

LOANS AUTHORIZED

Winfred F. Raley, Acting State Director of Farmers Home Administration announced today that Emergency loans have been authorized to assist farmers in Lincoln County. The designation was due to losses suffered by farmers and ranchers as a result of drought and excessively high temperatures from May 1, 1980 to August 15, 1980, resulting in the reduction of native grass production.

Farmers or ranchers who feel they were affected by the disaster can file their applications effective immediately and obtain full information from the FMHA County Office located at 1007 Mechem Drive, Highway 37, P.O. Drawer 2450, Ruidoso, NM 88345. The telephone number is 257-7371.

Applications based on physical and production losses will be taken at the County Office until January 2, 1981.

Employment Recommendations Announced, Bonds Bids Accepted

Tuesday's regular board of education meeting included 81-'82 staff employment recommendations for the Carrizozo Municipal School District.

Following a two-and-a-half hour executive session board president Sterling Spencer, publically announced the decision made by the Board by category of employment: administrative and supervisory, non-certified; tenured certified, non-tenured certified.

Four certified employees achieved tenure with their contracts: June Caster, Joe DeTevis, Jane Erwin and J.C. Richmond.

Four non-tenured certified employees resigned: Rick Bush, Shirley Taylor, Robert Shantz and Darlene Scott. Title I Aide, Dorothy O'Brien also resigned.

The rest of the staff with the exception of Title I and cafeteria employees, whose contracts depend on federal funding, were offered contracts for 81-'82. Federal funding has not yet been assured.

Pagan Rouché was recommended and hired for the mid-school Science faculty employment position for '81-'82. Rouché is currently a home economics and mid-science teacher with Tularosa schools.

Paul Cassidy, representing Quinn and Co. brokerage firm from Albuquerque was present at Tuesday's meeting. Cassidy recommended that the board of education accept the bid submitted by Citizens State Bank for the general obligation bonds in the amount of \$170,000.00 at 8 percent interest. The Board passed a legal resolution accepting this bid.

District voters in February approved the passage of a 2-mill levy and the bond issue. With the Board's acceptance of the bond bid, the district's high school renovation project kicks off in June. Completion is scheduled for early September. The '81-'82 school year begins Aug. 24.

At a special April 14 board meeting, Eugene Hunt and Carl Fulmer representing Dean and Hunt Associates LTD. of Albuquerque presented preliminary drawings for the renovation of the high school building.

At this meeting the plans were reviewed by the Board and several slight modifications were suggested. Architects Hunt and Fulmer discussed start and completion of the

project. The drawings may be viewed at Citizens State Bank.

Gambles 'Blitzed' Twice--

Easter Weekend Commercial Burglary

Approximately \$2,845.99 worth of merchandise was stolen from Mean's Gambles sometime between closing time Friday, April 17 and opening time Saturday morning, April 18. The store's owner, Ken Means discovered the theft when he opened for business last Saturday morning. Means reported the incident to the Lincoln County Sheriff's office, who in turn informed Carrizozo Town Police.

Law enforcement officers determined that person or persons unknown entered the store by breaking the large front door window with an old chunk of cement. Six rifles, two stereos, two cassette players, one 8-track player and eighteen western-style shirts were discovered missing. The Easter holiday 'shopper' selected size 15.

County and Town police investigation continues. Anyone with information regarding the incident is asked to contact the Sheriff's Department or Town Police.

This is the second big burglary to occur at Carrizozo's Gambles. The

first offense occurred about four years ago when an estimated \$3,000 worth of merchandise was stolen. The merchandise was later found in some abandoned buildings in Carrizozo. The majority of the items, including firearms were recovered and returned to Gambles.

No charges were filed in that case. In that incident and the most recent one over the Easter weekend, Gambles' owner was not insured for this type of loss.



The Lincoln National Forest was grateful for a little rain and a little snow last week, which helped to lower the danger of wildfire in the forest. Steadily increasing visitor traffic is expected on the forest during the next few weeks, as the weather continues to warm up and campers and picnickers begin enjoying the delights of Spring.

Bonita Lake is receiving heavy fishing pressure on weekends. Three Rivers Campground and Cedar Creek Picnic Area are open. The remaining campgrounds will open May 15. Small amounts of snow remain in the high country. Trails are mostly clear and roads are in good condition. Temperatures are ranging from the 30's to the 70's. Fire conditions are moderate, with no restrictions. All fuelwood areas except number 2 are open.

At Clouderott, fire danger is also moderate. The Joplin Ridge Fuelwood Area is open. It is a charge area. Silver Campground, and the Silver Over-flow Area are both open, but there is no water and no fees being charged. Bailey Canyon Road is still closed and the portion of the Rim Trail from a mile south of Alamo Peak Road to Atkinson Field, is closed. Maintenance work on the

upper portion of Dog Canyon Trail is in progress. Roads are in good condition, but there may be some isolated muddy spots. The Death of Billy the Kid -

Special Presentation at Lincoln Pageant

JAIL ESCAPEE AT LARGE - TWO DEAD

In a flurry of gunfire and death today, William Bonney - alias Billy the Kid - escaped from the county jail. Deputy Ollinger was gunned down in the street as he ran to investigate. Sheriff's officers are searching for clues in the escape. "No one is sure where Bill got the gun, but we'll find out," said Sheriff Garrett.

That may have been the way headlines read some one hundred years ago on April 28, 1881 when "Billy the Kid" escaped from the Lincoln County Jail, Lincoln New Mexico. That story has been told and retold over the years - the facts embellished and glorified. Many of the mysteries of that daring escape and of the man still remain unsolved -

unchanged since that fateful day. The community of Lincoln remains today virtually unchanged since 1881, it's place in history carved out with violence and bloodshed.

To commemorate Billy's daring escape the Lincoln Pageant and Festivals Corporation and the community of Lincoln will put on a special abbreviated presentation of Billy the Kid's daring escape Saturday, May 2nd in Lincoln, New Mexico. The actors - all Lincoln County residents - have added a new chapter to Billy's story - The Death of the Kid - which took place some weeks later in Fort Sumner. Also participating in the presentation will be the nationally famous Honco Valley Dancers, and Mr. Joe Salazar, performing traditional Spanish folk songs.

"There are some fishing hotspots this week in New Mexico," says Jim Knight, Extension wildlife specialist for New Mexico State University. Knight's predictions are used on information gathered by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish.

In the northeast part of the state, head up to Lake Maloya, Knight says. Spend some time on the east side of the dam along the northeast shore. Some nice catches of trout can be taken on corn and salmon eggs.

If you're a river fisherman, try the Cimarron River. You should be able to get some rainbows using corn and salmon eggs. You might also try

for German browns using spinner bait in the lower portion of the river.

In the northwest part of New Mexico, try Abiquiu Lake. Use minnows and corn and you should be able to get some nice sized fish.

In the southeast part of the state, Bonito Lake can produce some limits of rainbows. Try worms and salmon eggs, Knight says.

In the southwest part of the state, thereal hotpot is Snow Lake. There's excellent fishing using fireballs. Fish from the bank but get the fireballs on the bottom. Try various lures also from the bank and you should be able to get a nice mess of trout, the NMSU wildlife specialist says.






