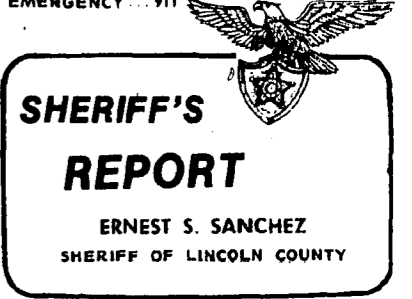

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## News Briefs..

On July 10, 1981 beginning at 7:00pm at the Carrizozo Assembly of God Church there will be a special gospel concert and Evangelist Sister Lucy Rael will appear in person. ### MOVALLI WORKSHOP

Charles Movalli, Gloucester, Massachusetts, will conduct a ten day Oil Landscape Workshop, July 20-30 at Carrizozo Lodge, Ruidoso, New Mexico. An artist and writer of national stature, Movalli will be in the Southwest for the first time.

Encouraging the use of a variety of palettes, Movalli will present "on location" demonstrations, discussing composition, simplification, values and color. Students will be encouraged to choose their own theses and palettes and to develop their own style. Painting on location will be stressed. The Sacramento Mountains with the tall pines, swift streams, high ranch land and sunny valleys will provide the subject matter.

As well as giving workshops and demonstrations throughout the year, Charles Movalli has contributed over 25 articles to AMERICAN ARTIST MAGAZINE. He is listed in WHO'S WHO IN AMERICAN ART and has edited many books on art, primarily THE ART OF LANDSCAPE PAINTING with Paul Strisik, COLOR IN OUTDOOR PAINTING and HOW TO PAINT SUCCESSFUL SEASCAPES with Roger Curtis and GRUPPE ON PAINTING AND BRUSHWORK with Emile Gruppe.

Charles Movalli has his PhD from the University of Connecticut and belongs to the North Shore Arts Association, Hudson Valley Art Association, Rockport Art Association, Academic Artists and the Guild of Boston Artists.

## Hear Lincoln Pageant and Festivals, Inc. Request

The Lincoln Commission handled a variety of business during their regular meeting on June 23, including the request of the Lincoln Pageant and Festivals, Inc. The non-profit corporation requested that the commission establish an entity for police and roads departments during the annual 'Old Lincoln Days'

festivities. The 3-day event includes the pony express, the Last Escape of Billy the Kid and the parade.

Each year the crowds at Lincoln have gotten larger and the problems that come with large numbers have increased. Four Lincoln residents, John West, Chris Zamora, Glenn Dennis and Walter Henn, who are a

part of the corporation now handling the August event were present at the commissioner's meeting. West read a letter signed by the corporation's president, Betty Shreengost. The letter outlined some areas believed to be potentially dangerous and the need for the commission's assistance.

The newly formed corporation

consists of 16 board of directors and an auxiliary board. The corporation's long-range goals are to improve the pageant and festivities in general, to protect both the citizens of Lincoln and those who come to enjoy the event. The corporation is attempting to improve the pageant and parade.

Parking in Lincoln during 'Old

Lincoln Days' has been sometimes two or three cars deep on the street. To limit parking on the street the corporation is establishing four free parking lots and two paid lots.

The corporation stated that EMT and ambulance service has been overlooked in the past. West cited an accident last year involving a horse. The corporation needs the commission's help in providing EMT and ambulance service during the busiest part of the weekend of August 7, 8, and 9.

The corporation intends to man the parking lots, give directions to the crowds, and set up an information booth in the center of town. They need the Sheriff's Department support in enforcing the safety rules they have set up, be evident at three locations in town and move through town periodically. Law enforcement officials have cooperated in the past and the corporation wants their continued support.

Lincoln County chairman, Cotton McKnight offered to act as a liaison for the Lincoln Pageant and Festivals, Inc. and the Sheriff's Department and the county roads division. Better law enforcement.

## NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

ACCORDING TO CRIMINAL CODE ORDINANCE ON GENERAL OFFENSES, UNDER SECTION 2-1-17 POSSESSION OF FIREWORKS:

2-1-17 POSSESSION OF FIREWORKS.

A. Unlawful Acts. It is unlawful to manufacture, sell, offer to sell, own, possess or discharge any firecracker, Roman candle, sky rocket, torpedo, bomb, blank cartridges or any other type or form of explosive commonly known as fireworks within the municipal limits unless the State Fire Marshall has declared that such item is not dangerous to persons or property.

B. Exclusions. The term "fireworks" shall not include toy pistols, toy canes, toy guns, or other devices in which paper caps containing twenty-five hundredths (25-100) grains or less of explosive compound are used, providing

they are so constructed that the hand cannot come in contact with the cap when in place for use, and toy pistols which contain less than twenty-hundredths (20-100) grains of explosive mixture, the sale and use of which shall be permitted at all times.

