News Briefs..

1,400 Attend

Some 1,400 people from all over New Mexico crowded the South Springs Ranch Saturday for one of the most successful fund-raising barbecues in New Mexico history.

The \$50.00-a-plate meal was on behalf of the re-election campaign of Congressman Joe Skeen, who represents New Mexico's Second District in Washington.

"It was just great," Skeen said. "Everyone had a good time and we got to see a lot of old friends." Special guests at the barbecue were former Texas Governor John Connally and his wife along with Senators Pete Domenici and Harrison Schmitt.

Skeen said he particularly wanted to thank Mr. and Mrs. Robert O. Anderson, owners of the ranch, for hosting the event. "They were most gracious and helpful," he said. "We couldn't have done it without them. And, of course, the meal was also outstanding. The East Grand Plains Lions Club really puts on a spread."

The fund-raiser was the first for Skeen since he won a historic write-in campaign last November to fill the House seat left vacant by the death of Rep. Harold Runnels.

Present Concert

Jon Stemkoski's Celebrant Singers, a nationally known Christian singing group from California will present a concert "Give Him Praise" Monday, September 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the Carrizozo high school old gym.

Members of the group come from many different states (14 in all) and are chosen from hundreds of nationwide auditions. Composed of ten singers, a ten piece orchestra, lighting and sound technicians, and featuring sign language for the deaf, the Celebrant Singers are a highly talented young group of adults who have traveled in many U.S. cities and throughout Egypt, Greece, India and Sri Lanka. While in New Delhi, India, they sang for Mother Teresa at her all-Indian Nobel Prize reception.

There will be no admission charge but a free-will offering, and will appear in Carrizozo in cooperation with First Baptist Church.

One-Woman Show

Brigitte Goes to Washington, D.C.

Mrs. Ronald Reagan will make the first presentation of the General Federation of Women's Clubs Distinguished Volunteer Award to seven women in White House ceremonies at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, September 10 (today).

The Distinguished Volunteer Award is part of the GFWC's FREE Enterprise program.

The 10-million member GFWC, organized in 1889, is the largest and oldest nondenominational, non-partisan, international service organization of volunteer women in the world, said Mrs. Don L. Shide of Washington, D.C. and Larimore, N.D., the international president.

It has members in 46 countries including 600,000 in the United States.

The Distinguished Volunteer Award is national recognition of the contributions of millions of American volunteers who are needed more than ever in a new era of economic challenge.

The five adult winners are Mrs. Sid Kline of Lakewood, Colorado; Mrs. Jane LeDain, Knoxville, Tennessee; Mrs. Faye Moore, Lilburn, Georgia; Mrs. Cynthia Vlasaty Smith, Manchester, New Hampshire, and Mrs. Ann Taylor, Aiken, South Carolina.

The two teenage winners are Karen Coble, Missouri, and BRIGITTE SANDOVAL, Carrizozo, New Mexico.

The basic criteria by which the seven were chosen was their individual contribution of time and effort to the American way of life. Each was nominated by one of the GFWC's 12,000 clubs in the United States and, to qualify for national judging, had to be named the Distinguished Volunteer by her own state.

Selection of candidates was not confined to GFWC membership of the seven, five are not members of GFWC clubs.

The FREE program is co-sponsored with the GFWC by Cities Service Company and Proctor & Gamble Company.

Mrs. Frederick D. Singer of Woodcliff Lake, New Jersey, GFWC FREE chairman, said that the two companies are co-sponsoring the Distinguished Volunteer Award in recognition of the contribution of women volunteers to strengthening the American free enterprise system.

The FREE program also broadens understanding of the American economic system and provides a mechanism by which GFWC members can become actively involved in the legislative process at federal, state and local levels.

Mrs. Reagan will present each of the seven winners with Steuben crystal eagles from the GFWC.

Sandoval was in 4-H, she started a joint Senior Citizens-4-H Grandparents program which helped make teenagers more aware of older citizens.

A few years later, she organized and led the Carrizozo Future Homemakers of American chapter in a year-long project to assist the Senior Citizens' Center

through regular senior citizen-high school activities.

And last winter, she directed the donation of free firewood to senior citizens who needed assistance in heating their homes.

"I've always had a warm spot for older people perhaps because I rarely see my own grandparents who live in California," she said.

Miss Sandoval was student council president when she graduated from high school this spring. She was a member of the National Honor Society, listed in Who's Who Among American High School Students, and won a scholarship to the University of New Mexico where she will enroll this fall.

As student council president, she spearheaded bringing a foreign exchange student from Mexico and Japan to live in Carrizozo for eight months, and for sending a Carrizozo student to Mexico.

