### Nogal rancher 'lowers boom'

### Miners, others locked out of wilderness

By Lulynne Streeter For roughly 100 years a road has run up Dry Gulch to the historic Helen Ray and American gold mines near Nogal, NM Long before it was designated Forest

Road 583, long before Fern Sawyer owned the land it crosses, and long before Ron Hesse filed his placer claim that he calls Excaliber, the road was used by cattlemen and miners alike.

Today the road not only leads to the mines and private and leased grazing lands, it and Forest Road 580 also lead to the vast White Mountain Wilderness Area They are the only entry roads to

He has been mining in Dry Gulch since the winter of 1979. when he leased a claim from Sharp and lived in a pup tent with his cat. About two years ago Hesse was able to file his own placer claim on 20 acres of National Forest close to Road 583. Since placer claim regulations prohibit erecting permanent living quarters on unpatented mining claims, Hesse said he moved a small camper trailer onto the claim. He noted that he had used 583 and the gate without any

He expressed some surprise when he returned home one evening just before Thanksgiving and found the gate locked and the Forest Service road signs removed.

### **Commissioners adopt** road, personnel policies

The Nov. 23 special meeting of Lincoln County commissioners was devoted primarily to personnel and road policy.

Commissioners adopted Ordinance 82-2 which establishes rules for private persons, companies and corporations who wish to perform work on any county road. The new ordinance requires that any private party, company or corporation can do work on a county road if a permit is first secured from Guy Henley, county road superintendent. Too, title to all improvements remains with the county, and any damage done to any county road must be repaired according the road superintendent's specifications. The superintendent is empowered to inspect all work being done.

The ordinance was considered important because Henley reports he has had to repair roads after utility companies had cut them up to install lines, and that private property owners had installed culverts improperly, which resulted in flooding on other people's property.

Changes were made in county personnel policy with adoption of Ordinance 82-1. Deleted from the policy was a requirement that most county employees be required to have a high school diploma or GED. Left standing is the policy of evaluating performances of county employees each year by department heads, two weeks prior to an employee's anniversary date. County Manager Suzanne Cox said that this policy is helpful in determining promotions, pay raises or dismissals of employees.

One change is that specific procedures will be set up in the firing of employees, except in cases of insurbordination or illegal activity where dismissal is mandatory. The grievance board will be made up of one elected official one employee and three persons who are not employees of the county. This replaces a board made up of elected officials only.

County employees will be entitled to an accrual of 100 days sick leave, but the policy of permitting employees to take sick leave in order to care for ill family members was rescinded.

New personnel policy permits cost-of-living pay raises, but does not provide for raises on the basis of merit.

Commissioners also awarded bids to two companies for data processing equipment. IBM of Roswell was awarded a \$74,159 contract for a System 34 computer. Triadic Enterprises of Deming was awarded the computer software contract on a bid of \$44,000. A previous contract for the equipment, awarded to Western Programmers of Albuquerque on a lease-purchase basis, was rescinded when the county manager was notified that the firm was not authorized to do business under state contract.

### Means ready to sue over store break-in

Ken Means, through his attorney James R. Askew of Capitan, has filed a complaint with the Town of Carrizozo and County of Lincoln regarding the handling of the recent burglary of Means-Gambles

The complaint, according to Askew, alleges that if an officer had been on duty the night of the burglary Means would not have lost about \$3,000 in merchandise. including guns, and that if the county's radio dispatcher had not been negligent the burglars would have been apprehended with the stolen goods.

The complaint further alleges that Mayor Harold Garcia reported noise of the breakin at Gambles to the dispatcher, and that Officer Guy Brown could have responded to the dispatcher's call had he been on duty as he should have been. In early Sunday morning breakin, Johnny Morales was arrested along with a juvenile. A third and unidentified

youth remains at large. The rifles were not recovered, and the case against Morales subsequently dismissed.

Askew said the law requires that a complaint be filed against a town or county before a lawsuit will be filed to recover approximately \$3,000 in uninsured merchandise taken from the


The main office of the Ruidoso State Bank in Ruidoso was robbed Monday by a lone gunman who escaped with an unspecified amount of money.







