News Briefs...

Mary Ella Fore Shanks of Capitan is among 216 candidates for Eastern New Mexico University's summer commencement on Friday, July 31. Commencement and baccalaureate services will begin at 8pm in Greyhound Arena.

Eastern's candidates for summer graduation include six associate degrees, 68 bachelor degrees, 137 master degrees, and five education specialist degrees.

Students graduating with a cumulative grade point average of 3.80 to 4.0 will be graduated "summa cum laude", while 3.70 to 3.79 grade point students are graduated "magna cum laude". "Cum laude" graduates must have a 3.60 to 3.69 GPA with 3.30 to 3.56 GPA students graduating with "honors".

Shanks will be awarded a master of education degree in elementary education.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce met at a noon luncheon this week to finalize plans for the annual 'People's Market Place' this coming Sunday, August 2nd. The event will be held on the south end of the golf course at the Carrizozo Recreation Area, located on Highway 380 two miles east of town.

The People's Market Place is held in conjunction with Santa Rita Fiesta. The theme of this year's jointly sponsored annual event is "UP, UP AND AWAY!"

Santa Rita Fiesta officially begins Friday evening with Vespers followed by a reception, with the fun and activities continuing Saturday and Sunday. See the Fiesta schedule in the NEWS for additional details.

The People's Market Place kicks off with the ascension of hot air balloons, scheduled for approximately 8:00am on Sunday. The balloon lift-off will be followed by a waffle breakfast at the Carrizozo Country Club patio. Breakfast of waffles, choice of a variety of toppings, coffee, juice will be sold by the Chamber to hungry Market Place visitors and vendors.

The 62nd Army Band from Fort

Bliss, Texas will perform at 10:30am and again at 1:30pm.

Santa Rita Catholic Church will celebrate Sunday Mass at 11:30am at the Market Place location. Those planning to attend Mass are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or other seating to use during Mass.

Sky-diving performances will begin approximately at 1:00pm. The Army parachutists jumping from a helicopter will land on a predetermined target on the golf course.

The Carrizozo Woman's Club and the Carrizozo Country Club will serve a courtesy lunch to the Army band and the sky diving team from Fort Bliss, but will sell barbecue sandwiches to the general public.

Promising something for everyone, young and old alike, the People's Market Place will feature artisans and crafts 'people' from all over the state. Rock chimes, antiques, pottery, ink paintings, and woodcrafts are some of the many items available for sale this Sunday. Various local organizations and clubs will have food and games.

New Attendance Policy Approved--

'Teeth are in'--Funerals, Dental-doctor Appointments are Out!

Carrizozo's new school principal Dennis Sidebottom was present at the board of education meeting last week. Sidebottom, hired for the 1981-82 principalship last month, presented the board with a 'missed days of instruction policy'.

Sidebottom in the presentation said that the new policy has "some teeth in it, but would accommodate those that have good legitimate excuses." Following discussion, the board approved the policy, which states that in order to receive credit for a class it will be necessary for a student to receive a minimum passing grade and not have more than ten missed periods of instruction in that class during the semester. However,

regardless of the grade received for the class work, the student may not receive credit if he or she has more than ten missed periods of instruction during the semester.

The new policy differs from the old one in that there are no excused or unexcused absences. All absences are counted against the ten allowed. If a student receives eleven absences he or she automatically loses credit for the semester.

School related missed periods of instruction such as field trips, athletic and music events, etc., as well as missed days of instruction for a student being committed to a hospital, subpoenaed into court as a witness or summoned into court as a

defendant will not be counted towards the ten missed days. All other missed days of instruction as for working, vacations, baby sitting, shopping, funerals, hunting, dental, doctor, drivers test, etc. will be counted towards the ten missed days of instruction.

Sidebottom told the NEWS that absentism is becoming a major problem in school, not just in Carrizozo, but all across the U.S. "In the end, a weak attendance policy is extremely detrimental to the student not only because of the valuable class time he or she misses but also because of the poor attitude towards responsible attendance that may carry-over into his or her job."