She organized students earlier this year to promote a yes vote on a school bond issue to renovate Carrizozo High School. It passed. She also was a leader in 1976 to save the Carrizozo municipal swimming pool, closed when the city had financial problems.

Miss Sandoval hopes to become a pharmacist.

FORT STANTON WINS

The Fort Stanton baseball team defeated the Military Institute at Roswell, Monday afternoon, by a score of 12 to 10. It was a game in which free hitting by both teams was a predominant feature and was a nip and tuck contest until the last inning, when Stanton stiffened and won the contest by the margin stated. Stanton has had some splendid teams in the past and it looks like a good season this year from the way she is starting out. - (Lincoln County News, Friday May 6, 1927).

CARRIZOZO WINS BALL GAME

The Nogal baseball team came down Sunday and crossed bats with a team across the tracks. The game was played at the west side ball park. The game went along for a few innings on an even keel, but in the latter half the local boys picked up and at the close of the game the score stood 13 for the locals to 7 for the visitors. A good crowd witnessed the game, a number coming down from Nogal. - (Lincoln County News, Friday June 13, 1927)

The preceding baseball news stories were reprinted from 1927 issues of the Lincoln County News, whose editor and publisher was John A. Haley.

The sports spirit of yesterday is carried on in Lincoln County. This past Saturday, September 5, 1981 five county teams met in Fort Stanton for their 'slow pitch softball' tournament. After two games, the ball players were "rained out". The tournament continues this coming Sunday, September 13 starting at 11:00 a.m. Admission is free.

Local men represent two teams - Carrizozo No. 1 and Carrizozo No. 2. The majority of team No. 1 are members of the town basketball team. Carrizozo No. 1 was the initial slow pitch softball team in town and their coach is LeeRoy Zamora.

The second Zozo team was organized recently when Fort Stanton invited Carrizozo to participate in their tournament. Team No. 2 includes some players from No. 1 and Carrizozo school staff. Eight players who are 20 years of age or younger are also in

No. 2, whose coach is "Shorty" Hollis.

Camp Sierra Blanca, location of the adult rehabilitation center near Fort Stanton has a team. "Hoppy Gutierrez, superintendent at the camp is in charge of the inmate team, which goes by the name, 'Outlaws.'

Employees at the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School represent the other two teams - the 'Bombers' and the 'Chumps.' The Bombers, mainly Fort Stanton fire department members, have been playing for about two years, according to Mark Delgado, administrator of Fort Stanton complex. Roy Baca coaches the Bombers, who placed second in the Lincoln County summer league. Chumps, the second team is comprised of other department employees - psychologists, teachers, aids, cottage and hospital workers, etc. Their coach is Tom Trost.

Delgado said two games out of a possible nine had been played in the double elimination tournament which started last Saturday when Carrizozo No. 1 defeated the Chumps 17 to 7, with LeeRoy at the pitchers place. Carrizozo No. 2 scored over the Bombers 11 to 3, with Dennis Sidebottom "pitching a 6 hitter ballgame," according to first baseman Richard Hollis.

Sunday's action begins with the 11:00 a.m. game between the Chumps and the Bombers. Carrizozo No. 1 will play against the Outlaws at 1:00 p.m. The rest of the schedule is not available at this time. First, second and third place trophies have been donated by Southwest Council of Industrial Workers - Local 2293.

Fort Stanton, who host the tournament, treated their teams and the visiting teams to a meal of barbecue and watermelon last Saturday. The games are being played at Fort Stanton Field which recently was updated. The field now features a concession stand, new lights and dug outs.

With slow pitch softball season coming to an end, Delgado hopes the county teams form again next year for ball playing at the Fort. He believes Fort Stanton is the ideal location for county teams to meet because they have the facility to play and they are centrally located within the county, "26 miles from Ruidoso, 26 miles from Carrizozo and Capitan is nearby."

Delgado, who is a history buff, has a collection of old photos which feature Fort Stanton ball players of days gone by. In those days, "if you could play baseball, you could work here," he added with a smile.

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

areas. This method will encourage children to become independent which will help them pass to the fifth grade.



GRIZZLY BOOSTERS

Launchings Are Scheduled

Sept. 2 - Eight Pershing 1A missiles are scheduled to be launched to White Sands Missile Range from McGregor Range during September and October.

Army officials at White Sands say four of the missiles will be fired by troops of the Federal Republic of Germany Air Force and four by the U.S. Army. All missiles will be programmed to impact on the northern portion of the White Sands range after flights of about 100 miles.

Present plans call for two missiles to be launched on each of four firing days. Firing days are set for Sept. 22 and 29; and Oct. 13 and 21. Alternate firing days also are planned if problems should necessitate rescheduling any of the launches.