From 2 to 4 p.m. there were not only wall-to-wall people in the


living room and kitchen, but fence to fence people in the front yard as their numbers increased to more than 100.

a I AM neither a member of the Ku Klux Klan nor a sympathizer. I find everything about the outfit repulsive. What I can't understand is why people and civil rights organizations want a law to prohibit them from having their silly little marches, as happened in Washington, DC, a few days ago. Surely the Klan is no greater threat to freedom, decency, and the American Way of Life than is the Communist Party USA.. But have you ever heard of anyone, anywhere, denying their right to peacefully parade? People who want to silence bigots forget that the same laws that protect Klan marches also protects parades and demonstrations by Communists, homosexuals, the American Legion, religious and civil rights groups. If the law doesn't apply to the Klan it doesn't apply to any other group, whether they're protesting anything or not." Freedom of speech and assembly apply equally to all of us. When the American Nazi Party marched in Skokie, Illinois, in 1977 it was a black judge who upheld their constitutional right to do so after having been denied a permit to march. Democracy shines brightest when confronted by something the majority finds objectionable.

• I HAVE waded through a platitudinous report by Henry Kissinger, who pontificates in gutteral statesmanspeak in Newsweek magazine in an article titled "How to Deal with Moscow." This egotistical protege of David Rockefeller, with his out-sized political ambition, had a perfectly levely opportunity to "deal with Moscow" when he served as the undistinguished US Secretary of State in the Nixon Administration — and he didn't. Now, armed with 20-20 hindsight he admonished President Reagan that he must "bring about a genuine change - expressed in substantial reciprocal arms reduction and restraint in international conduct -- (which) requires American leadership founded in firm purpose, clear concept and steadfast strategy . . . " He never gets more specific than that generalized garbage. The reading public, in spite of its faults, deserves better than Henry's meaningless rhetoric. I feel "right" about reading it, however, because it bolsters a conviction of long standing that Henry is a horse's ass. Still, I could have devoted those two hours to reading Poor Boys Cook Book, which is entertaining, readable and informational, and which deals with Moscow as effectively as does Henry the Hindsight.

GOV. GRUCE King is such a bright guy I can't believe there's any truth in the story they tell about him. One of his constituents asked the governor what he thought of the Lebanese situation. "The way I see it." King replied thoughtfully, "anything that goes on between two consenting adults is..."

THE STATE of California, bankrupt as it is, recently voted to pay \$5,000 in back wages to Japanese-Americans who were fired from their state jobs following Pearl Harbor and the US declaration of war on Japan. This month, or early in 1983, the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians is expected to recommend to Congress that it pay every Japanese-American who was relocated from the West Coast Defense Zone in World War II, the sum of \$25,000. If Congress goes for this boundoggle, taxpayers will have to pay an estimated \$10 billion to the aggrieved Japanese-Americans. One question: How much money will veterans of the war against Japan be given for fighting and dying at the hands of Japanese soldiers during the same time these Japanese-Americans were being "inconvenienced"?

 THE CONTINUING Saga of There's-Nothing-Wrong-With-The-Economy: Recently, we carried a story about unemployment in Lincoln County. The next week we carried a story that dozens of jobs are going unfilled at Ft. Stanton Hospital. Now we have the real capper. The US Immigration and Naturalization Service recently launched Project Jobs by rounding up 5,440 illegal aliens at 560 different work sites around the country and sent them home. It was hoped that their jobs would be taken by unemployed Americans, over which the nation is engaged in handwringing and demands President Reagan "do something." Project Jobs bombed. Unemployed Americans, it was found, are unwilling to take jobs held by illegals because they pay only an average of \$4.61 an hour and are beneath an American's dignity. The Wall Street Journal reported Monday that 28 employers, chosen at random, said Americans who took the illegal aliens' jobs left within days because they considered them "dead-end, demeaning and underpaying." The Journal interviewed 19 workers who left these jobs because they "had a backup source of support such as welfare or family." Comments Wayne Cornelius, head of the center for US-Mexican studies, University of California, San Diego: "The attitude (of Americans refusing aliens' jobs) is, this is the dirty work of society and that people born, brought up and educated in the US shouldn't have to do them." Well, la-de-da! Living off relatives or going on welfare isn't "demeaning, dead-end and underpaying!" If we expect to get the essential work done in this country, we obviously have to bring back the illegal aliens and give them back their \$4.61 an hour jobs. Meanwhile, let's hear more sob stories about the horrors of unemployed workers, and about how that nasty Mr. Reagan won't supply jobs as bank and corporate presidents for a bunch of clabberheads who would rather have nothing than something. Congress is debating a 5-cent raise in the federal gasoline tax this week to put 300,000 unemployed Americans to work repairing the nation's highways. That work is probably as demoning for these potential brain surgeons. The work on highways is hard, and tends to soil hands and clothing. Too, it might jeopardize the unemployed's social positions.

