Luna House Museum and Visitor's Center

Complex Open House - June 27th

Robert O. Anderson, President of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, announced today the opening of the Trust's newly completed Luna House Museum and Visitor's Center complex in Lincoln, New Mexico with an open house, 2-5pm, Saturday, June 27, 1981.

"We are opening with an exhibit of Peter Hurd facsimiles signed by the artist, the only complete collection in existence, collected over the past 30 years by John Meigs, Executive Director of the Lincoln County Heritage Trust. The first in a series of Indian figurines by Cybis furnished by Loretta Aiello Mathis will be on exhibit in the entrance

alcove. There will be on display a Harold Von Schmidt painting of 'Billy the Kid and his Regulators'. Von Schmidt, a painter and illustrator, was well-known for depicting Western People and Western Landscapes. There is also a painting of an Apache Youth Warrior by contemporary artist, William A. Hughes.

"The Rogers Aston exhibit, a gift to the Lincoln County Heritage Trust, includes five important saddles, saddle blankets and curly fringed chaps, a shingle axe and a superb Apache medicine vest and high topped beaded Indian boots.

"The Peter Hurd, 'Death of De Vargas', a full size mural study for

the New Mexico Military Institute, depicts the death of the conquistador in New Mexico. The replica is mounted in the entrance way of the Museum and Visitor's Center.

"A fine collection of early photos of Lincoln and the principals in its history have been enlarged and are being shown in the Visitor's Center Theater, a collection of original posters of Billy the Kid movies are mounted.

"The permanent exhibit is in the planning stage and will be opened next year. The restored Luna House across the patio from the Museum & Visitor's Center will be open and at a later date will be furnished

Emergency medical service providers in Lincoln County recently received approval for the expenditure

of \$16,470 in federal grant monies to purchase basic life support equipment, announced Susan W. Cox, Executive Director of Eastern New Mexico Emergency Medical Services Corporation, Region III, headquartered in Clovis.

'Lincoln Days' Changes Slated

The people of Lincoln County will be interested in hearing about changes in the 'Old Lincoln Days' festivities held in Lincoln NM, August 7 & 9. This year the festivities are being handled by a newly formed corporation - The Lincoln Pageant and Festivals Corporation, made up of citizens of Lincoln County.

The corporation is attempting to improve the pageant, parade, and services offered to the public during the three days of festivities.

Persons interested in participating with food concessions should write the corporation for permits. We are particularly interested in service organizations or church groups interested in earning money for the service of the County.

The parade this year will again include the Fort Bliss Band along with period floats and equestrian units.

A new emphasis on educational exhibits is being tried this year in lieu of an arts and crafts fair. Persons interested in giving presentations of spinning, weaving, quilting, gunsmithing, adobe manufacturing and laying, wood carving and other crafts are urged to contact the historical demonstrations committee of the Lincoln Pageant and Festivals Corp.

The Lincoln County facilities that received approval for funding at the May 20 EMS Corporation's Board of Directors Meeting are Ruidoso Honda

Valley Hospital in Ruidoso, \$5,200, and Lincoln County itself, which receives \$11,250 toward the purchase of a new ambulance.

"We only had \$73,404 to help purchase equipment for the entire region," Cox explained, "and each provider requesting funds was required to put up a percentage of the total as a cash match. In this way," she continued, "the money went

further and we were able to buy this medical equipment so vital to life in an emergency situation."

EMS Region III is a federally-funded, not-for-profit corporation charged with the responsibility of

implementing an emergency medical services system in the 12 county area of southeastern New Mexico

Chaves, Curry, Lea, Otero, Eddy, Harding, Quay, Roosevelt, Union, Lincoln, DeBaca and Guadalupe.

School Board Meeting--

High School Building Renovation Underway

The regular meeting of the board of education met June 16, with Wally Ferguson presiding in the absence of school board president Sterling Spencer. The board members present and the audience were given a tour of the high school building, now undergoing renovation. Amid exposed water and electrical lines, downed walls and doors, Superintendent James Miller explained the reconstruction plans for the 40 year old building.

Immediately following the tour of the school building, the group toured the local swimming pool. The pool, now under the supervision of the school district, is in the progress of preparing for a grand opening on Sunday, June 28. Carrizozo coach and teacher Jerry Koller is the pool manager.

After the high school building and pool progress reports and tours, the school board meeting re-convened at the conference room.

On the agenda were new employment recommendations Miller recommended Mr. Dennis Sidebottom of Lake Odessa, Michigan for the position of high school principal and his wife, Judith for the position of high school mathematics teacher.