All firings are planned during the morning hours and will require temporary safety roadblocks on two New Mexico highways. Highway 54 north of El Paso will be blocked between Newman and Orogrande, and Highway 380 will be blocked between points 10 miles east of San Antonio and 16 miles west of Carrizozo.

Roadblocks are set 40 minutes prior to the launch time to allow all traffic to clear the area and released immediately after the launches. Firing times on Sept. 22 are 10 and 10:30 a.m.

The purpose for the annual Pershing firings is both troop training and missile quality assurance.

Preparations for the second orbital flight of America's space shuttle Columbia are underway.

NASA officials have announced the Columbia is scheduled to make its second space voyage from Kennedy Space Center, Fla. on Oct. 9.

White Sands Missile Range's role in this second mission involves less activity and less preparation than required for the first mission in April.

NASA officials have named Northrup Strip, located about 50 miles from the WSMR main post area, alternate, instead of primary, abort-once-around (AOA) landing site.

However, Northrup could become the AOA landing site as late as launch-minutes eight hours if weather conditions at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif. would prohibit a landing there.

At present, Edwards AFB is the primary end-of-mission (EOM) and AOA landing site for the Columbia's second flight.

Northrup Strip remains the alternate EOM landing site. The range should receive no less than 24 hours notice in the event of an EOM landing here. In addition, WSMR should receive no less than three hours notice if a contingency landing occurs at Northrup.

No new equipment or facilities will be added at Northrup strip. It already has two 35,000-foot hard-packed gypsum runways, a stiff-legged derrick designed to lift the shuttle on to a 747 and a vast communications and data system linked with NASA.

The strip also has a navigational system in place which can help guide the shuttle to a landing. Included is a micro wave scanning beam landing system.

As before, the range also will provide services such as radar and optical tracking data, security and logistical support.

Holloman Air Force Base will provide standby crash and rescue services at the strip.

"Everything is pretty much in place at Northrup," says Alex Paczynski, NASA's project engineer for Northrup Strip operations.

The range has been running communication link-up and data flow checks between Northrup Strip and the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. In addition, meteorological instrumentation designed to monitor the weather conditions at the site, is being checked.

NASA, WSMR and Holloman Air Force Base will conduct operational readiness rehearsals shortly before launch day. Several scenarios involving a landing at the strip will be conducted.

In summing up on-going preparations for the Oct. 9 launch of the shuttle, Paczynski said, "This time the feeling is a little more positive about the entire operation."

"Hopefully we'll keep in business as usual here at the range."

Take your pick of either dark (chocolate) or "blonde" (butterscotch) brownies. For chocolate brownies, use chocolate cake mix and canned chocolate pudding. For butterscotch brownies, use yellow cake mix and canned butterscotch pudding.

Since the richness of these brownies comes from canned pudding, don't pay extra for pudding-added cake mixes. Look for the least expensive generic or store brand.

1 pkg. (double layer size) chocolate cake mix
1 can (1 1/4 oz.) Thank You Brand Chocolate Pudding
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/4 cup chocolate, choco-mint OR peanut butter chips

Combine cake mix and chocolate pudding until well blended. Pour into oiled and floured 9x13x2-inch cake pan. Sprinkle with nuts and chips. Bake at 350°F. for 35-45 minutes.

Hunter Training Deadline Sept. 30

Youths under 18 years of age who are planning to hunt with firearms this season and have not passed a certified hunter training course have until Sept. 30 to register for the class.
Those who have not enrolled by Sept. 30 will not be able to take the required course and, subsequently, cannot apply for, or purchase a license for hunting with firearms.
Hunter training prior to application for or purchase of a firearms license by a juvenile was made mandatory by State Game Commission last year. Prior to the new regulation, youths under 18 could purchase a firearms hunting license and then take the course. The State Game Commission set the Sept. 30 deadline for enrollment to help eliminate the last-minute rush by youths wanting to hunt during fall big game seasons.
Those registering prior to Sept. 30 will be scheduled for the next open class.
The hunter training course is usually taught by volunteer instructors over a period of several days, with class sessions from two to three hours in length.
Classes are available when an instructor has enough students signed up at a time when he or she can teach. Each class is kept to 25 to 30 students.
There is currently no age limit

for youngsters enrolling in the course, the coordinator said. But the material is normally absorbed well by students who are at least 12 years of age, and failure among 10-year-olds is much more common than among older students.
Those planning to enroll by the Sept. 30 deadline should contact an instructor or conservation officer in their area or phone a Department of Game and Fish office in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Raton, Roswell or Las Cruces.

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

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
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
