

An "over 18" student would not bring revenue to the school while at the same time be using the staff and facilities. The second problem is that

according to state law, a student who is over 18 is considered "emancipated" and that student's parents have neither rights nor responsibilities with that student The school would be unable to appeal to a parent for discipline of the student. After much discussion, it was a

consensus of the board that if there was room in a class and if it seemed reasonable that a student would benefit her-himself by being in school and if a student would not be detrimental to other students' achievement, and if a student seemed to exhibit a level of indicative motivation school with cooperation authroities, then the administration could bring to the board a recommendation favoring acceptance of the student.

An overriding consideration, which must be checked with school board legal counsel, is what legal rights-responsibilities the school
