



Prepares for Grand Opening

Ground was broken last February for the New Citizens State Bank. The construction activity on Central Avenue has attracted the attention of local people and other passers by Estancia, N.M. contractor, Charles Douglass and his crew had a steady stream of curious and interested observers since the day bell dozers dug out a big hole, which today is the basement of the

brand new Citizens State Bank. Rain or shine, Douglass and his construction team worked under the close watch of local 'sidewalk superintendents' (the public). People were seen sitting in parked vehicles or on the court house lawn watching the workmen operate heavy machinery. They witnessed the making of the bank vault and saw the pre-cast concrete walls going up.

Electricians, plumbers and other tradesmen were busy as bees as completion deadline neared.

This beautiful facility was planned to meet future growth in this part of the county. The architects are Nims, Calvani and Associates from Carlsbad. In anticipation of the December 19th grand opening, the finishing touches are being added. The 9,000 square feet building includes a large basement. The upper level provides for a complete banking facility. Provisions have been made for in-house computer system.

Banking business will be conducted at the new building starting, Monday, December 14. The grand opening party is scheduled for December 19 from 1 to 5 p.m. At the grand opening, Santa Claus will be on hand to give away free balloons. There will be free punch for the youngsters. Free cookies and lots of free coffee will also be available. Prior to the ribbon cutting ceremony the Carrizozo School Band will perform.

This holiday time grand opening celebration will include "foot-stomping" western music throughout the afternoon by "Howard Wright and the Rebels". Prize winners will be announced every hour during the event. Prizes include a microwave oven, a black-and-white TV, free dinner for two and more.

Johnson Stearns, president of Citizens State Bank; Scott Shafer, executive vice president; Lillian Swift, assistant cashier and the rest of the gang - Margie, Sharon, Peggy, Margaret, Glorietta, Donna, Billie and Faustino - hope that you'll be able to attend the grand opening on December 19.

The new bank has four spacious offices, three teller windows, a large bookkeeping area and an employee lounge. In addition to a bigger vault, the new bank has two private booths for use by safe deposit customers.

The central area in the bank is accented with a luminous ceiling. Earth tone colors are featured throughout the building's exterior. Sky lights in the main portion of the bank and in the bookkeeping area are striking features.

The 'Community Room' within the new Citizens State Bank was designed and built for a particular purpose - for use by the town's citizenry. This room will be available for meetings and other public gatherings. The room can be divided into two rooms with the aid

of an expanding wall. A restroom, coat closet, sink and counter space can be found in the 'Community Room'.

The new bank has two surveillance cameras for security purposes. An after hours depository is situated in a well-lighted area. Other customer services include a drive-up window and an indoor drinking fountain.

This week, interior designer, Charles Smith with Colony House Inc. of Roswell was busy moving in furniture and measuring for drapes. The contemporary Southwestern style of the interior of the bank will be designed to enhance the beauty of the new building and give a stable yet progressive image to the community of Carrizozo.

The warm color scheme will provide Carrizozo with a pleasant place to do their banking business. The new building is definitely an asset to the town.

Paintings by Burroughs Featured at Exhibit

A new exhibit of color ink paintings by Sue M. Burroughs of Alamogordo opened Dec. 1 in the conference room of the administration building of Carrizozo Municipal Schools. The show, which will run through Dec. 31, is open to the public Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Mrs. Burroughs was born in Santa Rita, N.M. It would seem that part of her life, too early for her to remember has influenced her most. Santa Rita was always a mining town, but for the most part has been razed to make way for the vast expansion of the copper pits there. Perhaps this accounts for Mrs. Burroughs' love of old places. Ghost towns, the Southwest, and for her dislike for so called "progress."

Her mother was giving an art lesson when she started having birth pains prior to Sue's birth, thus she claims to be a natural born artist. Her parents, both from Texas, returned to live there after World War I, and Sue grew up near Buffalo Gap.

According to Sue, Nature has always been a delight to her. When she lived on the farm, she had no childhood playmates except imaginary ones and what she found in the woods, fields and lakes. These are the subjects of her paintings.

Dorothy Barber Fills Vacancy

She attended McMurry College in Abilene, Texas, after studying with her mother since the age of seven. After a year there, it seemed more practical for her to attend business school, which she did, leaving behind the dreams of becoming a full-time artist. No paintings were done for almost 30 years. She married, had children and worked during that time.

Twelve years ago, however she began to experiment with ink paintings. She considers this media to be exciting, and suitable as a means of depicting the Southwest.

The inks she uses come from Germany in 15 different colors and shades. Some are used directly from the bottle, others are mixed with white ink or distilled water. The interesting thing about her particular ink, she says, is that it fluoresces under a black light.

Mrs. Burroughs has participated widely in the arts and crafts fairs throughout the Southwest. When Mr. DeTevis, Carrizozo Schools art teacher interviewed her, she said that she has held approximately 15 one woman shows. Her work has been featured at the Chamulay Memorial in El Paso, the Turkey Fest in Cuero, Texas, and in several galleries in Roswell, Las Cruces and Clouderoft. She is an active member of the Gallery La Luz. All her art work is for sale and at reasonable prices.

