### Briefs..

Loren "Pat" Dunning, 66, well-known area ranch woman died September 27 in a one vehicle traffic accident which occurred north of Carrizozo.

The accident was reported at 6:45 a.m. that Sunday.

According to State Police records, the 1980 AMC Eagle, north bound on 54 ran off the left side of the highway, hit a dirt embankment causing the vehicle to overturn twice, coming to rest on its tires.

Capitan resident Tammy D. Farris, age 18 died from fatal injuries she received in a one vehicle accident which occurred this past Monday, September 28 at 11:45 p.m.

Farris lost control of the 1966 Chevrolet pickup which she was driving. The truck moving at a high speed, overturned west of Junction 380 and State Road 48 in the vicinity of the Indian Divide.

Local State Police records indicate that the truck overturned throwing the victim from the vehicle.

Graveside services were held in White Oaks on September 30 for Loren McGuire "Pat" Dunning, born April 6, 1916. She passed away September 27 in a car accident north of Carrizozo.

Tom Ward officiated at the 11:00 a.m. services at White Oaks Cemetery. Pall bearers were Bud Crenshaw, Len Dunning, Bobby Dan Crenshaw, Forrest Dunning, Orville Runnells and Jim Martin.

State Police officers arrested three men and confiscated 68 live marijuana plants in two Nogal locations. The men and the plants, which were approximately four feet high, had been under surveillance for several days prior to the arrests.

Kent L. Skarda, 26, and Steven C. Halladay were arrested and charged with possession of more than eight ounces of marijuana with intent to distribute. Scharbauer A. Ward, 28, was charged with being party to a crime. The three men were arraigned and bonded out of the Lincoln County jail after posting \$5,000.00 bond each.

State Policeman Timothy Z. Stewart handled the investigation, with officer Clayton Floyd and Sgt. Johnson assisting.

# NFRW Convention

President Ronald Reagan and Vice-President George Bush were featured speakers at the 121st biennial convention of the National Federation of Republican Women held in Denver, Colo., September 17-19, according to Yvonne Lanelli, Alto, delegate from the Lincoln County Federation.

"It was exciting to hear not just one, but both our nation's top executive leaders addressing our assembly," she said, speaking at the September 22 meeting of the Lincoln County Federation at the First Christian Church, Ruidoso.

Secretary of the Interior James Watt, Bo Calloway, Governor James Harrison of Indiana, and many other top administrative aides, both male and female, spoke to the convention, which numbered 975 delegates, 430 alternates and numerous guests from all 50 states.

New Mexico sent 17 delegates and 14 alternates.

"For those of us from isolated rural areas it was heartening to hear those high officials credit us with much of the success in the last election," Lanelli said.

"For example, Republican women throughout the nation donated 6.2 million volunteer hours which was valued at \$48 million."

In addition to hearing speakers, delegates attended workshops designed to further their skills as campaigners, fund-raisers, or even as candidates themselves.

"We enjoyed social activities, too," said Lanelli. "Many delegations, including New Mexico's held receptions or parties. Many remarked that New Mexico's margarita party, during which we displayed ristras and Ojos de Dios, was one of the more enjoyable and unique." The NM delegation made over 3000 Ojos for

favours and souvenirs

Concluding her speech, Lanelli urged members to attend the upcoming state convention to be held in Albuquerque October 16-18. Further information is available from club president Rhonda Johnston, Ruidoso or secretary, Dorothy Smith, Capitan.

In other business, members voted to pay the convention registration fee for those attending and discussed their entry in the Aspenade parade Saturday, October 3.

Members will assemble in the parking lot of the Bonito Volunteer Fire Dept., Alto, by 8:30 AM and will proceed to the parade's

## Rent Subsidy Reps Here October 7th

Representatives from the Regional Housing Authority of Region VI, New Mexico will be in Carrizozo, on Wednesday, October 7, 1981, to take applications for the H.U.D. Section 8 Rent Subsidy Program. This program assists low-income families in making their monthly rental payments.

