Clean-up Day chairman Fred Vigil announced this week that the annual town clean-up event is scheduled for Saturday, April 25.

### C of C Concerned--

## Carrizozo Still Not on (SBAC)

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce president, Scott Shafer told the Chamber at their April 7 meeting that the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) has not yet given Carrizozo recognition. Trustee Ruth Armstrong and Dr. Dale Goad, both who are on the municipal airport committee were appointed by Carrizozo's mayor quite some time ago to represent the town on SBAC. Necessary membership fees were made available.

Carrizozo has been seeking SBAC membership for many months now, without success. Shafer told Chamber members that he has been and will continue to keep in touch with Betty King of Roswell, secretary to Senator Schmitt.

Shafer told the group at their noon luncheon meeting the local airport progress is taking shape. A new pump system will be installed in 2 weeks, a distributor's license will be obtained, insurance coverage is now ample and SAA financial assistance is being sought. The airport has plans to furnish aircraft fuel by the end of the month.

Shafer reported for project chairman, Pat Vigil that Clean up Day is Saturday, April 25. The town council will be approached for the town's help. The town has signed a proclamation, and will be assisting with the community project.

The Chamber heard the progress of Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. The Rec Center is open 4 nights a week, a lease has been signed with Jackie Martin who will operate the snack bar, the school district is interested in running the swimming program.

Arriba memberships are \$10 and it is hoped every adult in Carrizozo will join. Contributions of \$50 or more can be designated for a specific use by the donor. Arriba contributions are tax deductible.

A family golf membership is \$150. passes for swimming and golfing will be available. Fred Vega is doing a good job promoting bowling and was in charge of organizing the bowling tournament on April 11 and 12.

C of C plans continue for an August 2 People's Market Place. Word was received that four hot air balloons from Roswell and Chino, Corner will be available. Balloon rides were suggested as a "money maker."

The Market Place will be located near Country Club grounds on Hwy. 380. A pancake breakfast may be held in the screened area of the club. A service band and, or sky jumpers are other attractions which may be featured at the People's Market Place.

Among C of C business volunteers are the Economic

Development Committee. They will meet with existing committee members to appoint a chairman.

Betty Fields reported that \$620 was made for charities with the successful presentations by the local Little Theatre group.

Rene Burton told of plans for the 2nd Annual Ranch Tour on June 13. The participants will depart from the court house parking lot, visit 3 ranches and stop for barbecue at the White Oaks school.

Fr. Dave Bergs announced the St. Rita sponsored carnival to be held on the football field on April 23-26. People seeking booth space should contact Father Bergs.

Woody Schlegel told of plans for the Country Club to sponsor Sunday flea markets on the old rodeo grounds, during the summer months. Sellers will be charged \$3.50, buyers will be admitted free.

Beulah Moore invited Chamber members to the Lioness Club meeting April 14. Two guest speakers were to present pros and cons of a National Jr. Rodeo to be sponsored locally.

Bob Coppedge, Extension Service Economist NMSU, suggested that the C of C pursue more tourism and try to gain membership in Sun County USA. Their brochure does not note the local state park, Valley of Fires.

## Hondo Fiesta Presentation April 24-25

The nationally known Hondo Fiesta Dancers will present the 29th annual Hondo Fiesta April 24 and 25 in the Hondo School Gymnasium.

Sixty senior high school students in beautiful costumes perform the many graceful steps of Spanish-Mexican and New Mexican folk dances.

Mr. and Mrs. Fermin Montes of Roswell, founders and instructors of the dance performance group, named this year's Fiesta "La Fiesta Flor Oro."

Some of the dances to be performed include El Novillero, El Jarabe Pateno, La Varsoviana, Jarabe de Valle, El Shotis Norteño, and Jesuita en Chihuahua.

Also the difficult and strenuous Los Matlaches will be danced by the boys and the popular El Jarabe Tapatio, the Mexican Hat Dance, will be performed by the group. Several new dances are being added by Mrs. Montes.

These nationally famous dancers have traveled and danced in the Festival of Arts in Tucson, Arizona in 1951, the National Folk Festival in Nashville, Tenn. in 1959, and festivals in Mexico City and Acapulco, Mexico.

Other travels include Disneyland three times, HemisFair and festivals in Chihuahua City and Los Mochis, Mexico.

A fine Mexican dinner again will be served by the moms and dads of the dancers. Dinner will be served from 5 to 8 p.m. with the dancing performance beginning at 8 p.m. Charge for the dinner is \$2.50 per plate and a \$2.00 admission fee to the dancing performance.

### \$300,000 (HUD)---

## Pre-application Grant Approved

Following approval of a pre-application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) assistance in the amount of \$300,000 the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) invited the town of Carrizozo to submit a full application. Carrizozo was among nine New Mexico cities and counties receiving grants from HUD. The Carrizozo grant of \$300,000 was awarded to the town for housing rehabilitation and storm drainage.

Last Monday's regular meeting of the town of Carrizozo board of trustees served as the first of three public hearings as required by the 1981 CDBG Programs.

Target area for the grant use is the portion of town located South of the railroad tracks, which includes Aspen Street all the way to 17th Street. Low interest loans and direct grants will be available for residents who are eligible according to guidelines. Need rather than a first-come-first-serve basis will be an important factor. The greatest concentration of the town's minority group live in the target area. The town anticipates applying for additional CDBG funds in future years to assist the minority populations not being served by this first project.

