District Attorney Steven Sanders has announced that an administrative assistant has been hired to serve Lincoln County.

John Carver, a former Alamogordo resident, has just returned to the area and will be living in Ruidoso, where he will maintain an office in the Sheriff's Department.

Carver will administer the pre-prosecution probation program mandated by the Legislature. This program is for counseling non-violent, non-drug first offenders to attempt to lead them away from further criminal behavior.

Sanders said Carver will also expand and systematize the district attorney's worthless check prosecution program, and will implement a program for reciprocal enforcement of court-ordered child support.

The latter program is a cooperative program in which a parent may bring charges against a resident of another county or state who refuses to pay child support.

Ruidoso 'Village' Turns Down--

Carrizozo (SBAC) Application

Following the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) endorsement recently of a proposed study by U.S. Sen. Harrison Schmitt, "Cotton" McKnight, Picacho rancher protested the exclusion of Carrizozo from SBAC.

McKnight, chairman of the Lincoln County Commission had made a motion at a county meeting earlier this year to cease county SBAC support if Carrizozo wasn't accepted as a member.

Lincoln County, Capitan and Ruidoso Downs all SBAC members approved Carrizozo on SBAC. Mescalero Apache Tribe has not acted on Carrizozo's request. Ruidoso turned the application down.

SBAC's chairman told McKnight that SBAC makes no policies; that they have no authority, no power, no influence over the Ruidoso Village council.

McKnight also brought up the fact that SBAC did not conduct any meetings in the past five months.

After explaining why they had not for several months, SBAC voted to hold monthly meetings the first Thursday of the month at 2 p.m.

The study recently approved by SBAC should determine whether the proposed airport and agricultural research being conducted by NMSU on Fort Stanton mesa could co-exist. NMSU research operation is being conducted on acreage leased by the

Bureau of Land Management.

There has been in the past much controversy over the proposed airport and the mesa location.

Although the Senate Appropriations Committee has endorsed Schmitt's proposal of a

study of the mesa location, no funds have been allocated for this purpose.

Fred Heckman of Albuquerque is SBAC chairman and Ruidoso 'Village' representative. Lincoln County continues to remain on SBAC with com-

missioner Ben Hall of Ruidoso representing the county.

If the proposed airport is realized, Carrizozo tax dollars will help pay for the construction. Carrizozo is still excluded from SBAC membership.

Construction Problems Viewed at Capitan--

School Board Meeting

The Capitan Board of Education called a special meeting on September 17, and met for the specific purpose of pointing out certain construction problems with the Phase II of the new high school building, and relating those problems to the architect and the building contractor representative.

Present at the meeting was superintendent David Lee, principal Glen Crane and board members Mark Delgado, Hollis Cummins, Isidro Peralta, Ralph Barber and James McDaniel.

The architect and construction reported the high school building and the vo-ag building and pointed out the problems and areas which had to be re-done before the building could be accepted by the board.

Mr. Hollis Cummins speaking on behalf of the board stated to the contractor that the board would not want the quality of work to suffer for the sake of speeding up the completion date, emphasizing that the board had a responsibility to the community to make sure that quality was not sacrificed for the sake of speed, and that construction should meet the criteria contracted for.

Both architect and the Land Graft Co., representative, Richard Clifton assured the board that their intention was to correct all problems to the satisfaction of the board, stating that the time criteria was an important factor as cause for the finishing problems.

Sub-contractor who did the interior wall finishing and was doing the re-finishing job invited the board to go over and inspect the re-finishing of the job this Thursday. Problems found in the vo-ag building were scheduled to be corrected as soon as electricity power can be supplied and be

finished about one week after that.

The construction representative, stated to the board that about 82 percent of the building was completed and that the new building should be ready for occupation on or about the 15th of October.

Carrizozo Woman's Club Committee People Named

The Carrizozo Woman's Club met September 17 for their first meeting of the 1981-82 year. Members were named to 14 yearly permanent committees. Club president, Viola Vega Fenter presided over the business meeting which included the appointment of Mary Spencer to the executive board of directors. Spencer fills the vacancy of Mary Rich, who resigned. Other directors are Carolyn Cantrell, Hazel English, Sue Stearns and Ramona Ortiz.

The club made plans to hold a 'before game' dinner on October 16, homecoming day for Carrizozo schools. A committee was named to finalize plans.

Fenter informed the members that two bids have been received on the roofing work needed on the club building roof. Sample roofing materials were passed among members for inspection. A third bid will be considered before a

contract decision is made. The building, new in 1939 is an attractive addition to the community and is a very sturdy and well-built building. (See related story, 'Turning Back the Clock')

La Junta Ranch in Alto will be the site of the district meeting to be held October 1-3. Members wishing to enter the arts and crafts at the district meet should contact member Mary Ellen Payne before September 29 at the Extension Office.

The club's October meeting will feature a guest speaker, Betty Beagles, president of the Roswell Woman's Club. Beagles will give a class on parliamentary procedures. Other local civic clubs and the town's governing body will be invited to the meeting which will include a potluck noon luncheon.

