Carrizozo C of C Holds First 1982 Meeting

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce met for their first regular meeting of 1982 in the 'Community Room' located at Citizens State Bank. Opening remarks by Chamber president W.A. Schlegel included the recognition of the Christmas decoration contest committee. In charge of the yuletide project were Dr. James P. Miller, Jr., Phyllis Schlegel and Fr. Dave Bergs.

The George Vega and W.D. LaMay homes tied in first place in the residential category, each entrant receiving a \$20 gift certificate. Third place honors and a \$10 gift certificate went to the Neo Vallejos household. Chamber business members will honor the certificates. An engraved wooden plaque was awarded to Santa Rita Catholic Church for winning first place in the commercial category of the contest. Awards were presented Dec 29 at the CSB Community Room.

Tuesday's agenda included discussion of a Chamber meeting place and time. Schlegel stated that the executive committee decided that the membership should choose the meeting location. The group agreed that CSB Community Room is the ideal site because the place is centrally located within the town. In the past the noon luncheon meetings have been held at the Four Winds Restaurant and at the REA building last month.

Chamber meeting date was resolved. It was pointed out that the first week of the month is a very busy time for business people, including those in the banking field. Meeting day will now be scheduled for the second Tuesday of each month.

'Brown bagging' and cold cut style meals were discussed. This month's noon meal of burgers and potato salad was catered by Paul's Place at \$3.50 per member. The suggestion was made to rotate the catering business among the local establishments. The final decision was left up to the executive committee.

Chamber committee people gave progress reports. Scott Shafer, on behalf of the local airport committee told the group that the town's airport business is doing well. Shafer said that a letter of appreciation had been written concerning the facility. He said that town policeman, Guy Brown, who is the airport's manager, may be contacted at Wetzel's Feed Store when he is not on duty or at home. In addition, Shafer said that he (Shafer), Leon "Hoot" Gibson or Dale Goad are also able to assist pilots in the event that Brown is not available.

In other Chamber discussion, Shafer said that he had stopped at Santa Rosa's Chamber of Commerce office recently and that they have on hand brochures on Carrizozo. Shafer informed fellow members at Tuesday's meeting that Santa Rosa has regular hours at their place located on main street. Shafer learned that they are able to do so because the Santa Rosa Chamber of Commerce operates on funds generated from 'Lodger's Tax', plus a monetary contribution from the municipality. There is no 'Lodger's Tax' in existence in Carrizozo. David Lynch, representing the Chamber, will inquire about local 'Lodger's Tax' at this month's meeting.

Signs no longer valid, but erected throughout the town were questioned by Chamber member, Phyllis Schlegel. She suggested that the still sturdy signs could be put to good use. She proposed replacing the misleading information with suitable messages. Lynch will bring the matter up before the town council next Monday night, January 11.

Medicare Amounts Go Up

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first receives hospital inpatient services in a benefit period, will increase to \$260 in 1982. Don Austin Social Security district manager in Roswell, said recently. The 1981 deductible was \$204.

Also scheduled to increase are the per-day amounts patients are responsible for after specified lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility. Austin said.

After 60 days of inpatient hospital care in a benefit period in 1982, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$65 a day. The 1981 figure was \$51.

For each reserve day of inpatient care, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$130 a day. The 1981 figure was \$102.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered costs except \$32.50 a day. The 1981 figure was \$25.50.

The Medicare medical insurance annual deductible is also scheduled to increase in 1982, the first increase since 1973. The 1982 annual medical insurance deductible will be \$75, up from \$60. Medical insurance generally pays 80 percent of the approved costs or charges for covered services and supplies after a person incurs covered charges equaling the annual deductible.

The W.C.F. announces that on Tuesday, Jan 12, 1982 at 7:00pm at the Assembly of God Church a slide presentation on a trip to Israel will be given by Arlene and Ira Bogard of Ruidoso, NM.

Representatives from the Regional Housing Authority of Region VI, New Mexico, will be in Carrizozo, New Mexico to take applications for the HUD Section 8 Rent Subsidy Program. This program assists low-income families in making their monthly rental payments.