C. Public Display. Nothing herein contained shall be held to apply to or prohibit any municipal or civic organization from sponsoring and conducting, in connection with any public celebration, an officially supervised and controlled fireworks display.

WHOEVER COMMITS POSSESSION OF FIREWORKS IS GUILTY OF A MISDEMEANOR, Chapter 51, Laws of 1981 (amending Section 30-17-4 NMSA 1978).

## Preparations Continue

Santa Rita begins preparation for its Fiesta with the opening of the Fiesta Queen Contest on July 1st. The candidates for queen are the publicity agents for the Fiesta as they engage in one month of fund-raising activity. The fun-raising event that the candidates will share is the selling of tickets for the Fiesta dance and raffle. The dance will be August 1 and will cost \$3 per person, \$5 per couple. The raffle will be for a pig donated by Cristobal Zamora of Lincoln and the butchering of the pig donated by Albert Hernandez, Sr. Aside from that common activity, each candidate is limited only by her own imagination and energy as to events she might have.

Each girl desiring to be queen must get an adult sponsor who will advise and assist her throughout the campaign. Mary Vidaurri Chavez is the general sponsor of the contest. She

will introduce the candidates to the parish community this Sunday, July 5, with cake and drinks after the 11:30am Mass.

sanitation, traffic and crowd control at the annual 3-day Lincoln event in August should be evident this year.

Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. president, Bill Payne of Carrizozo approached the Commission to ask them to reconsider a funding request for maintenance of the Carrizozo Recreation Area. Payne added that he would not be asking for money if the facility was just used by Carrizozo residents. Commissioner John Allen Hightower was pleased that Arriba plans to cut expenses at the recreation area. The Commission will try to come up with some funding.

Mary Lou Brown of Ruidoso was hired as coordinator for the county's ambulance service. Pending Santa Fe's approval of the county budget, Brown's job starts July 1. The Commission wants Brown to provide leadership to each EMT group and to send a report every 3 months. Brown's part-time position will involve 10-15 hours a month. She hopes to organize the ambulance service so that it can eventually be on its own. Brown is director of nursing at the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital.

The Commission tabled a request from Capitan senior citizens for funds they need to move a building. Herbert Taylor and Beacie Jones of Capitan, on behalf of the village's senior citizens, asked the commissioners for the financial aid. The building they want re-located was donated to the seniors by the Capitan school district and the site was leased from the village of Capitan. The funding request was tabled until an agreement is drawn up with village officials.

Guy Henley, road department superintendent brought to the commission's attention that a contractor had dug across and along a county road that had been graveled last year. Henley was instructed to file criminal

complaint charges against anyone who destroys county property, including county roads.

The Commission approved a deferred compensation program for county employees as explained by two representatives of the company. The National program helps county employees meet the problems of taxes and inflation.

The program, through special tax laws, allows a person to defer a portion of their income and the taxes on that income and use both to build a bigger fund for supplemental retirement income, as well as for other purposes. In the program, employees in the 25 percent bracket can choose to put \$100 in the deferred compensation, tax free. Interest paid is 10.5 percent with a six month re-enrollment.

The representatives said that since the commissioners are considered county employees they may also take advantage of the retirement program. Other than payroll deductions, the county isn't responsible for any paperwork or charges.

### Grant to Aid Public Transportation Development

The State Highway Department has \$94,000 available to promote and assist the development of public transportation systems in a five-county area in the southeastern part of the state. The area includes Chaves, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln and Otero counties.

The money is part of a \$617,801 federal Department of Transportation grant administered by the state road agency. Grant funds are to assist the planning, establishment and operation of public transportation systems in rural and small urban areas throughout the state.

Applications must be submitted through the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District. That office will process the applications for the department. Before making its recommendations, the district will have a public hearing to determine that applicants have met federal guidelines and will not duplicate existing services or conflict with other programs.

Ivan Hall is coordinating the local program. He can be contacted through the district's office, P.O. Box 6639 - RIAC, Roswell, NM 88201, for information and a copy of the program guidelines.

Grant money is available to both public and private transportation system operators. Funds may be used for capital outlay, operating expenses and technical assistance costs.

Capital outlay grants are funded at 80 percent of need. Operating assistance is funded at a 50 percent level. Local sources must be used for the necessary matching funds.

The federal government has indicated that operating assistance grants will be discontinued in fiscal year 1981. Transportation system operators will have to arrange for alternative funding after that time.

Those interested in applying for capital or operating grants must submit a letter of intent to the district's office by July 31. Grant applications must be received by October 2.

