## News Briefs..

The State Highway Department will begin repaving New Mexico 532, the road to the Sierra Blanca Ski Area in Lincoln County, on or about Aug. 24. Weather permitting, the repaving should be completed in about five weeks, department project manager Gilbert Aguilar said.

For several weeks, the contractor has been crushing and stockpiling materials for the job. Armstrong Construction Co. of Roswell is doing the work under a \$614,384 contract awarded at the road agency's June 26 bid letting. The contract requires that all work be completed by Oct. 15.

The road extends west for approximately 12.5 miles from Alto to the ski area. While paving is in progress, nine miles of the road above Eagle Creek Lodge will be closed to traffic, Aguilar said.

A parking lot at Windy Point will also be repaved. Culvert pipe will be installed to improve drainage on the upper end of the road.

Congressman Joe Skeen, R-NM, said today he has been notified by the Economic Development Administration of the U.S. Department of Commerce that the Mescalero Apache Tribe has been awarded a \$351,300 public works grant.

The grant notification said, "the federal assistance will be used to help complete the financing for a conference center at the Inn of the Mountain Gods on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation. The center is to accommodate 600 persons. The facilities will include conference space, a banquet kitchen and storage area. The grant brings to \$3,401,300 the funds approved by EDA for the project."

The Oklahoma State Board of Public Accountancy announced that Leslie Carnell, a 1975 graduate of Corona High School, has passed the examination for Certified Public Accountants in that state. Mr. Carnell is now residing in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and is employed as an accountant with Phillips Petroleum Company. He will travel to Oklahoma City in October for an awards banquet, where he will receive his CPA certificate.

## High School Opening Delayed

### Due To Remodeling

The Carrizozo Municipal School District begins its 1981-82 school year a little differently than in past years. Due to the remodeling of the High School building, the High School will not open until Wednesday, August 26 at 8:30am. Students are to go to the hallway of the new gym to pick up their schedules on Monday or Tuesday from 8:30 until 12:00. At this time if they have any schedule changes, Mr. Roueche will be available to discuss these changes with you. All new high school

students will register at this time. Anyone that has not picked up their schedule may do so at 8:15 Wednesday morning with the Counselor.

Mid School and Elementary students will begin school as scheduled on Monday, August 24, at 8:30am. Parents are requested not to send their children to school until at least 8:15am each morning. The school doors will not open until that time, and buses will be arriving between 8:15 and 8:30 each morning. Students

registering for the first time are asked to report to the Conference Room in the Administration building where the Principal and High School Secretary are located until the remodeling is completed.

Regular lunches in the cafeteria will cost 75 cents, reduced lunches will cost 40 cents, and adult lunches will cost \$1.50. Parents are encouraged to eat lunch in the cafeteria as well as children. Students in sports programs particularly are also encouraged to eat the well-balanced meals provided in the cafeteria program. Tickets are available from Mrs. Vega before school in the cafeteria. All Kindergarten students will report to Mrs. Wetzel's room in the Elementary school at 8:30am and will be assigned to either morning or afternoon kindergarten at that time for the remainder of the school year.

**HANDICAPPED ASSURED OF EQUAL EDUCATION.** Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 provides that: "No otherwise qualified individual shall solely by reason of handicap, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of or subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." Although the Carrizozo Schools receive very little financial assistance, it is the policy of the schools to provide an appropriate education for all students, including those with handicapping conditions. ## Blood Drive Scheduled for C'zozo Aug. 27th

United Blood Services has scheduled a blood drive in Carrizozo this coming Thursday, August 27th from 10:00am to 4:00pm at the Woman's Club Building. We need your donation! Let's face it. Many of us are frightened by the idea of giving blood; or we say we're just too busy to take the time to donate - or we find some other excuse to avoid it. But when a patient needs blood, even the best excuses won't help. There is no substitute for blood and no source other than healthy, human blood donors. The shocking fact that less than 5 percent of the people who are eligible to donate give blood. With advances in modern medical technology, such as open heart surgery procedures and organ transplants, more blood is needed. It is estimated that 6 out of 10 of us will need blood sometime during our lives.

Here is how it is done. The entire process lasts only about 30

minutes. First, we answer some questions about your medical history and current state of health. Your temperature, pulse, blood pressure and blood iron level will be checked. The actual blood donation takes only a few minutes. We relax a few minutes afterwards, have a light refreshment, and then we are on our way - feeling very good about having helped someone less fortunate than ourselves. One requirement is that you must eat before giving blood.

Please don't make excuses. Let's all donate blood this next Thursday. Knowing we've helped sustain life for one or more people should make us feel terrific. ## Solar Power Contract Awarded

Electricity generated by solar-powered systems will soon be used by the Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, to pump water for campers and livestock and to provide electrical power for equipment at fire lookouts.

