News Briefs..

They will also be in the Procession for the Vespers Service Friday night October 23rd at 7 P.M. and will be the Honor Court for the Fiesta Queen. Fiesta Queen Candidates are Jo Ray Salcido, Rosie Salas and Monica Trujillo. The St. Jude Fiesta Queen will be crowned by Kelli Vigil, Santa Rita Fiesta Queen for 1981 from Carrizozo.

Other Fiesta events will include Carnival Rides on Church grounds Thursday October 22nd to Sunday October 25th. Raffle drawings on Sunday and a Turkey Bingo Saturday night at 7 P.M.

Guy Brown of Carrizozo graduated 4th in his class from the New Mexico Police Academy in Santa Fe. Attorney General, Jeff Bingham, was the guest speaker at the graduation ceremony October 16, 1981. Mr. Bingham admonished the graduates to take their work as law enforcement officers seriously.

The Police Academy covers many areas of study. Classes include street survival tactics, hand to hand combat, weapons, laws, riot control, defensive driving and physical agility. During the intensive six week course students are taught how to react in a number of crises situations such as hostages, family disputes, and snipers.

Sally Abercrombie of Santa Rosa was recently accepted into New Mexico State University's Crimson Scholars program.

Miss Abercrombie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Abercrombie, Box 235, Santa Rosa, is a freshman planning to major in geology.

Designed to attract, retain & reward academically superior students, the Crimson Scholars program is open to new freshmen, current students and those transferring to NMSU from other institutions.

As Crimson Scholars, students receive registration benefits, special library privileges, recognition upon graduation and special faculty advisement emphasizing professional and post-graduate studies. When possible, they will be provided with salaried work experience related to their career goals.

To qualify for the program, freshmen must have an ACT composite score of 26 or better and sophomores, juniors and seniors must maintain a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.5.

Revisions Noted--

Property Taxes

Property Tax Bills which will be due November 5, 1981 will reflect both the rate reduction authorized by the 1981 legislature and the mandated separation of property into residential and nonresidential categories, according to Fred Muniz, Secretary of the Taxation and Revenue Department.

"The most notable change is the reduction in the school tax rate," Muniz said today. "It dropped from 8.925 mills to half a mill for residential property. This translates into a cut of \$84.25 for every \$10,000 of taxable value." The rate for nonresidential property dropped from 8.925 mills to four mills, which will result in a tax bill \$49.25 lower for every \$10,000 of taxable value.

County assessors will determine how properties are to be classified and indicate the classification on the tax bill. Residential property will include houses, apartments and mobile homes used for human habitation. Vacant lots, regardless of location, will be classified as nonresidential property.

Because of the greater tax relief offered to owners of residential property, Muniz advised taxpayers to check the classification assigned to their property. Those who disagree with the assigned classification have until December 5, 1981 to file protests with their county treasurers.

County treasurers will accept statements of a property's classification from protesters and, on the basis of that affidavit, will issue adjusted tax bills. The adjustment is subject to review by the county assessor and, if taxpayer and assessor still disagree, to final review by the county valuation protests board. This procedure is new for 1981 and is applicable only for this year.

In 1982 taxpayers will be responsible for reporting the classification of their property to the county assessor. Property not reported as residential will be presumed to be nonresidential and will be taxed at the higher rate.

Classification documents will be mailed in January of 1982 (in some cases as part of the notice of value). Taxpayers will have until February 28, 1982 to file this document for residential properties. Once a classification document is filed, it will not be necessary to report classification in subsequent tax years.

C. Cantrell Named to Review Board

Senator Harrison Schmitt announced today that Carolyn Cantrell of Carrizozo will be serving on his Military Academy Applicants Review Board. The Board which will meet in Roswell on October 25 will interview applicants from eight New Mexico counties who are interested in attending the military service academies. Similar boards will be meeting in Las Cruces, Santa Fe, and Albuquerque and will interview young people from their respective geographic areas. Recommendations from the four boards will assist Senator Schmitt in making appointments to the academies.

