THIS BUILDING is believed to have been constructed sometime around 1917 or 1918 to house the First National Bank under E.M. Brickley. In 1935, A. E. Huntsinger rented the building to establish a branch of his Vaughn bank, naming it 'Lincoln County Agency'.
On Monday, Dec. 14, Johnson Stearns, president of Carrizozo's Citizens State Bank and his staff conducted business from their brand new quarters nearby. The rest of the crew are: Scott Shafer, executive vice-president; Lillian Swift, assistant cashier; Margaret Barela and Sharon Lueras, tellers; Billie Koller, secretary; Peggy Najjar, Margie Baca, Glorieta Miller and Donna Wood, bookkeepers; Faustino Gallegos, custodian.

In Years Past

At one time there were three banks in Carrizozo, the Lincoln State, Exchange Bank (formerly at White Oaks) and the First National Bank. First National was controlled and managed by E.M. Brickley. The other two banks were forced to close in 1924 and only the First National survived. In late 1935, Brickley decided to move his bank "lock, stock and barrel" to Carlsbad.

On August 16, 1935 the announcement was made that on September 1, 1935 the First National Bank building in Carrizozo would become a branch of the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn under the name of "The Lincoln County Agency".

On September 15, 1935 Brickley left Carrizozo for Carlsbad where he was to establish the "American Bank of Carlsbad". He transferred the assets and liabilities of the Carrizozo bank to his new location.

"Since the bank was opened here it has always enjoyed a large business for a town of this size, but officers felt that the field for the investment of funds has contracted to the extent that they should seek a larger location to expand. However, Mr. Huntsinger has rented the First National Bank building and will open a branch of his Vaughn bank here." - Lincoln County News, August 23, 1935

Ernest Merrill Brickley had been with the First National Bank since its establishment here on October 28, 1917. Brickley, born and reared on a farm in Pennsylvania, obtained a teacher's life certificate in that state, came west in 1909 and entered the banking business at Tucumcari, N.M. Under his guidance the bank in Carrizozo weathered the storms safely in 1923 and "rode the waves" successfully through a heart-breaking period of failures and disaster.

President of the Carrizozo Business Men's Club in 1935, Brickley also served terms on the municipal and county boards of education. At the request of the public organizations in Carrizozo, he took the trusteeship of the Community Hall. At no cost to the

Hall or the town he used all the proceeds of eight county fairs for the payment of indebtedness, repairs and improvements of the building, which is today the site of the Piggly Wiggly store.

Excerpts of Brickley's statement in the NEWS expressing gratitude to the citizens of Lincoln County: "...We believed it would be more profitable to locate in a larger field where we might be able to better employ an invested capital of over \$60,000.00. Besides the grass loans have been largely absorbed by Government and Semi-Government loan agencies...To those who rode with us through storms and sunshines for a greater part or all of eighteen years, we can only say you made it possible for us to survive the roughest financial seas this country has ever known...To the Post at Ft. Stanton, we enjoyed a large volume of business from you, and we paid out at your location more than \$1,000,000.00 cash, with never a "hitch"...I commend to the attention of the Carrizozo schools and the people of Carrizozo, the Community Hall. This property has been of great benefit in the past days, and is too valuable to let go now...To the School Teachers of Lincoln County, we always had from seventy-five to ninety percent of your business, and we have loaned you a lot more money than your financial statements would warrant, but never a note of yours was lost during our eighteen years of business. Aside from dates, the writer never lost anything on a school teacher..."

Lincoln County Agency, branch of Citizens State Bank of Vaughn opened for business on September 9, 1935 in the old Exchange Bank building (Masonic Temple) until the First National building was vacated. Mr. Wayne Zumwalt, born, reared and educated in Lincoln County became the bank's manager. Formerly an assistant cashier with the outgoing First National Bank, he was well acquainted with local needs and problems.

In later years, Raymond E. Lemon of Carrizozo managed the Lincoln County Agency. Lemon once lived in the once-prosperous mining town of White Oaks. His roots stemmed from Kansas. When Lemon was manager of Lincoln County Agency, Huntsinger came to Carrizozo from Vaughn on Fridays and Saturdays to see how Lemon was directing banking affairs in Carrizozo.

Alva E. Huntsinger began his banking career in Fredonia, Kansas in 1912 and worked in the Emporia National Bank until July 5, 1918 when he became a soldier in the U.S. Army, signal corps and was discharged Jan. 19, 1919. Prior to his Army service, Huntsinger had in mind to buy into a small bank and had made inquiries along these lines, getting in touch with a firm in Kansas who had several banks for sale in Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas and other places. They came up with a banker in Vaughn, N.M. that was interested in selling his stock in the bank of Vaughn. With help, Huntsinger was able to buy into the Vaughn bank on March 8, 1919.