Southwestern Regional Forester M.J. Hassell said TriSolarCorp of Bedford, Mass., was awarded a \$200,097.24 contract to design, supply and install five photovoltaic power systems, semiconductor devices that convert light directly into electricity, in the Santa Fe, Lincoln and Gila national forests in New Mexico and in the Prescott National Forest in Arizona.

Hassell said the projects will be funded under the Federal Photovoltaic Utilization Program, a program to encourage the use of photovoltaic solar cells.

A system in the Lincoln National Forest will pump up to 7,500 gallons of water a day from a shallow well to a tank near South Fork Campground.

Another unit will be installed at North Blowing Well in the Santa Fe National Forest to provide livestock with up to 1,500 gallons a day from a 600-foot well.

Systems will also provide electricity for communications equipment, appliances and water pumps at Signal Peak Lookout in the Gila National Forest and at Horsethief and Hyde Mountain lookouts in the Prescott National Forest.

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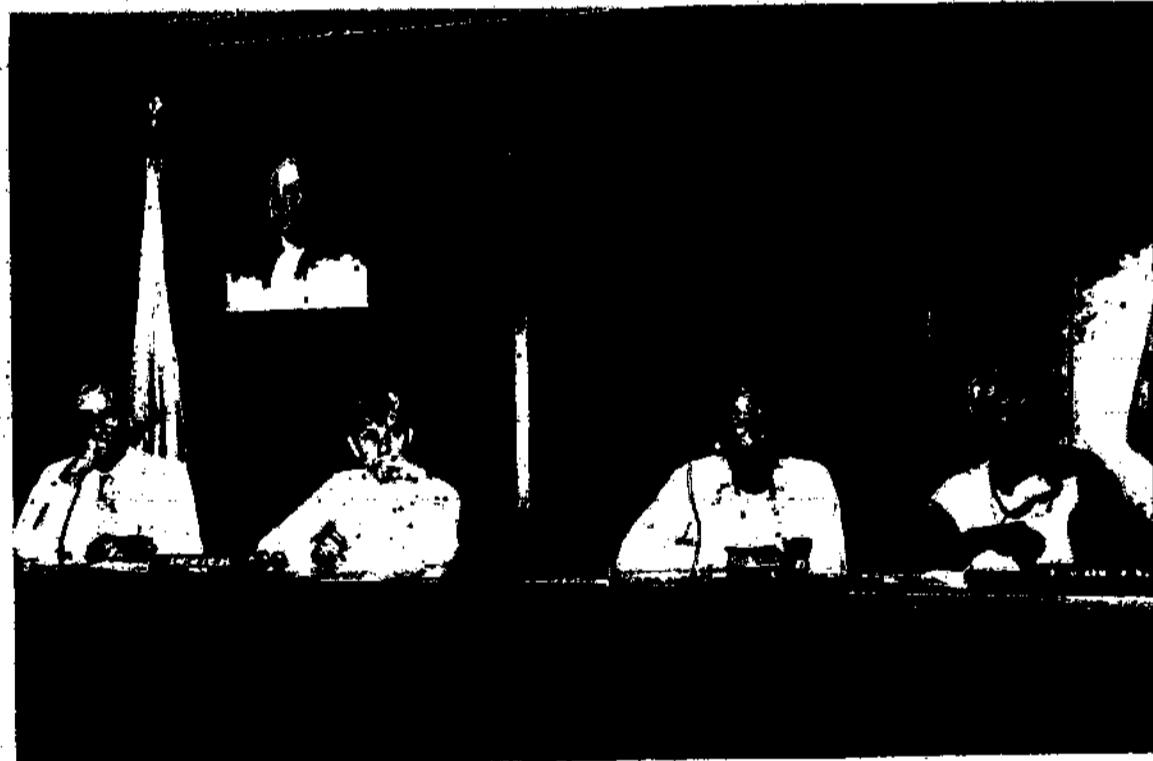

# Attendance Policy Approved By Capitan Board of Education

To maximize educational opportunities and promote constructive attitudes, the Capitan Schools will require regular and punctual attendance. Academic experiences missed by lack of in-class instruction can seldom be satisfactorily regained. Therefore, ten (10) absences (excused or unexcused) from any class during a semester will result in credit for that class not being granted or promotion denied. Parents will be notified in writing when absences become excessive (at the 5th and 8th days) so that all efforts can be made to insure satisfactory attendance. FIFTH DAY - letter to parents and conference with the student by the counselor. EIGHTH DAY - letter to the parents requesting conference with them and the student by the counselor.

Students representing the school on school sponsored activities will not be considered absent.