The income limit is \$14,900 a year for a family of four. Any citizen who thinks they will qualify for assistance is encouraged to apply at the Welfare Dept. in Carrizozo on Wednesday, January 6, 1982 at 10:30am. Applications are taken on a first come, first serve basis. Also any landlord who is interested in possibly participating in the program and would like more information is encouraged to contact the representatives.

With many N.M. businesses planning layoffs in Jan., best news many workers is an increase in New Mexico's maximum weekly unemployment benefit. Employment Security Department Secretary Louis R. Bachicha today announced the maximum weekly benefit during 1982 will be \$130, up from \$117 in 1981.

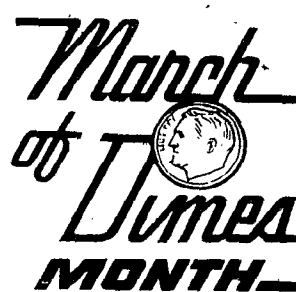
Bachicha noted the new maximum benefit will apply only to claims filed in 1982, weekly benefit amounts will not be increased on claims filed during 1981. Under New Mexico law, a claimant who earned more than

\$3,354 during the highest paid quarter of the base period and at least \$4,192.51 in covered employment altogether during the base year would qualify for the new maximum.

The new minimum benefit will be \$26, compared with \$24 in 1981. That amount will go to claimants with higher quarter earnings between \$671.32 and \$676 and total earnings in covered employment during the base year between \$839.15 and \$845.

Under New Mexico law, the maximum weekly benefit during any calendar year is fifty per cent of the state's average weekly wage for work covered by the state Unemployment Compensation Law during the year ending the preceding June 30. The minimum is set at ten percent of that average wage. The average weekly wage during New Mexico Fiscal 1981 was \$258.23, almost \$25 higher than the 1980 average of \$233.64.

Youth representatives from high schools around the state will present regional reports to a joint session of the New Mexico State

Legislature on January 11, 1982 at 11:00am in the House Chambers. The youth reports were developed as part of seven conferences entitled 'New Mexico Youth in the 80's' held around the state in November and December of this year. The young people will offer their viewpoint on the issues and concerns affecting children and youth during the next decade and their ideas for resolution of problems.

Topics include drug & alcohol abuse, youth unemployment, cultural and age bias, family breakup and violence, lack of recreation, relevant school curriculum and youth input into policy making.

This project was developed and implemented through a grant from the federal Health and Human Services Department when President Reagan cancelled the White House Conference on Children and Youth earlier this year.

The couple honeymooned in Albuquerque and plan to move to Burmannton, Washington in Mid-January.

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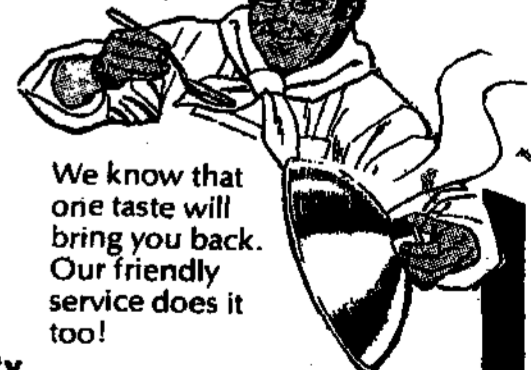

If you are feeling pressure to perform and produce more at work and especially if you supervise others, you should consider enrolling in a Stress Management workshop to be held in Albuquerque Jan. 19 and 20.

The workshop which is sponsored by the University of New Mexico Management Development Center, will be held from 8:30am to 5pm each day at the Sheraton Old Town Inn. Among the topics to be

discussed at the workshop are the sources and consequences of stress, stress in the individual and in the organization, measuring and reducing stress, and action planning for stress management. Enrollment for this program will be limited to stimulate individual involvement and to encourage discussion of problems and techniques with instructors and other participants, said John Warner, director of the center.

"A wide range of instructional techniques and instruments will be used during the workshop to insure the greatest value in skill building and managerial application," he added.

The fee for the program is \$245, which includes all program materials, luncheons and refreshments, but excludes lodging. A 10-percent discount is automatically available to any organization sending three or more people.

Expenses incurred for continuing management education may be tax deductible if undertaken to maintain and improve professional skills, Warner said. This includes tuition, travel, meals and lodging.

