Viola Fenter Presides Over First Meeting

A Spring fashion show and luncheon; restoration of a 1941 pullman railroad coach; providing a Ranch Tour luncheon and selection of a Community Improvement Project (CIP) are among the plans in store for the Carrizozo Woman's Club members.

These projects were among the many exciting plans discussed by members and the club's new president, Viola Vega Fenter during their February meeting. Formerly the club's first-vice president, Fenter

accepted the president's position following the resignation of Mary Thorpe. Thorpe is now director of the Zia Senior Citizen's Center, which is sponsored by the Carrizozo Woman's Club.

Fenter is no stranger to club service. She has served as the club's first and second-vice president, was treasurer for a 2-year term and has been in charge of House and Grounds. She currently chairs the Zia Senior Citizen's Center advisory board.

Born and raised in Carrizozo, she

is the daughter of Mrs. Natalia Vega and the late Nick S. Vega, former Lincoln County Sheriff. Fenter is a graduate of Carrizozo High School.

She is married to retired Army man, Earl L. Fenter. They are the parents of two daughters, Chris and Cyndi. Chris is employed at Lincoln County Abstract Company, Inc., Cyndi is a senior at CHS. The Fenter family has traveled throughout the U.S., Alaska, and Europe.

The club's new president is employed with the State of New Mexico Employment Security Department in Carrizozo and Ruidoso. In addition to holding a full time job and participating in voluntary civic club work, Fenter is actively involved in school and town organizations. She is first-vice president of the Parent-Teacher-Student Association (PTSA), serves on the CHS Vocational Advisory Committee and is a member of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce.

Her family represents three generations in the Carrizozo Woman's Club. Her mother, Natalia and her daughter Chris are members also.

During the February meeting, the Woman's Club held a memorial service in honor of Clara Snow and Carrie Magee who passed away recently.

Business presided by Fenter at her first regular monthly meeting included discussion of how to use the club's CIP money. Member suggestions included spraying elm trees, re-naming some streets, painting house numbers on curbing, new street signs, building a walk over the railroad tracks, restoration of the pullman car and Odd Fellows Club building which the Woman's Club now owns.

At their March meeting the club women will discuss feasibility of each project and money needed to carry it out. The club will announce their choice at a later date. Casa Manana, the 8-unit elderly housing complex was the club's CIP project which earned them national recognition.

Lucia Vega was elected during this month's meeting to serve as the

club's parliamentarian, the position previously held by Linda Housley, who moved away.

The 'Galleria' (ladies apparel) of Ruidoso will be featured at the club's April 2 noon style show and luncheon.

The Woman's Club will again provide a meal for the Ranch Tour. The Canyon and Crown Cowbelles, the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and the County Extension Office are other organizations involved in the June 13 event.

Woman's Club members have volunteered to assist in a town survey to be conducted on Saturday, March 7. The survey is sponsored by the Economic Developmental Committee of the Chamber of Commerce. It is an effort to develop positive steps towards economic development in Carrizozo.

Board Members Are Sworn In

A review of the school's activity and athletic programs was a part of the Carrizozo board of education regular February meeting last week. The board expressed their opinion that these programs teach skills that are not taught in a classroom setting.

however the board felt that these programs should not have priority over the school's academic program.

In the 1981-82 school year the student will have to be more selective in their choices of extra-curricular participation. Every effort will be made so that all programs will be scheduled for after school hours and during weekends. A "dead week" will be planned for January, the end of the first semester. This special week will be scheduled for studying in preparation for tests and no activities will be held.

In order for the athletic student to spend more time in the classroom in the future, Jerry Peckinpaugh Carrizozo's athletic director, told the board that the sports program for 1981-82 will feature mainly Friday and Saturday evening ball games. At least one varsity football game will be scheduled for a Saturday afternoon home game. The school will also limit their out-of-town tournament participation.

Retiring board member Ray Wells swore in recently elected board member, Don Wall. Wally Ferguson, who was re-elected on February 3 was sworn in by Gail Stackpole, secretary of the board. Wall has made plans to attend the new school board member training program in Santa Fe on March 6 and 7. A March 8 afternoon reception is being planned for Wells, who served at his last meeting last week, after 18 years of school board service.

Wall, who begins his term with the March meeting was allowed to sit in during an executive session for consideration of the superintendent's contract. On it's return from the closed session, the board moved to offer Superintendent Jim Miller a 2-year contract.







Put them all together they make a lifetime and fill a career. Vocational agricultural education and the FFA is "Building Tomorrow" for 485,000 high school students "Today." The "Building" process begins for them when they enroll in the vocational agriculture class in their school as freshmen.

First of all, vo-ag will prepare these students for the important "Tomorrow" of getting established in an ag career. They are taught skills and competencies. In the classroom for a particular field of agricultural interest they have chosen.

Secondly, the new students soon discover a unique learning laboratory will be an integral part of vo-ag. It is the FFA Chapter where students are given the opportunity to Learn By Doing. Incentive awards to motivate them. Competition to drive them. Desire to pull them into their work and study. Experiences to season them. Hard work to test them. Rubbing shoulders with other members and experienced adults to teach them.

An adult advisor is the chief builder in this educational Building process. The advisor is the vocational agriculture instructor, as well as the FFA Chapter advisor, and is the reason motivation, inspiration and learning take place.

