Carrizozo School Board Meeting--

Four Receive Safe Driving Awards

During Carrizozo's regular board of education meeting, four school bus drivers were recognized for safe driving. Board president Sterling Spencer presented two years of awards (78-79, 79-80) to Lois Roper and Sharon Hefker. Roper is on her 11th year as a safe school bus driver and Hefker on her 4th year. Mary Groer, on her 5th year was not on hand to receive her awards. Sam Roper, a safe bus driver for 7 years received his safe driving award for 79-80. A reception in honor of the safe

driving award recipients followed the presentation.

A special meeting for bid opening purposes on the building reconstruction will be held on May 26 at 2:00 p.m. in the conference room. A public budget hearing for Carrizozo and Corona schools will be held at 9:30 a.m. on May 27 also at the conference room.

Representative Maurice Hobson will be at Carrizozo schools on Friday, May 22. He will arrive between 10:00 and 10:30 a.m., tour the school and eat

lunch at the cafeteria. The public is welcome to discuss mutual concerns about school business with Hobson while he is a school visitor.

Darlene Scott was re-employed. She asked that her letter of resignation be disregarded. She has reconsidered returning to school and wants to remain as music teacher to continue working to build a good music program. Her department will present a concert Thursday, May 21 at 7:00 p.m. in the old gym. The public is invited.

Title I re-employments are Jane Erwin, as a half-time teacher, Josie Vega and Delfina Vega as instructional aides. The position vacated by Dorothy O'Brian will not be filled but will be a cut back in the Title I program. Charlotte Archuleta, Flora Samora and Audra Wilson were re-employed for the cafeteria.

Suzanne S. Monroe, State Department of Education observed the food service operations this month in connection with the school lunch program. She visited the kitchen and storage facilities, observed cashier

collections procedures, reviewed menu record book and reviewed her observations with Superintendent Miller.

Monroe complimented the staff on the nutritious and attractive meal and organized menu record book. She approved of the excellent collection system of Nena Vega, in charge of cash in the lunch room program.

The School agenda included the second consideration of the library media materials selection policy, which was approved. Librarian Sally Florian was on hand to explain the policy changes and student library use. Objectional reading material may be questioned by concerned parents by filling out a form, which Florian has available. A committee will decide if publications in question should be returned to the shelf.

Florian carefully selects reading material and screens before placing on shelves or magazine racks. The board and Florian expressed their opinions on 'Sports Illustrated'. It was agreed that sections of the magazine had no educational value.

Carrizozo Health Center Distributes Circular

'Why You Cannot Get Immediate Service'

The Carrizozo Health Center has recently distributed a circular entitled "Why You Cannot Get Immediate Service at the Health Center."


The circular was prompted by the Advisory Committee's review of the number and nature of calls placed to the Center during the night and on week-ends.

"It appears that there are some families or individuals in the area who feel that our medical personnel are their personal servants, to be rusted out at any time of day or night they are uncomfortable," said a Committee spokesman. "There are enough actual emergencies to tax the strength and skills of our medical personnel without subjecting them to additional fatigue and hazards where

no emergency exists."

When asked what qualifies a person for immediate service the spokesman replied: "Any occurrence which places the life of the person in immediate jeopardy, such as a car crash, a heart attack or stroke, or threatens to cause a permanent disability, such as cuts to the bone, gunshot wound, etc., or induces excruciating pain beyond endurance, the cause of which is unknown. There are other symptoms, but I think you get the idea. Beside that, a person who has an appointment at the Center, and arrives in time to keep it, will be given immediate service."

Townsend is C.H.S. Graduation Speaker

Dr. David H. Townsend, director of New Mexico State University at Alamogordo will be the guest speaker at Carrizozo's high school graduation for 29 seniors. This year's commencement exercises will be conducted at Spencer Park on May 26 at 6:00 pm.

Townsend, long active in community and civic affairs was recently named campaign chairman for this year's United Way of Otero County. He is a graduate of Seagraves, Tex. High School, received his B.A. in history at Eastern New Mexico University in 1956 and MA in History from ENMU in 1958.

He received his Education Doctorate in higher education from Texas Tech University in 1979. His dissertation topic was "The Community College Movement in New Mexico."

Townsend taught in Alamogordo High School from 1956 to 1964 and in 1965-66, taught at Covina Valley Unified School District, Covina, Calif., South Hills High School, 1964-65. He was part time instructor at NMSU-A from 1968-64 and 1965-66, instructor there in 1966-67; assistant professor, 1967-70; associate professor, 1970-78; coordinator of academic development 1973-78.

He became director of NMSU-A in 1978, upon retirement of Marvin Rohovec.

In the academic area, he received his MA with honors, received the Valley Forge Freedom Foundation award in 1960; was awarded a President Gerald Thomas Teaching Grant (NMSU), 1972.

Dr. Townsend was a delegate to the New Mexico Constitutional convention in 1969, has served as a member of the New Mexico School for the Visually Handicapped board of regents since 1972, and as chairman from 1976-78. He has been active in the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce since 1977.

Attendance Up

Attendance at Lincoln State Monument for the first four months of 1981 is 5.5 percent ahead of 1980.

Through April 30, 3,845 have visited the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, now a museum, compared to 3,639 last year.

Visitation in April itself also increased over last year, 1,309 to 1,467.

Most other state monuments also show increases for the year, including Coronado, 10,863 to 11,146; Fort Sumner, 1,903 to 2,039; Jemez, 3,601 to 4,038; and Quarai, 1,720 to 2,119. Fort Selden declined, 3,424 to 3,140.