TWO WEEKS ago Soviet leader Yuri Andropov warned the US that we would be making a terrible mistake by pursuing President Reagan's MX missile cluster program in Wyoming. So, on Dec. 7, anniversary of the "Day of Intamy" bombing of Pearl Harbor by the Japanese, Congress acceded to Andropov's desires and voted not to fund the MX missile, thus delighting the Russians who can now continue to increase their lead in nuclear warheads pointed at the US for "peaceful purposes." This bowing to Soviet wishes by Democrats is something you might like to remember if we have another election.



### Cities: the outstretched palms

Once upon a time when a city wanted a street, sewer plant, park, school or library the city council put the question to residents. If residents approved, bonds were voted to finance the project. Residents, in turn, were texed to retire the bonds.

This country reached greatness under such a plan. Then revenue sharing was born. Most forms of American life became centralized in Washington. Cities that toed the political line got handsome grants from the federal government. Those that did not soon wised up. Once they stripped themselves of any responsibility for their own institutions, they prospered beyond belief since their bills were being paid by everybody in the country.

Now comes President Reagan, who wants cities (states, too) to go back to the plan of paying for their own needs, and alarm and indignation broke out across the land.

Last week 4,200 mayors and councilmen met to plead with the president to keep the dole coming, else their cities would deteriorate and be bankrupted. Not one suggested they might resume paying their own bills.

Seattle Mayor Charles Royer sald revenue sharing was ''mother's milk for cities,' implying that the withdrawn breast would cause Seattle to die. Others said taxes would have to be increased locally from 25 to 45 percent without revenue sharing. Perish the thought!

Standing hip-deep in the combined tears of 4,200 supplicants the president wavered and said he would consider full funding of the \$4,6 billion program for the next two years, so that cities wouldn't have to pay for the things they want.

Cities and states are like people. Once they tap the treasury they lose incentive to do for themselves.

Oddiy, these mayors seldom pass up a chance to make speeches extolling the virtues of free en terprise, private initiative, self-sufficiency, personal and civic responsibility and the American Way in the Horatio Alger tradition.

What the president should have done, we think, is stick to his guns and compel cities to face their own financial problems instead of whining, wheedling and crawling to the federal government, tin cup in hand, for charity.

### Bad news for coyotes; 1080 ban may be lifted

WASHINGTON — Administrative law judge Spencer Nissen's recommendation that the Environmental Protection Agency lift its 10-year ban on Compound 1060 coyote poison has been welcomed by the office of Rep. Joe Skeen (R., NM), who is himself a sheep rancher.

Judge Nissen's decision came after six months of hearings and means that, if there are no appeals made within 20 days, Compound 1080 (sodium fluoracciate) can be used once

"But we expect there will be appeals," said Lucy Schwartz of Pacific Legal Foundation, which represented the New Mexico Woolgrowers and the New Mexico Cattlemen's Association.

Schwartz noted that EPA regulations specify that this decision will be final if nobody appeals within 20 days. Opponents of the use of Compound 1080 included Allen Smith of the Defenders of Wildlife, who commented:

"The judge clearly called out that there are problems with 1080 in the field and that it's an extremely lethal poison with no known antidote."

But Schwartz, whose office distributes such bumper stickers as: EAT LAMB, 50,000 COYOTES CAN'T BE WRONG, retorted: "There are lots of chemicals in the environment with no known artidote.

Judge Nissen called upon the EPA to allow the use of Compound 1060 in toxic collars. These poison containers, operating something like a money belt, are now being put around the necks of sheep as well as lambs, which are most vulnerable to the marauding coyotes. When the coyote's fangs tear at the lamb's throat, the poison is released and the coyote dies instead of the lamb.

A spokesman for Rep. Skeen's office said that there is no known instance where rams bite the necks of ewes while mating — as stallions bite the necks of mares.