He returned to Kansas, to Emporia where he and wife Nellie were united in marriage and they returned to Vaughn. Huntsinger, who retired from banking in 1960, still resides in the same house where he and Nellie lived as newlyweds. Under their guidance and conservative management, the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn grew and prospered, with continuous service since the day they opened for business with the exception of the four day bank moratorium in 1934. This was when every bank in the nation was closed and only those with good management and sufficient resources were allowed to again open.

Many of today's Carrizozo Citizens State Bank customers are sons and daughters, grandsons and granddaughters of the original customers, dating back to the temporary 1935 quarters at the old Exchange Bank and the old Citizens State Bank on 12th Street. This building will be razed in January to become a parking lot for customers and staff of the new Citizens State Bank.

In 1966, Citizens State Bank in Carrizozo held a May 14, 1966 open house for their completely remodeled bank, the building vacated this past week to move into new, spacious, modern quarters nearby. J.S. Stearns, vice president of the bank in 1966, invited the community to attend the big day to celebrate the bank's new look, featuring volcanic cinder panels. Today, Stearns is president of Carrizozo's Citizens State Bank. Stearns, a former Southern Pacific employee, began his banking career with Citizens State Bank in

1948 on a part time basis doing miscellaneous clerical work under the management of R.E. Lemon. Huntsinger was still head man at Vaughn. In 1953, Stearns became a full time assistant cashier in the Vaughn office. He returned in 1957 to Carrizozo to work as town clerk for Carrizozo. In 1961 he was again working for the bank, this time full time in Carrizozo. He became vice president in 1965 and by 1969 he had worked his way up to the presidency.

When Citizens State Bank established roots in Carrizozo as Lincoln County Agency in 1935, Stearns was a junior at Carrizozo High School. He and his wife, Margaret (Shafer) both graduated from this school in 1936. He started working for Southern Pacific that same year. He and Margaret married in 1937. Today they are the parents of three, Bob Stearns and Linda Gibson, who both live in Carrizozo and Judy Glover of Las Cruces. The Stearns have six grandchildren.

Johnson S. Stearns, who was given three last names at birth, was born in a humble little house across the tracks on the south side of Carrizozo. His mother is Pearl Stearns, well-known Nogal resident, who now lives at Good Samaritan Nursing Home in Alamogordo. His father Orsa Stearns died in 1935. The Stearns couple and their children lived in Bonita and then in Nogal Canyon during the summer months. Like many past and present area

families they moved into town during the winter months.

Stearns has been associated with many community organizations, in addition to serving as Carrizozo's mayor for 6 years, beginning in 1968. He is a past president of the local Chamber of Commerce and Board of Education. He was a board member several years for the Soil Conservation Service and chairman of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital once located in Carrizozo. At one time Stearns was a member of the Lincoln Memorial Commission. These are only a few of the many positions he has held. Stearns varied civic service caused him to wonder at times if he is coming or going to a meeting.

Stearns has been preparing all month for a bigger, better open house than the one he hosted in 1966 for the bank's remodeling. At Saturday's grand opening dignitaries will include Robert O. Anderson, Chairman of the Board of Bank Securities, Inc. which is a registered bank holding corporation. A.G. Hamilton, BSI President and Chief Executive Officer, is also expected to be on hand.

Citizens State Bank of Carrizozo is a vital part of an area that once had more cow paths than roads. Forty-six years ago very few people could afford a \$465.00 Chevrolet Standard or a \$435.00 Ford V-8. A Southern Pacific freight train often was the fastest and cheapest means of travel.



A. E. HUNTSINGER arrived in this area of New Mexico in 1919 and bought stock in the Citizens State Bank of Vaughn. Vaughn became a terminal point on the AT&SF Railway in the early 1900's.

Today, George A. Del Curto, Executive Vice-President is in charge at Citizens State Bank of Vaughn. On his crew are Antonia Romero, Dorothy Garcia, Romie Cordova, Lucarol Duran and Roman Paiz.

A branch of Citizens State Bank of Vaughn was established in Estancia in 1961. Today, former Ancho resident, Lee Straley is the Assistant Vice-President there. On his staff are Peggy Myers, Lisa Encinas, Corrine Brazfield, and Marilyn Acosta.

NEWS BRIEFS

Trinity United Methodist Church, 10th and D Streets in Carrizozo will host the fourth annual Community Christmas Concert on Sunday evening, December 20th, at 5:30 p.m.

According to David J. Lynch, host pastor, the program will feature two church choirs and a community choir, a ladies quintette, a mens quintette, a youth orchestra, a piano-organ duet, a violin solo, an oral reading and congregational singing of familiar Christmas carols.