The income limit is \$14,900 a year for a family of four. Any citizen who thinks they will qualify for assistance is encouraged to apply at the Welfare Office, Carrizozo, on October 7, 1981, at 10:30 a.m. Applications are taken on a first come, first serve basis. Also, any landlord who is interested in possibly participating in the program and would like more information, is encouraged to contact the representatives.

Carrizozo Hardware received extensive damage from a fire which occurred September 24. An electrical short between the tin ceiling of the basement and the main floor was responsible for the after midnight blaze.

Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department fought the fire with the department's big pumper, a scut unit and 6 air packs. A request for additional air packs was filled by Capitan Rescue Unit. Nogal Fire Department also responded to the fire at the two-story building.

There are eight apartments in the building's second floor. At the time of the fire there were only two occupants. Owner Fred English said that Zane McVey, a Southern Pacific employee who rents one of the living quarters awoke gasping for air around 12:15 a.m. when he alerted the fire department. English's father, Mr. Frank A. English was evacuated from another apartment.

Fred English and Fire Chief Albert Najar expressed appreciation this week to all the persons assisting in fighting the early morning fire.

Carrizozo Hardware is located in the historic Lutz building built in 1917 by Henry Lutz. Until 1926, Lutz operated the Carrizozo Trading Co. In 1933 Frank A. English bought the building and the first floor became Carrizozo Hardware Co. After his retirement in 1946, his son Fred took over the family business.

Carrizozo Hardware is conducting a 'Fire Sale'. Smoke damaged merchandise is available for as low as 50 percent off. A contractor will completely restore the entire building, which will be restocked.

Toby English, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred English is assisting in the liquidation of the merchandise. He is a detective with the Albuquerque Police Department.


## Local Family Doctor Attends Medical Meet

LAS VEGAS - Dr. Amy S. Barton MD attended the Annual Scientific Assembly of the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) September 21-24 in Las Vegas. Some 4,000 family physicians from around the nation are attending the continuing medical education meeting.

The local physician, an AAFP member, heard renowned speakers discuss up-to-the-minute health care topics. She also had an opportunity to attend clinical seminars on 30 different topics and visit more than 100 scientific and 200 technical exhibits.

Subjects covered in this four-day scientific session were of immediate interest to family physicians both in their everyday practices and in their continual endeavors to keep abreast of the latest advances in medicine. Topics included depression, asthma, nutrition, sleep disorders and antibiotics.

Headquartered in Kansas City, the 50,000-member AAFP is the nation's second largest medical organization. It was the pioneer among medical organizations in requiring its members to take continuing medical education. Its members must complete 150 approved hours of mandatory continuing study every three years. Dr. Barton has been a member since the academy was founded in 1947.

through the NEWS what was available in Carrizozo in 1938 and where to turn for the different services. In 1938 the following ads in the NEWS were household words: B&M Merc. Co., Rollands, Ziegler Bros., Burnett's, City Garage, Lincoln County Agency (Citizens State Bank of Vaughn), Zozo Boot Shop and many others.

Thelma, a smart business woman took advantage of local events in planning her advertising. Her weekly ads would begin "Get Ready for the Rodeo Dance" (Alumni, Junior, American or Rainbow Girls). There are women today who remember attending these social gatherings at the Community Hall, sporting a new hair-do from Thelma's. The Community Hall was located at the present Piggy Wiggly store. (When ever I go down the aisles of this grocery store I remember that this building was once the ol' stomping ground of my folks.)

Today's 1981 Carrizozo and surrounding area women and men are offered the latest in cosmetology services at Erma's Salon. Erma Alford has been in business in Carrizozo for about 20-years. Her husband, Buster is back home after a stay at Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo.

Patty Saucedo, has been working with Erma for the past 15 years. She and her husband, Max, have three school age children, Stephanie, John and Suzanne. Rita Narvaez has been with Erma for four years. 


