## Town Council 'takes care of business' . . . Recedes on Industrial Revenue Bond Issue . . . (Armstrong Motion Snubbed)

### Guest at Club Meeting

Eva Zumwalt, author of five separate novels to date, will be the guest of honor at tonight's (7:00 p.m.) Carrizozo Woman's Club monthly meeting.

Mrs. Zumwalt is married to Ted Zumwalt, and has been a resident of Lincoln County for twenty-seven years.

Her books include: Masquerade of Evil, Briarlea, Sundust, The Yearning Years, and her latest, Mansions of Dark Mists.

At a special town meeting last Tuesday, three of Carrizozo's four town trustees did not give their blessing to 'Zia Steel, Inc.' and their plans to construct a "mini-mill" (60 thousand ton production), in or around Carrizozo.

In order to avoid a conflict of interest issue, Attorney Don Wall of Carrizozo sat in for Bill Payne,

the town's business attorney. Payne has worked for several years for the firm requesting the town's approval of the 10 million dollar industrial revenue bond.

Payne answered some questions on behalf of his client. As town attorney for the evening, Wall explained how an industrial bond works and that the

town would not be liable for anything, including his fee that evening. Wall told the board a "Trustee" which would be a financial official from the trust department of a bank would disperse the funds should the board approve the bond request.

A question and answer session was conducted by Mr. N. Edward Bottinelli, a principal of the not as yet incorporated 2-man business of Bottinelli and Hargis from Dallas, Texas and members of the council and the audience. . . . One gentleman said that 'Zia Steel Inc. was a "figment of Mr. Bottinelli's imagination". Bottinelli responded by saying that they are "doing business as" (DBA) and would later take steps in the expense to become incorporated in the State of New Mexico.

Bottinelli said that he and his associate have to satisfy the underwriter, federal and state requirements, which are "ample", assuring the town that they have nothing to fear. Bottinelli said that congress feels bonds have been misused in the past and may not be available next year. . . . "This type of bond will be disallowed in the future" was his reason for speeding up preliminary work. Now he only needs the town to express a desire to bring in the industry and approve the 10 million dollar bond.

Assets of the industry was stated as the guarantee of the bonds. All monies would have been

in escrow until all requirements were met. The proposed corporation would not have made demands on the town's utilities. Well water was to be used as 2,000 gallon per hour would be required for the manufacturing of the steel billets.

Trustee Betty Fields asked what would be the incentive for Carrizozo if town utilities will not be used and if the corporation would not have to pay sales tax. Bottinelli's answer was that 66 people would be employed. . . . that in turn would affect the town's growth potential.

Mayor Manuel Hernandez pointed out that the town would have nothing to lose in showing interest and signing the resolution. One section stated:

5.) "It is understood that Zia Steel will agree, in form and substance satisfactory to the Town, to indemnify and hold the Town harmless and defend the Town from and against all claims, demands, causes of action, liabilities and expenses, including attorney's fees, that may arise as a result of any undertaking, act or omission by the authority of ZIA STEEL pursuant to this Resolution.

6.) "neither this Resolution nor any other resolution, ordinance or agreement shall grant the Town the power to pay out of its general funds or otherwise contribute any part of the costs of acquiring such Project, provided, however, that this Section 6 shall not be construed to prevent the Town from accepting donations of property to be used for as a part of any Project or money to be used for defraying any part of the cost of the Project"

## Weather Dry, Fire Danger High

— Large Number of Hunters Expected in Forest Areas Over Weekend —

The danger of fire this weekend is high on Lincoln National Forest, but no restrictions are in force. The weather is very dry, and there are going to be a lot of hunters out in the forest.

Hunters and other visitors are asked to be especially careful with cooking and campfires, to wear high visibility clothing, and to keep their vehicles on established roads whenever and wherever possible.

Christmas tree applications have been processed for all the

trees that were available in Cloudercroft Areas 2A, 2B, and 2C. Trees are still available at Smokey Bear, Mayhill, and Guadalupe Districts.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, the road into Tortolito Canyon (FR 580) is closed at the new Wilderness boundary. For further information call the ranger station at (505) 257-7095. All other roads are dry and in good condition.

Three Rivers Campground is open. Fishing pressure is light on

Bonito Lake, which will close November 30. Trails into the White Mountain Wilderness are in good condition. Fuelwood areas are open.

