C'zozo Town Council Meeting--

Carrizozo Housing Rehab Project to Start Soon

The Town Council heard last Monday evening an update on the town's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Mr. Hubert Quintana, economic development specialist with Southeastern New Mexico Development District (SNMEDD) said that he was happy to report that the housing rehab program is ready to get underway.

"Since the last town council meeting we have been able to clear the last few hurdles by returning the required signature cards for

the letters of credit and the designation of depository form so that the U.S. Treasury knows where to send the CDBG funds as they are requested. We have received our request for payment forms and are only awaiting our letter of credit number so that we can request our first drawdown."

Quintana said that the Contractor Selection and Grant-Loan Approval committee has met twice to finalize the "Town of Carrizozo Housing Rehabilitation Loan-Grant Handbook." The committee is made up of a cross section of local residents: Rene Burton, Scott Shafer, Noyola Ortiz, Bob Chavez, Jim Miller Jr., Bob Watson and Fr. Dave Bergs. Quintana and the committee have made the necessary changes in the handbook so that it is applicable to the needs and local issues which they will deal with in the program.

Quintana is the administrator of the CDBG program, which involves a grant to the town of Carrizozo totaling \$300,000. Of this amount, \$30,000 is for administration purposes, and the rest will be used for housing rehabilitation and storm drainage activity to be conducted south of the railroad tracks.

The committee has developed a "Priority Rating Guide" so that application for assistance can be prioritized by need and applicants can be on a needs rather than a first-come, first-serve basis. The guide targets three areas of impact-income, household characteristics and grant-loan impact. The system is scored on 100 total possible points, the higher the score, the higher the need. Grant applicants must have a minimum of 45 points to be eligible. At least 25 of those points must be "income points" and 15 points must be "grant-loan impact" points.

Says Quintana, "As an example, lets take a female head of household with five dependent children living in a home with severe electrical problems, and few structural problems in the

home. She could score 40 income points, 15 household characteristic points, and 25 grant-loan impact points for a total of 80 points."

The committee after much deliberation at the two meetings also developed income eligibility guidelines for grants and loans. The guidelines are income adjustments based on the "non-SMSA area" incomes in New Mexico. The figures were further adjusted so that the 100 percent figures represented families of 8 rather than 4. "The median income figures used for 1981 is \$14,300 and the low-to-moderate income is \$11,440. The figures were provided by the U.S. Bureau of Census and HUD," Quintana said.

The reason a very low income scale was developed was to ensure that some 20 percent of the most needy low income participants would receive help from the program. The following are the income eligibility guidelines:

Another area of local concern that has been amended was the requirement of a performance bond by the contractor. The state of New Mexico has a new law requiring the original contractor to provide a 20 day lien rights notification to all subs and suppliers. "In addition we require a lien waiver from all subs and contractors before final payment to the original contractor. We feel that these precautions will sufficiently eliminate performance problems that will occur," Quintana said.

The contractor will also be required to provide one year warranties on the works and materials, and furnish evidence of a comprehensive public liability insurance policy covering the homeowner for not less than \$20,000 in the event of property damage arising out of the work

performed by the contractor.

"Finally we developed an application packet that will include all the materials essential to completing a home from a family survey to the follow-up reports." Quintana hopes that the program will be ready to take applications by September 21 or no later than September 28. The community will be notified of the start date by a news release, legal notices in the NEWS in both English and Spanish and bi-lingual posters at public buildings.

The street drainage portion of the CDBG program has been slower than the housing project however progress has been made. Quintana has talked with Richard Ramsey of the Soil Conservation Service about flood control and has received recommendations. The project will be along 3rd Street from 14th to the dike east of the railroad tracks. The street has existing stone gutters but pooling is occurring as a result of poor engineering and slope changes.

What is being proposed is the shaping of the street to force flow along the gutters east to west. Re-grade the area between Aspen and the dike so that water is not forced to pool before it runs off and under culverts so that water flows under Aspen as opposed to flowing over the street. If money allows, grading will occur on north-south streets to carry storm water north

to third and then west to the channel around town.

The council in other town business, with mayor pro-tem Ruth Armstrong in charge, re-appointed Mr. Dale LaMay of Carrizozo to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association Board. The association will hold its annual election of officers on September 16.

A \$40.00 a week bonus will be given to police clerk, Rosemary Gallegos for every week that she works while town clerk Carol Schlarb is absent. (Schlarb had her baby this week.) A temporary replacement for Schlarb was discussed but was not approved. In addition to her police department duties, Gallegos will handle other town hall business, including the motor vehicle department.

The council accepted the bid from DeLuna Ford-Chrysler of Mountainair for a 4-door police patrol car. The 1982 Ford Fairmont is priced at \$7,993.00 including air conditioning.

The council approved the request of Emilio Beltran, town superintendent for a new chlorinator for the town's water treatment plant. The present chlorinator has been in use since 1955, is obsolete and Beltran cannot find parts for it anymore. Because it was of extreme emergency that one is obtained as soon as possible, town attorney Bill Payne said that bidding would not be required.

One of the goals of any community program such as New Horizons is to assist residents to successfully live in a community. Past experience has shown that this ability to live successfully in a community has a lot to do with community attitude, if the community does not want them there, they won't adjust well. Carrizozo has overwhelmingly accepted the residents of New Horizons.

ended in a score for the Panthers. The rest of the game was neck and neck: It was mostly a defensive game with both defenses holding each offense to a minimum number of yards and no points.