Sidebottom was one of 20 men and women applicants seeking the

principalship position. The board approved the hiring of Mr. and Mrs. Sidebottom. The Sidebottoms have 2 children. Mr. Sidebottom has been a teacher 9 years. His most recent position as government teacher and football coach at Lakewood High School, Lake Odessa, Michigan.

At Miller's recommendation, Ellen Hightower of Ruidoso was hired to teach 4th grade for a final year. Jolene Pafford is the other 4th grade teacher. The school district does not anticipate two 4th grade classes next year.

In other school board business: -The football field has been graded, seeded is currently being watered.

-Teacher J.C. Richmond has completed his instruction of a course in drivers education, with 20 students enrolled.

-The board approved the purchase of 7 acres of land for a Vo-ag farm, one mile West of school property. The land belonged to Charles Adams and Mary Rich Adams, who handled the purchase. Property description included city water meter, utility pole, ceptic tank, and new fence on one side. The purchase of the land for the Vo-ag department was considered "a milestone in the program."



Mobile Theatre Company to Present Original Musical

The Mobile Theatre Company from the College of Santa Fe will present free, open-air, live theatre in Carrizozo, July 1, 1981 at 8:30 pm in Spencer Park.

In its ninth season, the Mobile Theatre Company will present "Futura or Cosmic Crystal's Search for the Long-Gone Rainbow." This original musical deals with a gypsy rebellion against the confines of a futuristic society. The gypsies bring to the structured city of Futuria magic, merriment, song and dance.

The book and lyrics were written by Santa Fe playwright Pamela Jensen, with music by songwriter

Lisa Gilkyson. The company, under the direction of Susan Giles and management of Susan Martin, includes Denise Pass, Mark Christopher, Sheina MacCormick, David Young, Sarah Steadman, Kim Lowry, Gigi Mills, Jose Delgado and Lisa Martley.

The company performs on a flatbed truck that folds out into a 12-by-16-foot stage, complete with built-in lighting, costume and sound facilities. The traveling theatre has entertained more than 50,000 people during the past eight seasons, and is planning some 40 performances throughout the state this summer.

ERNEST O. FREHM PASSES AWAY - Mr. Ernest O. Frehm, age 58, well known merchant of Carrizozo died at his home here, early Wednesday morning. Cause of death was pronounced as heart failure.

Ernest O. Frehm was born July 10, 1884 in Saxony, Germany. He came to the United States when quite young. After his marriage he entered the mercantile business and was successful. He has resided in Lincoln County about 23 years and was well known and liked. He was agreeable and socially inclined - a Mason, an Odd Fellow and a member of the Knights of Pythias.

He is survived by his widow and two sons, and some relatives in Germany. The remains were shipped to Joplin, Missouri, where the Frehm family has a vault.

Council members are not paid for their service, but are repaid for travel expenses to official meetings.

Watkins, pastor of the Sierra Vista United Presbyterian Church, 10:00 a.m., Thursday, May 21, 1981, Kammann's chapel.

Scripture lessons read: Psalm 8, Ecclesiastes 3:1-14, Psalm 90, John 14 (selections), I Corinthians 13 (selections).

Service for Charles Bradley Smith

May 21, 1981

What makes a man the man he is. . . the man we know. . . the man we love. . . the man we remember? What made Charles Bradley Smith such an unique man. . . a special man?

One's parents make a man. . . the man and woman used by God to conceive him. For Charles, his quiet father very likely gave him his quiet way. His vibrant, vocal, vital mother determined so much of his interests and skills.

What makes a man? The land - the place - where he spent so many days of childhood. . . adolescence. . . early youth. . . these make a man. For Bradley it was a unique place, a special place. Can anyone from a town named Carrizozo be ordinary? And anyone who calls New Mexico home has a special flair - a certain spirit about them, don't they? They know those horizons that are always a tomorrow away. They have lived under that electric blue sky. They have ridden across the mountains and hills that surge up from the earth like the roll of deep waves in the middle of the ocean. They know those cold winters, the warm summers, the crisp autumns, the cool springs. They have lived among a people from a handful of cultures each making the land their own with their sweat, their blood, their love poured out so passionately, so freely. The land makes a man.

And so did those forces of history that came to him and his generation. . . first like thunder in the mountains and then like the driving force, the fury of a storm sweeping across their lives and carrying them down the flooded arroyos of troubled times out - way out - to lands far away; but even in this World War II experience, which claimed millions in its cause, there was something unique, set apart for Bradley Smith. . . an officer of the 7th Cavalry fortunate enough to have

known the feel of a horse under his seat and the tug of a curry comb in his hand. He bore well the enviable dash of jodhpurs and boots beneath the regulation army blouse and Sam Browne. The 7th Cavalry - that special corps with special assignments like Eichelberger's staff with MacArthur in Tokyo at the end of the war. A man's moment in history makes a man - and the 7th Cavalry and World War II contributed their own uniqueness to Brad Smith.