Excused absences includes illness, doctor's appointments and death or illness in the immediate family. Students returning to

school must bring with them a note from their parent or guardian verifying their absence including the reason. Until the note is received in the school office (upon the student's return) the absence will be unexcused. Students will not be admitted to any class, following an absence without an admit slip from the office.

Unexcused absences are those incidents not covered above. They include truancy, suspension, shopping, hunting, fishing, family celebrations and trips, employment, missing the school bus and oversleeping. Assignments missed due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up and a grade of "0" will be given.

If a parent feels that an absence from school is necessary and justified, they may bring those exceptions to the principal's attention before the absence occurs, so that the absence may be excused. If this is not done, the absence must be considered unexcused.

It is not the purpose of this policy to withhold credits unnecessarily, but to promote attendance and learning, and to comply with the statutes of the State of New Mexico regulating truancy. In the event of unusual circumstances such as an extended illness, arrangements for make-up work and home study may be made through the office. This will avoid the mentioned sanctions and must include a doctor's statement regarding the illness and a prognosis. Work assigned, but not completed by the end of the grading period will be given a zero.

If a student feels they have been unjustly denied a credit, they may appeal the decision in writing to the principal. The principal will then assign an appeals committee to review the situation, notify the student to appear and determine whether credit is to be given. If the student is still not satisfied, he may appeal to the superintendent and Board of Education. The decision of the Board will be final and with no further recourse.

Assignments missed must be made up during a period not to exceed three days following the last day of the absence. It is the responsibility of the student to contact the teacher for his work and return them within the

prescribed period. Any work not made up will receive a grade of "0".

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# Karate -- A Blend of Power and Grace

Walking past the Masonic Temple building, passers-by may hear loud piercing shouts coming from the basement. A close look at the building, an early day Carrizozo structure, will reveal that the basement houses TAE KWON ARTS, a karate school of instruction 'Kia' in the name of the sound made by a karate student when exhaling.

The NEWS this week went behind-the-scenes to learn a little bit about karate and how this form of the martial arts has changed the lives of local and area people. This female reporter learned karate lingo and other fascinating facts of this technique of self-defense, which originated in the Orient.

The earliest known forms of karate began in China. Okinawans developed it to a high degree during the 1600's after their government had forbidden them to carry weapons. In the early 1900's, karate was introduced from Okinawa to Japan, where it is most popular today. Karate spread to the United States and other countries after World War II.

Karate involves striking an opponent with hands, elbows, knees and feet. A karate expert aims his blows at such sensitive body parts as the throat and temples. Students of karate toughen their hands and feet by striking a straw covered post or by driving them into sand, gravel or similar substances. Karate experts can shatter bricks and boards with their hands and feet.

Persons skilled in karate usually use it only in emergencies. They can kill or seriously injure an opponent with a single blow.

Larry Smith, who moved to Carrizozo in October 1980 is the 'sensei' (teacher) at TAE KWON ARTS in the 'dojo' (gym) located in the basement of the historical Masonic Temple building. Smith was first introduced to karate at Ponca City Military Academy in Oklahoma. His sensei in tai chi chuan (Chinese kung fu) was John Kwong. Smith now holds a 1st degree black belt in taekwon do (Korean karate). Smith studied under sensei Henry Rudolph. Smith taught privately in karate before moving to Carrizozo.

Smith, a cabinetmaker and wood craftsman, also operates THE WOODSHOP, where he makes beautiful wood works, created using his own blueprints or scale drawings. Highly skilled in carpentry, he refuses to copy other cabinetmakers. In addition to cabinetmaking and furniture restoring, Smith enjoys making novelty wood items. His shop is located above the karate dojo.

His wife, Waynette, is a karate enthusiast and had participated in the martial arts before meeting him. She was introduced to karate at a YMCA in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Smith began giving her private lessons two years ago and she recently received her 1st degree green belt.

Waynette, born, raised and educated in Carrizozo, is the daughter of local residents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Wilkerson. She is the bookkeeper at the WOODSHOP, assists in some woodwork and is one of Smith's most zealous karate students.

The couple, each married previously, have a total of five children - Kari and Shelby Allen; Marcus, Rusty and Shailla Smith. This past winter, the Allen youngsters lived in Carrizozo, where they attended school. Two of Smith's children vacationed in Carrizozo this summer, while the Allen children visited with their father out-of-state.

Smith's combined talents in

carpentry, construction, and masonry turned a dark, dusty Masonic Temple basement into an attractive, modern dojo. The latest in karate equipment includes a stretcher which Smith designed and made. The wooden device develops leg flexibility so important to higher and stronger kicks.

Smith, who has conducted private and public karate lessons in Carrizozo this year, will begin another 8-week session, beginning August 25. He instructs in tai chi chuan and taekwon do styles. His classes include male and female students of various ages.

