### Briefs...

The South Central Mountain RC&D group will meet this coming Tuesday, June 23rd in Ruidoso at the Public Library. Wally Ferguson will preside over the Executive Committee meeting which will begin at 10:00 am. The afternoon session will convene at 1:00 pm, chaired by Clem Weendorf. The SCMRC&D has accepted a pilot project for the Carrizo, Patos, and Jicarilla mountains to raise wild turkeys for the control of harmful insects. The guest speaker for the afternoon session, Dan Sutcliffe, Research Biologist for the Wild Turkey Project, will be talking about our proposed project and will answer any questions. He works for the NM Dept. of Game & Fish in Alamogordo. Everyone in the area is invited to attend the RC&D meeting. Ideas of any kind for new projects are always welcome. Further information may be obtained by calling the SCS office in Carrizozo, 648-2941.

Brent Sultemeier has been awarded Crown Cowbelle's first scholarship. The scholarship is for one hundred dollars to be divided equally between two semesters. Brent has been accepted for the fall term at New Mexico State University where he plans now to major in agriculture mechanics.

Brent, 18, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Sultemeier. He is a member of pioneer families who for six generations have ranched in the Corona area.

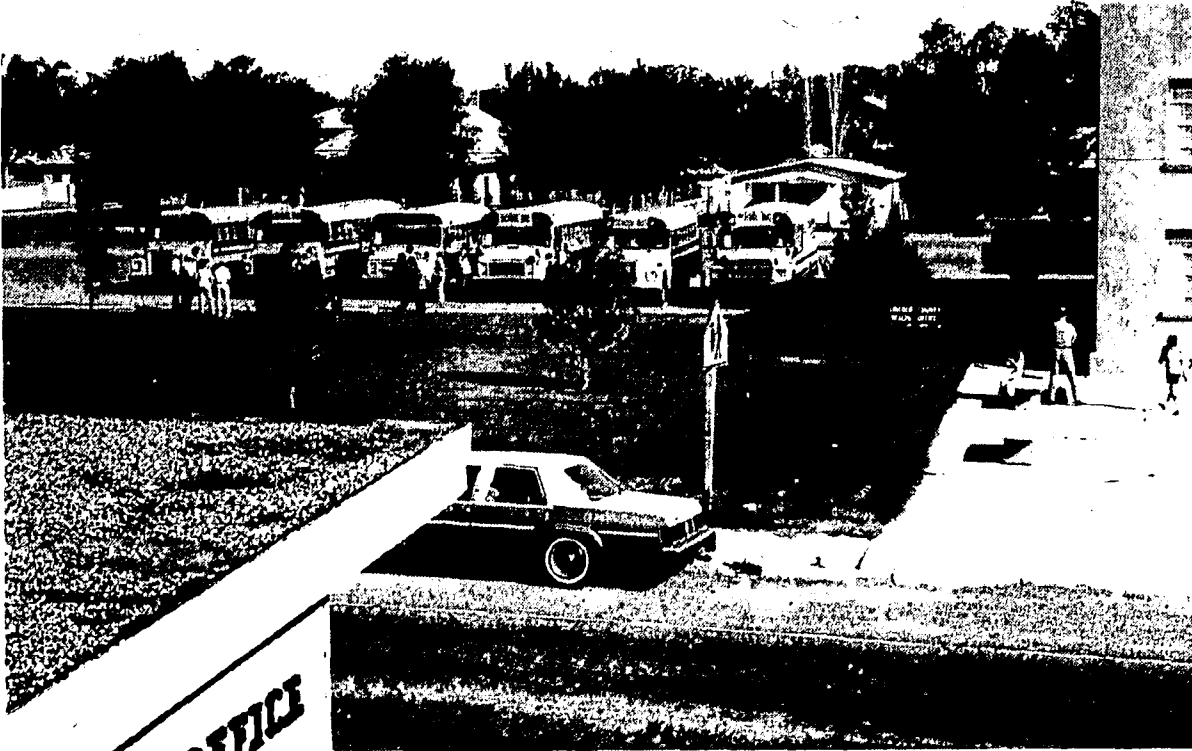
He has attended Corona schools where he played football and basketball and is a member of FFA. He has spent his eighteen years on the ranch where he helps his father and grandfather and neighbors with all ranch work. He enjoys hunting and fishing and has trapped for several seasons.