Application Beginning Date Set

Carrizozo Mayor Manuel R Hernandez today announced that starting Monday September 28 low and moderate-income homeowners can begin to apply for 1981 CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Grants and Loans.

The mayor said "This project has been on the drawingboards for a little over a year now, it's going to make a big impact on housing in our community. I hope that all eligible homeowners will take advantage of this opportunity to

provide major repairs or additions to their homes."

The CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Program is a large part of the \$300,000 grant the Town of Carrizozo recently received from the Department of HUD. The Town after six unsuccessful attempts to acquire CDBG, small cities monies was selected to implement a two phase single purpose program. \$245,000 of the grant is earmarked for housing rehabilitation, \$35,000 will be used

for improved flood and storm drainage, and \$30,000 is for administration of the program. All work in the project will take place south of the Southern Pacific railroad tracks in Census Enumeration District 4.

The mayor went on to say that applicants will be assisted on the basis of need and that thanks to a local committee of interested citizens a rating guide had been put together to aid in the selection process.

"Reception at New Club House"

Last Friday evening December 8th the Woman's Club of Carrizozo held a reception at the new club house, from 4 until 7 o'clock. Coffee, tea and doughnuts were served to at least 100 members and guests. Numbers of prominent people were present from over the county, among whom we noticed Senator Louise Coe of Glencoe, Mrs. Ola C. Jones of Ancho.

On Wednesday, November 16, 1938, Mr. Dan Conley was put in charge of preparations for this magnificent building. He assembled tools, paraphernalia and men and laid the foundation. Later in the game, Mr. Jess Garrison and the carpenters and plasterers added their part and the results? -A dream come true! The Carrizozo Woman's club a masterpiece of Spanish architecture, plainly designed, and ornamented only with our beautiful sunshine sign, the STATE INSIGNIA in the center of which are the figures "1939".

The main room is 54 feet long and 40 feet wide with a large fire place in the center of the room, opposite the door. The room is designed for a reading room and library, and also has ample space for dancing.

On the left as you enter is the large circular dining room which in itself attracts and holds the attention of the visitor as the large

beams running from the center to all parts of the room catch the eye. To the rear of the dining room is a big conveniently arranged kitchen, which opens on a large porch, with steps to the basement. On the right of the main room are lounges, which are well lighted and comfortable.

And now comes the tug-of-war, the furnishing of this building. Mrs. Dewey Stokes has already donated a large leather couch, Mrs. J. V. Taylor donated a piano, Mrs. Ziegler donated a piano stool, the music study club donated a picture, the woman's club bought another picture, and Mr. Jess Garrison made and donated the frames. Each member donated a folding chair, and a large, over stuffed chair was donated by Mrs. Blaney. Mmes. Selma Degitz and May English gave the kitchen range.

Just here we pause to sing the praises of the club leaders who envisioned the time when the building would be a reality and the community center for women's activities in the days to come. It is they who deserve the praise, and although it sounds like anti-climax, "It's a feather in their caps." - Lincoln County News, Friday, December 15, 1939.

The preceding news story was reprinted from a 1939 issue of the

Lincoln County News, whose editor and publisher was Mrs. Era B. Smith. The news items used for my twice a month 'Turning Back the Clock' features are copied word-for-word, including sentence structure, from file newspapers.

The Woman's Club has given the town of Carrizozo 61 years of continued community service. Organized in April of 1920, members met for their regular meetings in each others homes.

Special events were conducted at various places throughout the town.

Their main goal was to help the needy, love the community and help its growth. For awhile most of their fund raising proceeds were targeted for the construction of their very own club building. Pledges and personal effort of the members had alot to do with the raising of sufficient funds for their

building. Completed in 1939, the building was originally called, 'Community Center for Women's Activities.'

Among the Woman's Club minutes of December 15, 1939: "Mrs. Will Norman, Chairman Open House Committee, reported \$5.60 from the open house silver collection and moved this sum be applied on water connections for their new building. \$100 was given

to the Building Committee to apply on the indebtedness on building. The president reported the gift of enameled top kitchen table by Mrs. Sale and Grace Jones. The club appreciates all the gifts which help to make our building comfortable" (Mrs. Thelma Degitz presided over this 1939 meeting held in a brand new building.)

Today, 42 years later, club president Viola Vega Fenter and members continue to take pride in their "magnificent" building, which features ceilings designed and constructed with beautiful Spanish-style 'vigas' (beams). Members commend the women who proceed them for their courage in the great undertaking of securing a meeting place.

Refreshments were served following the business meeting. Tea, coffee and homemade baked goods were provided by the club officers who are, Viola Vega Fenter, president; Mary Ellen Payne, first vice president; Lyn Miller, second vice president; Charlotte Wall, secretary; Cheri Goad, treasurer and Lucia Vega, parliamentarian.

The program consisted of a display of quilts and quilt ideas provided by members and guests. A pattern has been chosen for blocks which each member will piece individually. The blocks will be made into a quilt and raffled. The drawing will be held during the club's annual Christmas dinner.