NEWS COVERAGE CONTINUED...

Clubs and other organizations usually appoint or elect public relations persons. These people are responsible for getting the groups' news to the newspaper. This week Post Script offers some pointers for making their job easier.

When you are preparing news releases for your club or organization remember two things: 1) Timeliness - an event has news value if it happened recently, is going on now or is planned for the near future. 2) Human Interest - people like to read about people.

When you write a news release it will compete for space and time with other news of the week, locally and county wide. Your news stories should be written so they are easy to read, edit and checkout.

Be sure to cover the important facts about a club, organization or church project or program. If your curative handwriting looks as if a bunch of ants crawled out of a bottle of ink and wondered all over the sheet of paper, I would suggest that you type or hand print your news release. Type the news in double space.

Include full names and titles and make sure all names are spelled correctly. Avoid opinionated statements (send those to Post Script in care of Polly). Avoid advertising of prices (the NEWS has very reasonable ad rates).

The news release should contain the name, address and telephone number of the person sending out the release for the club or organization. This comes in handy if there is any questions regarding story content.

Office hours at the NEWS are 8:30 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Thursday, with an hour off for lunch. The NEWS is usually closed Friday afternoon. A mail slot on the NEWS door is available for those unable to stop by during office hours. News items may also be mailed to Lincoln County News, P.O. Drawer 459, Carrizozo, NM 88301.

Send your news in no later than 4:00 pm each Tuesday. It bears repeating... that getting your articles in as early as possible will assure it getting in that week's NEWS.

A weekly newspaper such as the NEWS is a 'home county' newspaper for a particular county. No matter how small your club or organization, there's news to write about.

Members of the Capitan and Carrizozo United Methodist Churches recently completed an intensive study of their local church designed to discover whether they were concentrating their use of time and money in doing what they could do best.

"There are so many demands upon Christian congregations everywhere that it is easy for a local church to dissipate its strength and its available funds by trying to do something about everything, with the result that not much is done about anything," stated the pastor of the two churches, the Rev. David J. Lynch. He cited at least twenty-six enterprises beyond the local church in which his respective congregations are currently involved.

The study, conducted by the membership in each church meeting in small groups, focused primarily upon discovering the strengths and weaknesses of the congregation as each person perceived them to be, and that person's vision of what the church would be like by 1986 if its efforts and funding were concentrated on what it could do best.

"It is not that church programs attract people" stated the pastor, "for the recent survey by the Institute for American Church Growth revealed that not more than three percent of those who attend church were drawn there because of its program; (and not more than twelve percent were drawn by its pastor, for that matter). Of those who do attend church it was discovered that at least eighty percent do so because they are invited by relatives and friends. But relatives and friends are not inclined to invite others if they do not feel their church's program concentrates on doing what it can do best."

Reverend Lynch was enthusiastic about the participation and findings of the study, which will be the basis for each church's planning during the next four years.

The Scenic Dunes Drive will be open at 8:00 am daily and will remain open until 10:00 pm. The Visitor Center and Gift Shop at the park entrance will operate from 8:00 am until 7:00 pm. This schedule will remain in effect until September 5. The Visitor Center features exhibits to aid your understanding of the geology and ecology of the snow white dunes. Rangers are on duty to provide orientation and information as you begin your visit.

A full schedule of interpretive programs will begin on Saturday, May 23 and continue through September 5, 1981. Short orientation talks will be presented on the hour from 11:00 am until 4:00 pm, Tuesday through Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, the talks will be presented from noon until 4:00 pm. The site of these talks will be the Visitor Center Patio.

Naturalist conducted programs in the dunes will include nature walks and slide presentations. On Friday,

Saturday, Sunday and Monday evenings at 7:00 pm, a one-hour Evening Stroll will leave from the dunes drive. Watch for a sign on your left. The first picnic area will be the scene of Naturalist slide programs at 8:45 pm each Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday night. Monday night will be star program time, with telescope viewing and star myths the subject.

Once again this summer, the dunes will stay open until midnight during the full moon. The dates of this unique area event will be June 16, 17, 18; July 15, 16, 17; and August 13, 14, 15. Special programs featuring guest speakers, including astronomers, geologists, archaeologists and other experts in these fields, will be presented in the picnic area at 8:45 pm on these evenings. Later press releases will announce exact topics and speakers.

"The White Sands by full moonlight is an experience unequalled in all the world. We invite you to come out and enjoy not only this, but all of your monument's breathtaking beauty and excitement!" concluded Superintendent Harper.

Lincoln National Forest News

Lincoln National Forest map prices went up from 50 cents to \$1.00 this week, and camping fees were raised on some campgrounds, according to forest supervisor James R. Abbott.

Abbott explained that the price increases were caused by the pressure of inflation.

The user fee on South Fork Campground in the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the forest, near Ruidoso, went from \$3 per day to \$4. The campground opens today for the season. In the Cloudcroft District, Silver, Saddle and Apache Campgrounds, which also open today, will increase fees from \$2 to \$3, and user

fees at Pines and Deerhead Campgrounds will go from \$1 to \$2 per day.

Sky Line, Oak Grove and Monjeau Campgrounds open today. Bonito Lake is full and fishing pressure is heavy on weekends. Roads are in good condition and all trails are open and free from snow. All fuelwood areas are open except No. 2.

Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving moderate use during the week and heavy use on weekends.


