Mix well 2 lbs. frozen hash browns (found some at Grocery Basket), thaw 30-60 minutes; 1 lb. carton sour cream; 1 can cream of chicken soup (undiluted); 8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese; 1 small onion, diced; salt and pepper; 1/2 stick melted margarine. Top with bread crumbs and paprika. Bake at 350 degrees in casserole dish for 1 hour.

Lincoln National Forest News

The growing popularity of developed campgrounds in the Lincoln National Forest has resulted in the imposition of "stay limits" for two

groups of campgrounds, according to a Forest Service spokesman.

He explained that the stay limits were inadvertently described incorrectly in a news release issued by the Forest Service last week.

Camping in the developed recreation areas listed below is limited to 14 days within a 30-day period. The areas are South Fork; Monjeau; Skyline; Oak Grove; Three Rivers; Deerhead; Pines; Sleepy Grass; and James Canyon Campground.

The same limit, 14 days within a 30-day period, is in effect for Silver, Saddle, Apache and the Silver Overflow Campgrounds. For the purpose of this order, the spokesman said, these four sites are considered one.

Otherwise, unless the area is posted, visitors may camp on the forest for up to a total of 30 consecutive days.

Rains have brought out the wildflowers in many areas of the forest, particularly in Cox and Scott Able Canyons, according to forest visitors last weekend.

In the Smokey Bear Ranger District, at Ruidoso, South Fork Campground is receiving heavy use, and other campgrounds are receiving light use. Bonito Lake is down somewhat, but streams are running muddy, and higher than usual. Visitors are asked to be prepared for lightning storms and slick roads due to thundershowers. The Visitor Information Service program is being

conducted on Saturdays at dark at South Fork. Fuelwood gatherers are asked to check with the district office before planning to cut or gather wood.

At Cloudcroft, campgrounds are receiving heavy use on weekends and moderate use during the week. Bailey Canyon is muddy and all off-road travel is prohibited. Unsurfaced roads are muddy, because of rains falling daily. The campfire programs at the Silver Overflow Area have been concluded for the season. Trails are muddy and all fuelwood areas are closed. Fuelwood gatherers are asked to check with the ranger station for current information on the fuelwood areas.

Applications for campground hosts for the 1982 season are being accepted by the Cloudcroft District. Requests for application blanks will be taken over the phone and the blanks will be mailed to persons requesting them.

On the Guadalupe District, at Carlsbad, Sitting Bull Falls Picnic Area is receiving heavy use; road conditions are good; weather conditions change rapidly; rattlesnakes are out and campers are urged to be aware of the possibility of potential flash floods in low-lying areas. Trails are in good condition and fuelwood areas are open.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving heavy use; fishing is fair on the Penasco River; roads are dry, except in the area of showers; and fuelwood areas are open.

It is the finding of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, that all activities proposed in its 1981 Small Cities HUD CDBG Application are exempt from environmental review requirements because they are defined as exempt activities in Section 58.21 consisting solely of: Construction for upgrading. The article will upgrade a substantially identical original article, without more than a minimal change in its use, size, capacity or location. (Section 58.21 (5) (ii)).

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the Town of Carrizozo which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request at the Chamber of Commerce between the hours of 10:00am and 4:00pm.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be

conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Town of Carrizozo to the Mayor. Such written comments should be received at P.O. Box 247 Carrizozo, New Mexico on or before August 20, 1981. All such comments so received will be considered and the Town of Carrizozo will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The Town of Carrizozo will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The Town of Carrizozo is certifying to HUD that the Town of Carrizozo and Mayor Manuel R. Hernandez in his official capacity as Mayor consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews decisionmaking and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval The Town of Carrizozo may use the Block Grant funds and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD, 2001 Bryan Tower-Fourth Floor Dallas, Texas 75201.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated

above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after September 3, 1981 will be considered by HUD.