An added plus in "Building the Tomorrows" for young people is the unique experience FFA can provide its members. Experiences which help them face the little tomorrows.

Leadership experiences abound for members constantly. In FFA. Organized ones like public speaking contests or serving as an elected officer. Or unorganized ones like a chance to present a motion during the meeting; the chance to serve and work on a committee; or the chance to see an older chapter member succeed.

Add to leadership the experiences of solid citizenship training, a sensible bout with cooperation, the encouragement of self pride, forced decision making, a taste of thrift, an opportunity to save others, and a place to exhibit unshamed patriotism.



Lincoln National Forest News

ALAMOGORDO, NM - Record-breaking warm, sunny weather was melting hopes of skiing enthusiasts for a longer season last week, but folks ready for spring couldn't get enough of it.

Sierra Blanca Ski Area facilities near Ruidoso, the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest, were open last week and skiing was fair-to-good. Call 257-9001 for current conditions. Smokey Bear fuelwood areas were open and roads were in good condition.

For the most current information on all of the Lincoln's ranger districts,

forest visitors can call the Smokey Bear District at 257-4080; Cloudcroft, 682-2551; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill, 687-3411. It is a good idea for all forest visitors to call the number of the district they plan to visit before leaving home, to get the most current weather and driving conditions as the forest.

At Cloudcroft, all campgrounds were closed, but dispersed camping is allowed in the snowplay areas. Ski Cloudcroft had most of its runs open and lifts operating. Snow conditions were good at midweek. Snowplay areas were open, but fuelwood areas

were closed. Part of the Rim Trail about two miles from Alamo Peak Road is closed because of logging activities. Highways are dry, but some secondary roads are snowpacked or muddy.

The Guadalupe Ranger District reported Sitting Bull Falls receiving light use, fuelwood areas open and trails in good shape. Repairs are still underway at Robinson Draw, near FR 540, and in Dark Canyon.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground was receiving light use, fuelwood areas were open and fishing in the Penasco and Bear Canyon, fair.

WILDLIFE NEWS

NEW MEXICO GAME & FISH

SANTA FE, N.M. - Proclamations for the new fishing season beginning April 1 have been distributed to vendors statewide, and licenses will be available to the public by mid-March, according to Albert Rivera, chief of Business Management Division, Department of Game and Fish.

Regulations in the new proclamation, approved by the State Game Commission in September, govern fishing in New Mexico for a two-year period, a change from the customary one-year season, which saved the department an estimated \$10,000 in printing costs and cost of meetings to formulate those regulations. Fishing licenses, however, are still valid for only one year, and new licenses are needed each April 1.

Only one major change has been made in the new regulations: an increase in the bag and possession limits on the Rio Chiquito in Taos County. New bag limit on that stream above the Borrego crossing is 32 brown trout per day; possession limit is 64, not to include any cutthroat trout. The Rio Chiquito will close to all fishing from August 1 of this year to March 31, 1983, to facilitate a native cutthroat rehabilitation program in that water.

Fishing license prices for the 1981-82 season have not changed: junior-senior licenses, sold only to residents 12 to 14 years of 65 years and older, \$1.25, with an additional charge of \$2 for a trout water validation; resident fishing licenses, \$7.50, trout validation, \$4; nonresident fishing licenses, \$15.50, trout validation, \$5; one-day fishing, resident or nonresident, \$3.25, trout validation, \$2; five-day fishing license, resident or nonresident, \$8, trout validation, \$3. The licenses will be available at game department offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Espana, Roswell and Las Cruces, and from approximately 350 vendors statewide.

Anglers still have opportunity to use their current licenses until the new season opens April 1, and licenses for the 1981-82 season are not valid until that date. With more than a month; worth of use still in the fishing license bought last year, a half-dozen popular northern trout lakes reopen to fishing February 28. In addition, many other waters are already open to angling.

Lakes opening February 28 are Charette, Springer and Maxwell lakes, near Springer; Jackson Lake, near Farmington; McAllister Lake, near Las Vegas; and Clayton Lake, near Clayton.

Farmers and Ranchers May Be Eligible for Loans

Clovis, N.M. February 17 - Bill Glennon, Disaster Loan Manager for the Small Business Administration's New Mexico District, reminded farmers and ranchers they may be eligible for low-interest loans because of physical damage caused by drought, beginning in June of last year.

Glennon said drought-related damage to farm and ranch operations in 1980 triggered the SBA Disaster Loan program in most of Eastern New Mexico. The four counties of

Curry, Roosevelt, Torrance and Union - and all counties adjacent thereto, totalling 17 in all, comprise the drought disaster area. He encouraged all ranchers and farmers to inquire about the program by phoning 769-2681 locally and 800-433-2681 toll-free, or stopping by the SBA office at 1802 Mitchell, Clovis, between the hours of 8:00 am and 4:30 pm.

It was also pointed out that a recent designation of Catron, Grant, Hidalgo and Mora counties by SAA now permits economic injury disaster loans by SBA to non-farm businesses

in these four counties in addition to the original 17. Glennon added that these loans were designed exclusively for businesses whose income is derived primarily from the farm and ranch community, and resulting from drought and high temperatures last year. Glennon concluded by noting that closing dates for disaster loan applications are June 5, 1981 for farmers and ranchers, and somewhat later for non-farm businesses. The new toll-free number for the SBA Disaster Office in Clovis, once again, is 800-433-2681.






