Two Houses Near Completion--

C'zozo Housing Rehab Construction Starts

The first visible signs of progress in the Town's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for Housing Rehabilitation from HUD are now evident. Hubert Quintana, Project Administrator, reported to the Town Council last Monday that eighteen months after data collection and public hearings began to support the need for the Town's project, the first two houses are nearing completion.

Local contractors have been busy working on the two houses and four others that are presently under contract for rehabilitation. A priority rating system has been developed by the CDBG Contractor Selection Committee to insure that the families or individuals in greatest need are assisted first. Project Inspector, Bob Hill of Carrizozo, is inspecting the homes of eligible applicants to determine need and establish what work must be done on each home.

The homes when completed will not be of new home construction quality, but they will be very liveable, energy efficient, and meet standards in the Uniform Building Code and the Minimum Program Standards adopted by the Town Council. Most homes will be re-wired for electricity, replumbed, insulated, and additional work will be performed to bring the house to MPS and family requirements.

The Housing Rehabilitation Project is part of a \$300,000 CDBG grant to the Town from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. The project is targeted in the Town's southside. A total of 25 houses will be rehabilitated by the project. Applicants must be owner-occupants of the house to be rehabilitated. Eligible applicants may receive a grant, a loan, or a combination loan and grant to pay for the work

done to the house.

The council agreed to pay their new attorney, Don Wall, \$150.00 per month including special meetings if extra legal work, at \$50.00 an hour, exceeds two hours per month. Wall must have council approval.

Wall replaced town attorney veteran, Bill Payne, who resigned late last year. Wall, a Rotarian, serves on the Board of Education and is a member of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce. He is president of the Economic Development Committee and is Carrizozo's juvenile probation officer. Wall has a private practice of law, with offices at 311 South Central Ave.

The town council on Monday approved an election resolution to provide for expenses on the upcoming municipal elections. March 2 local people will vote for one mayor for a four year term

two trustees, each for four year terms; two trustees, each for two year terms and one municipal judge for a four year term.

January 26 is the day set for filing declaration of candidacy with town clerk, Carol Schlarb. This is the only date on which a candidate may file for office. On this day, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., the clerk will provide a form to the office seekers. Name as shown on affidavit of registration and office the candidate seeks is among the information requested. In order to be eligible to hold a municipal office, a candidate must be a registered voter for municipal elections.

'Lodger's Tax' came under discussion when David Lynch, on behalf of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, inquired, "Does Carrizozo impose a 'Lodger's Tax' on those who come to our motels?"

The Chamber's work includes attracting small businesses to town. With some funds secured from the state, the Chamber has advertised the existence of Carrizozo in a well-known publication. Lynch asked if the town would consider writing the Chamber into the town's budget for a share of the 'Lodger's Tax' revenue. Lynch said the money would be used by the Chamber for promoting economic development.

Lynch was informed that the town does not have a 'Lodger's Tax'. Trustee Ernest Pittillo, Crossroads Motel manager said he was, "strictly against it." He said people are urged to come to Carrizozo and then they are charged additional fees.

A 2 percent tax added to approximately 16 rooms at two local motels would bring less than \$10.00 per month, the council estimated. It was decided that 'Lodger's Tax' would entail more paperwork than revenue.

Lynch offered an alternate suggestion to the council. Writing in a stipend in the town's yearly budget for the chamber. The idea was favorable to one trustee, but no formal action was taken.

On another subject, Lynch asked if the town had jurisdiction over three signs on entrance roads to Carrizozo. The Chamber would like to use the old signs for current

information. Two of the signs are privately owned and a third belongs to the state.

Reports from trustees in the announcement from Betty Fields that she plans to resign before the county commission next day to offer them a paving job. In a cooperative arrangement between the State Department and the town, all Carrizozo streets are to be worked on.

The county commission which met January 11 found that a back log of work on the permit extra contractor work added that if further in the paving job were to be offered.

Fields, in charge of streets and parks, has kept at work on a street project since the town council has authorized it. Each way official's report on the paperwork involved in the paving project. 

National Forest News

Winter sports activities are being enjoyed by visitors to Lincoln National Forest this week, with both Smokey Bear Ranger District at Ruidoso, and Cloudcroft Ranger District reporting new snow. A "Winter Recreation Safety Guide" is available at both of these District Offices, with information about winter travel, hypothermia, and skiing.

Hypothermia, caused by exposure to cold, and aggravated by wet, windy conditions, result in death. Visitors should prepare for severe winter conditions by wearing several layers of warm clothing, with appropriate raingear and windbreakers.

To check on current weather, driving conditions, and fuelwood areas, call the districts. Telephone numbers are: Smokey Bear at Ruidoso, 257-4095; Cloudcroft, 682-2551; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill, 687-3411. For skiing conditions, call 257-9001 at Sierra Blanca Ski Area, or 682-2587 at Ski Cloudcroft.

Smokey Bear Ranger District reported one foot of snow in the higher elevations. Temperatures are in the teens to fifties. Fuelwood areas are inaccessible due to weather. Areas No. 2 and No. 8 will close January 18. Other areas will be open, weather permitting.

Smokey Bear Classic

"College? How You Can Afford It In 1982"

If you are considering attending college, then two programs on "College? How You Can Afford It In '82" produced by Albuquerque Public Broadcasting Station KNME-TV5 are something you will not want to miss.

The first program of the two-part series, with Brian Hansen, chairperson of the University of New Mexico department of theatre arts, will be shown January 16 at 9 a.m. The second will be aired January 17 at noon.

KNME worked closely with the New Mexico Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators and the UNM Student Financial Aid and Career Services to develop the

program. One of the major consultants, Virginia Edgar, associate director of the UNM Student Financial Aid and Career Services, said: "It's really a general information program geared mainly to incoming freshmen, their parents and older students who are considering returning to college."

The programs describe what financial aids are available, how and when to apply, finance charges, pay-back plans and generally anything else dealing with financial aids.

"Financial aids for students are not as bright as they have been in the past. People should contact their congressmen, both at the federal and state levels, to tell them it is very important that the programs continue as they have in the past."

"There is at least one grant program," Edgar said, "which

was given a zero budget at the federal level. It is a program which has matching funds where the federal government puts in 50 percent and the state puts in 50 percent. Since the federal money has been stopped it is possible that the state money will also be cut."

Deadline for submitting financial aid requests is March 1, 1982, for all schools in New Mexico.

"Because of the tight money situation we have to operate on a first-come, first-served basis," Edgar said. "Since it takes between four and five weeks to process financial aid forms, the earlier they are submitted the better off the applicant, and they stand a better chance."

Financial aid information and applications are available at local high school counselors' offices or at the UNM Financial Aids Office.

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



B. The following questions relating to the creation of school district indebtedness and the issuance of general obligation bonds of Capitan Municipal School District No. 28, and the imposition of a two-mill levy shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the school district:


The necklace was made by Carol McConnell.
