Exterior of Lincoln Church Restored

Restoration of the exterior of Lincoln's San Juan Church recently was completed by the Museum of New Mexico.

Time, weather and neglect had taken their toll on the 1887 church, one of several 19th century buildings at Lincoln State Monument. The church's tin roof and wooden trim had deteriorated, and plaster on the walls had fallen away in some places to expose adobe bricks.

Under the restoration project, the corrugated tin roof was replaced and the walls were replastered using a rough cast technique to duplicate the original texture. Braces were installed in the attic to support the roof, and the wood trim was replaced and painted to match the original design and color.

Now that the exterior work has been completed, restoration of the interior will begin. Funds for the church project and for minor repairs elsewhere at the monument are from a \$100,000 state appropriation, sponsored in 1981 by Rep. John Bigbee, R. Guadalupe-DeBaca-Torrance.

The project architect was William E. Burk III of Albuquerque, and the contractor was James Waide of Roswell.

In the late 1800s, Catholics of the Rio Bonito Valley worshipped in a building which had been Lincoln's dance hall and temporary courthouse. By 1886, the congregation decided to build a church, donating labor, materials and limited cash. Roof beams were cut from trees in the nearby Capitan Mountains, and more than 19,000 adobe bricks were made at the construction site.

Lincoln's peak population of 450 begins to decline after the county seat moved in 1913 to Carrizozo. When the parish headquarters followed the county offices to Carrizozo a few years later, San Juan was served by a visiting cleric.

By the late 1960s, the population of Lincoln had dropped to about 50 people. The church was then sold to the state of New Mexico in 1973.

'Full Circle'

A young man with much artistic talent grew up in the ranching country of west Texas, roaming the wide open spaces and later followed the rodeo circuit. All this time this young man kept active in artist work but really didn't get serious about using his God-given talent.

Then he graduated from high school and about this time he arrived at the decision that would shape his life. He entered Texas Tech. After 5 years he graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree with a major in Drawing and a minor in Ceramics and Sculpture.

Who is this young man? Bill McLure who lives in the old Snow house at 312-10th St., Carrizozo. This young man (mid-thirties) was an artist apprentice to a well known western artist and sculptor, graduated from college, received a Master of Arts degree from East Texas State and spent an additional year at Southern Methodist studying Visual Communications.

It was there in Dallas where Bill really got into the more sophisticated art work. He entered competitive shows, had exhibitions, did commission work and also free-lanced. His work while in Dallas ranged from large outside murals to displays for trade fairs, letterheads, cartoons and also illustrated work. In addition, Bill worked on stage sets and props for the Dallas Summer Musicals. This work included several productions over the years he was in Dallas but the most memorable to him was the production of "The King and I." He also worked on the MGM movie productions of "The Seniors" and "Bonnie and Clyde."

After twelve years in Dallas a desire to return in thought and work to a former time in Bill's life set in and he gradually returned to cowboys and cowboy life related works of art. Since Bill was traveling a great deal between his studio in Dallas and a foundry in Santa Fe, N.M., he chose our fair city as the most logical place to anchor his new studio. He did this on August, 1981.

Since Bill arrived in Carrizozo he still freelances and does some commercial work. His major interest, however, is in sculpting and the fine arts, primarily in the western motif. His first major work since last August was a sculpture of a cowboy that just arrived in town and is heading for a "watering hole" called the Jersey Lily and that is the name of that piece of work. Right now he's working on a small, beautiful piece called "God's Dogs." These dogs are better known as coyotes. He also has a bust of an Indian nearing completion.

Bills work has been purchased by collectors from Arizona to New York. He also has work displayed for sale in Midland, Tx. and closer to home at the Silver Dollar in Tinnie. Bill prefers sculpting and he uses the "Lost Wax" process. If you don't know what that is don't feel bad but stop by 312-10 St. and see his beautiful work. You'll enjoy talking to Bill because by his own admission he still has a lot of little boy in him.

Legislative--

Changes in Medicare

Medicare beneficiaries should be aware of changes in the law that affect the amount they must pay for the cost of hospital care.

Beneficiaries who receive more than 60 days of hospital care during a benefit period, or who receive more than 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility during a benefit period, must pay part of the daily cost of their care. Under the old law, the amounts they were required to pay were based on the hospital insurance deductible that was in effect when the benefit period started. This was true even if the care was received after a new deductible became effective.

Under the new law, the Medicare beneficiary is responsible for the current year's daily amounts, even if the benefit period has not ended. Thus, a person whose benefit period started in 1981 and who required more than 60 days of hospital care or more than 20 days of skilled nursing facility care that extended into 1982, will have to pay part of the daily cost of care based on the 1982 hospital insurance deductible.

Another change in the law that affects Medicare beneficiaries is the elimination of the "carryover rule" for medical insurance. Under the old law, any covered medical insurance expenses incurred by a beneficiary during the last 3 months of a year that counted toward the annual deductible for that year, also counted toward the deductible for the following year. This carryover rule no longer applies.

Still another change effective in 1982 increases the annual deductible for medical insurance under Medicare from \$60 to \$75. As a result, a person must incur \$75 in approved charges for doctor's bills or other covered expenses in 1982 before Medicare will begin paying 80 percent of the approved charges for the remainder of the year.

Q When can a person enroll for medical insurance under the Medicare program?

A A person who does not sign up for medical insurance when he or she first has the opportunity to do so, or who drops the coverage, can enroll only during the first 3 months of the year. Protection will begin the following July 1.

Q My mother has substantial

medical expenses. What portion will Medicare pay under medical insurance?

A Beginning in 1982, Medicare will pay 80 percent of approved charges after the beneficiary has insured \$75 in approved charges for doctors' bills or other covered medical expenses.