Brent received the Jim Goodloe sportsmanship award at the 1979 Lincoln County Fair and Rodeo. He is an outstanding young man of the Corona community.

The Lincoln County Development Association will again be sponsoring the annual White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express Race. The race is to be held on August 8th starting at White Oaks at 8:00 am. The purse is \$3,500 divided first, second, and third places.

This is a designated mail route and the riders will again be carrying letters. Anyone wishing to have a letter carried in the race needs to do the following:

- 1) Address and stamp a first envelope to whomever it is to be sent to.
- 2) Insert the stamped, addressed envelope - along with 50 cents per letter - into a second envelope, stamped and addressed to Pony Express, Lincoln, New Mexico 88338.
- 3) The pony express committee will remove the original letter from the outside envelope and affix a gold seal stamped to commemorate the 13th annual Pony Express Race. The letter will be placed in the race and then sent to the addressee through the postal service.

## Lincoln County Ranch Tour Draws Large Attendance

Agriculture is the world's most important industry and has influenced the way man lives throughout history. The Second Annual Lincoln County Ranch Tour provided the general public a closer look at how three Lincoln County ranches contribute toward agriculture, America's single largest industry with assets totaling \$820 billion.

The informative and entertaining ranch tour was a joint effort of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, the Cowbelle and FFA organizations of Carrizozo and Corona, the Carrizozo Woman's Club, Farm Bureau and the Soil Conservation Service Board.

Seven buses were required to transport approximately 275 people of all ages to three area ranches for the county's second annual ranch tour held Saturday, June 13. Buses were loaned by Frankie Silva, Captain, Everett and Linda Greer, Nogal, Carrizozo Public Schools, and Garland Tillary of Estancia.

The first ranch on tour was the Curtiss horse ranch, west of Carrizozo. Bob Curtiss gave a talk about the raising and caring of registered horses, which are used for show or ranch work. A demonstration on "cutting" was featured in the ranch's arena with sons Mike and Joe assisting.

The next stop was the Bar W cattle ranch, also west of Carrizozo. The Curtiss men gave rancher Sterling Spencer a helping hand. A weight guessing contest, a talk on raising livestock and a branding demonstration were among the activities conducted with cowboys Tony Gable and Alan Langley assisting.

At the Bar W, Scott Shafer, executive vice-president of Citizens State Bank of Carrizozo gave tour participants a talk on the financial impact of agriculture in the state of New Mexico and Lincoln County. Shafer, who also is president of Carrizozo's Chamber of Commerce told the ranch crowd that agriculture employs more people than any other industry in the country and historically has been the nation's most effective creator of new wealth.

Volunteer bus drivers, including Everett Greer, J.C. Richmond,

Morgan Maxwell, Barry Herd, Hoot Gibson and two Estancia men, drove their passengers to White Oaks for lunch prepared by the Carrizozo Woman's Club. The meal was served at the old school house.

Tour participants enjoyed the bar-be-cue lunch in Lincoln County's most famous "semi-ghost" town nestled in a alley between the Captain and Jicarilla mountains. White Oaks recently attracted state-wide attention with a modern day feud between two families.

At the luncheon site the Corona Crown Cowbelle's drew names for door prizes and Captain's Greg Haussler gave a talk on land management. Haussler is associated with the Soil Conservation Service.

The last ranch on tour was the

nearby Gnatkowski sheep ranch in Ancho. Hosts and hostesses here were A.W. "Gnat" and wife, Janice, their son Pete, his wife Sarah, and their daughter and son, Callie and John Pete.

The ranch had on exhibition different types of sheep. Demonstrations were held on shearing and lamb marking. Bessie Jones, Juanita Sultemeier and Linda Ponder spinned and weaved. Kelley Hobbs gave a demonstration on predator control

After a fun-filled and educational day, the ranch tour visitors were bused back to the starting point, the Lincoln County court house in Carrizozo. The ranch tour concluded with an ice cream social, which was included in the price of the tour ticket.

