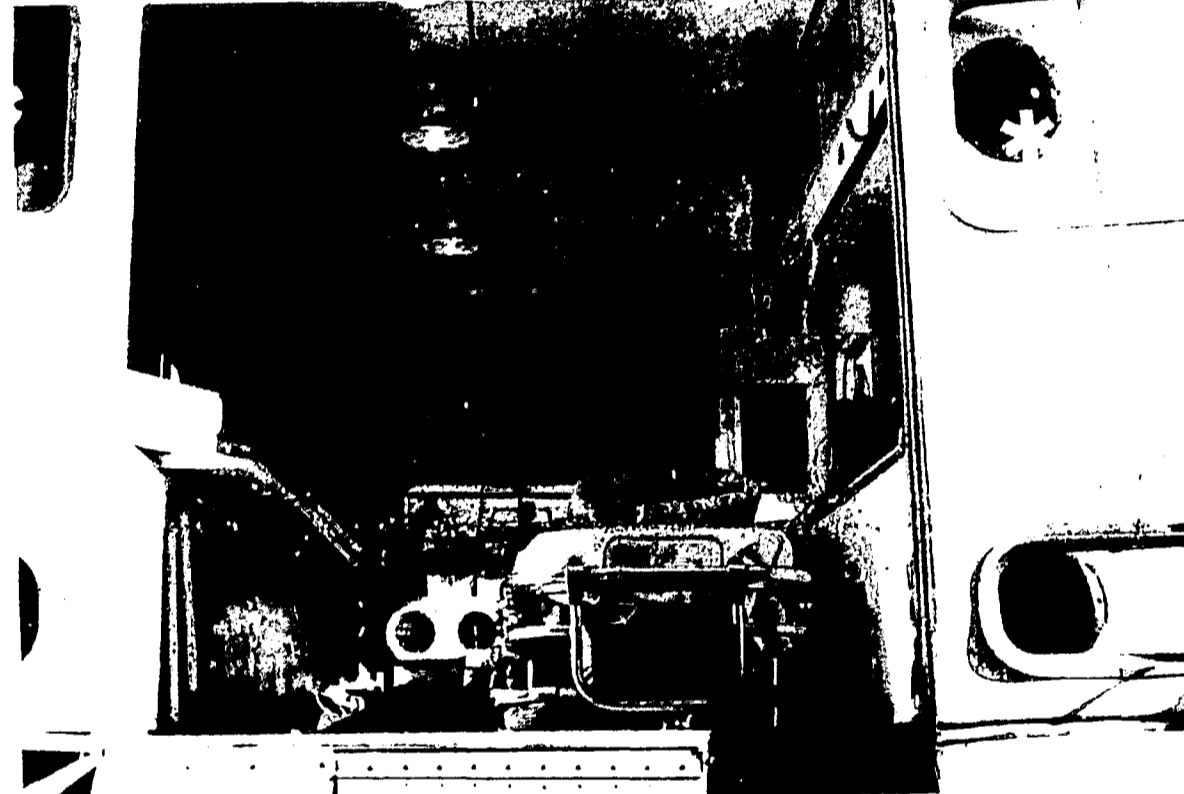
High school senior Don Ward, present with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Ward, was recognized by the board. Ward was the recipient of a

\$2,325 grant for the purpose of writing a historical account of his ancestors, who lived in the mining town of White Oaks. Ward submitted his application last Fall to the National Endowment for the Humanities. For support in seeking the grant, Ward extended his appreciation to the school's administration; Gail Stackpole, board member; and Doug Jarrard, teacher.

Band instructor Darlene Scott explained the school's music program. Scott has a beginning band consisting of sixteen 5th and 8th graders. A 7th period for the next school year was discussed as means for solving the subject competition that exists between band and other subjects.

Scott also told the board that band should have priority over a choral program. Veda Lou Stephenson, who has taught chorus on a waiver, agreed with Scott that a vocal program should not be considered.

A band library, band travel and a summer band program were ideas that Scott would like to see in the school's music program. She said that the faculty brass band of which she is a member, is a source of encouragement to school band students. She would like to initiate a community band program. A parent support group (band boosters) was cited by Scott as being an important force to a band program. Principal Steve Stuart commended Scott for outstanding job performance.

### Ambulance Study Result Shows Loss--

## Service Charge May be Upped 50%

The Lincoln County Commission at their March 24 meeting heard the results of a study on the county's ambulance service. The county is losing \$380.00 a run. The study was done on the 181 runs in a 12 month period.

Dr. Paul Krause from UNM EMS Academy conducted the study at the request of county manager, Truman Billingsley. District Attorney Steve Sanders will draw up a brief which will be filed with the New Mexico State Corporation Commission. The brief will request an increase in ambulance patient fees by 50 percent. This move will decrease the county's loss to \$261 per run.