Mr. Hubert Quintana, Economic Development Specialist with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) present at Monday's town hall

meeting to go over highlights of the Carrizozo Citizen Participation Plan for the 1981 CDBG Program. Quintana stated that it is very important that citizens attend the two additional public hearings, scheduled just prior to the May 1, 1981 deadline set for the full application grant of \$300,000.

The second public hearing April 20, 1981 will be at the Rec Center at 7 P.M. Quintana will explain the CDBG Program, obtain input from citizens, and review draft of final application. He will review a Housing Assistance Plan (HAP) to establish realistic goals for 1, 2 and 3 year housing goals for the community.

HAP is a required element in CDBG program application. HAP consists of five parts: survey of housing conditions; housing assistance needs of lower income households; three year housing assistance goals; general locations for proposed assisted housing and annual housing assistance goals.

The third and final of the three required hearings will be Apr. 27 at a special 7 p.m. town hall meeting. This meeting will include review of final CDBG application, HAP review, citizen input and the council's approval to submit final application for housing rehabilitation and storm drainage grant.

Grant application information requests the town's establishment of activity involved: A. Housing rehabilitation (1) establish

minimum housing standards and program guidelines (2) housing rehab assistance application procedure (3) housing inspections (4) bid advertisement (5) owner-contractor town negotiations (6) construction phase (7) completion B. Storm Drainage (1) engineering and design (2) material acquisition (3) construction phase (4) completion. Cost summary of A and B. Flood and drainage facilities - \$35,000. Rehabilitation of the private properties - \$235,000. General administration of the projects involves \$30,000 for a total cost of \$300,000 for the whole CDBG project.

The CDBG program will involve more than "paint up" work. Extensive plumbing, wiring and addition of rooms will be considered to bring existing housing in the target area up to standard level. An on going citizen participation committee formed last Fall is comprised of local residents Theresa Baca, Noyola Ortiz, Carol Schlarb, Monica Ortiz, Fr. Dave Bergs, Bill Payne and Mary Silva. They will serve for the duration of the CDBG project (July 1981 - July 1982) and meet monthly.

This committee, the home owner, contractor and the Town of Carrizozo will work closely with Quintana, who guides them throughout the CDBG program.

Mayor pro-tem, Ruth Armstrong conducted this month's regular town meeting. Albert LaFave, CETA

worker employed at City Hall assisted at the meeting in the absence of town clerk Carol Schlarb who could not be present.

Armstrong read a letter of resignation signed by Trustee Ruben Zamora who is vacating his seat because of part-time employment. The resignation of Zamora, who was absent was accepted with regrets.

Motion was made last month to turn over the outdoor recreation facility to Arriba immediately, including the fertilizer and gold card bids. A letter from the attorney general's office was read regarding approval of Lincoln County Arriba, Inc and their management of the facilities, in town and out of town.

After letter was read last Monday, Trustee Roy Harmon stated that he would like the town to have the advice of the Department of Finance in regard to the agreement between the Town and Arriba and money borrowed by the town for outdoor recreation.

Meanwhile, an outdoor recreation bill of \$6,987.08 was among the monthly expenditures for the month of March to be paid in April by the town of Carrizozo. \$4,200 of this amount is for gold carts. Arriba president, Bill Payne said that the \$40,000 loan money has not been turned over to Arriba by the town as agreed.



**Lincoln National Forest News**

Hundreds of wild turkey hunters were expected to be out for the annual Spring Turkey Hunt on the Smokey Bear, Cloudercroft, and Mayhill Districts of the Lincoln National Forest this weekend. The danger of fire in those districts is listed as high, and hunters have been asked to be especially careful of their camp and cooking fires. The spring turkey hunt lasts from April 11 through April 26.

In the Smokey Bear District, at Ruidoso, Sunday will be the last day for the Sierra Blanca-Ski Area to be open. Downhill skiing conditions were fair at mid-week. Call 257-9001 for current conditions.

Smokey Bear fuelwood areas were open, except for No. 2; Three Rivers Campground is open, and Cedar Creek Picnic Area is open. Small amounts of snow remain in the high country. Trails are mostly clear and roads are in good condition.

At Cloudercroft, the ski area is closed. The Joplin Ridge Fuelwood Area is open. It is a charge area. Silver Campground is open, but there is no water and no fees are being charged. Bailey Canyon Road is still

closed and the portion of the Rim Trail from a mile south of Alamo Peak Road to Atkinson Field is closed. Maintenance work is in progress on the upper portion of the Dog Canyon Trail. Also, some maintenance work is being done on the lower end of Alamo Peak trail, adjacent to Westside Road. Primary roads on the district are in good shape, but some shaded areas of secondary roads are muddy.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, fuelwood areas are open, but visitors should be careful of rattlesnakes coming out of hibernation. Sitting Bull Falls is receiving heavy use. Roadwork is continuing on Forest Road 540, and intermittent road construction work is continuing on Forest Road 67, the Rim Road. Motorists should use caution in these areas. Trail and road conditions are good.

At Mayhill, fuelwood areas are open and James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. Fishing is good in the Penasco River and Bear Canyon. Roads are dry.


