## Carrizozo C OF C

Business at Tuesday's Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce meeting was swiftly conducted with W.A. "Woody" Schlegel presiding. A potpourri of announcements and suggestions were brought forth during the hour long meeting at the Four Winds.

Among the suggestions was a change from noon meetings to night meetings. The Chamber meets the first Tuesday of every month at the Four Winds. The matter of changing the meeting time and place was referred to the executive committee.

A report on the membership drive was given. To date 15 businesses and 16 individuals are chamber members. The Chamber made plans to publicize a list of the membership in the NEWS, urging people to support local merchants who are Chamber members by shopping in their places of business.

The Chamber continues to seek members. Membership is \$40.00 for each business and \$10.00 for each individual. The Chamber discussed plans for a new logo for Chamber membership cards.

Member Betty Fields announced that she is in the process of moving her business, 'Fields Accounting' into the south side of

the J.G. Moore Insurance Agency building. Chamber quarters will remain at its present location next door to Roy Dow's 'Gift Gallery.' Fields said that Dow will assist in the distribution of Chamber literature until another arrangement is made.

Chamber vice president, Scott Shafer told the group that there has been a change in personnel at the local airport. Dave Wheeler, former airport manager who was also a town policeman has moved out of town. Guy Brown who has filled the position on the police department, will live at the airport house and manage the facility.

Chamber members learned that Carrizozo has a new business - a shoe repair shop. The proprietor is Mr. Tom Furtk, a half-time teacher in the English department at Carrizozo schools.

Schlegel informed members that on behalf of the Chamber, he has written a letter to the Adult Basic Education Division in Santa Fe endorsing a proposal for a

G.E.D. program in Carrizozo. The project would create two new part-time jobs in the community.

It was brought to the chamber's attention that New Mexico ranks 6th place, from the standpoint of economics, weather and population mix, in a list of "Best States to Retire to". The article appeared in the October-November 1981 issue of Modern Maturity.

An announcement was made at the chamber meeting that there will be a 7:30 p.m. Community Thanksgiving Service on Sunday, November 22 at the Assembly of God Church. The event will be held in conjunction with the distribution of food baskets to the needy or elderly.

A round of applause was given to fellow members who helped in preparing for Chamber representation in the October 18 homecoming parade. Schlegel said the project was successful and enjoyable.

## School Board

A person over 18 years of age seeking entrance to the school as a student was the subject in question at last month's regular meeting of the Carrizozo School Board of Education. The administration sought a policy on which to base its decision. The problems involved are two-fold. First, the Public School Finance Division only funds a school for those students who are between 6 and 18 years of age. An "over 18" student would not bring revenue to the school while at the same time being using the staff and facilities.

The second problem is that according to state law, a student who is over 18 is considered "emancipated" and that student's parents have neither rights nor responsibilities with that student. The school would be unable to appeal to a parent for discipline of the student.

After much discussion, it was a consensus of the board that if there was room in a class and if it seemed reasonable that a student would benefit her-himself by being in school and if a student would not be detrimental to other students' achievement, and if a student seemed to exhibit a level of motivation indicative of cooperation with school authorities, then the administration could bring to the board a recommendation favoring acceptance of the student.

An overriding consideration, which must be checked with school board legal counsel, is what legal rights-responsibilities the school

and student achieve when a board allows a student to be enrolled who is over 18. The board does not want to grant the right to attend classes to someone if the school does not have the right to take disciplinary measures. The school board also does not want to enroll a student who, bringing no revenue, might cost the school monies in an extended due process procedure involving discipline. When that legal point is clarified, a policy will be established and included in the Board Policy Handbook.

## Open House Nov. 14th

The public is invited to attend Holloman Air Force Base's annual Open House on Sat. Nov. 14, from 11 am until 4 pm. There is no admission charge.

The Open House will feature static displays of Tactical Air Command aircraft, an aerial demonstration of the F-15 aircraft, special exhibits, music, food, and entertainment.

In addition to Captain Mike Larkin of the 48th Tactical Fighter Wing demonstrating the capabilities of the F-15 "Eagle," there will be an F-15 and T-38 fly-by.

Ground demonstrations will include remote-controlled airplanes, motorcycle safety, Space Shuttle "Columbia" rescue procedures (using the Holloman shuttle mock-up used for "handson" training), and drill teams from the New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell.

Aircraft on display at the Open House will include the F-86, F-4D, PQM-102, F-16, F-111, KC-135, F-10 C-12, and UH-1 helicopter. Missiles will also be exhibited.

Other displays will include a hangar from the 449th Mobility Support Squadron, the space shuttle mock-up, a test sled from the 6585th Test Group, special automobiles, and aircraft engines. The International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo will have a

### American Cupcake

Fudgy chocolate cupcakes, with a glass of ice-cold milk might just be the all-time favorite after-school snack for generations of American kids. Here's a streamlined version of this popular classic that tastes super rich and chocolately with moist, delicate texture.

Since these cupcakes are super simple to put together, older children can have fun making them with minimal supervision.

