

1,400 Attend

Some 1,400 people from all over New Mexico crowded the South Springs Ranch Saturday for one of the most successful fundraising barbeques in New Mexico history

The \$50,00-a-plate meal was on behalf of the re-election campaign of Congressman Joe Skeen, who represents New Mexico's Second District in Washington.

"It was just great," Skeen said. "Everyone had a good time and we got to see a lot of old friends." Special guests at the barbeque were former Texas Governor John Connally and his wife along with Senators Pete Domenici and Harrison Schmitt

Skeen said he particularly wanted to thank Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Anderson, owners of the ranch, for hosting the event "They were most gracious and helpful," he said. "We couldn't have done it without them. And, of course, the meal was also outstanding. The East Grand Plains Lions Club really puts on a spread."

The fund-raiser was the first for Skeen since he won an historic write-in campaign last November to fill the House seat left vacant by the death of Rep. Harold Runnels


"I've always had a warm spot for older people perhaps because I rarely see my own grandparents who live in California," she said.



Take your pick of either dark (chocolate) or "blonde" (butterscotch) brownles. For chocolate brownles, use chocolate cake mix and canned chocolate pudding. For butterscotch brownles, use yellow cake mix and canned butterscotch pudding.

Since the richness of these brownies comes from canned pudding, don't pay extra for pudding-added cake mixes. Look for the least expensive generic or store brand. For an interesting change from plain brownies, an easy topper of chips and nuts is suggested. Of course, these yummy extras add to the cost of the recipe. When you compare basic brownle mix with the pudding/cake mix method, (minus the chips and nuts), you'll be saving money.



Hunter Training Deadline Sept. 30

Youths under 18 years of age for youngsters enrolling in the who are planning to hunt with firearms this season and have not passed a certified hunter training course have until Sept. 30 to register for the class.

Those who have not enrolled by Sept. 30 will not be able to take the required course and, subsequently, cannot apply for, or purchase a license for hunting with firearms.

Hunter training prior to application for or purchase of a firearms license by a juvenile was made mandatory by State Game' Commission last year. Prior to the new regulation, youths under 18 could purchase a firearms hunting license and then take the course. The State Game Commission set the Sept. 30 deadline for enrollment to help eliminate the last-minute rush by youths wanting to hunt during fall big game seasons.

Those registering prior to Sept. 30 will be scheduled for the next open class.

The hunter training course is usually taught by volunteer, instructors over a period of, several days, with class sessions from two to three hours in length.

Classes are available when an instructor has enough students signed up at a time when he or she can teach. Each class is kept to 25 to 30 students.

There is currently no age limit and September 17, 1981.
