Easter Weekend Commercial Burglary

Approximately \$2,845.99 worth of 7MM Mag . . . \$325.00. merchandise was stolen from Mean's Gambles sometime between closing time Friday, April 17 and opening time Saturday morning, April 18. The store's owner, Ken Means discovered the theft when he opened for business last Saturday morning. Means reported the incident to the Lincoln County Sheriff's office, who in turn informed Carrizozo Town Police.

Law enforcement officers determined that person or persons unknown entered the store by breaking the large front door window with an old chunk of cement. Six rifles, two stereos, two cassette players, one 8-track player and eighteen western-style shirts were discovered missing. The Easter holiday 'shopper' selected size 15.

served twice as president as well as chairman of many committees.


To Dorothy goes the credit for the success of the New Mexico Beef Cook-Off. In 1980 New Mexico had the second; place national winner.

The Lincoln National Forest was grateful for a little rain and a little anow last week, which helped to lower the danger of wildfire in the forest. Steadily increasing visitor traffic is expected on the forest during the next few weeks, as the weather continues to warm up and campers and picnickers begin enjoying the delights of Spring.

In the Smokey Bear District, at Ruidogo, water levels are normal, and

Bonita Lake is receiving heavy fishing pressure on weekends. Three Rivers Camparound and Cedar Creek Picnic Area are open. The remaining campgrounds will open May 15. Small amounts of snow remain in the high country. Trails are mostly clear and roads are in good condition. Temperatures are ranging from the 30's to the 70's. Fire conditions are moderate, with no restrictions. All fuelwood areas except number 2 are

At Clouderoft, fire danger is also moderate. The Joplin Ridge Fuelwood Area is open, It is a charge area. Silver Campground, and the Silver Over-flow Area are both open, but there is no water and no fees being charged, Bailey Canyon Road is still closed and the portion of the Rim-Trail, from a mile south of Alamo Peak Road to Atkinson Field, is closed. Maintenance work on the

upper portion of Dog Canyon Trail is in progress. Roads are in good condition, but there may be some isolated. muddy spots.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, fuelwood areas are open but some areas are wet. They have received some rain this past week. Sitting Bull Falls Picnic area is receiving moderate use through the week, and heavy use on weekends. Road work is continuing on Forest

Road 540, and intermittent road construction is continuing on Forest Road 67, the Rim Road, Motorists should use caution in these areas. Trail and road conditions ar wet.

At Mayhill, fuelwood areas are open and James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. It has been ranging on the Mayhill District, and some roads may be muddy, Turkey Season will be open until the 26th of





QUESTION: Do Black Widow spider bites kill you?

ANSWER: Medical records, according to most Drs., show that spider bites cause severe symptoms to the nervous system: vomiting, dizziness hard breathing, ringing of the ears and headaches. The spider bite poison will affect a person 5 or 6 days. The bite itself should be treated with iodine and immersed in ice water. Or apply an ice pack.