Start with a base of versatile unsweetened cocoa (chocolate in very concentrated form so flavor will be robust.) Cocoa blends readily for smoother batters, another boon to beginning cooks. Measure and mix it in, right from the can, with no messy pre-melting.

Swirl cooled cupcakes with cocoa buttercream or fudge frosting... then let the children create colorful "faces" with sprinkles and tinted coconut.

-Quick 'n' Easy Chocolate Cupcakes

- 2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 2-3 cup Hershey's Cocoa
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 5 cup milk
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degree. Line 30 muffin cups with paper-baking cups. In large bowl of electric mixer combine flour, sugar, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Add shortening, eggs, milk, water and vanilla. Beat mixture 1 minute on low speed, scraping sides and bottom of bowl with rubber scraper. Turn speed to medium; beat 3 minutes or until mixture is creamy smooth. Spoon batter into lined muffin pans, filling each about half full. Bake 15 to 20 minutes. Press center of cupcake lightly at minimum baking time - cake springs back when it's done. Remove cupcakes from oven. Turn pan upside down to remove cupcakes. Turn them right side up on wire rack to cool.

A total of 6,800 Christmas trees will be available for cutting on Lincoln National Forest this year; with each ranger district on the Forest having an allotment of trees. Applications for permits will be available October 30, at all Lincoln National Forest offices, many Chambers of Commerce, and Post Offices in southeastern New Mexico and west Texas. Permits to cut trees will be issued only by mail, on a first-come, first-served basis, so mail your application in as soon as possible.

Also available to the public at all Lincoln National Forest offices and many Chambers of Commerce, is a thirty-two page tabloid, listing campgrounds, hiking trails, and containing a variety of informative articles about Lincoln National Forest. This publication is free through the courtesy of area business that have advertised in the tabloid. The cover shows a ten-year collection of Smokey Bear posters.

Fuel cutters may pick up a free publication titled, "Firewood From Public Lands in New Mexico", with maps and other information about fuelwood, at most Forest Service, BLM, and State Forestry offices.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, all fuelwood areas are open except Area No. 4, North Goat Mountain, which has sold out. The only campground open on the district is Three Rivers. Fishing is fair at Bonito Lake, with light fishing pressure. Trails into White Mountain Wilderness are in good condition.

At Cloudcroft Ranger District, fuelwood areas are open. All campgrounds are closed for the season except Lower Sleepy Grass; access is through the entrance on U.S. Highway 82, as the gate off State Highway 24 is closed. Hiking trails are open, but icy in spots. Maintenance work is in progress on Sunspot Road (FR 64); there is still no centerline on State Highway 24 north; and there are a lot of skunka roaming the roads, so motorists should use caution.

## SWCD Annual Report

Fiscal Year 1981  
The following is the Annual Report of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District. This report shows the District's activities and accomplishments during the period July 1, 1980 to June 30, 1981.

The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District was organized on October 11, 1945 as a legal subdivision of the State of New Mexico. It was formed to further resource conservation and development and give local people the opportunity to plan, direct, and carry out programs that will lead to the conservation and development of our natural resources. There are approximately 1,100,000 acres of land in the District.

Present supervisors of the District are Gary Hightower, Chairman; Wally Ferguson, Vice-Chairman; Pete Gnatkowski, Secretary-Treasurer; and Stirling Spencer and Tony Gabel, members. These supervisors are elected by the landowners for three-year terms to administer the Soil and Water Conservation District and its affairs. This year Pete Gnatkowski was re-elected, and Tony Gabel elected to serve three-year terms.

The Board meets the first Wednesday of each month to conduct District business. The meetings are held in the Soil Conservation Service Office, Carrizozo - Lincoln County Courthouse Annex, at 8:00 p.m. and anyone interested is invited to attend. There were ten regular meetings held this past year. The average attendance included four supervisors and two guests.

The District was active in supporting and assisting the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Area in its program of total resource development in Lincoln and Otero counties. Wally Ferguson serves as Vice-Chairman of the organization's Steering Committee and oversees the ac-

tivities of the Executive Committee.

Highlights of the Board's activities during this fiscal year included:

Observed Soil Stewardship Week in May. "Sermon" material booklets and bulletin covers were given to all churches in the District, book-marks were sent to schools and coverage was given to the local newspaper.

Toured the Spurlock Ranch in Arizona to view the Savory Cell Grazing System. This is a new concept in range management that the Board is very much interested in.

Introduced a resolution to the Region VI SWCD meeting concerning the control of broom snakeweed.

Continued to write our congressional, delegation concerning issues of importance to the conservation movement.

Published a quarterly newsletter with issues of importance to the District included. Each newsletter feature a plant article of concern to ranchers in the area.

The Board paid national Association of Conservation District dues, state Association of Conservation District dues, and Farm Bureau dues for the year.

The Board cooperates with land-administering agencies and encourages conservation of public land. They have entered into Memorandums of Understanding with the Department of Interior, Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Forest Service, Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Bureau of Land Management, Environmental Improvement Division, and New Mexico Department of State Forestry.

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