The club hosted a membership tea on Sunday afternoon, September 13. The Woman's Club invites and encourages all women in Carrizozo and vicinity to become members. The General Federation of Women's Clubs (G.F.W.C.) is an international organization. The Carrizozo Woman's Club is a federated women's club and has a long history of community service.

The Carrizozo club recognized a need for senior citizens' housing and applied for government funding construction. The club owns and operates Casa Manana, an eight-unit residential complex for low-income senior citizens. In 1980 the Carrizozo Woman's Club won a national Community Improvement Project (CIP) award for Casa Manana.

The club was the initial sponsor of the annual People's Market Place; provide the Spring Cleanup luncheon and were responsible for the Storefront Beautification project.

Every year the club awards a Carrizozo high school senior with a \$500 scholarship; help annually with March of Dimes; and sponsor a local girl as a Sun Duchess to the annual Sun Carnival activities in El Paso.

The nationwide General Federation of Women's Club Distinguished Volunteer Teenage competition award was recently given to the young lady which the Carrizozo club nominated. Brigitte Sandoval was in Washington, D.C. this month to receive her award.

In years past the club obtained a piano for a local nursing home, which no longer exists. Nearly one third of the town's population are senior citizens. The club today sponsors the Zia Senior Citizens Center.

The club assisted in starting progress on the swimming pool and recreation center located at Spencer Park and were instrumental in securing roadside parks. They purchased a movie projector for the Lyric Theater.

In earlier years the club's accomplishments included Spider Park and Valley of Fires State Park. The club was helpful in securing the town's sewer system and took steps to have the White Oaks cemetery declared a state monument. Club women petitioned for signatures which testified the need for piping natural gas to town.

Last, but not least - on behalf of its citizenry, club members campaigned door-to-door to rid the town of a health hazard... privies or outhouses. The club has accomplished much since it's inception in 1926.

HELLO MABEL!

Three days of canning has brought me down to Earth, from my Europe trip; I did a little research and here it is -- ON CANNING I mean!

METHODS OF CANNING--

WATER BATH CANNING
1. Water Bath Method -- suitable for high acid foods such as fruits, tomatoes, relishes, and pickles. This method processed foods in boiling water (212) degrees.

Here are some tips on hot water bath canning--

1. Place large pan on burner, add water to half fill canner, bring water to boil while preparing food.
2. Wash jars in hot sudsy water, rinse well. Put in boiling water till ready to use.

3. Place lids and screw metal rings in sudsy water - then put in boiling water, till ready to use.

4. Prepare fruit with juice and boil about 5 to 10 min.

5. Remove jars from water one at a time, place on clean cloth, then place fruit and juice in jars - with a funnel or a clean cloth around the jar - while pouring it in, leaving a head space of about 1/4 inch from top.

6. Remove any air bubbles by running a thin wooden or plastic spoon or knife down each side of jar. Wipe top and threads of each after you fill them if necessary - very lightly but the funnel will help keep the threads clean.

After they are sealed twist tight -- and the lid will pop down after a time. If the fruit begins to bubble or spuel -- throw it away.

Tomatoes are canned the same was as above.

Here is a recipe for sweet pickle chips --

4 lbs of small cucumbers, sliced 1/4 inch.

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 teas. mustard seed
- 5 cups sugar
- 1-tbspn. whole all spice
- 1 qt. white vinegar
- 3 tablepoons canning salt
- 7 cinnamon sticks
- 2 cups white vinegar
- 2 teaspooons celery seed

Wash & rinse 5 pint preserving jars. Put them in containers to boil. Combine 1 qt. vinegar, and 1/4 cup sugar, canning salt, mustard seed and stick cinnamon in a large heavy kettle. Add cucumbers. Bring to boil simmer 5 min., drain cucumbers, discard liquid and reserve cinnamon. Combine remaining sugar and vinegar, all spice and celery seed in pan; bring to boil. Pack cucumbers into hot preserving jars using wide mouth funnel, add a cinnamon stick, then pour hot liquid over pickles, to about 1/4 each from top - slip a knife down on each side to get bubbles out - then seal, this is still the water bath method. They are good - and you will enjoy doing them.

Now for the garden! and the Family--

After working all summer mowing the lawn and during this rain, it was very often -- no one wants to get their yard ready for fall -- but if you could scrape up a

little energy -- here are some tips.

1. Remove all old stalks, vines, stems.

2. Don't cut off the tops of your asparagus until after a freeze.

3. Your strawberries should be fed a little fertilizer, cover with some mulch.

4. Grapes could be pruned in late winter -- early spring (Feb.)

5. Dead wood should be taken off fruit trees now.

6. You can thin out your iris and daisies, and stock.

7. Tulips should be planted late in the fall. Peonies can be planted now through Oct.

O.K. Mabel -- I just wanted you to know about those things--

INFLATION -- Stop charging and start retreating.

IMAGINE -- how much grief we'd all be spared if only we could get our hindsight to come in first.

Did You Know?--

1. That in the future some odd things will be available - like Facial features that you can buy - instead of having surgery.