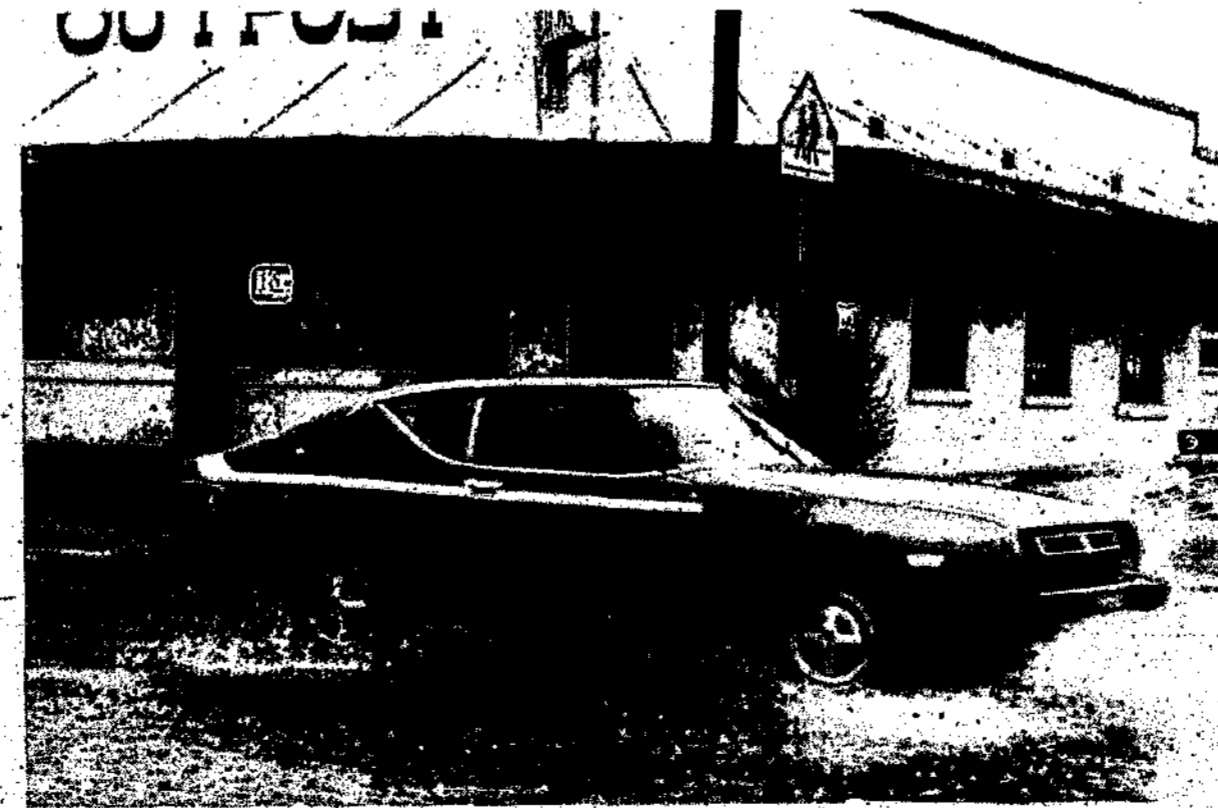
The \$92,670 technical assistance portion of the grant will be allocated by the Highway Department on a statewide basis. Letters of intent and applications for these grants should be sent to Ron Forte at the department's planning division, P.O. Box 1149, Santa Fe, NM 87503. Submission deadlines are the same as those for other parts of the grant program.

The most famous bell in America was cast in 1753 in England by Thomas Lester of London and weighed a ton. ## FRESH PEACH DUMPLINGS

- 1 recipe double crust pastry
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 4 peaches, peeled, pitted, halved
- 1 tablespoon margarine, cut into 4 pieces
- 1 cup Karo dark corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons margarine

On lightly floured surface roll out pastry, 1/2 at a time, to 7-inch square. For decorative edge, cut with pastry wheel. In small bowl stir together sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Place a peach half in center of each pastry square. Fill center of peach half with about 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar mixture. Dot each with 1 piece of margarine. Top with other peach half. Bring each corner of pastry square to top of peach. Moisten edges with a little water and pinch edges together firmly to cover peach. Place dumplings in greased 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking pan. Bake in 325° F oven 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Meanwhile, in 2-quart saucepan stir together corn syrup, water and 2 tablespoons margarine. Stirring frequently, bring to boil over medium heat. Pour over dumplings. Bake 5 minutes longer, basting occasionally with syrup mixture. Immediately remove dumplings from pan to serving dishes. Spoon syrup mixture over dumplings. Makes 8.

