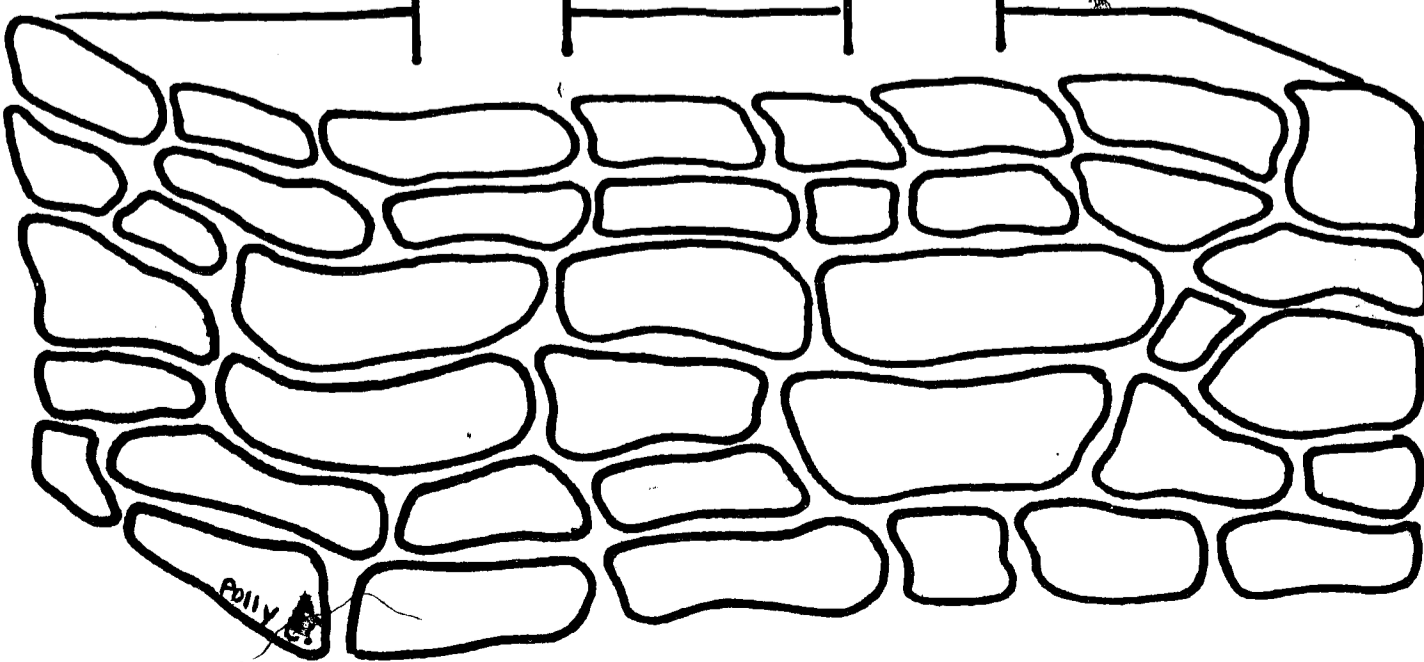

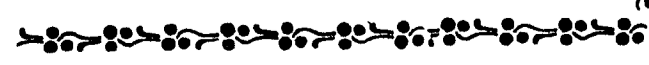

## Robert Montano Wins Oratorical Contest

Two Carrizozo high school juniors participated in the local American Legion sponsored oratorical contest recently. Robert Montano, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Montano took first place. Lisa Cantrell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cantrell came in second.

This is the third year that Montano has won the local contest. He also has been runner-up twice in the district oratorical contest. The eleventh grader is vice-president of his FHA-HERO Chapter and president of District 'J' Executive Council. (Cantrell is president of the local FHA-HERO Chapter.) Montano was selected to represent Carrizozo High School and the state in the Society of Distinguished American Students for 1981. He is a member of the Junior Varsity basketball team.

**Quilting Bits**

Denise Hill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Hill was the winner of the Nine-Patch quilt made by the Santa Rita Quilting Group. The drawing was held after the Midnight Mass on the 24th. Denise is a 4th grader at Carrizozo. The quilt will be cherished and treasured as Denise's mom and grandmom are quilt admirers and have experience in the making of quilts.

This latest achievement of the Santa Rita Quilters features quilted N.M. scenes in the plain color blocks. The needlework art includes an apple cider jug, a bean pot, horse, hot air balloon, skier, pine tree, White Sands Monument, Zia symbol, chili ristra, deer, state outline, Indian, sunflower, roadrunner, and last, but not least "Smoky the Bear" There is even a block quilted with the outline of the Santa Rita Catholic Church building.

My attention now turns to the quilt the Carrizozo Woman's Club is in the process piecing. More next week on their project.