Participating in this annual event are the Assembly of God, Baptist, Catholic, Episcopal and United Methodist Churches. The Concert is open to the public without charge - no offering will be taken.

SANTA FE, NM - Grant proposals for Maternal and Child Health Services, Preventive and other Health Services, Drug Abuse and Alcohol and the Mental Health Block Grants are available at the Carrizozo Courthouse Annex, local county health offices, Health Systems Agency (HSA) sub-area offices and Council of Governments (COG) throughout the state for public inspection during the month of December.

The programs are presently administered by the state Health Services Division and the Behavioral Health Services Division of the Health and Environment Department. Federal funding for the continuation of the programs will be made available through the grant application process in accordance with the Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981. The grant proposals specify how funds will be used to maintain existing health services on a state and local level.

Considered as recipients for federal allocations for the Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant are the Maternal and Child Health Program (MCH), the Crippled Children's Services (CCS), and Supplemental Security Income-Disabled Children's Program (SSI-DCP). Included in the Preventive and Health Services Block Grant are general statewide public health services, fluoridation services, hypertension services, health education, risk reduction, and emergency medical services.

Public comment and concern will be taken into consideration for modifications and revisions of the reports. Written comments should be submitted to Danielle Wilson, Health Planning Director for the Health & Environment Department, P.O. Box 968, Santa Fe, NM 87504-0968.

Low income households in New Mexico will again be able to receive help with utility bills through the Governor's Office of Community Affairs and local community action agencies.

A total of \$7 million is available for distribution around the state, which is about 25 per cent less than what was available last year. It is anticipated that about 32,000 households will receive help with energy bills with these funds.

Persons wishing to apply for assistance should contact their local community action program. If they are in doubt about where to apply, the toll-free number to the community affairs office in Santa Fe is 1-800-432-2010.

DALLAS - The U.S. Labor Department has awarded a contract to Teledyne Economic Development Company of Los Angeles to administer the Roswell, N.M. Job Corps Center for two years beginning December 15, 1981.

The contract provides \$2,023,659 for the first year of administration and \$2,070,000 for the second year. It may be negotiated for an additional year.

Armando Quirox, Southwest regional job corps director, said Teledyne's proposal was selected from submissions from four competing companies.

The Roswell Job Corps Center is located on the campus of Eastern New Mexico State University and was previously operated by the university.

Job Corps trainees must be between the ages of 16 and 21 and come from underprivileged families. They are provided with lodging, food and medical care and may receive up to \$100 per month while in training.

Snake Snacks

Last week's column 'News n' Notes' by our Lincoln County Home Economist stated that they have a new booklet, 'Handling and Cooking Snake'. In addition to including a good recipe it has a section on dressing rattlesnake. The interesting booklet lists rattlesnake in the same category as fish and frog legs. I have read somewhere that snake makes a 'mouth-watering meal', but I have never talked with someone who has actually cooked and eaten snake. I would like to hear from Post Script readers who have eaten this meat. Does it really taste like chicken?

While at the Extension Office I picked up my copy of 'A Preliminary Checklist of Birds and Mammals, Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch.' In 1963, the Agricultural Experiment Station of NMSU signed an agreement with the BLM for use of the area as a livestock, wildlife and range research station. County Agent Barry Herd obtained a copy of this informative booklet for me and he may have identical copies.

The extension office has all sorts of booklets free to the public. Agents in each N.M. county area as near as your telephone. Professionals of the Cooperative Extension Service are trained in agriculture and resource development, 4-H and youth development, and home economics.

What's Cooking

Here's what's cooking - Carrot Cookies. The recipe is from the White Oaks kitchen of Maggie Bohks: Cream three-fourths cup shortening or butter and three-fourths cup granulated sugar. Beat in 1 egg. Add and mix well, 1 cup cooked, unsalted, mashed carrots; 2 teaspoons vanilla, 2 cups sifted flour; 1 teaspoon salt; half a cup chopped pecans. Drop dough by teaspoons on greased baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees oven 10 to 12 minutes. Cool and frost.

To make Orange Frosting: Cream half a box of powdered sugar with 3 tablespoons margarine. Add graded rind of one orange, and 1 teaspoon orange extract and enough orange juice to make a frosting that spreads easily.

Hand Fashioned

Mr. and Mrs. Terry Strickland are awaiting for their new double wide trailer house which is to be delivered this week.



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

Remove from heat; stir half of the hot mixture gradually into egg yolk. Blend into hot mixture in saucepan. Boil and stir 1 minute; remove from heat. Stir in margarine and rum; cool. Beat whipping cream until stiff; fold into sauce. Store in refrigerator.
