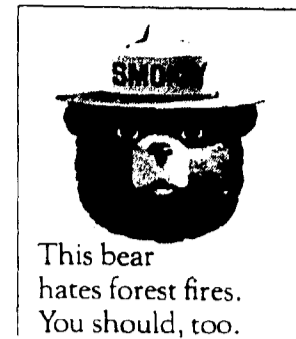

Carrizozo Town Meeting--

Fields Sworn in as Trustee

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees conducted their regular meeting of May 11 with a "full force". Sheila E. (Betty) Fields was sworn in following the motion by Trustee Ruth Armstrong and seconded by Trustee Roy Harman.

Mayor Manuel Hernandez had originally recommended Earl Fenter, a former Carrizozo trustee for the position saying that Fenter would represent the area south of the railroad tracks well. Hernandez, asked for the council's vote, Armstrong felt she could work with Fenter, but that "dozens" of residents had contacted her requesting that Fields be recommended. Harman, when asked for his vote of 'yes' or 'no' for Fenter said, "I'll withhold judgement," and would not commit himself as to why he took this stand. Trustee Richard Vega voted for Fenter.

Town attorney Bill Payne said the mayor technically has the right to recommend someone to fill the vacant trustee seat. He then recommended Armstrong's recommendation and asked for the council's approval or disapproval. Harman seconded Armstrong's motion and Fields was sworn in.

Fields expressed her thanks for the appointment and said that she'll not "just work for this section or that section", but for every citizen, wherever they live.

Fields who manages her own accounting service was raised in Carrizozo and attended school here, graduating with the class of '53. She returned to Carrizozo after retiring from Hamada Inn, Inc. in 1978. With a bachelor's degree in Accounting, a Master's in Business Administration and a Doctorate in business, Fields has the background to assist the mayor and trustees in budget preparation and grant requests.

She began accounting work at the age of 15 when she worked for Albert Roberts at Monte Vista Service Station. She has also worked for N.M. Welfare System; as the District Court Clerk in Carrizozo; and as a legal secretary to George Zimmerman when he was a Carrizozo attorney.

At last Monday's short meeting Hernandez read a letter from John Allen Hightower, whose greeting on his letter began: "Gentlemen and Madam", Hightower asked for the

council's "assistance and guidance" in whatever way and means is proper and legal, to effect the curbing and paving, of 6th St. from E Ave. to F Ave. He plans to place a side walk along his property and asked if permission was required.

Hightower who serves on the Lincoln County Commission also said that the county would like to replace the side walk and curbing along the highway near the new parking lot at the courthouse and asked for the town's assistance.

In regard to the street paving on

6th St., Hernandez said that they have inquired into State assistance, but have not had a response. He said the town will "do what we can with what we've got" and requested that the town superintendent do some blade work on 6th St. and add gravel.

A special meeting was scheduled for May 12 at 1:30 p.m. at the town hall between the town, Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. and the Carrizozo Municipal school system. Al Romero, Financial Division, Santa Fe was present. Romero went over Arriba's agreement for taking over all the

recreational facilities. He commented and explained on different contract sections. He discussed the federal grant and the town's pay back procedure.

The council moved to make \$6,000 worth of improvements on the swimming pool. When the town brings the pool up to acceptable standards to suit the environmental agency, the school will take over the management. The school plans to invest \$3,000 to \$3,500 for a summer program.

Carrizozo Still Not In---

Commissioner Moves to Withdraw County Out of SBAC

(Budget Request Made for Courthouse Sub-office in Ruidoso)

At the May 5 Lincoln County Commissioners meeting, Chairman "Cotton" McKnight told the commissioners that the commission's seat on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) should be vacated. McKnight, who resides in Picacho expressed his opinion that he did not like the Ruidoso Village's continued disapproval of Carrizozo membership on SBAC.

SBAC originally established for the feasibility study of locating a regional airport in Lincoln County, has five (5) governing bodies on it's commission - Ruidoso Village, Ruidoso Downs, Mescalero Apache Tribe, Capitan Village and the County Commission.

In July 1980, Carrizozo's mayor appointed two representatives to SBAC. The Carrizozo Woman's Club and the C of C Economic Development Committee put up the required membership fee of \$500. Carrizozo has tried for eleven months to seek a vote and voice on at SBAC meetings without success.

McKnight said he was elected to help all of Lincoln County and he felt that it was wrong that Carrizozo be denied membership on SBAC. He moved to withdraw the county out of SBAC and have the treasurer divide the money among those entitled to a share.

County Commissioner Ben

Hall stated that the Mescalero Apache tribe hadn't approved of Carrizozo representation on SBAC either and that all SBAC members have to sign. Hall said that two Ruidoso trustees had mentioned that the matter concerning SBAC and Carrizozo would be brought up at their next village meeting. Hall, a resident of Ruidoso in the county commission's spokesperson at SBAC meetings.

Commissioner Hightower has attended SBAC meetings as an interested and concerned county resident. Hightower said he has not been treated kindly by SBAC and his opinion is that SBAC doesn't welcome his presence there.

Hightower, who lives near Carrizozo in Ancho, asked that McKnight attend the next SBAC meeting before making the decision to withdraw the county membership. McKnight agreed with Hightower that he should voice his opinion regarding Ruidoso's failure to approve SBAC membership for Carrizozo.