Judge Nissen also recommended that in place of the practice of injecting an entire horse, cow or sheep carcass with poison, that small pieces of meat be injected by certified applicators from the Animal Damage Control division of the Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service. Such small pieces of meat could be placed in remote areas known to be frequented by coyotes.

The ban on Compound 1060 went into effect under the Nixon Administration in 1972, despite the strong protests from sheepmen and cattlemen all over the West.

At the White House, during one of the first energy crisis meetings, Rhode Island's Sen. John Pastore noted with a grin that the energy shortage has its blessings — on the New England sweater industry, for example.

"What are you going to do," asked Wyoming's Sen. Cliff Hanson, "when the coyotes have eaten all of the sheep?"

That day during the really White House news briefing, I asked Nixon News Secretary Ron Ziegler: "What is the President's coyote policy?"

THE WHITE HOUSE: The President believes that the coyotes should not eat the sheep. (Loud laughter from the press.)

QUESTION: How does Mr. Nixon believe they should be inhibited from eating the sheep? You've banned 1000; does he believe in denning? Or tracing them down by helicopter? Or what?

THE WHITE HOUSE: The President believes that the coyotes should be persuaded not to est the sheep. (Loud laughter—and the end of the briefing, as Ziegler fled to his office.)

In the Black Hills of South Dakota, a number of sheepmen organized STAR (RATS, spelled backwards) "in order to come to the defense of that nationally endangered species, the urban rat" — several of which were caught, boxed and mailed to the White House.

Rep. Skeen's office conceded that the coyote is very popular with environmental groups and Easterners, because it is "clever as hell and howls impressively at the moon." But the coyote isn't attractive at all when you see what one of them has done to the newborn lambs of your own flock. Take one look at the throat of a dead lamb that has been torn out by a coyote and realize that if it weren't for coyotes, the sheep population would be 14 million

today instead of 12 million.
"We don't know how many coyotes there are. But we noted that last year news reports from California mentioned that a coyote had gotten loose in Los Angeles and made off with a baby."


the Grizzlies. As a team the Grizzlies shot 21 percent from the free throw line and made 34 percent of their field shots.

The A and B boys team and the girls B team will play Corona Thursday, Dec. 9, in Carrizozo, beginning at 5 p.m.




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

#### COOKIE JAR TREAT

Prehent oven to 350 gegrees. Sift flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt.



### Bishops' freeze would have denounced JFK

WASHINGTON — New
Orleans's Catholic Archbishop
Philip Hannan may be remembered as having given the very
moving eulogy at the funeral of

President John F. Kennedy.
Archbishop Hannan has now charged that President Kennedy would have been denounced, had the Catholic bishops during his presidency issued anything like the proposed pastoral letter endorsing a nuclear freeze. During an interview, Hannan told this

column:

"He (Kennedy) issued a
threat to the Russians, in order to
settle the Cuban missile crisis. He
did what this proposed letter
implies would be wrong. He made
a direct threat."

Q: What about the Archbishop of Seattle and the Bishop of Saginaw. Michigan, who have suggested that surrender would be preferable to any use of nuclear weapons?

ARCHBISHOP HANNAN:
That's completely at variance with our theology. For instance, Archbishop Hunthausen (of Seattle) says that Christ commands us simply to allow anything to happen to us rather than use weapons. Christ didn't command that at all. To me, that is poor theology.

The Archbishop went on to note: "The German bishops have not condemned the presence of nuclear weapons in their country. The French bishops sent a representative priest here from (the Paris newspaper) Figaro. And he came up and complimented my position highly and said that this is very necessary to say. The fact that our statement will have a very great influence on the freedom of Western Europe will, in my opinion, change the bishops in their thinking."

Archbishop Hannan was then asked about the considerable influence in the formulation of this proposed letter of a priest at national headquarters named Bryan Hehir. (Father Hehir is described by Catholic lay theologian Michael Novak as one of the most powerful people in the Catholic Church.)

Father Hehir is exceptionally clever. For this proposed freeze letter was given to the press just one week before the national elections.

"I haven't spoken with him," replied Hannan. "But to me, this is like people in an ivory tower speaking about a realistic world—without participating in that realistic world. . . They do not remember tht World War II won back Europe's freedom and protected our freedom, too. They do not remember that we engaged in a solemn contract, the NATO treaty, to preserve freedom, They haven't considered that at all."