'Corey Lane', a western novel is available at Family Pharmacy at Carrizozo. The novel, written by Norman Zollinger of Albuquerque is set in the New Mexico Territory of 1879. Combining high adventure, romance, and the rugged beauty of the old West, "Corey Lane" vividly chronicles the downfall of a hero - a hero whose extreme pride is both his greatest source of strength and his fatal weakness.

At the heart of this stirring western saga is the extraordinarily powerful Sheriff Corey Lane, a man capable of quelling unruly crowds with a single look. Although respected for his many victories over the Indians, Lane rules Black Springs with such an autocratic hand that the townspeople eventually turn against him. In retaliation, Lane becomes a renegade and joins forces with bloodthirsty Apaches for a march on the town.

Zollinger's characters, each one superbly drawn, are molded by the rigors of frontier life. There is Cory's mother, Alicia, who rides horseback as well as any man; his beautiful wife, Virgie, who quickly wins the heart of Jim McPherson, an eastern newspaper man who has come west for his health and soon finds himself in the thick of the crisis in Black Springs; and Victorio, the Apaches' formidable leader.

"Riders to Cibola", Zollinger's earlier book, won the prestigious Golden Spur Award for Western Fiction and the Southwest Book Award for Fiction.

Zollinger was one of four guest speakers at a recent Writer's Invitational Tuesday in the Roswell Public Library. The other distinguished New Mexico writers were Charl Van Horn of Roswell; Jean Burroughs of Portales; and W.W. Southard of Clovis.

Zollinger ended the Invitational with "Weaving History into Fiction."

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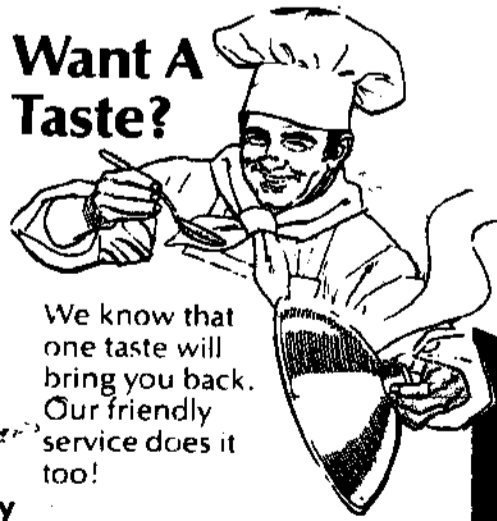
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Safety During Halloween

Halloween goblins, ghosts and ghouls will soon be appearing. Now is the time to be planning their costumes.

Some safety factors need to be considered as Halloween costumes are bought or made, according to Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

If a costume is bought, be sure it is marked flame retardant. The length should not be so long that the wearer will trip on it. The mask should be comfortable to wear with large holes for eyes and mouth, and should have plenty of breathing space.

Pick a costume with reflective paint or dye in the design. Or, sew or glue reflective ribbon or tape to the costume to make it easy for motorists to see.

For home sewn costumes, select fabrics that are flame resistant. Or, apply a flame retardant finish at home. A recipe for the finish follows:

Dissolve three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water and stir in seven ounces of borax. Soak the costume in the solution for five minutes, then hang to dry. When slightly damp, iron to smooth wrinkles.

This treatment does not make the costume flame proof. It does, however, help the costume resist ignition and slows the spread of flames if the costume does catch fire.

The solution will work best on fabrics such as cotton, burlap, linen, and rayon. It is not a durable finish and should be reapplied each time the costume is to be worn.