## Historic Wortley Hotel Re-opening Set - June 26th

The historic Wortley Hotel, owned by the State as part of Lincoln State Monument in Lincoln, NM, will re-open June 26 pending contract approval by the State Board of Finance.

The eight-room, frontier-style hotel has been closed since Dec. 1 while the museum searched for a lease to operate it and arranged for installation of new kitchen equipment.

The Museum has signed an agreement with Eleanor Paul and Richard Watts to operate the hotel. That contract must be approved by the Board of Finance at its June 15 meeting before it becomes binding.

Both Paul and Watts are Roswell residents. Paul has a wide background in the restaurant and hotel fields. Watts owns successful businesses in home building, decorating, and handcrafted art objects.

The Wortley, named after its manager Samuel Wortley, was built in 1872 to serve ranchers, lawyers and merchants who visited Lincoln, then county seat of Lincoln County.

The building burned down in 1934 and was rebuilt to its original appearance in 1960. Each guestroom was furnished with a Victorian brass bed, lace curtains and marble-topped dresser.

In 1978 the Wortley's ownership passed to the Museum of New Mexico from the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission under former Governor Jerry Apodaca's government reorganization plan.

Last spring the Museum spent \$50,000 to repair, renovate and redecorate the building. The work included refinishing floors, walls and ceilings, and replacing all bathroom fixtures. New dining room furniture and tableware were purchased, and period artwork was found to decorate each room.

Major work was also done in the kitchen, but available funding was

sufficient to cover only repair, not replacement of major equipment.

An emergency purchase request just approved by the State Property Control Division did provide money for new equipment - range, ice cube machine, exhaust fans, shutters, screens, refrigerator and linoleum floor to complete the job.

Paul and Watts said the dining room will be open for breakfast, lunch and dinner. They plan family-style service at moderate prices, and hope to apply for a beer- and wine license.

Room rates will be \$25 to \$35 per night. Reservations can be made by writing the Wortley Hotel, Lincoln, NM, 88338. After June 26, the telephone number will be 653-4381.

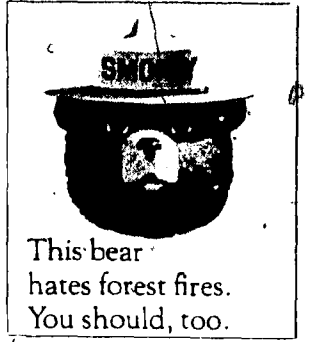

## SHERIFF'S REPORT

This is a second column of the Sheriff's Department doings which will appear on each issue of the Lincoln County News. We will be telling you of the complaints, arrests, investigations, traffic accidents that have been investigated by the Sheriff's Department.

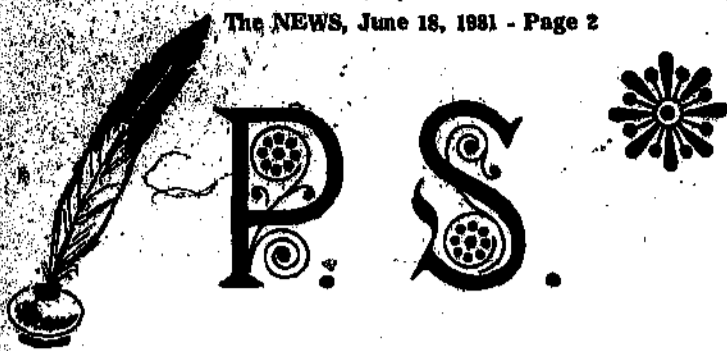

## SEWING UPDATE

Just when I think I know everything there is to know about sewing, Mary Ellen Payne, Lincoln County Home Economist comes up with new tricks of the trade. At Lincoln County Achievement Day she had on display sewing items that lend a helping hand, add convenience and save time.

Mary Ellen Payne was kind to let me and Dorothy Current of Carrizozo, another sewing enthusiast, purchase some of these tools of the trade, among them - needle lubricant. My sewing machine was skipping stitches, something I had never experienced. Needle lubricant applied sparingly to spool and bobbin thread and sewing tools make machine sewing smoother and hand sewing easier.

