"Human Head" Not Propped By Hiway or Anywhere Else

A rumor was going around that Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies had found a human head in the vicinity of Three Rivers or Oscura. The ghastly story spread like wildfire.

An inquiry by the NEWS at the Sheriff's office revealed that the rumor was unfounded. Sheriff Ernest Sanchez believes that an incident on May 17, when a headless human skeleton was found in Ruidoso, was linked to the report of a sleepy hitch hiker in the Carrizozo area.

The "head" story originated following the report that a subject, believed to be dead or intoxicated, was seen lying on the side of the highway. May 28, county police received conflicting reports on the hitch hiker who took a midday nap.

The first call came from Otero County. The subject in question was sighted near Oscura. Sheriff's Deputy Gilbert Archuleta headed south of Carrizozo on Highway 54. The entrance to Oscura Range is located in the area, and Security police alerted to the incident were patrolling the area. No person or a body was found.

The second call that same day came from Socorro County. A person was reported to be lying near the highway, possibly dead, west of Carrizozo close to the 'Boot Legger Bar' (or White Horse). N.M. State Police checked out the area, along with Security Police at Oscura Range, who have another entrance on Highway 380.

A hitch hiker, a male of Mexican

nationality was questioned. He had proper documents for being in the U.S. The sleepy traveler decided to take a siesta by the highway in broad daylight. Motorists reported spotting a 'body', when in fact it was only a sleepyhead catching 40 winks before continuing his May 28 journey to Artesia.

In the May 17 incident, a Lovington, NM man, out for a Sunday trail walk with his children in the Cedar Creek area, came upon human skeleton remains buried in a shallow grave, approximately 2 feet deep. Part of the pelvic bone and the leg bone, intact with a brown boot, protruded out of the ground.

The headless skeleton incident was first reported to Ruidoso Police. Carrizozo Deputy James McSwane conducted a search of the area. McSwane said jewelry, apparently worn by the deceased and fragments of bone were recovered near the buried site.

The remains, believed to have been buried in the make shift grave for 1 year or more, were sent to the NM State Medical Examiner in Albuquerque.

IN OTHER COUNTY POLICE ACTIVITY:

According to the May incident reports, the Sheriff's Department received many calls from around the county. Among the incidents were reports of a missing person, several B & E (Break and Entry), one attempt B & E, one death, one burglary, a confrontation, a cut fence, and an illegal alien. A small item stolen was


Junior Rodeo This Sat. & Sun

New Location for Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce

Set for June 13--

2nd Annual Ranch Tour Plans Finalized

Tuesday's Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce agenda included a report of the plans underway for the Second Annual Lincoln County Ranch Tour to be held June 13. With the experience of last year's event, this month's tour will be even more successful.

The Chamber is one of several organizations sponsoring the behind-the-scenes look at the ranching industry. Other co-sponsors are Canyon Cowbells, Crown Cowbells, Farm Bureau, Soil Conservation Service Board, Carrizozo Woman's Club, Carrizozo and Corona FFA and area ranchers. Local merchants including the two banks have donated money to be used for various expenditures.

One new ranch plus historic White Oaks as the barbeque site are among the many new features for the Second Annual tour. The tour will start from the Lincoln County Court House, with registration starting at 9:00 a.m. Buses will provide the transportation. Cost of the tour \$6.50 adult, \$4.00 for children under 12, includes the noon lunch and ice cream at the end of the tour back on the courthouse grounds.

Tentative plans include beginning the tour at the Curtiss horse ranch, then on to the Bar W cattle ranch, and a stop for lunch at the old school house in White Oaks. The Gnatkowski sheep ranch is last on the tour.

A total of 145 reservations from Roswell, El Paso and Albuquerque have been made. Local and area people are urged to send their registration fees soon to LINCOLN COUNTY RANCH TOUR c/o Canyon Cowbells, P.O. Box 509, Carrizozo, NM 88301 or call 645-2582 for further details.

