RECREATION CENTER

Gets Solar Grant

The Town of Carrizozo has been awarded \$11,000 to construct and install a solar hot air heating-system on the Carrizozo Rec Center.

The grant is from a state-federal program for small energy projects, and will be used to acquire materials, supplies and electrical work.

The system, which will contain 10 banks of solar panels which will provide 1,000 square feet of collector surface will be built by vocational students at Carrizozo High School.

The system will provide the majority of heat needed to operate the rec-center.

Officials said the center will probably have to be closed if the cost of utilities cannot be reduced this winter.

A. Lindamood Attends Conference

The Legislative Committee of the National Association of Post Masters of the United States (NAPUS) gathered last month in Washington, D.C. for the 1981 Legislative Conference to lobby with their senators.

Among the NAPUS lobbyists was Aileen Haley Lindamood, retired Alto, N.M. postmaster. During the conference the committee personally visited with their elected officials on Capitol Hill to discuss upcoming bills which will effect the outcome of the U.S. postal service legislation.

Lindamood of Carrizozo, N.M. introduced James D. Syers, NAPUS national president to Harrison "Jack" Schmitt, Republican senator from New Mexico. Schmitt is on two Senate Standing Committees of interest to NAPUS - Appropriations and Commerce, Science and Transportation. Schmitt also serves on the Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence.

Senate Bill S. 898, "The Telecommunications Competition and Deregulation Act of 1981," was introduced by Senators Schmitt, Barry Goldwater (Arizona-Rep.) and Ted Stevens (Alaska-Rep.) It cleared the Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee on a vote of 16 to 1. Schmitt expects this bill to be on the Senate floor for a vote this fall.

Advisory Committee on Brush and Weed Control Appointed

Governor Bruce King has appointed a 23 member advisory committee to look into the impact of brush and weeds on New Mexico rangeland.

The committee, chaired by Secretary of Agriculture Dr. William P. Stephens, has been asked to examine the impact of brush and weeds in terms of their ability to affect land's productivity. The Governor told the committee he wants them to make recommendations on the appropriate action necessary to deal with brush and weed problems on New Mexico rangelands and to advise on need for additional research on control methods plus educational and demonstration programs for handling brush and weeds.

King said livestock provides three fourths of the agricultural cash receipts for the state. He said rangeland contributes substantially to this production and

any improvements in productive capacity through brush and weed control will benefit the whole state.

The New Mexico Department of Agriculture, under the direction of Stephens, will take the leadership in managing a brush and weed control program. The department will also be responsible for staff support to the brush and weed control committee, King said. Advisory committee chairman Stephens said the key to increasing rangeland productivity is a coordination of agency and private industry efforts "to get brush cleared on New Mexico rangelands".

The Committee members are from state and federal government, private industry including the ranching segment, conservation districts and brush and weed control researchers.

A three-day weekend, together with peak fall colors, will attract both sportsmen and spectators to Lincoln National Forest this weekend. The big show will feature aspens and maples in a glorious display of color. In addition, Elk hunting season runs from October 8 to 12. Another attraction is the annual Mule races at Ruidoso Downs, sponsored by the Ruidoso Mulekenners Association.

Cooler temperatures, accompanied with fall rains, have made warm clothing and rain gear a must. Fuelwood areas are open for firewood gatherers, but may be inaccessible at times due to rains.

Current driving and weather conditions can be obtained by contacting the District Ranger's offices. District telephone numbers

to call are: Smokey Bear at Ruidoso, 287-4098; Cloudfcroft, 682-2551.

On the Smokey Bear District, at Ruidoso, a scenic tour of Forest Road 107, along Bonito Creek will reward viewers with a beautiful display of fall color, especially looking up toward the wilderness along the south fork of Bonito Creek. State Highway 682, the Sierra Blanca Ski Area road, has been reclosed for continuing repairs. The road to Monjeau Lookout (FR 117) is suggested as a drive that will offer scenic vistas of aspens and oaks; however, it is recommended only for high-clearance vehicles.

Three Rivers Campground is the only campground remaining open on the Smokey Bear District. Cedar Creek Picnic Area will remain open until October 31. Bonito Lake is full and fishing pressure is low. Trails into the White Mountain Wilderness area are open, but may be muddy in places.

On the Cloudfcroft Ranger District, there will still be isolated spots of fall colors along Sunspot Road (FR 94) and in the Alamo Peak area. All campgrounds are closed except Sleepy Grass. The restroom at Bluff Springs has been closed for repairs. Hiking trails are open, but muddy in places. Motorists should be aware that rock falls are occurring on U.S. Highway 82 west of Cloudfcroft, because of the rains; and that there is no centerline of State Highway 24, north.

Seedling Applications Available

Applications for New Mexico Division of Forestry's Tree Seedling Program are now available according to Raymond R. Gallegos, State Forester. Each year the division provides seedlings to landowners at reasonable costs.

Two varieties of seedlings are available; containerized conifer and bare-root deciduous. This year the coniferous species available are: Arizona cypress, Afghanistan pine, Austrian pine, Colorado blue spruce, Douglas-fir, Ponderosa pine, Scotch pine and white fir. Deciduous species available are: green ash, skunkbush sumac, Lombardy poplar, Russian olive, native plum, narrowleaf cottonwood and hackberry.

To qualify for the program you must own at least two acres of

land, use the trees for conservation purposes; such as windbreaks, reforestation, erosion control or Christmas tree plantations, and buy a minimum of 100 seedlings.

Costs for containerized species run \$42.00 per 98 trees, and deciduous seedlings are \$23.00 for 100.