My request for a carrot cookie recipe came through. Thanks to Maggie Bohks, who lives in White Oaks and works with the Sheriff's Department. I tried out the recipe and the cookies were great. Keep some carrots handy, the recipe will be featured in Post Script next week.

Merry 'Crispness'

Here is the candied popcorn and nut recipe which I promised last week. The recipe is compliments of Ruth Wilson of Ancho. My family gobbled up every crumb 2 cups brown sugar, 1/2 cup light or dark syrup, 1 stick oleo, one-fourth teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda, 5 quarts freshly popped corn, 1 cup salted nuts.

Boil sugar, syrup, oleo and cream of tartar for five minutes and quickly stir in soda. Add nuts to popcorn. Pour syrup mixture over corn. Mix thoroughly and spread on two lightly greased cookie sheets. Bake at 200 degrees for 40 minutes, stirring every 10 minutes.

News N' Notes

A big part of the Holiday Season is the food we prepare for our family and friends. Most homemakers are looking ahead to buying for Christmas. The U.S.D.A. says that food shoppers should have no problems this year in finding a turkey for holiday meals. According to Jack Ross, poultry marketing specialist with the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, supplies will be plentiful, even larger this Dec. than last. Overall supplies of turkey are expected to be 10-15 percent greater than a year ago and the 1978-80 average for the month. Commercial cold storage holdings on Dec. 1 are forecast to be 16-20 percent more than last year and will account for most of the increase in supplies. Weekly production of turkey during the month are likely to average 4-8 percent above a year earlier.

If you would like further information on buying, thawing and cooking turkey please contact your County Extension Office at 648-2311 or drop us a card.

Ample Grapefruit and Winter Pear Supply Anticipated: A record-breaking crop of Florida grapefruit and a larger Texas grapefruit crop are expected this year and should contribute ample supplies of that fruit in markets. William Doyle, fruit marketing official, says that Florida is expecting a record-breaking crop of 55 million boxes 9 percent larger than last season's freeze damaged crop. The Texas grapefruit crop is pegged at 10.5 million boxes, an increase of 57 percent over last season and 33 percent above 1978-80 production. The California-Arizona crop is down 5 percent over last year. The quality of this season's crop is good, Doyle says, but more time is needed for fruit size to increase.

William pears also will be plentiful in December, Doyle says. Though 5 percent less than last season's record production of 244 thousand tons, this season's estimated production is quite large and should guarantee ample supplies throughout most of the shipping season. Oregon expects a crop of 120 thousand tons, about the same as production in 1979 and 1980. Washington State expects 100 thousand tons, 12 percent below last season's 113 thousand tons.

In California prospects point toward a 1981 crop of 11,000 tons - three percent larger than last year and 12 percent larger than 1979 production. The quality of the winter pears is reported to be good.

ZUCCHINI PINEAPPLE RECIPE CAN BE DANGEROUS: A fad recipe that is suppose to make a home-canned pineapple substitute from zucchini squash has the potential to be dangerous. Mae Martha Johnson, Ext. Food Specialist at NMSU recommends that the zucchini pineapple recipe not be used until tests can be made to evaluate the recipe's safety.

There are a number of recipes being used, but the basic ingredients are shredded zucchini squash, some pineapple juice and sugar. Some of the recipes may be safe to use, but preliminary tests how the potential for growth of Clostridium botulinum in other recipes. "Botulism is a deadly form of food poisoning" Mrs. Johnson said. The toxin produced by growth of Clostridium botulinum, if it is present, can be destroyed by boiling the product for 15 to 20 minutes before eating - or even tasting.

The zucchini-pineapple product can be safely canned if it is processed in a pressure canner using the recommended processing time for zucchini. However, the safety of the recipes being used is questionable because they call for water bath processing or open kettle canning.

In open kettle canning, the product is heated to boiling, packed into sterilized jars and sealed with no further processing. NMSU's Coop. Ext. Service recommends open kettle canning only for jellies and jams. All other foods should be processed in a steam pressure or water bath canner, depending on the acidity of the particular food being canned. Anyone who has already canned the zucchini-pineapple product should boil the food for 15 to 20 minutes before tasting. Also, all jars should be examined and those showing any sign of spoilage should be thrown out.

-Now if this isn't enough to do, start thinking about your Turkey dressing for Xmas. My mother and I did the following for Thanksgiving. Maybe it will work for you?
1st Make some good old fashion cornbread. In a large pan put a box and 1/2 of prepared dressing, and mix with the fresh cornbread. Then add another half loaf of whole wheat bread that has been toasted and crumbled up. Toss this together and set aside.
2nd Cut up 4 or 5, large onions and boil in just enough water to keep it from burning. Cook the onions enough to soften and then pour juice and all in to the bread mix-

Now cut up a complete stalk of celery - very fine, and cook like you did the above, then pour it in to the bread mixture. 3rd Cook your Turkey neck - heart and etc. Together until done with 2 cups or more of water. After you have your Turkey partly done - scoop out some juice and pour over dressing. Adding 4 eggs with a little chicken broth. This should be tasting pretty good by now, put it in a pan and bake it for about 30 min. You can season this more if you want it stronger. Ours was good without extra seasoning.