Tai chi chuan is similar to the Shaolin style or Bruce Lee's wing chun kung fu, now called ject kung do, which involves hand-arm speed and the pressure point technique with a minimum of foot movements. Taekwon do emphasizes foot action. Many people get tai chi and tai chi chuan mixed up. Tai chi is a Hawaiian form that resembles a mass of exercises, which may be just what a particular person wants or needs.

Meditation begins and ends Smith's classes. He stressed that meditation is invaluable to karate. Meditation clears the mind of the day's mental pressures.

A karateka (student), out of respect for the dojo, bows in and out at the start and conclusion of the class. A dojo can be anywhere where karate is practiced, exercised, or taught.

'Katas' are movements made up of various kicks, blocks and punches aimed at a hypothetical opponent. "The secret of karate lies in the katas," Smith pointed out. Katas are often a confusing series of moves that the beginner must overcome before he or she can reach some level of proficiency.

Katas provide physical exercise as well as self-discipline. A

sensei begins and ends each kata by saying "chiun bi". The words mean to "prepare to start, or to finish".

When the karateka learns the traditional or established katas for a particular style, he or she may concentrate on katas which will sharpen weak areas. For example; if the weak area is in punching, a kata should be employed which involves punching.

As a karateka works up to the more difficult katas, he or she advances in belt ranks, which are earned after testing. A beginner starts out with a white belt, then

there are two degrees in yellow; one degree in purple; two in green; three in brown; nine in black. There are other color ranking systems. Colors may be eliminated or added. Each sensei uses his own discretion. There are no set rules because of the wide variety of kata styles taught.

Smith says that once a karateka is skilled in discipline control, self-defense will come automatically. He says there is no reason to engage in fighting unless physical injury is experienced individually or when one must come to the aid of a helpless

person. Smith's study of the martial arts goes with a knowledge based on self-understanding.

"There is no reason to bring myself to the other person's level by fighting. I know what I can do, why prove it? It's so funny; everybody wants you to prove it."

Smith is often asked what can be done in a particular situation. He can demonstrate numerous moves to counter an opponent's approach, but in a real-life situation, an informed karateka will know what to do.

In today's society, Smith feels that weapons are used for show.

Smith does not place much importance on weapons. He believes that those who carry weapons are looking for trouble. "If you train with weapons and you do not have one when you need it, you're going to find yourself in an awkward situation. My empty hands - my weapons - are the meaning of karate," says Smith. His philosophy is that training with weapons should be secondary and that it should not take priority over the physical and mental training of karate.

Smith says that those who are now turning karate into a sport are losing its true purpose. self defense. With the introduction of a new match style in karate tournaments, karate dojos are no longer able to stick to one style. The new style for the ring is a style of its own, belonging to no particular school.

"By turning karate into a spectator sport, the true spirit and style and meaning of karate as a martial art is probably going to be forgotten," Smith says sadly.

Smith does not have the killer instinct, but he is intrigued by 'ninjas'. Ninjas, considered the silent assassins, use their brain as a spiritual tool. To become a toasty natural being is the goal of a ninjutsu student. This form of awareness stems from a mystical knowledge of the universe as taught and developed for combat centuries ago by Japanese warrior priests.

"Ninjas are considered magicians. They have superior fighting abilities and are acrobatic. They are fascinating to read about," says Smith. He knows that he will probably never be able to practice ninjutsu under a sensei for the simple reason that you don't advertise the fact that you are a ninja.

The dojo at TAE KWON ARTS prominently displays a framed picture of Ida May Carr, who received a taekwon do black belt at the age of 72. It was in 'Black Belt', the world's leading magazine of self defense that Smith read about the senior citizen from Pennsylvania.

Ida May is working her way to her second 'dan', one of many karate ranking systems. She defied the myths of growing old by taking up the martial arts. The clipped picture, of which Smith is very proud, is an example of self discipline.

Smith says that it takes repetitious workouts to become proficient in karate. Although he is a 1st degree black belt technician, he still considers himself a student.

"I'm always learning. Everytime I practice, I get better. It is only the beginning. The spiritual part comes now, along with the physical," says Larry Smith, karate sensei.

The flying side kick, used to knock a person off a horse, is demonstrated by sensei Smith. His feet are probably equivalent to leather because he walks in bare feet almost year-round. Winter weather forces him to put on shoes or boots.



Roueche serves as the opponent for Smith's demonstration of the side kick to the throat. The greatest amount of strength is attained when a person exhales. To insure this, a karateka (student) gives out a loud shout, known as a 'kia'. Smith adds, "It also serves to scare an opponent!"

To disarm a knife, Roueche employs a reverse crescent. The move began with his back to Smith, who acted as the opponent. In the days of early Orient, farmers were not allowed to have guns or swords. They trained with weapons on hand - farm tools.