The principal is aware that in some extreme circumstances, attendance might be impossible. To deal with these cases, an attendance committee has been developed. The committee membership will be composed of one student from the student council, two teachers appointed by the administration, the attendance secretary and the principal.

The student's parent may request a hearing from this committee after their child has received the eleventh absence. At this hearing the parents should be prepared to present evidence supporting the reasons they felt their child should receive credit regardless of their attendance record.

Sidebottom strongly suggests that parents, guardians and students keep an accurate record of absences and reasons for absences. He added that students should not deliberately skip classes or whole days of school because skipping school will cause a student to lose his or her right to appeal to the committee.

In other business the board hired two new teachers. Superintendent James Miller presented the board with "two stacks" of paperwork representing the applicants which he interviewed for the teaching positions. Miller recommended Mr. William Cramer and Mr. Tom Funk.

New Policy Approved

The board approved the employment recommendations.

Cramer, veteran teacher and administrator from Sioux City, Iowa will be the District's 1981-82 mid school Social Studies teacher. He will also teach high school Civics. A certified Civics teacher had been lacking in the District in the past. Cramer will be coaching the school's new drama program. An experienced football coach and former college football player for the University of Nebraska, Cramer will coach Jr. High football in Carrizozo. His wife is a veteran Girls Scout leader.

Funk is from Corona where he taught high school English for three years. He will teach Elementary Grammar and Composition at Carrizozo High on a half-time basis. Presently, he is in Vermont participating in a summer institute for rural teachers. He is attending on a scholarship. Cramer and his wife, parents of two daughters ages 5 and 3, will open a show repair shop in town.

Miller told the board that Mrs. Bonnie Brock-Wood, director of the Public School Capital Outlay Council was in Carrizozo recently to review the school's application for additional funding for the district's Vo-ag program. Brock-Wood will make a presentation on August 5 in Santa Fe. The council meets August 11 to make a final decision.

The board learned that fellow board member Sister Gail Stackpole was appointed to the Resolutions Committee for the State Board Association Convention. Stackpole is the board's secretary.

The board accepted the following bids: business machine maintenance - Ink Well of Alamogordo; school vehicle insurance - Insurance Exchange of Albuquerque; football field electric - Ross Electric of Socorro.

The board tabled a purchasing practices presentation until their next regular meeting on August 18. Another agenda item which was tabled was the review of the 1980-81 Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) Students Scores. The public may want to ask questions regarding these subjects. The board encourages the audience at their public meeting to ask questions.

Tabled also was the setting of evaluation goals for the superintendent. The board felt that because there had not been sufficient time to consider the evaluation material that it be a part of the August 18 agenda. It was hoped that board members Wally Ferguson and Richard Vega could be present to give their input in the matter. Miller presented the board members on hand with 1981-82 district objectives which will be discussed at the later date when priorities will be established.

During the board meeting various school patrons were recognized for their support. Board chairman Sterling Spencer plowed the football field voluntarily in preparation for the fertilizing and seeding work by school maintenance supervisor Nat Chavez and custodian Freddy Nava. Henry Vega donated the fertilizer used. Miller brought to the board's attention the five foot high fencing which Chavez, custodian Mario Ortiz and Vo-ag teacher Mike Gaines installed along each side of the football field. The fence, in 300 feet lengths, will keep football fans and children from walking across the field when a game is in session and other times.

Jack Heffer was instrumental in obtaining a windmill for use in the Vo-ag program. Dale LaMay provided barrels for use in containing trash at the swimming pool. The \$25.00 donation which school patron Aileen Lindmoed gave to the pool was appreciated.

Miller gave the board an update on pool activities. Considering the late opening date, the pool has made \$1,063, a sum under projected. Pool manager, Jerry Koller is currently teaching swimming lessons to youngsters, three times a week. Future pool plans may include the addition of a 10 foot concrete area for sun bathing.

SORRY MABEL!
I forgot your recipe last week, but here is a nice fresh one!