In other Chamber business: In the absence of Dr. Dale Goad, who is on the local airport committee, Ruth Armstrong gave the chamber the monthly report on airport progress. Armstrong is Chamber treasurer and Carrizozo's Town Trustee. Armstrong was pleased to report that the airport is progressing

well. Available as a landing strip for a long time, the local airport now has fuel and oil on hand. State and Town monies provided a new pump, fuel, oil and other necessities. Shafer added that the facility will be on a "paying basis" within a year.

The chamber learned that the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) won't be receiving any funding from the Lincoln County Commission for the 1981-82 fiscal year. The commissioners cited SBAC's violation of the joint-powers agreement as the reason for withdrawing the funding.

At a previous meeting Lincoln County Commission chairman, "Cotton" McKnight criticized Ruidoso for denying membership to Carrizozo, who has been trying for months to have a voice on SBAC. It was pointed out that SBAC monthly meetings were not being held. The County Commissioners tabled the motion to withdraw their membership from SBAC for lack of a second hearing.

At a recent preliminary budget hearing, the commission denied funding to SBAC for failure to submit quarterly reports to the county, which administers the SBAC treasury, and failure to hold monthly meetings, all violations of the joint powers agreement under which SBAC was formed.

At Tuesday's noon Four Winds luncheon meeting, Chamber members applauded the work of the Economic Development Committee for their promotional efforts. The committee consisting of David Lynch, Betty Fields, Carlyn Ladd, Ruth Armstrong and Chairman Don Wall prepared and sent over 3,000 Chamber literature to various chambers in NM and Texas. This action has brought in a response. The local chamber will place an ad in a national publication, 'Retirement Life'.

The Carrizozo Board of Education, at a May 28 Special Meeting, has awarded a \$190,437 contract to Courson Construction Corporation of Carlsbad for the remodeling of the High School Courson, low bidder on the job will begin work within 10 days of the Board's acceptance of the low bid. Other bidders included Silverton Construction Co. of El Paso (\$240,400) and Service Contractors Inc. of Ruidoso (\$300,023).

Fun Run

The 4th of July celebration in Capitan will feature a 10 Kilometer (6.2 miles) and 2-Mile Fun Run starting at 8:30 am on Saturday, July 4. The first run of this kind to be held in Capitan is sponsored by the Capitan Womens Club to raise funds for its yearly projects.

The race will start on the Encinosa Highway No. 47 at the top of the hill just behind City Hall in Capitan. Runners will have a slight upgrade for one-half their race on asphalt, turn around and return to the finish line just adjacent to City Hall.

Runners in both the 10-K and 2-Mile Fun Run will register at the Fire Hall between 7:30 and 8:25 am on the day of the race. Early entries will be \$5.00 and entries on the day of the race are \$6.00.

T-shirts will be awarded to all participants with trophies to first overall male and female and first male and female in each age group. Age groups will be 0-10, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, and 50 and over. Area merchants are providing prizes to the oldest runner, youngest runner, and traveled farthest runner.

Local School Budget Approved at \$1.6 Million

The 1981-82 budget for the Carrizozo Municipal Schools has been approved by the Public School Finance Division of the Department of Finance and Administration. A local budget hearing was held by Mrs. Rebecca Delgado, Deputy Director, Public School Finance on Wednesday, May 27 in the District Conference Room. At the hearing, Mrs. Delgado pointed out that since 1979-80, the Carrizozo Schools had moved from 31st in average teacher salaries to 15th in 1981-82. The average teacher salary in 1981-82 will be \$20,597. A decline in student enrollment of 5.6

percent (30 students) was also noted, and a program cost per student \$3,109 was estimated based on remaining students. All employee salaries were increased an average of 18 percent, with some employee groups such as secretaries, averaging somewhat higher due to job reclassifications.

Mrs. Delgado noted in her closing remarks that local property taxes for operation of the schools will be declining due to the action of the Legislature, and that the District was making commendable progress in its capital improvements program.

These senseless drownings can be prevented if adults act responsibly. This means fencing pools, and never leaving children unattended near the pool or anywhere in the house where

Dear Melissa: These tragic drownings that claim the lives of so many children take only a minute. The grief and guilt suffered by those in whose care the youngsters were lasts a lifetime. Thanks for a timely reminder.