Chicago's Archbishop Joseph Bernardin attracted enormous media coverage by telling a press conference that the bishops will not be "intimidated" by a letter from President Reagan's National Security Councilor William Clark, in which Judge Clark, a Catholic layman, disagreed with the proposed pastoral.

During a later press con-

ference, this column asked:

"Do you believe, considering the Holy Father and other Polish bishops who live under unquestionably intimidating governments, that it is realistic to describe Judge Clark's letter as 'intimidating' — or is such use of the word a trifle melodramatic?"

The President of the Conference of Bishops, Archbishop John Roach of Minneapolis, replied:

"Did some one say it was intimidating?"

Q: Yes, sir. It was on page one of one of our local dailies (The Washington Post) that one of your more distinguished prelates said, "We will not be intimidated."

ARCHBISHOP ROACH: No, I don't think it (the letter) was. I hope that his letter was an attempt to assist us in our dialogue; as we try to assist them.

We then asked: "Has anyone on the White House staff, to your knowledge, suggested that the

release of your second draft of this letter — just one week before a national election — was an attempt by Father Hehir and some of the bishops to intimidate the White House?"

ARCHBISHOP ROACH: Well, I hope they are no more easily intimidated than we are (Laughter) No, that kind of language I would not include.

Later in this news conference, we asked this ranking Catholic prelate in the US:

"A headline in a local daily this morning affirmed that the US bishops are 'standing firm' on this issue. In the event this pastoral letter is passed in essentially this form, will your stance on this pastoral be any firmer than your opposition to contraception and to the ordination of women to the priesthood? Or will it be less firm?

ARCHBISHOP ROACH: Well, I think they are pretty separate questions? (Laughter)

Q: Well, you are certainly firm on contraception and regarding the ordination of women, aren't you?

ARCHBISHOP ROACH: Yes, Q: Are you just as firm on this pastoral as on those issues?

ARCHBISHOP ROACH: Well; our teaching has not yet been completed on this.

Q: I said: "In the event.!."
ARCHBISHOP ROACH:
There will be changes in the draft.
There is no way that that committee can go back and say,
"Great, we got it made." There's
lots of work to be done.

There are no doubt any number of Catholic laymen who would recommend that such work begin immediately — with instant shredding — along with an ecclesiastical order transferring Father Hehir to the chancery staff of the Archbishop of New Orleans for some retraining by Archbishop Hannan.

## Land bank lowers

For the second time in as many months, the Federal Land Bank of Wichita has announced a reduction in the billing rates it charges on its loans.

Effective Jan. 1, 1983, the billing rate for new and existing variable interest agricultural loans will be reduced one-half of one precent to 12.25 percent from 12.75 percent.

The rate charged for rural home loans for both farmers and non-farmers will drop to 12.75 percent from 13 percent.

The announcement was made by Federal Land Bank President M. K. Mathews Jr.

The current charge for variable interest agricultural loans was reduced to 12.75 percent on Nov. 1. Between October 1981, and November 1982, all variable rate land bank loans were billed at 13 percent—the highest rate ever charged in the bank's history.

The Jan. 1 rate reduction will result in a savings of approximately \$2 million a month to farmer and rancher borrowers in the four-state area served by The Federal Land Bank of Wichita.

The Federal Land Bank of Wichita is a farmer-rancher owned agricultural lending cooperative which specializes in long-term real estate loans. The bank has over 68,000 loans outstanding for \$5.2 billion in unmatured principal. These loans are made and serviced by 40 federal land bank associations located in Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico.

Since July 1969, all land bank loans have been made on a variable interest rate plan which allows the billing rate to fluctuate up or down during the term of the loan depending on money market exonditions. "Such a policy enteres the lowest possible cost of borrowing," Mathews said.

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### Freeze holiday foods now

"Start baking for the holidays while you have time, and use your freezer," advises Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food and nutrition specialist at New Mexico State University.

"A little extra work now can free you to enjoy holiday guests and parties."

As you prepare meals now, make a double recipe and freeze the extra, especially casseroles and one-dish meals.

Line the pans with aluminum foil and allow extra foil to fold over the top, Cook the food in the usual way until it is almost done. Use a light touch with seasoning because some spices become stronger during freezing, the food specialist says.