Cloudercroft Ranger District reported heavy woodcutting traffic. Wood gatherers should use caution in the new Alamo Peak Fuelwood Area, where the roads are only one lane wide with no pull-off spots. Road construction may be encountered at truck escape ramps on US 82, west of Cloudercroft. Lower Sleepy Grass Cam-

pground is open, with access from US 82, but the water has been turned off. Hiking trails are frosty and slippery in the mornings. Restroom facilities at Bluff Springs are closed for repair work.

Hunters on the Mayhill and Cloudercroft Ranger District are reminded that off-road vehicle closures in Mule and Russia Canyons are still in effect. The closures, marked with signs, were put into effect last year to protect revegetation projects. The areas are not closed to hikers or horseback riders. The Cloudercroft number is (505) 682-2551.

At Mayhill, James Canyon Campground is receiving light use. Fishing is fair on the Penasco River. Roads are dry. Fuelwood areas are open. Mayhill's phone number is (505) 687-3411.

Hello Mabel! Noga is getting ready for winter.

The golden glow is almost gone, and the apple trees are looking bare; these fall days have been beautiful and now that harvest time is here and Thanksgiving is on its way, lets enjoy Nov., and all the good food and company to come.

I had a very informative visit with the Crouses lately. Mr. & Mrs. Urban Crouse (Agnes & Urban) are old time residents of Noga. They have a beautiful Apple Orchard just up the hill and down the dip from the Post Office. Through the years they have given their trees plenty of "T.L.C." and Urban has many steady and all time customers who wait for his apples every year. He and Agnes gave me some special hints about their trees to share with you.

- ON THE CARE OF APPLE TREES**
1. Prune in February
  2. Use dormant spray as soon as leaves are 1/4 inch long.
  3. Use Calyx spray when 80 percent of bloom is gone
  4. Spray every 12 to 14 days until the 15th of July.
  5. Fertilize at start of growing period

6. Water to keep ground from drying out, no further than 4 inches down.

**SOME VARIETIES GROWN IN NOGAL ARE:**

1. York Imperial - Pick 1st of Nov. - can be wrapped and kept for Xmas - they are nice for jelly. (Med. tart - good eating)
2. Arkansas Black - Pick 10th of Nov. they don't cook down soft - (very tart good to eat) taste a little like wine.
3. Ben Davis - Picked last of Oct. They stay firm when cooked (a little hard to eat)
4. Grimes Golden - Pick late Oct. - good eating apple - reg. taste
5. Summer Champion - Picked in late June - good for sauce and pies. (semi-tart)
6. Maiden Blush - Pick in Oct. (early), good to can - make pies - very big.
7. Jonathan - Pick late Sept. - very good for pies - can be wrapped and kept. (slightly tart - not good for eating)
8. Winesap - Picked in late Oct. - can be wrapped and kept all purpose apple.
9. Golden delicious - Pick 1st of Oct. All purpose apple will freeze well dries - cooks well.
10. Red Delicious - Picked in early Oct. or late Sept. Very sweet apple mostly for eating. Doesn't keep well.
11. Rome Beauty - Picked late in Oct. nice for eating and cooking, sweet and slightly tart.

12. Graven Stein - Picked in Sept. good eating and cooking taste just wine.

**Wool Program Participants Reminded to File for Payment**

"Wool producers who have sold or plan to sell any shorn wool or unshorn lambs this year, should turn in their sales receipts to be eligible for incentive payments under the wool program," Larry Bond, chairman of the Lincoln County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said.

county ASCS office disbursed more than \$283,000 in wool incentive payments last year, according to Mr. Bond.

The wool program is designed to encourage growers to increase production and improve the quality and marketing of wool.

Farmers who have a record of their wool sales are eligible for incentive payments only if the sales are reported to the county ASCS office. Mr. Bond said the quantity sold does not affect the eligibility. However, sales slips should contain the month of shearing, month of sale, number of head shorn, pounds of wool sold and net proceeds. Sales slips for lambs must show the liveweight and state whether the lambs were unshorn, he said.

The federal support price for 1981 shorn wool marketings is \$1.35 per pound and \$3.72 per pound for mohair. Pooled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

Shorn wool payments are based on a percentage of each producer's return from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool in 1981 up to the support price of \$1.35 a pound. Shorn wool prices fluctuated between 69 and 106 cents per pound through September 1981.

As of November 13, 65 local producers had filed for their 1981 wool incentive payments. The

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

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
