

National Award to Carrizozo Teenager

Brigitte Sandoval of Carrizozo has been named one of two volunteer Teenage Women of the year for the United States by the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC). The announcement of the award came this past weekend at the Women's Club annual convention in Carlsbad.

Criteria for the award included service to the community. All GFWC clubs were eligible to nominate a candidate for the state awards. The competition was open to all women who are actively engaged in any form of volunteer service on a national, state or local level. New Mexico's club nominations were judged by a panel of judges who selected an outstanding teenage volunteer from their state. Selection took into consideration the achievements that have helped to preserve the American Way of Life through individual contributions of time and effort.

Brigitte's application, first forwarded to the state office by the

local Woman's Club, joined 49 other applications in final competition at the national level. An applicant from southern Missouri and Brigitte were selected as the two finalists for the U.S. The presentation of their awards will take place in Washington, D.C. later this summer.

A panel of nationally prominent persons selected the recipients of the national GFWC distinguished volunteers awards for the state winners and the announcement of the first GFWC awards was made on April 24, 1981, from Washington, D.C., on the 91st anniversary of GFWC. Brigitte, sponsored by the N.M. Federation of Women's Clubs, was named as one of two teenagers selected to receive the national award. She will receive an inscribed Steuben glass eagle, a trip to Washington, D.C. and a reception at GFWC headquarters.


yellow squash - cut in slices

1/4 cup salad oil.
1/4 teaspoon salt dash of pepper and ground curin.