FOR THE FAMILY!
Here is a hint, Mabel:
If plastic wrap is hard to handle, put it in the deep freeze then it won't cling when you take it out.
Place a piece of orange peel on the electric burner, turn heat low and it will get rid of a bad kitchen odor.

FRUIT PIE
In a saucepan mix 1/2 cup sugar and 1 tsp corn starch, then gradually stir in 1 1/2 cups orange juice and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in 1/2 cup lemon juice and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut up assorted fresh fruits and fold into sauce, then fold into a vanilla cracker crust.
CRUST: 1/2 cup butter and 1 cup of flour blended with a pastry blender, then add 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg yolk and

It is the finding of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, that all activities proposed in its 1981 Small Cities HUD CDBG Application are exempt from environmental review requirements because they are defined as exempt activities in Section 58.21 consisting solely of:
 Housing rehabilitation of single family dwelling units that will not increase density more than 20 percent

change use characteristics or involve work worth 75 percent or more of the replacement cost of any unit after rehabilitation. (Section 58.21 (b) (8)).
 An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the Town of Carrizozo which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request at the Chamber of Commerce between the hours of 10:00am and 4:00pm.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Town of Carrizozo to the Mayor. Such written comments should be received at P.O. Box 247 Carrizozo, New Mexico on or before August 20, 1981. FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT SUPERSONIC FLIGHT OPERATION IN WSMR AIRSPACE

Description of Proposed Action:

The 6585th Test Group and the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing, Holloman Air Force Base, propose to continue to use portions of White Sands Missile Range restricted airspace located in Socorro, Dona Ana, Sierra, Otero, and Lincoln Counties to conduct supersonic flights in support of training for air-to-air combat and intercept missions plus research and development for the testing of new weapon systems. The proposed airspace encompasses by the 49th TFW operations consists of 3,497 square miles. The actual operating vertical span will be from 5,000 ft to 25,000 ft above ground level. The proposed airspace encompasses by the 6585 operations consists of 1,229 square miles. The actual operating vertical span is 300 ft to 25,000 ft above ground level. The northern edge of the area is approximately 5.5 miles south of highway 380. Aircraft involved are the F-15, F-16, F-4, PQM-102, T-33 and newer aircraft, missiles and other weapon systems as they reach the flight testing stage. Maximum airspeeds and power settings are F-15, F-16 and F-4, Mach 2.0 at maximum augmentation; PQM-102 and T-33, Mach 1.2 at maximum augmentation. Supersonic flights in the general areas described above were granted under Waiver 75-13 in March 1975. This action is a renewal of Waiver 75-13 with minor modifications and does not constitute any new commitments.

Anticipated Environmental Effects: Most of the area over which the Supersonic flights will be conducted is unpopulated; however, there are some ranches in the area where the 49th TFW plans supersonic flights. The majority of the 6585th supersonic flights will be conducted within the WSMR boundary, therefore it is assumed that the 49th TFW operations will have the greatest impact of the two operations. Based on 25 sorties per day as planned by the 49th TFW, five or less supersonic sorties per day (50 per month) will be flown resulting in a maximum of seven sonic booms per day with the normal being three. It is estimated that a maximum of 1.4 sonic booms per day would occur over populated areas with a normal being less than one. Airborne pollutants generated by aircraft emissions are within the State of New Mexico emission standards.

Finding and Conclusion: The proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. However, complaints may result from supersonic flight operations in the fixed area affecting ranchers in Socorro and Lincoln Counties. An environment Impact Statement is not required and will not be prepared for the proposed action.

Responsible Official: Colonel Francis R. Geisel, Director of Facilities Engineering, is the responsible official at White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico for the proposed action. An environmental assessment which discussed the impact of the proposed action has been completed by the US Air Force and is available for public reading at the WSMR Environmental Office, located in Bldg. 17848. Comments regarding the proposed action are to be addressed to the Director of Facilities Engineering, White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico 88002, before 14 Aug 1981.