The oldest of quilt patterns is the "Crazy Patch". Our grandmothers and great-grandmothers called the crazy patch work "a slumber throw". The pieces were small and seams were topped with a variety of embroidery stitches. Both plain and figured silks were used. Flowers and other motifs were embroidered on the plain patches. Several colors of embroidery thread were generally used but sometimes one color of

thread predominated the embroidered seams.

A foundation of soft material was used to base the pieces on. An old wool blanket or flannel was commonly used. In "Crazy Patch" work, a piece of material is placed over the space to be filled on the foundation backing. This is overlapped with a second piece. This type of cover is "tied" instead of quilted.

**Weekly Wash**

Another White Oaks cooking and baking enthusiast, Maggie Bohks, has lent me a small cookbook from years past. The booklet, "Mary - Dunbar's Favorite Recipes" features tips for doing the weekly wash. Some laundry hints of yesteryear:

"To keep clothes from freezing to the line in cold weather, wipe line with a rag wrung out of strong salt water....Rag rugs straighten out better if you put starch in the last rinse water. Use the starch remaining in the Kettle at the end of the wash, emptying it into the last rinse for the rug....After starching house dresses, run them through the wringer. This takes out extra stiffness....Put a teaspoon of salt in starch to prevent clothes from freezing in winter....Save the melted ice water from the pan under the ice box. Add Jewel Brano to make excellent soft water for the family washing....Put the bluing in the machine while washing the clothes instead of in the rinse water to make the clothes whiter....To keep clothesline groops from slipping out from under the line, drive a long finishing nail to part of its depth in the bottom of the pole. The headless nail sticks into the ground and prevents slipping....To remove lettering from sugar and flour sacks, boil for thirty minutes in water to which two laundry tablets and a tablespoon of Grano have been added - and dissolved....To whiten linen when it looks gray, put four slices of lemon with rind in the water in which you boil the linen."

A new idea originated this Christmas in this household. I purchased a two foot plastic tree, which I placed on a cake turn table. Next I took out the jewelry boxes out of the closet. The children and I rummaged through its contents. Costume jewelry, keepsakes and other treasured baubles became tiny Christmas tree ornaments to the delight of the young people in the Chavez residence.

Hanging on the little tree limbs are their dad's army 'dog tags', and other military insignia; a blue rhinestone heart given to their mom by their dad when both were teenagers; Holy Communion, 4-H and sports medals; lapel pins of every size and shape; one, two, and three strand necklaces of simulated pearls or other man-made gems, matching and unmatching earrings; initial jewelry; a scorpion under plastic pin; a tiny lock; a picture locket; a mustard seed charm.

There are jeweled pins representing an owl a poodle, a lady bug, gun, silverware, spider, horse and a donkey. The tree sports Rotary and Lions Club pins given to 'Newspaper Polly'. There is a wrist chain with a tiny bible, which opens to reveal even tinier rosary beads. A miniature Congress building, a souvenir of Betty Rannels dangles from a tiny branch.

Well, Mabel! The candles are burning low, the turkey is ready to be made into hash, the room is full of scrap ribbons, cards, rich candy and left-over food. Everyone is enjoying the afterglow of Christmas and wondering what the new year will bring.

OK Mabel! You received all that cologne, powder and make-up for Xmas, let's use it. You need to indulge yourself. Here are some tips for you.

1. Start with the feet: Soak them in rice-soapy water for 15 minutes to get rid of stubborn callouses, add in 2 tablespoons of

baking soda. Next clip your nails.

In bowl combine all of the ingredients and mix together. Put the muffins on a greased pan and cook about 25 minutes at 375 or 400 degrees Fahrenheit.

# Grizzly School News

The Carrizozo Grizzly girls' basketball team took second place in the Grizzly Invitational December 17, 18 and 19 held in Carrizozo. In the free throw tournament Lisa Crenshaw came out victorious defeating three other girls representing their schools. Also three Grizzly girls were named by the vote of the coaches to the eight team All-Tournament team. The girls named were seniors Lisa Crenshaw, Denise

Vega and sophomore Christetta Chavez.

Here is a rundown of the three games played in the tournament.

The Carrizozo-Corona game was a rematch of a game played December 11 in Corona with the result the same, the Grizzly girls defeated Corona 63-43 with Denise Vega bucketing 20 points in the winning cause. Christetta Chavez contributed 14 points with 12 rebounds and 8 steals. Lisa Crenshaw also contributed 13 points with 10 rebounds and 6 steals. The girls as a team really shone during the game hitting 50 percent of their free throws and shooting 44 percent from the field.

In the second game of the Grizzly Invitational the girls were confronted by a District 5A opponent. The outcome was tremendous, but it does not count as a district contest.