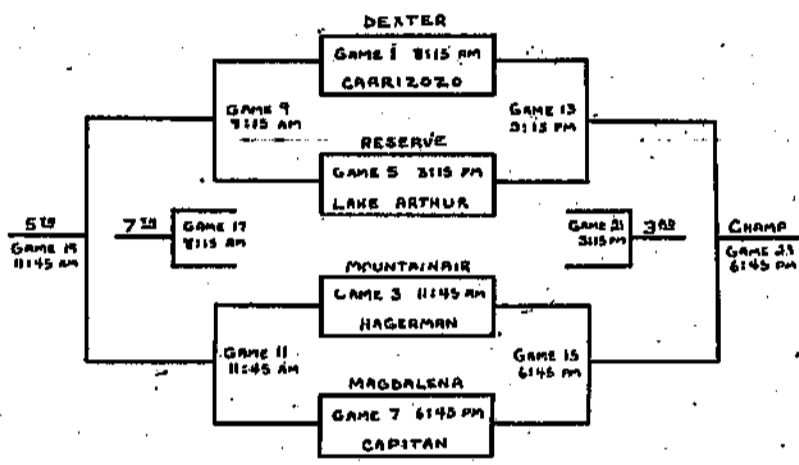

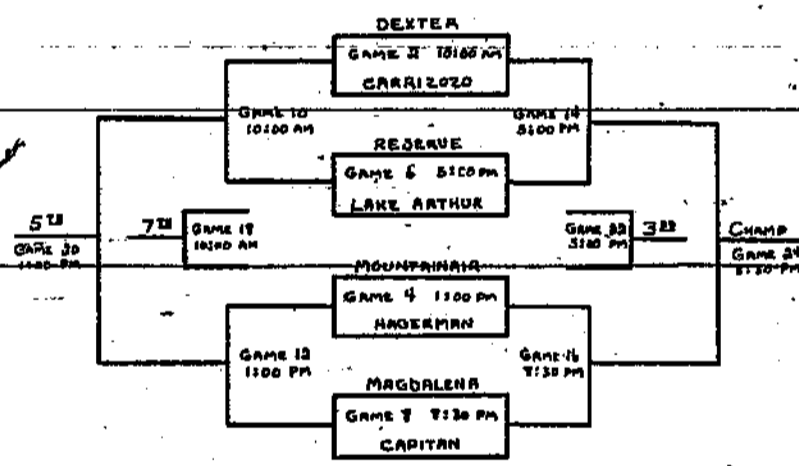

National Forest News
Snow covered Sierra Blanca is a welcome sight to winter sports enthusiasts, ranchers, businessmen, and all who love a beautiful view. Smokey Bear and Cloudercroft Ranger Districts received from 6 to 12 inches of snow this past week, indicating an upswing in winter sports activities and in needed moisture. Bow hunters will be on the Forest January 2-10.
Smokey Bear Ranger District at Ruidoso received 12 inches of fresh snow in the high country. Trails into White Mountain Wilderness Area have snow on them, and days and nights are very cold. Three Rivers Campground is open. Hikers and winter campers should be prepared for inclement weather. Roads are generally in good condition, but icy in shaded areas. Fuelwood areas are muddy and inaccessible.
Skiing at Sierra Blanca Ski area is rated as fair on upper mountain, and as excellent on lower mountain. Lifts and trails are open daily. Current skiing conditions can be checked by calling 257-9001 at Sierra Blanca, or 682-2587 at Cloudercroft.
Cloudercroft Ranger District received 6 to 10 inches of new snow last weekend, and Ski Cloudercroft is open with very good conditions. The entire Cloudercroft area is excellent for cross-country skiing. The Apache Loop Cross-country Trail will officially open January 15, but can be used now. Trail maps are available at the Cloudercroft Ranger Station and at the Forest Supervisor's Office in Alamogordo.
Silver Snowplay Area is open for sledding and tubing. Upper Karr Canyon, 8 miles south of Cloudercroft on Sunspot Road (FM 84) is open, and a snowmobile outfitter-guide is renting equipment in the parking area. A private tubing slope and snowmobile rental is located approximately 5 miles south of Cloudercroft on the Sunspot Road. Paved roads are open, but may have patches of snow. All fuelwood areas are closed due to snow and muddy roads.