Apply lubricant to machine needle, bottom of presser foot. Use lubricant on stubborn metal zippers and for cleaning for your eye glasses. Handy stuff.

## Sign Bug at Large

Stop signs stolen last Saturday were among several that have been destroyed or removed from local streets recently. Carrizozo Chief of Police C.A. Morales said that the intersections of B Avenue and Drexel Blvd; E Avenue and 14th Street; and E Avenue and 5th St. were sites that attracted the "stop sign bug".

Morales said the stop sign violations have been occurring for about a month. The absence of the signs creates dangerous traffic hazards. Citizens are urged to come forward if they have information that could help apprehend the person or persons involved in the stop sign taking or vandalism.

It is unlawful for any person to willingly, maliciously or wantonly destroy, injure, remove, tamper with or deface real property or improvements thereto or personal property, either public or private.

Morales warns that any person found guilty of violating any of the provisions of the ordinance will be fined not more than three hundred (\$300) or imprisoned for a period of not more than ninety days.

Attendance at Lincoln State Monument for the first five months of 1981 continues ahead of the same period in 1980.

Through May 31, 6,235 have visited the 19th century courthouse museum, compared to 5,886 in 1980. Visitation in May itself also increased slightly, to 2,300 this year from 2,347 in 1980.

All other state monuments, except one, also show increases for the year: Coronado 18,065, up 175; Fort Sumner 3,065, up 341; Jemez 6,195, up 748; and Quarai 3,167 up 485. Fort Selden is down from 4,710 to 3,363.

The Palace of the Governors museum in Santa Fe, most prominent of the state's historic structures, has had 123,963 visitors this year, 21,947 more than through May, 1980.

Cooking and Campfire restrictions will be placed into effect for the Lincoln National Forest on Friday, June 19th at 8:00am. Any questions regarding the restrictions can be answered by calling the Smokey Bear Ranger District at 257-4095.

High fire danger listings are in effect for the Smokey Bear and Cloudcroft Ranger Districts, but not for Guadalupe, at Carlsbad, and Mayhill. The Smokey Bear Hot Shots responded to a call for help to fight a small fire on the Cibola National Forest, Monday, near Magdalena. The Hot Shots were accompanied by sector bosses Jim Snow, Roy Parker and Ed Wishard, and crew liaison officers Alan Beatty and Bob Pena. Two local air tankers responded to the Cibola fire, also. It was put out.

Last week on the Smokey Bear District, all facilities were open. Southfork Campground was receiving heavy use and others were receiving moderate use. Streams were running low and being used heavily, along with Bonito Lake. Roads are in good shape, but dry and dusty, as are

trails. Campers were urged to keep their food put away, because bears have been seen raiding dumpsters.

At Cloudcroft, Upper Sleepy Grass Campground is temporarily closed for construction, but other campgrounds are open and receiving heavy use on weekends and moderate use during the week. Evening campfire programs will be held at the Silver overflow area on Saturdays at 7:30 p.m., beginning June 13. Fuelwood areas are open.

Along with such expressions of praise, the respondents described the manner in which their respective