A man's family and friends make the man also, don't they? His childhood friends - schoolmates, playmates - exploring, experimenting, sharing, learning. His R.O.T.C. and Army buddies. . . competing, caring, helping, remembering. His family makes a man. . . sisters sharing adjustments and joys of common parentage. . . and that particular friend and partner in the deep commitment of marriage. . . loving, enduring, sharing across the years. All these friends and family contributed to and took from the man that he was. . . deep moments shared. . . privacies kept. . . a drink, a laugh, a joke together. . . thoughtful, helpful remembrances and deeds done in a quiet way, known to few if any. All these made the man.

And his job, too, the labor of his days, made this man. The printers ink rubbed off on his nose early and never came off. In stead it became part of him. . . part of his blood and being. The bitter smell and slick feel of the ink. . . the pungent, flat smell of hot lead. . . the soft clink and whine of the linotype. . . the demanding precision of the chase. . . the clank and roll of the flat bed. . . the "whish" and "wump" of a Heidelberg. . . the feel of paper. . . the smooth satin of baked enamel finish. . . the soft tug of lineweave. . . the tickle of deckle edge. . . deadlines. . . the printer's plague

determining - beat of heart, pressure of blood and degree of temper. . . proof reading that pulls the eyeballs out of your head. . . the satisfaction of sight of eye and feel of hand of that first sheet pulled from the press. . . the contentment, achievement of a job well done - stacked, stamped, cut and wrapped. . . waiting there on the front counter for the customer at four o'clock.

All these made the man we are privileged to remember here today and for all our days. . . his parents who conceived him. . . the land, the place that nurtured him. . . his moment in history that shaped and molded him. . . his friends and family, loved ones and dear ones, who shared so much of life's meaning and purpose, its joys and sorrows. . . the craft in which he found such satisfaction and achievement. . . all these made the man.

And certainly, yes, one more factor made Charles Bradley Smith the unique man that he was. . . that Source of all being from which he came and unto which he has now returned. . . his God and our God. Out of all the billions of people that have ever lived and are living now and will ever live on this planet earth, there never has been and never will again be one like the man we were privileged to have known and to remember today in Brad Smith. The wonder of such uniqueness must ultimately, finally be attributed to this God whom he knew, confessed and revered in his own quiet way. We cannot know, we cannot say with any real confidence all that God contributed to the uniqueness of this man. . . but we do know that that relationship was there in its own way across the years. . . molding, shaping, guiding the man that we were privileged to know and love. So let us give out thanks first and finally to this God - our God - for this man and all the things that made him the man he was. Amen!

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

BLM Advisory Council Meeting

Resolutions calling for a September meeting of the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM's) Roswell District Advisory Council to study the problems of county roads being vacated, the need for an accelerated program of processing potash leases, and a review of progress concerning the Roswell District's brush control program were highlights of the Advisory Council's June 18 meeting.

Nominations for a new council which will assume office for a two-year term on January 1, 1982, after being appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, were also solicited by Dick Bastin, Acting Manager of the Roswell District.

Held in the district conference room, this meeting was chaired by J.R. "Jim" Walls of Carlsbad. He is council Chairman and also represents non-renewable resources as a member. Other members attending, and the resources that they represent, were: Vice-Chairman George W. Mitchell of Roswell (Renewable Resources); State Senator Joseph E. Gant of Carlsbad (Elected Government); Gilsiero "Rod" Rodriguez of Roswell (NonRenewable Resources); Jack H. Hunt of Carlsbad (Recreation); Carlton S. Laman of El Paso (Transportation and Rights-of-Way); and Thomas B. Thornton of Carlsbad (Wildlife).

As usual, this council meeting was open to the public, with several

persons, including local ranchers and representatives from the press, attending. The Southeastern Grazing Association and the New Mexico Cattlegrowers Association were also represented.

Bastin opened this meeting by asking for nominations to the new Advisory Council and set a closing date of July 15. He also stated that persons now serving can be renominated, if they wish. After a general discussion of the agenda, Bastin introduced members of his staff who were present and then moved into a discussion of the current status of the Sagebrush Rebellion and of the problem of county roads being vacated.

Members of the Roswell District staff discussed several topics of interest to council members in detail. William T. Johnstone, District Community Planner, explained the progress being made on the new management program for the Roswell Resource Area and that program's interaction with the previous planning efforts in southeastern New Mexico. Wildlife Biologist, Linda Rundell, discussed the problems involved in closing county roads, with the rancher's viewpoint on this subject being presented by H.S. "Bud" Eppers and Richard W. Corn.