Marion added that the Red Cross has always trained the lifeguards for our local pool. Lincoln County's new Water Safety chairman is Jeanne Culbertson of Fort Stanton. Life guards are required to pass a 21 to 28 hour test and be 15 years or older. Their certification expires in 3 years.

There were reports of a stray dog, stray horses and stray pig, one hungry dog chained to a tree, several dog bites to humans and the discovery of a pit with dead dogs or other animals.

The Lincoln County Commission recently met with Sheriff Sanchez and approved a new deputy to the staff. The deputy is needed because of

additional animal control duties and as relief for present staff. County police are experiencing additional complaints, especially burglaries in the Alto area.

The new deputy is John McIntyre, a former chief of police. McIntyre is assigned to the Ruidoso area, which includes Alto, Angus and other hamlets. Other deputies assigned to the Ruidoso area are Lucas Gallegos, Chris Volquardson and Bobby Barnes. John Greenwood is assigned to Captain Barnes' and Greenwood also patrol the Bonito area.

State to Make Decision on Elephant Butte

The New Mexico State Park and Recreation Division will hold a meeting on June 11 in Truth or Consequences to receive public comment on the possible removal of the boat slips from the Elephant Butte Resort Marina at Elephant Butte Lake.

That meeting is scheduled for 7 pm at the Convention Center in Truth or Consequences.

As a result of repeated storm damage to the Elephant Butte Resort Marina, located at Hot Springs Landing on the west side of Elephant Butte Lake, the State of New Mexico has spent nearly \$500,000 in the last 18 months to repair this facility, said State Park and Recreation Division Director Mark Sideris.

"In order to rectify a very negative cash flow situation," Sideris said, "we are considering removing the 182 boat slips from the Elephant Butte Resort Marina, and leaving only the primary boater-service facility that includes the store, bar, restaurant, boat-service area and gas docks." Sideris noted that boat slip rentals at the Resort Marina brought the Park Division only \$7,158 in revenues last year.

"We also considered the possibilities of constructing a breakwater to protect the marina or moving the facility to a more tranquil site," Sideris said, "but these alternatives would cost anywhere from \$500,000 to \$1.5 million.

"Of the thousands of boats and boaters using Elephant Butte Lake, only 182 boats are actually housed in the slips at the Resort Marina, and in our opinion the expenditure of an additional several hundred thousand dollars to directly benefit only 182 people would not be in the best interests of the State," Sideris said.

Deputy Gilbert Sambrano patrols Tinnie, Hondo, San Patricio and Glencoe. Deputies James McSwane and Gilbert Archuleta cover Carrizozo, White Oaks, Corona and Three Rivers up to the county line.

The Sheriff's Department now has three new cars. They will keep the '78 Plymouth as a spare.



Ranch Tour Plans Finalized

Chamber president Scott Shafer read an excerpt from the May 1981 New Mexico Progress, a monthly business and economic report published by First NM Bankshare Corporation.

"New Mexico's population continues to grow at a much faster pace than the nation as a whole. During the last decade the population on NM grew at a rate of 27.8 percent compared to only 11.4 percent for the United States. Based on the latest report from the U.S. Bureau of Census, the revised 1980 count for NM as of April 1, 1980 totaled 1,299,968 an increase of 282,913 or 27.8 percent from the 1970 count."

Shafer added that Lincoln County is in fourth place in growth. The publication states that Lincoln County

grew from 7,560 in 1970 to 10,997 in 1980.

The Chamber continues planning for the annual People's Market Place to be held this year at the Carrizozo Recreation Area, south of the golf course. This event on August 2 is held in conjunction with the Santa Rita Catholic Church fiesta July 31 and August 1 and 2. The Chamber this year is making arrangements for including new features, such as hot air balloons, an Army band and parachutists.

BLM Advisory Council to Meet June 18th

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Roswell District Advisory Council will meet on June 18 in the Roswell District Office, 1717 West Second Street, Roswell, New Mexico, according to Dick Bastin, acting district manager.

This meeting will be held in the district office's conference room and will begin at 10 a.m. There will be seven major topics on the agenda and a public comment period which begins at 1 p.m.