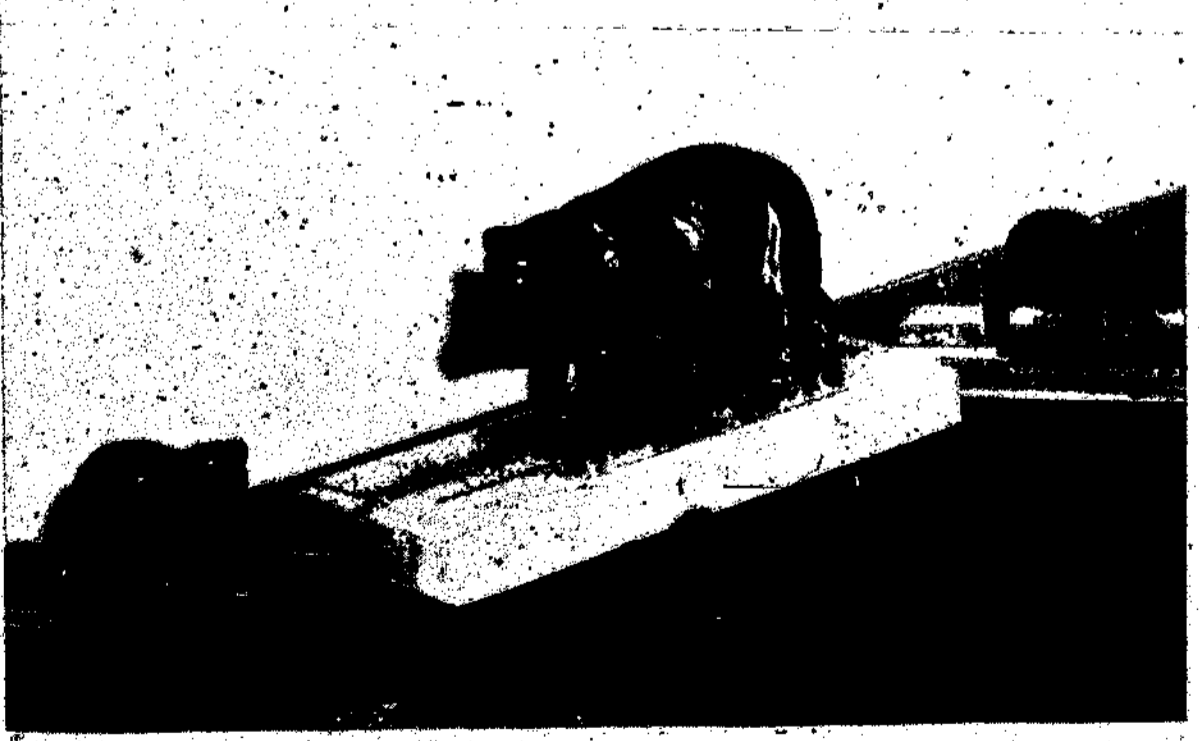

The danger of a fire in the Guadalupe District at Carlsbad is listed as high, but because of recent rains, the district was not included in the area where campfire and smoking restrictions are in effect.

Restrictions on campfires and smoking are also in force on the Cibola and Gila National Forests. On the Gila, fire teams have been fighting a number of separate fires all week, with help from the Lincoln.

In campfire and smoking restricted areas of the Lincoln, no one may build or use a campfire, cooking fire, charcoal broiler, or coal or wood stove outside of a Forest Service developed camp or picnic ground, or in areas posted by authorized Forest Officers.

Smoking is prohibited on the forest except inside buildings, in developed camp or picnic grounds or in vehicles. Smokers are asked to please use ashtrays.

Violations of the restrictions are punishable by a fine of \$500 or less, or imprisonment for not more than six months, or both. For more information on the restrictions, contact any Forest Service Office or officer, in the field.

The use of gasoline stoves, lanterns or heaters which meet fire underwriter's specifications for safety, is not restricted.

On the Smokey Bear District, all facilities are open and receiving heavy use; Bonito Lake is receiving heavy use and streams are low. Campers and picnickers are cautioned to keep their food put away, because bears have been seen raiding dumpsters. Trails are open, conditions are dry and fuelwood areas are open. The Ranger District Office is open on weekends from 8am until noon, and from 1pm until 5pm.

The annual Cherry Festival is being held at High Rolls from 10am to 5pm on June 27 and 28.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, Sitting Bull Falls is receiving heavy use, road conditions are good, rattlesnakes are out and campers and hikers are urged to carry plenty of water, because of extremely hot weather. Fuelwood areas are open.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use, roads are dry and fuelwood areas are open.