Other current issues discussed were: the Antelope Research Project,

the Ft. Stanton Airport proposal, the cooperative agreement with the Department of Energy concerning the Waste Isolation Pilot Plan (WIPP) site, and the status of the Roswell District's fiscal year 1982 budget, a subject which brought a spirited discussion concerning programs concerning the oil, gas, and potash industries.

The next meeting for this Council will be in mid-September to further consider such issues as county roads, brush spraying, an potash leasing.

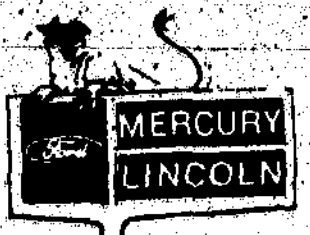
During the training, students receive instruction in drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid, and Army history and traditions.

Restrictions on camp and cooking fires and smoking will go into effect Friday at 8 am for Smokey Bear, Cloudcroft, and Mayhill Districts of Lincoln National Forest, Forest Supervisor James R. Abbott said today.

Restrictions are also in force on the Gila and Cibola National Forests. Specifically, these restrictions mean that no one may build or use a campfire, cooking fire, charcoal broiler or coal or wood stove outside Forest Service developed camp and picnic grounds, or in areas posted by authorized Forest Officers.

Smoking is prohibited on the forest, except inside a building, in developed camp or picnic grounds or in vehicles. Smokers are asked to please use ash trays.

The only exceptions to the restrictions are persons having special permits to use fires or smoking materials in restricted areas, or government officials or members of an organized firefighting force in performance of official duty. Fireworks are always prohibited on all National Forests.

Permits are not required for the use of gasoline stoves, lanterns or heaters which meet fire underwriter's specifications for safety.

Violations of the restrictions or conditions of any permit issued are punishable by a fine of \$500 or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both. For more information, contact any Forest Service office or officer in the field.

Lincoln personnel have put out 29 fires this year, most of which were on state and private land and 18 of which were man-caused. The largest was on May 13, just south of the mouth of Alamo Canyon. It covered two-and-a-

half acres and was caused by an abandoned campfire. To date, the forest's 1981 fire suppression activities have cost \$19,100.

"It's hard to believe that after more than 30 years of Smokey Bear's reminding folks that they are the only ones who can prevent forest fires, they will go off and leave a campfire unattended," Abbott said, "but some still do."

This week on the Smokey Bear District all facilities are open and receiving heavy use. Campers should keep their food put away because bears have been seen raiding dumpsters. Streams are low. Trails are open and in good condition. Fuelwood areas are open.

At Cloudcroft, Upper Sleepy Grass Campground is temporarily closed for construction, but other campgrounds are open. Evening campfire programs are being held at the Silver Overflow Area each Saturday at 7:30pm. Trails are open. Joplin Ridge and Fuelwood Area No. 13 are open. Permits are required. Both the Smokey Bear and Cloudcroft Ranger District Offices are open on weekends from 8am to noon and 1pm to 5pm.

Guadalupe Ranger District near Carlsbad is the only district on the forest not under fire and smoking restrictions. Sitting Bull Falls picnic area is receiving heavy use. Visitors should be prepared for changing weather conditions and watchful for rattlesnakes. Trail conditions are good and fuelwood areas are open.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use. Fishing pressure is moderate on the Rio Penasco. Fuelwood areas are open.

Danger Still High

The current warming trend has continued drying fuels in our State causing very high and extreme fire dangers, was announced today by the New Mexico Multi-Agency Fire Management Committee.

Level Two Fire Restrictions are still in effect in many parts of New Mexico. This restriction prohibits smoking except in vehicles equipped with ashtrays, on paved roads, surfaced roads or in designated areas, and campfires except in developed campgrounds or in designated areas.

Those areas where Level Two restrictions will be in effect include:

All of the Santa Fe National Forest and the Gila National Forest. The Magdalena, Mountainair, Sandia and Mt. Taylor Ranger Districts of the Cibola National Forest. All of the Lincoln National Forest with the exception of the Guadalupe Ranger District and all of Bandelier National Monument. Portions of the Capitan and Socorro Districts of the New Mexico State Forestry Division are considering the Level Two restrictions at this time.

Although Level Two restrictions are in effect, fire permits are being issued for some specified areas. Individuals are urged to check with local officials for the latest fire information and restrictions when entering Federal and State lands.

One of the largest fires of the year occurred last weekend on private and Forest Service land in the Jemez Mountains. The man caused 125-acre fire cost \$200,000 to suppress.

As we enter the most critical part of the fire season, the Multi-Agency Fire Management Committee urges all individuals to use extreme caution