After baking, cool the food quickly, Wrap it in moisturevapor proof material, label and freeze at zero degrees or below.

Remember, it takes longer to heat a frozen casserole than it does to bake one that has not been frozen. But the convenience of having these prepared foods ready to thaw and serve on busy days makes the extra effort worthwhile.

When preparing special occasion foods for the freezer, remember that certain ingredients do not freeze well, Mrs. Johnson says. Avoid freezing cooked egg whites (meringues and fluffy frostings), raw vegetables and mayonnaise.


Cakes may be frozen frosted or unfrosted. You can also freeze baked or unbaked pies. Partially baked rolls may be frozen, similar to commercial brown-and-serve products.

Large quantities of leftovers after holiday meals or parties are better stored in the freezer than the refrigerator. Freeze leftover turkey, stuffing and gravy if they will not be used within one day. Use containers which will hold as much food as you intend to serve at one time.

Label foods clearly. The label should include the name of food, freezing date and number of servings in the package. For maximum quality, use frozen cooked foods within two or three months.

### Living trees bring years of pleasure

Choosing a live Christmas tree this year could bring pleasure to many for years to come.

"If you want a Christmas tree that has many benefits, buy a live tree," says Dr. Fred Widmoyer, a horticulturist with New Mexico State University.

After the tinsel comes off, a live tree can be donated to a school, a park, the Boy Scouts or any other non-profit organization for use in landscaping. As an added bonus, a tree donated to such organizations is tax deductible.

Plant the tree as soon as possible after Christmas. In New Mexico, trees can be planted with little soil preparation. In colder climates, a hole should be dug early and filled with straw to prevent the soil from freezing. Loose soil should be stored in a dry, warm location until planting time.

Water thoroughly every two weeks, especially in southern New Mexico where warm winds dry the soil

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


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The furbearer season in New Mexico for raccoon, badger, weasel, fox, ringtail, bobcat, nutria, beaver and muskrat has already started. The season for all these species ends on March 31,

In the past few years, there has been an increase in the number of trappers, so stricter controls have been placed on the sport of trapping, These controls will help prevent damage to the furbearer resource, private property, domestic or protected animals, and the privilege of trapping. Let's look at some of the regulations governing the sport of trapping.

Each trap or snare set for the capture of wild animals must be permanently marked with either the name and address of the trapper, or a user identification. number issued by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. A trap identification number can be obtained by contacting the Game Department office in Santa Fe. Trap identification allows conservation officers in an area to know exactly who is running each trap line and also helps in regaining lost or stolen traps.

No steel trap with an outside jaw spread larger than six and one-half inches may be used in making a land set for furbearers. This prevents small furbearers from being injured, without being caught, by large traps. It also helps to stop large animals, such as mountain lion, bear or domestic cows, from being caught in traps set for smaller furbearers.

No land set may be placed within one-fourth mile of an occupied dwelling without the permission of the occupant; no land set may be placed within one-

people to contact the Forest Service, Lincoln County Commissioners, and the district attorney and protest the action.

In a telephone interview, Paul Gordon and Jim Abbot, supervisor for the Lincoln National Forest, both agreed that Sawver was within her rights to close the portion of 583 that crossed her property. According to Abbot. there is no legal way for us to go in and provide public access to Forest Roads 580 and 583. . . The forestry road markers mean nothing. . . What we have here is public land entirely surrounded by private land, and unless we talk the owners into a right-of-way or condemn it for public use, there is nothing that we can do."

Abbot added that unless a road is maintained by county, state, or federal funds there is no way that any government agency can claim it as public access roads.

Gordon noted that the Forest Service is experiencing this type of problem everywhere. "We are trying very hard to resolve this situation and we're hoping to work out a fair compromise," he said.

Suzanne Cox, Lincoln County manager, reported that both roads in question were not maintained by the county. She said this precludes the county from forcing the roads to be opened, as happened recently on the nearby O-Bar-O Ranch outside of Carrizozo.

In the meantime, Sawyer continues to keep the gates legally locked and Hesse continues to walk to his claim.

"I don't understand this," he said, "I have always respected Fern's property and in effect I have been a sort of free watchdog up here." Hesse indicated that if he had

been at the claim when the campers vandalized the cabin he would have been able to stop them. "They would have had to go right past me," he said.
