
Ruidoso

Accepts C'zozo Letters to the mayor at Tuesday's Carrizozo town meeting included the one from the Village of Ruidoso informing the Carrizozo council that they have accepted the town's request for membership on the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC).

Lincoln County, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs had previously approved Carrizozo's membership. Mescalero Apache Tribe, the fifth SBAC member, has not given their go-ahead for Carrizozo SBAC membership. Lincoln County Commissioner, Thomas "Cotton" McKnight has strongly supported Carrizozo's desire to be represented on SBAC.

Carrizozo dentist, Dr. Dale Goad and Carrizozo Town Trustee Ruth Armstrong, both on the local airport committee attended the last Ruidoso Village council meeting and heard first hand that Carrizozo was approved for SBAC membership. A joint powers agreement among present SBAC members states that the proposed regional airport must be located within 15 miles of Ruidoso. The town of Carrizozo is willing to accept this condition.

Mr. Hubert Quintana, CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Project Administrator, told the Carrizozo town council last Tuesday that 36 applications have been received so far

Dr. Howard Tate of Ruidoso, program chairman for the Lincoln County Historical Society meeting

made arrangements for a presentation by historian-author. Mr. Herman B. Weisner of Organ. N.M. Weisner, president of Dona Ana Historical Society, is a retired White Sands Missile Range electronics technician.

He began his research of Lincoln County when his study of Organ turned up parallels and common historic figures. He spent many hours researching in Lincoln County for his book, "Indictments of Lincoln County, 1872 - 1882, which mentions Albert Bacon Fall. Weisner gave a talk at the White Oaks meeting about recent views concerning the involvement of A. B. Fall in the Teapot Dome scandal. Fall was a former Otero county ranch owner.

Teapot Dome is the name given to one of the most notorious scandals in the administration of President Warren G. Harding A Senate investigation in 1923, as well as subsequent testimiony in court trials, revealed that Secretary of the Interior Albert Fall had persuaded Secretary of the Navy Edwin Denby to transfer government oil reserves at Elk Hills, California and Teapot Dome, Wyoming, to the Department of Interior. Fall then leased the reserves to private oil producers.

These leases were made

without competitive bidding. Fall received large sums of money for helping to arrange the transfers The scandal forced Fall to resign in 1923. He was later convicted of accepting a bribe and sent to prison in 1931.

Calvin Coolidge entered the White House just as the Teapot Dome and other scandals of the Harding administration became public. Coolidge made no effort to shield the guilty. In 1924, he forced the resignation of high officials who had been connected with the scandals.

Ups and Downs Forecast for Ranching in '80s

The new decade promises to be challenging period for southwestern ranchers in the estimation of two New Mexico State University researchers. They say ranchers will continue to face the old price-cost battle, but won't have to contend with serious drought.

"Nobody knows exactly what's going to happen in the next 10 years, but if the rancher knows what general conditions to expect, he can outline strategies and seek alternatives to deal with these conditions," said Dr. James R. Gray, an agricultural economist at NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station.

Gray and fellow agricultural exonomist Dr. John M. Fowler recently outlined the conditions ranchers can expect to face in the 1980's. The researchers based their forecasts on historical trends and agricultural economics studies.

On the positive side, the researchers do not expect a major drought in the southwest. They said the 1980s fall outside the 22year drought cycle which peaked in the last decade. According to past trends, the southwest will have minor drought in some areas with a few areas suffering severe drought for short periods.

Gray and Fowler took meteorologists to task for not developing more reliable longrange drought forcasting. "With the date handling capabilities of computers, more progress is needed and should be demanded for long-range forecasting," said Gray.

He said ranchers need a ninemonth forecast with a minimum 80 percent accuracy. The ranchers need to berreasonably sure that when they buy calves in November the forage supply will last until summer. If drought is predicted, he said, ranchers can cut back purchases and lower their feed costs during the dry spell.

Cattle numbers also follow a cycle. In the current one, which runs from 1979 to 1989, price appeared to peak early, in 1979. Since then, prices have drifted downward. Some price recovery will come in 1981 through 1984, but will weaken again in 1985 as supplies begin to pile up. The researchers speculated that prices will pull out of the slump by 1988, particularly

for feeder animals and cows. "Lamb prices will have small uns and downs during the 1980s with more ups than downs," Gray said. Wool prices are expected to be very favorable through the next 10 years.

According to Gray and Fowler, ranchers could weather the price decline by accumulating some financial reserves during the 1979 to 1984 boom years to carry them through the bust years of 1985 to 1989.

"One way to increase cash reserves," Gray said, "is to liquidate some of the 'paper profit' tied up in land investment." Liquidation also would ease cash flow problems created by depressed cattle prices and higher production costs. "Ranchers with \$2 to \$4 million tied up in land are getting less than 1 percent profit return," he said.

The rancher could opt for a partial-sell and lease-back. strategy which requires that the rancher sell a minor part of his rangeland and then lease it back from the buyer. This way, the rancher frees some of his landlocked cash and still is able to use the land for livestock.

Ranchers also must adapt to changes in the market of the 1980s. "Experts indicate that ranchers more often 'sell' their livestock rather than 'market' them, " Gray said. By planning the sale, getting the highest price and finding the right buyer, ranchers can get a better share of the consumer market.

One way to market livestock is to use electronic exchange communications. According to one study, these systems, which include teletype networks and digital 🌱 computers, can solve 13 of 16 major problems in merketing livestock. Pooling, or combining herds from several ranches for sale, is another way to achieve'market power, he said.

"One way or another, the traditionally independent range livestock producers will have to get together with his neighbors in both buying supplies and selling livestock," said Gray.