The agenda will include an update on the status of studies concerning continuation of the ongoing research, being conducted by New Mexico State University at Fort Stanton vs locating an airport in part of the research area, BLM's tentative budget for southeastern New Mexico, plus discussions about the WEPF Site Project, and BLM-DOE cooperative

agreement.

Council members will also be brought up-to-date on the status of the antelope study, the MX Missile System's environmental statement, and the Resource Management Plan for the Roswell Resource Area. Three general topics will also be considered. These are: access to public and state lands, grazing management actions, and the receipts from district resource programs, including oil and gas.

The Roswell District Advisory Council's chairman is J.R. Walls of Carlsbad, NM, representing non-renewable resources, also representing non-renewable resources is Glicerio Rodriguez of Roswell, NM. Renewable resources are represented by the Council's Vice Chairman, George W. Mitchell of Roswell and Bill Lane Lee of

Lovington, NM. Elected government's representative is New Mexico State Senator Joseph E. Gant of Carlsbad, NM, while Carlton S. Laman of El Paso, TX, represents transportation rights-of-way. Jack H. Hunt and Thomas E. Thornton of Carlsbad represent recreation and wildlife interests, respectively. At this time, the Council seat representing environmental protection is unoccupied.

This meeting is open to the public. Interested persons may make oral statements to the Council or may file written statements. Anyone wishing to make an oral statement must notify Dick Bastin, acting district manager (905-622-7870) or (P.O. Box 1297, Roswell, NM 88201) by June 17, 1981. The public comment period will begin at 1 p.m. on the day of the Council meeting.

Carlsbad Caverns Nat'l Park Schedule Announced

The National Park Service has announced that Carlsbad Caverns National Park's full summer schedule will begin on May 31 and continue in effect through August 22.

Under the new schedule, visitors will be able to enter the caverns for complete cavern trips any time between the hours of 7:30 am and 6 pm. The complete trips are three miles in length and take about three hours, while the Big Room trips are one and a quarter miles long and require approximately an hour and a half.

The park visitor center will open at 7:30 am and remain open until after the evening bat flight programs which are held nightly at the cavern entrance amphitheater starting at about sunset.

Lantern tours through undeveloped New Cave in the southwestern part of the park will also be expanded from two to four trips daily for the summer. Times for the lantern tours, which are by reservation only, are 9 am, 10 am, 11 am, and 12 noon. The number to call for reservation is (505) 783-2233.

According to park Superintendent William W. Dummire, some trail improvement work is planned in the New Cave-Slaughter Canyon area sometime during the summer which may require a closure of about two weeks in this area of the park. However, the main developed cavern will not be affected and an alternate lantern tour into another undeveloped cave area is planned during the closure period to accommodate those desiring this type of trip.

In addition to the cavern trips and bat flight programs, the park offers

nature trails, backcountry hiking, picnicking, roadside exhibits, scenic canyon and mountain views along a new ten-mile loop drive, and opportunities to observe native wildlife in natural surroundings.

Concession facilities available at the park include a nursery, kennel, restaurant gift shop, and underground lunchroom.

The park entrance fee of \$3 per carload for private non-commercial vehicles for \$1 per person for commercial bus passengers covers all available visitor activities. Annual Golden Eagle or Golden Age Passports are also honored and available at the park.

For the last two weeks of the summer season from August 23 through Labor Day, September 7, hours will be from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm for complete trips, and from 7:30 am to 5 pm for Big Room trips, with the visitor center continuing to remain open until after the evening bat flight programs.



6 ripe medium-sized tomatoes
1/2 cup chopped onions
1/2 cup chopped green peppers
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon dried basil
dash oregano
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
1 cup cornbread crumbs

Cut tops from tomatoes; hollow out about 2 tablespoons of the pulp. Save for a salad. Sauté onions and green peppers in butter; add basil, oregano and salt; stir. Toss onion mixture with cornbread crumbs. Fill tomatoes with cornbread stuffing. Place on top of grill where fire is not too hot or broil in oven. Serves 4-6.