Hall then informed the commissioners that SBAC Chairman Fred Heckman, (who presumably lives in Ruidoso) has cancelled all SBAC meetings until further notice. The joint powers agreement states that SBAC, a public body, will meet once a month. The move to cancel all meetings is technically illegal. (The NEWS contacted County Mgr., Truman Billingsley this past Tuesday

to inquire if SBAC has scheduled a meeting since the May 5 county commissioners meeting. "I don't know when they'll (SBAC) meet," Billingsley answered without further comment.)

In other county business, Commissioner Hall, requested budgeting for a sub-office in Ruidoso of the Lincoln County courthouse. Hall said that his proposal be considered in next fiscal year's budget. Discussion followed on employees needed for a sub-office, emergency communication system (other than through the sheriff's sub-station already established in Ruidoso) and transportation of documents which require processing at Carrizozo, county seat of Lincoln County.

The commission authorized the county manager to negotiate with Mary Lu Brown about taking the position of county professional medical advisor for the ambulance service. Brown is director of nursing at Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

A request from the Carrizozo Municipal Schools to extend the bus route in Nogal Canyon by 9 miles was approved. It was pointed out that new families have moved there with school age children.

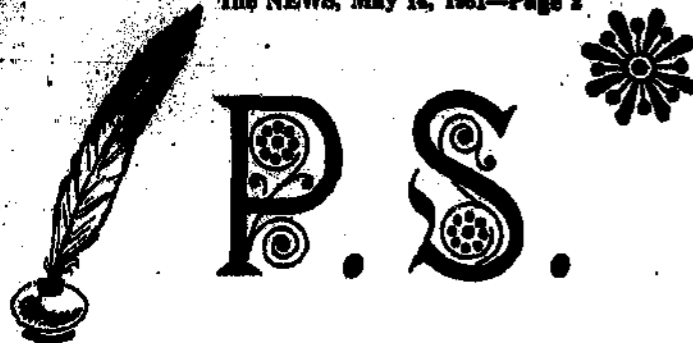
The commission approved Carrizozo Health Center proposed expenditures. The Center's x-ray equipment needs to be re-located and additional office space is required. The Center needs room to expand facilities and the commission voted to

appropriate \$5,000 for the purchase of a lot nearby. Present at the commissioners meeting were Joan Means, Mary Rich Adams and Rev. David Lynch, who are a part of a group of people who serve on the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Committee. Commissioner Hightower is also a member.

As in the past, the commission again approved a budget request to provide \$1,500 in financial assistance for the Jane Turner Memorial Pool. Bill Payne, Carrizozo attorney and Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. president made the request. Arriba is a county non-profit corporation which operates and manages the local and area recreational facilities which are utilized by county residents.

Fruit Leather

Fruit leather? That's right. Strawberry fruit leather, a chewy tasty, nutritious snack will be among the foods a NMSU food specialist will be demonstrating at 10:30 at Santa Rita parish hall. The May 15 workshop is for all those interested in canning, freezing and drying.

Talking of strawberries, a Post Script reader has contributed a strawberry preserve recipe for those who took advantage of the big sale recently. Alice Wright, a local resident shares with 'P.S.' readers a recipe for easy, perfect preserves which she has used for years. She said her method eliminates the risk of over boil which takes away flavor and ruins appearance of the finished product.

Strawberry Preserves our 1 quart (4 cups) sugar over 1 quart strawberries in large kettle (in case of over boil). Alice prefers whole medium size strawberries but the large ones can be cut in half. Let stand until juice forms. Place on low heat (lower than simmer) to dissolve sugar. With wet towel wipe sugar around inside pan edges. Slowly bring to a rolling boil. Count to 10 slowly. Remove kettle of strawberries from heat. Pour in flat pan which has edges and let stand about 10 hours or overnight, (this thickens the mixture). Pour into sterile containers.

Summer Youth-- Employment Program Announced

The federal department of Labor has authorized funds in excess of \$3,000,000 to be used for the 1991 CETA Summer Youth Employment Program in all counties except Bernalillo, which received its own funding. These funds are expected to pay wages or allowances for nearly 4000 young people this year. Although the amount is slightly higher than last year's funding, higher minimum wage rates and higher than last year's funding, higher minimum wage rates and higher costs will keep the number of participants at approximately the same level as in last year's program.

To be eligible for enrollment a young person must be between the ages of 14 and 21; and must be handicapped or economically disadvantaged. Applications are now being accepted at local high schools and local field offices. Participants may not be placed on work sites until schools are closed. Students may receive pre-application forms and guidance from their high school counselors. Subsequent enrollment of selected applicants will take place at field offices throughout the State.

Students may be placed in actual work sites or, in some instances, in classroom or vocational training programs for a period of up to 9 weeks, and will be paid wages or allowances at the minimum wage rate of \$3.35 per hour for a maximum of 20 hours per week. The program will begin on June 8 and participation will end by August 14. All enrollees will complete the program by the time school opens in the fall.

Purposes of the Summer Youth Employment Program include introducing economically disadvantaged youth to the world of work and enabling them to earn money needed to return to school at summer's end. Besides providing employment, many work sites will give youth the opportunity to explore different vocations, thus encouraging them to select and prepare for a field of work.

Other historical and natural monuments dot the area. Northwest of Ruidoso are an old Spanish-Mission and the Gran Quivira ruins of an Indian pueblo community which thrived from about 800 to 1700.

Also in nearby Carrizozo is the Valley of Fire State Park, one of the

largest preserved lava flows in the world, and the Carrizozo Recreation Area (golfing, tennis, fishing & playground), Southward, near Alamogordo, are the White Sands National Monument and the Space Hall of Fame.