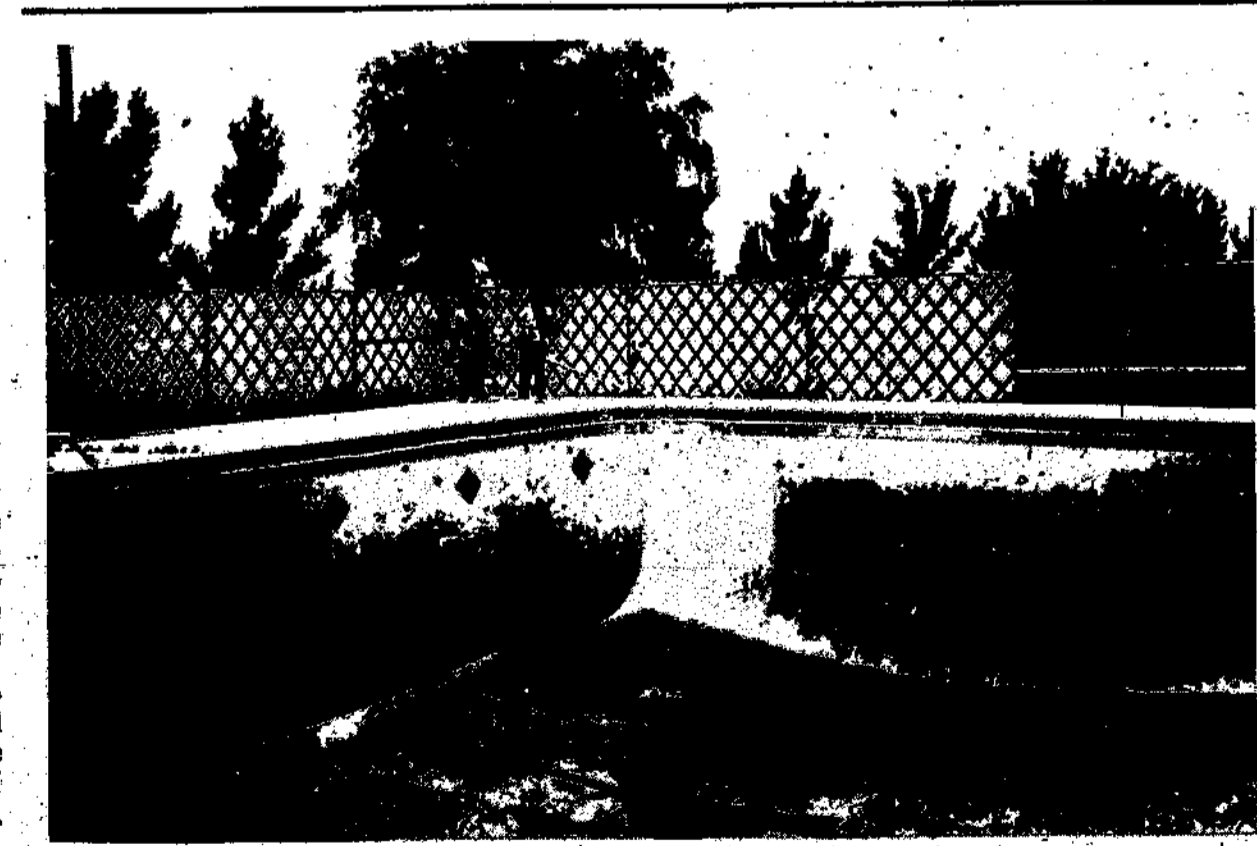
Chambers were organized and functioned to further the economic development of their towns.

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## Elderly and Handicapped Transportation Grant Available

The state Highway Department has money available to help local non-profit organizations provide transportation for elderly and handicapped persons.

The funds come from a federal grant program administered by the department. For several years, funds available through this program have been used by community groups to buy vehicles for use in specialized transportation programs.

This year, the federal Department of Transportation through its Urban Mass Transportation Administration has made \$140,000 available for the purchase of vans or small buses to be used in programs designed to improve the mobility of elderly and handicapped persons. Many of these vehicles are equipped with wheelchair lifts or ramps.

Groups qualifying under the federal guidelines can receive 80 percent of vehicle purchase costs. The balance must be provided through local sources.

In New Mexico, some Community Development Act funds and Indian Self-determination and Education Act funds can be used for matching funds.

An announcement of the grant availability has been mailed to approximately 600 organizations and individuals throughout the state, according to Judy Gray, who is coordinating the program for the road agency's planning division.

This year, applicants must coordinate grant applications with their state Area-wide Planning Agency (Council of Governments or Economic Development District office).

To avoid a duplication of existing services, applicant will also be required to contact public and private transportation operators in their community along with other non-profit groups already providing transportation services to a variety of users. Groups applying for a grant will be asked to show that their proposed service is not already being provided by others.

Information packets, including grant applications and other forms, can be obtained by writing to Ms. Gray at the Highway Department's general office: P.O. Box 1149, Santa Fe, NM 87503. Grant applicants must also submit a letter stating their intent to participate in the program. These letters of intent should be submitted to the department by July 31.