At present, a Carrizozo resident requiring ambulance service to Alamogordo's hospital is charged \$111.50 without "extras." Extras include oxygen use (\$7.50), special handling (\$7.50), restraining devices (\$7.50).

The current base rate charged by Lincoln County Ambulance Service is as follows: First patient mile-\$30.00, second through 50th patient mile \$1.50; all patient miles over 50-\$1.00, call cancelled-\$30.00 plus .25-mile. There is a discount on multiple patient charges. A corpses call is \$15.00 plus \$1.00 per mile.

Heart attacks and vehicle accidents heads the list of all ambulance calls. An emergency medical training course being conducted by Captain's Devil Bill Adams concentrates on the assistance needed for these medical situations.

The 80-hour course which began March 2 at the Capitan school is held

twice a week for three hours. After three months of training those passing the course become certified emergency medical technicians (EMT's). A 20-hour update is required every two years.

Sixty-one EMT's are currently serving the county, eight of these for the Carrizozo area. Lincoln County Ambulance Service provides ambulances for Corona, Capitan, Alto, Hondo and Carrizozo.

In the month of March, County ambulances made 20 runs, 10 of these by the Carrizozo ambulance. These ten Carrizozo runs included a car accident, a gun-shot injury, illness at four residences and a "dry run" call

cancelled. Commission chairman, Thomas P. Cotton McKnight moved to approve an application of \$25,000 for a new ambulance to serve the Carrizozo area. Submission of the grant application was to the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Region III Council, which serves 12 counties, including Lincoln.

Billingsley states that there are 40 ambulance services in Region III, 14 hospitals and only \$73,000 to go around. He recommended asking for 50 percent matching funds and the county might be more likely to get funding for a new ambulance for Carrizozo.

### State FHA-HERO Advisor is Guest at Monthly Meet

As a special guest of the Vocational Advisory Committee on March 30, Dr. Judy Summers, State FHA-HERO Advisor, explained that New Mexico FHA-HERO does not compete statewide as other vocational groups do, primarily because their focus is on the family and; therefore, they encourage cooperation among groups through communications and workshops.

Other guests of the committee were Lisa Cantrell and Christella Chavez, FHA-HERO members who attended the recent convention in Albuquerque. Lisa gave a review of their activities.

Billy LaMay, FFA president,

reported that the local Ag. Mechanics team has won first in all contests so far and will compete in the state contests, April 8-11. Other teams have also represented Carrizozo very well.

Applications for the Vocational Advisory Scholarships are available from the school guidance counselor and will be due May 1. Contributions are being accepted now by members of the scholarship committee.

Following reports by the three vocational area teachers and an enlightening report by Laura Jones on the future child Development Program, the meeting was adjourned. The next full committee meeting will be on May 11.

The Carrizozo Municipal school system is wanting to sponsor two foreign exchange students again next school year, 1981-82.

Two families that are willing to host two students in this program are needed now.

## Application Reviewed

The chairperson of the New Mexico Health Systems Agency Subarea Advisory Council for New Mexico district VI, Josette Herrell of Cloudcroft, has announced that a review committee of the district VI council will meet with a similar committee from district IV on April 7 to review the continuational funding application of the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Council for Region III. Region III is made up of the two New Mexico planning districts IV & VI, thus a joint district review of the funding proposal is appropriate.

The Region III Emergency Medical Services Council exists for the purpose of establishing a system of emergency medical services within the twelve county area Union, Harding, Guadalupe, Quay, DeBaca, Curry, Roosevelt, Otero, Lincoln, Chaves, Eddy, and Lea Counties.

Its present priority concern is to promote the training of sufficient numbers of emergency medical technicians (EMTs) within the Region in order to have certified trained medical technicians with easy reach of all emergency situations in the region. Achieving this in some New Mexico areas is extremely difficult because of long distances between residential communities and also very low population densities. However, Regional EMS staff and many interested residents of concerned communities are committed to do the best with what is available.

The review of the Region III funding application will be held at the Roswell Public Library, in the Bondurant Room, Tuesday, April 7, 1981, beginning at 1:30 p.m. This review meeting is open to the public.

Through their class project, 'New Mexico - the Land of Enchantment' the third grade students are also learning about the multi-culture of New Mexico residents.

Navajo and Pueblo Indians were here long before Spain's Coronado came to N.M. by way of El Paso through El Camino Real in 1540. Years later Missouri traders and trappers came to N.M. by way of the Santa Fe trail. N.M. today is a bilingual state, with many Indian dialects. The English and Spanish languages are interspersed on N.M. city, town and village streets.

One of N.M.'s incomes is from tourism. The state attracts many visitors annually, who come to see the varied places of interest in this enchanting land. Mrs. June Caster has shown her third graders film strips on the state's national monuments.

