All other missed board of education meeting last week Sidebottom, hired for the 1981-82 than ten missed periods of instruction principalship last month, presented the board with a 'missed days of instruction policy'. Sidebottom in the presentation said that the new policy has "some teeth in it, but would accomodate those that have good legitimate excuses."

Following discussion, the board the semester. approved the policy, which states that in order to receive credit for a class it will be necessary for a student to receive a minimum passing grade and not have more than ten missed periods of instruction in that class during the semester. However,

regardless of the grade received for defendant will not be counted towards receive credit if he or she has more days of instruction as for working. during the semester.

The new policy differs from the old one in that there are no excused or towards the ten missed days of in unexcused absences. All absences are struction. counted against the ten allowed. If a student receives eleven absences he or she automatically loses credit for

The principal is aware that in some extreme circumstances, at tendance might be impossible. To deal with these cases, an attendance committee has been developed. The committee membership will be composed of one student from the student council, two teachers appointed by the administration, the attendance secretary and the prin-

The student's parent may request a hearing from this committee after their child has received the eleventh absence. At this hearing the parents evidence supporting the reasons they felt their child should receive credit regardless of their attendance record.

Sidebottom strongly suggests that parents, guardians and students keep an accurate record of absences and . reasons for absences. He added that students should not deliberately skip classes or whole days of school because skipping school will cause a student to lose his or her right to appeal to the committee. In other business the board hired

two new teachers. Superintendent James Miller presented the board with "two stacks" of paperwork representing the applicants which he interviewed for the teaching positions. Miller recommended Mr. William Cramer and Mr. Tom Funk.



Leon Eggleston has been appointed chairperson of the annual Cystic Fibrosis Breath of Life Campaign to be held September 19 and 20 in Capitan. Cystic fibrosis, an incurable, degenerative disease that affects the lungs and digestive systems, is the number one genetic cause of death of children and young adults in the country.

Mr. Eggleston will appoint approximately four (4) volunteers to fan out through the area's neighborhoods and conduct a door-to-door campaign to solicit funds. The campaign is conducted annually, by the New Mexico Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Anyone wanting to volunteer, please call Mr. Eggleston at 354-2247 or 354-2237.

Our goal for the door-to-door campaign is to inform the public about CF and raise money to fight this dreaded disease. This can be met with energetic and dedicated volunteers, and if the members of our communities open their doors and checkbooks wide and give generously.

Money raised during the campaign will be spent in three areas: medical treatment, public education. and research. All three are important. Medical therapy, developed through years of research, has raised the average life expectancy of a cystic fibrosis child. Twenty five years ago, CF children did not live to even pre-school age. Today, nearly half of those born with CF will live past their twenties. Public education reasss the chances of early diagnosis and treatment. One out of every 20 adults carries a CF gene. When two carriers marry, there is a 25 percent chance that each child will inherit the disease and a 50 percent chance that the child will be a carrier. For those who inherit CF, early diagnosis is vital since the disease often masquerades as other lung and digestive disorders.

The need for a cure is self evident. There is none at present. The disease is inherited, non-contagious, degenerative, and often fatal. But researchers are hard at work on the problem, and their work needs broad public support.







> Anticipated Environmental Effects: Most of the area over which the Supersonic flights will be conducted is unpopulated; however, there are some ranches in the area where the 49th TFW plans supersonic flights. The majority of the 6585th supersonic flights will be conducted within the WSMR boundary, therefore it is assumed that the 49th TFW operations will have the greatest impact of the two operations. Based on 25 sorties per day as planned by the 49th TFW, five or less supersonic sorties per day (50 per month) will be flown resulting in a maximum of seven sonic booms per day with the normal being three. It is estimated that a maximum of 1.4 sonic booms per day would occur over populated areas with a normal being less than one. 
