



## Knief Wielding Bandit Strikes

Carrizozo town police continue investigation into the armed robbery which occurred at Central Package Liquor Store on November 27. A lone bandit entered the store that Friday evening around 7:00 p.m. and left with \$454 in cash, plus some checks.


The suspect, armed with a hunting knife handed employee Mary Hernandez a note which stated in large print letters: "IT IS NOT A JOKE. PUT ALL THE MONEY IN BAG."

In addition to a stocking over his face, the person wore a ski

mask, a bright orange hunter's jacket, levis and tennis shoes. Disguising his voice by whispering, the man demanded all the money in the cash register, plus money kept out of public view behind the counter in a drawer.

Other witnesses to the incident were Mrs. Hernandez' two young daughters, ages 4 and 6 and her mother, Marian Schlarb.

Police officials believe that the suspect, described as 5'6" to 5'8" in height, had an accomplice who waited in a get-away car in the alley behind the liquor store.

## Finds Own Way Home

Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies were busy around the clock when a Carrizozo hunter was reported missing last Sunday, November 29 at 6:00 p.m. The hunter, Orlando Beltran, age 21 after spending the night in area west of the Mal Pais, hitched a ride into Carrizozo with a passing motorist.

Arriving at his parents home around 11:00 a.m. on Monday, he was told that a search was being conducted and that he should inform the Sheriff's Department that he was safe.

He had been hunting with his brother, Jerry Beltran when a dense fog set in, followed by night fall. Unable to locate his younger brother, Jerry Beltran returned to Carrizozo. Another brother, Juan Beltran contacted the Sheriff's Department.

Alamogordo Search and Rescue was asked for assistance at 9:30 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 29. The rescue team led by Michael Curtis, a member of the 40th Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron from Holloman Air Force Base

(HAFB), arrived at 1:30 a.m. Nov. 30 and conducted a night grid search of the areas area where Orlando Beltran was last seen.

Two helicopters from HAFB joined the search at 8:00 a.m. and conducted an extensive air search of the area within 5 miles of where

the hunters parked their vehicle when they began hunting.

Orlando Beltran told the NEWS that although grateful that people were concerned with his safety, he had confidence that he would find his way out once daylight arrived.

Ft. Stanton Hospital and Training School and Eagle Creek Ski Area, in cooperation with the New Mexico Special Olympics, will be sponsoring the 1982 Winter Games Jan. 26-29 at Eagle Creek Ski Area near Ruidoso. These Winter Games will include participation by Special Olympians from the southern New Mexico counties of Lincoln, Otero, Chaves, Lea, Dona Ana, Grant, Curry, DeBaca, Quay, Guadalupe, Roosevelt, Hidalgo and Luna.

Special Olympians, chaperones and instructors will be arriving at the Camp of the Nazarene in Alto on Jan. 26. That evening, Ft. Stanton Hospital will provide a banquet dinner for the athletes, chaperones and instructors with gym activities and swimming to follow.

On Wednesday, Jan. 27, Alpine and Nordic skiing instruction will be given to the Special Olympians at Eagle Creek Ski Area. The torchlight parade and opening ceremonies will take place at 7 p.m. at the ski area.

Competition in the slalom and giant slalom, the 100-meter and one-kilometer races will be held on Thursday, Jan. 28, at Eagle Creek. A dance will be held that evening at the Elks Lodge in Ruidoso.

The participants and instructors will depart Friday, Jan. 29. All activities on the slopes will be supervised by ski instructors who are trained and experienced in teaching the basics of skiing and insuring safety for all participants. A registration fee of \$25 will be assessed each athlete and sponsor. This fee does not include rental fees for the ski equipment. ## Mesquite Control Revived

The Bureau of Land Management has a mesquite control program going in southeastern New Mexico for the first time in more than a decade and, so far, it looks good.

BLM aerially sprayed 12,500 acres of rangeland in June, the first step in an ambitious brush control program that should double grazing capacity on a million acres of range in the Roswell BLM district over the next ten years.

The district plans to spray another 13,000 acres in 1982 to

make up for several years when there was no brush control program. BLM last sprayed brush in 1969 before a ban on the use of 2,4,5-T on public lands stopped mesquite control work.

BLM used a new herbicide mixture of Tordon 22K and Banvel, applied as an oil-water emulsion, in this year's aerial treatment of mesquite. It was specially licensed in New Mexico to let BLM try to control mesquite with herbicides that don't contain 2,3,4-T.

This BLM land is leased to Roswell area ranchers on the basis of 10 animals to the section. If the mesquite control program is successful, the land will probably support 18 animals and maybe 20.

Ranchers now pay BLM \$2.31 per animal unit per month on this land, so if the brush control program works as planned, BLM's increased revenue from leases should be more than the cost of mesquite control with this herbicide.

BLM is aiming for about 40 percent control of mesquite in these grazing areas. They won't try for 100 percent control for a couple of reasons. First, 100 percent control is probably impossible, and would be much more expensive than the present program.

Second, the Environmental Protection Agency wants to leave some natural cover for wildlife.

Kirk McDaniel, Extension brush control specialist at New Mexico State University, said if the land sprayed in June was not treated at all "... brush growth probably would cause it to become less and less productive for grazing."

The Roswell BLM district is the first district to go beyond the test pilot stage, McDaniel said. There are 13 million acres of BLM-managed rangeland in New Mexico, and all of it has some kind of brush control problem on it.
