March 2nd Elections--

C'zozo - Capitan - Corona Seek Twelve Candidates

Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona residents who are eligible to vote in municipal elections have five (5) days left to decide if they want to 'throw their hats in the ring' for any of the 12 positions available in their respective towns. In all three places, the only day to declare for candidacy is, Tuesday, January 26. Elections are March 2.

The Carrizozo election results may be of special interest to local

people. All positions are to be filled. In the past, two trustees always remained on the council to ensure continuity.

Roy Harmon, retired postmaster and long-time area resident, is the only person on the council who was elected and who has served the most years. Harmon, on the council for eight years, cites the numerous council ap-

pointments for the unique situation in Carrizozo where all terms will expire at once.

Ruth Armstrong, Ernest Pittillo, and Betty Fields were all appointed to fill vacancies of resigning trustees. Mayor Manuel

Hernandez, although originally elected as a councilman in the last two elections, was appointed to the mayor's seat.

Carrizozo residents will also vote for a municipal judge. S.N. Ortiz, former Lincoln County Sheriff, has served in this capacity for the last 10 years. He began his duties as municipal judge by appointment. This was followed by his election of 2 four-year terms. In addition, Ortiz is the area's magistrate judge.

Other positions in Carrizozo that need to be filled are: one

mayor for a four-year term; two trustees for a four-year term; and two trustees for a two-year term.

In Carrizozo, the council, including the mayor are paid \$10.00 for every regular and special meeting in which they participate. (It is of interest to note that Harmon has never accepted his stipend. His money returns to the town's general fund). A judge is paid a set monthly salary.

The Village of Capitan has to fill three offices; one mayor for four years and two council people also for four years.

The terms of Mayor Don Stark and trustees Bennie Coker and Sharon Horton expire this year. Remaining for an additional two years each are, trustees David Cummins, "Maggie" Trujillo, and municipal judge Alfred Montes.

In Corona, villagers there like in Capitan, will vote on March 2 for one mayor for a four-year term and two councilmen for four-year terms.

Lee R. Mulkey is Corona's mayor, having been appointed in 1975. His term expires, as well as those of trustees Ernest Lueras and Cheryl Hiltzley, who was appointed six months ago to replace Roy Cason, who moved. Trustees who will remain on the council until 1984 are Jean Flores Chavez and Minnie Davenport.

The Village of Corona does not elect or appoint a municipal judge. If the need arises, Corona residents are "judged and, or jailed" in Carrizozo, with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department investigating incidents.

People interested in seeking municipal positions in Carrizozo, Capitan and Corona have only one day (January 26) to place their names before the public. If they have opponents for the positions they seek, they will be obligated to hit the campaign trail.

Even if they have no opponents, they still may want to campaign, as write-in voters may pop up when least expected election day.

County Extension Agent, Ralph Dunlap and his wool judging team placed 4th in the Denver Livestock Show last week. Dunlap, presently serving as Otero County's temporary extension agent, has been teaching class in wool technology and judging at New Mexico State University during the past semester. Prior to this, Dunlap and his wife, Rosalie, spent 2 years in Tunisia, where he was employed as a sheep specialist. Dunlap, who makes his home near Lincoln, retires from extension service in February.

Manny Hernandez, a native of Carrizozo has opened his one-man show in the conference room of the Carrizozo Public School administration building. The public is invited to view the work, Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Among the works currently on exhibit are portraits of Indians, paintings of vases and bowls, wildlife and landscapes, in oils, pen, ink or metal.

This self-taught, versatile artist considers Peter Hurd his inspiration. "I love art and think it is the best way to describe life," Hernandez stated.

Hernandez, age 33 began a series of metal sculpture two years ago. He designed and welded the Santa Rita Catholic cemetery entrance sign. Employed locally as a welder, Hernandez is also Carrizozo's mayor. Elected as councilman in 1976, he has served as mayor pro-tem.

One of the first shows at Carrizozo Art Gallery on 'E' Avenue was the Hernandez art. The show was well received. Many of his works were sold during and after the reception given in his honor.

In great demand are his leather carvings of wildlife. During the hunting season, he designed, made, and sold many leather belts. His hobbies include model car building, interior and exterior home remodeling. One of his current projects is a frontier town, 3 miles south of Carrizozo. His "artistic creation" includes so far, the "Red Dog Saloon" and a black smith shop.

Hernandez served in the U.S. Army during the Viet Nam conflict. He is married to the former Mary Schlarb. They have two daughters, Yvette and Lynette.

What's Baking

This week it's Austrian Christmas Cookies. Don't wait until next Christmas to try out this easy recipe. Thanks to Raylene Greer, supervisor at New Horizon's Group Home, another favorite cookie recipe has been added to my collection:

-Blend 1 cup sugar, 3 eggs, grated peel from 1 orange or tangerine and the juice of 1 orange or tangerine. Fold in 1 cup finely chopped walnuts or pecans. Gently blend in one and a half cup sifted flour.

-Spread mixture on cookie sheet 9 (with sides) which has been sprayed with Pam (- greased and

floured my cookie sheet). Bake at 350 degrees for 12 minutes. This will not brown the mixture, you just want it to spring back in the middle, a sign that it has baked.

-Cool 5 to 10 minutes. Cuts off ends, cut the rest into bars. (I cut mine bite-size). Dust with powdered sugar and store in airtight container.

To make the quilt top, the material is not cut into any particular pattern. Squares are sewn "al trochemoche" as the Spanish say for "helter-skelter".


Chinese Style

'Economic Impacts'

Another major construction job is currently taking place at Carrizozo Public Schools. Clegg Hall will be enlarged by a library and Special Education Classroom addition on the Tenth Street side. This increase will add approximately 2,200 square feet to the existing building and cost \$189,357.

Between now and June 1 a large number of construction workers will be spending money in Carrizozo for food, lodging, gas, etc. In addition, the contractor expects to buy most of the required small hardware locally and also plans to get concrete in excess of \$10,000 from a local supplier.

The work at Clegg Hall will also remove a number of firecode

deficiencies identified last year by the fire marshal. Also included in the new addition will be the latest in energy conservation measures, one of which will be a new type of wall insulation. Clegg Hall will be the second public school building in New Mexico to have an active solar heating system. The high school building across the street was the first public school building in the state to have an active solar heating system. All the solar panels will be produced locally by Belco Industries, Inc.

The original library was built to hold about 3,500 books, however, now there are about 7,000 volumes in that space. The expansion will double the size of the library and allow sufficient room for the 7,000 books there.

The entire high school will

benefit from this new construction by the addition of a Media-Center. This center will contain tapes and records, audio visual equipment plus other material allowing students the opportunity to engage in more sophisticated study and research.

The Special Education classroom will add facilities for physical and occupational therapy and also for speech therapy. Also provided will be pre-vocational training of mid-school and younger high school students enrolled in Special Education.

The expansion at Clegg Hall is just one example of the efforts of the Carrizozo Public Schools and from which the community will benefit.

JCMP was established in 1977 to provide for the development, test and evaluation, acquisition, and logistics support of the Navy's sea launched cruise missile and the medium range air-to-surface missile weapon systems on a joint service basis.

A 1965 graduate of Carrizozo High School, he received his bachelors degree in civil engineering from New Mexico State University, Las Cruces in 1970 and a master's in business administration in 1974 from the University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo.

Captain Torres received his commission as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force through the NMSU's Reserve Officer Training Corps in February 1971.

LINCOLN National Forest News