The Class project features cultural music and art 'show and tell' activity. Sammy Montoya, Abe and Valarie Padilla have brought colorful sombreros to display in their classroom. Yvonne Vega brought a Mexican crafted miniature chest of drawers and a water jug. Mexican dolls and records are also available for class enjoyment.

This week the students have been involved in a play, 'Don Gatò', accompanied on the piano by music teacher, Darlene Scott. The third grade New Mexico historians will join other elementary grades at the Fiesta this coming Friday afternoon for a presentation of a folk dance, 'La Raspa'. American square dances will also be performed.

The class study of N.M. includes the sharing of multi-cultural food recipes. The mixture of the state's cultural reflects on the foods the students eat daily - frijoles, tortillas, enchiladas, Indian fry bread and popcorn, etc. Parents of students who are doing the study of N.M. history are requested to send in their favorite New Mexican recipes. Office ed teacher Lucia Vega and her class are helping the students by typing the recipes for the students' scrapbook on N.M. Mrs. Vega contributed

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her fool-proof, quick recipe for 'sopapillas', also known as Indian Fry bread: 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, salt, enough milk to make a stiff dough. Roll thin, cut into 2" squares, let set 10-15 minutes. Fry in deep fat. Recipe can be doubled, in the case of this columnist's household it has to be tripled and even quadrupled!

The state's vegetables are chili and pinto beans. Without these ingredients it is impossible to prepare a 'proper' New Mexican dish.

A Saturday night special' was to blame for the bad case of writer's block that I almost got this past Monday. 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Lincoln National Forest News

**ALAMOGORDO, NM** - The danger of wildfire was listed as high for the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest this week, according to a forest spokesman at the district office in Ruidoso.

The Sierra Blanca Ski Area was still open last week, with all lifts and trails open, with good skiing conditions. Visitors were asked to call 257-9001 for current skiing conditions.

It is a good idea for all forest visitors to call the ranger district office in the district they plan to visit for current driving and weather conditions before they leave home. Their numbers are: Smokey Bear at Ruidoso, 257-4095; Cloudcroft, 682-2551; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill 887-3411.

At Smokey Bear last week, all fuelwood areas were open. There was not enough snow for snowmobiling, cross-country skiing or tubing. Three Rivera Campground is open and the snow in the high country was melting quickly. Trails are mostly clear. Cedar Creek Picnic Area will open on April 1 for picnicking only, but no overnight camping will be allowed. District roads are in good condition.

In the Cloudcroft District, the ski area was closed and the forest was drying out. Snowplay areas were closed, but Fuelwood Area 15 was open. Wood is scarce, however, and fuelwood gatherers may have to walk 100 yards or more to get wood. Silver Campground was open for winter camping, but there is no water and no fees are being charged. Bailey Canyon Road is still closed. Primary roads are in good condition and some secondary roads are muddy or snowpacked.

Fuelwood areas were also open at

Guadalupe, but a spokesman said visitors should be aware of rapidly changing weather conditions and possible high winds. Sitting Bull Falls was receiving moderate use last week, and roads on the District are dry. There is some intermittent road construction work on Forest Road 67 (the Rim Road), and motorists should use caution. Trail conditions are good.

At Mayhill, fuelwood areas are open, and fishing is good in the Penasco River and at Bear Canyon Lake. James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. Roads are dry.

Bonito Lake near Ruidoso and Burns Canyon Lake near Chama will open April 1 (Wednesday), also the beginning of a new fishing season and the day anglers must have new licenses. Santa Cruz Lake, near Espanola, will open April 4.

Department of Game and Fish reports also indicate fishing on both trout waters and warm-water reservoirs is picking up with increasingly spring-like weather.

Bonito Lake will open this year under a new cooperative agreement between the Game and Fish Department and the City of Alamogordo. Hours for fishing will be 6 am to 10 pm through November 30. No boats or floating devices may be used on Bonito, and a portion of the lake within 600 feet of the outlet, as posted, is closed to fishing.

More than 1,000 anglers are expected at Bonito for the first two opening days, according to Richard McCleskey, chief of the department's Fisheries Division.

Bonito Lake for the past several years has been leased to the department by the City of Alamogordo, which depends on the 45-acre lake as one of its water supplies and has become concerned with increasing surface pollution at the lake. areas above the lake and to develop primitive campsites. Campers will be charged a fee for the use, McCleskey said, and the city will use the revenues to help keep the lake and surrounding area clean.

"The City of Alamogordo has been very cooperative in the past in providing public fishing and other recreation on its lands surrounding Bonito Lake," McCleskey said. "The department will continue to plant trout in the lake. Both the department and the city believe this new land management approach will provide an improved environment for thousands of anglers and campers at Bonito."