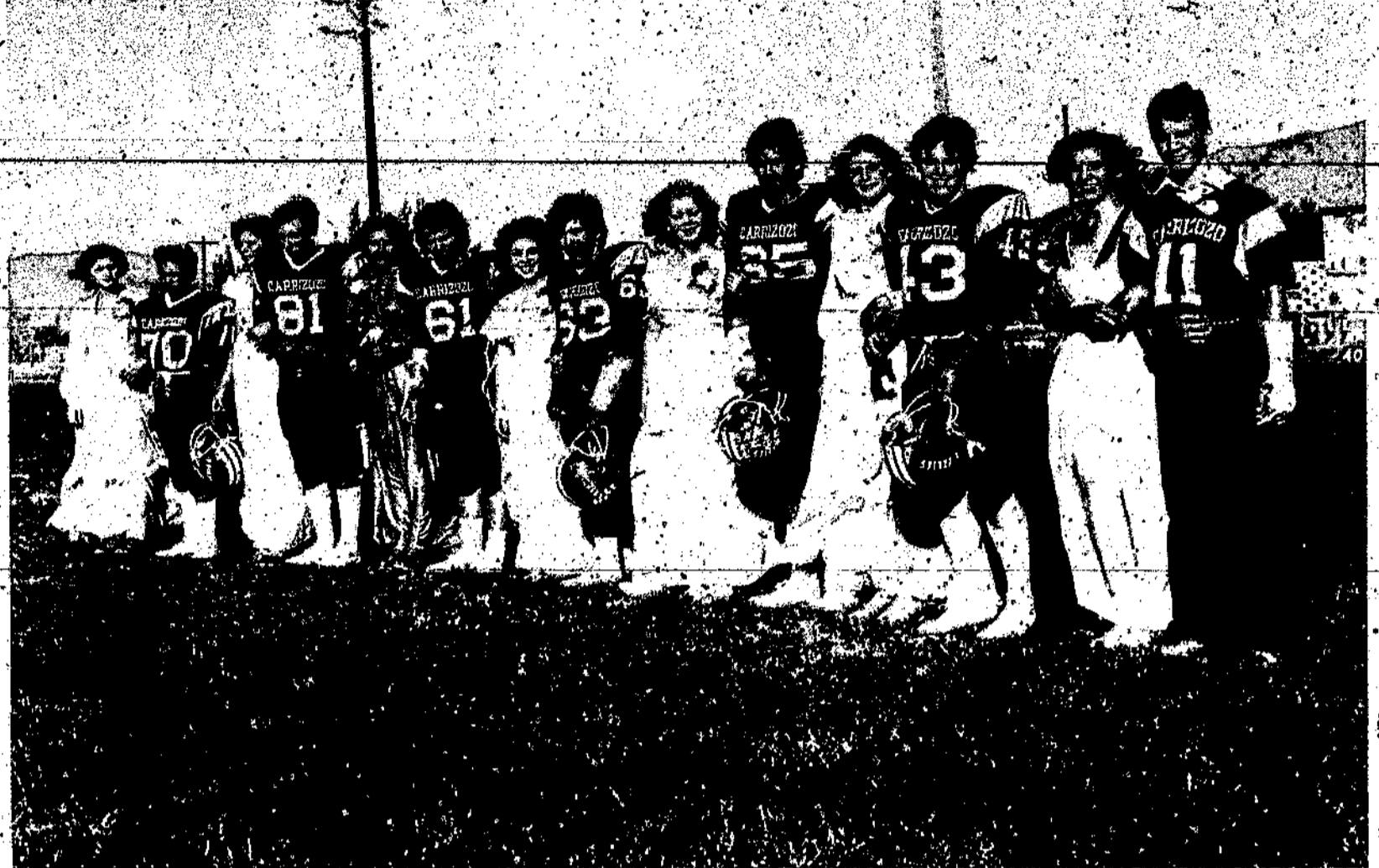
Nathan Portillo, cousin of the bridegroom was the ring bearer. Andrea O'Brien, also a cousin of the bridegroom, was the flower girl.

The good news about education in Carrizozo is here: Carrizozo Elementary students are scoring on the average above many other students nationally in many academic subjects. According to information recently received by the District from the Westinghouse Scoring Center, Carrizozo students in grades 1 through 4 are scoring

from several months to as much as several years ahead of similar students around the nation.

Students are tested annually in Math, Language-Reading, Science, and Social Studies using the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS). Scored in California, the tests are administered to students over a several day period in early May each year through the nation.

Tests are then scored, and scoring information is returned to the District for discussion with parents and indicator of a basic skills emphasis by teachers, a well developed curriculum, of classroom teachers.
