Plans being looked over--

Lincoln County Courthouse Expansion in Carrizozo and Ruidoso Set

At a special meeting last week, representatives of Herkenhoff and Associates of Albuquerque presented the Lincoln County Commission with proposed floor plans for two new buildings.

An administrative building will be built south of the present court house, located in Carrizozo,

seat of Lincoln County. The structure will be built next to the annex and across the new Citizens State Bank. The new county building will have ample room for bookkeeping and computer operations; a larger county manager's office and a meeting room for the commissioners.

Kenneth Guthie and Miguel Cheng-Guajardo, architects with the Herkenhoff firm told the commission that plans were in the first phases. The Commission and County Manager, Truman Billingsley were asked for their opinions on the proposed plans.

The building will be carpeted

throughout, with the exception of the entrance, heavy traffic area and computer room. The new commissioner's room will have a different seating arrangement and feature an enlarged county map.

The other new county structure, a sub-office, will be built in Ruidoso near the airport. Offices

for the District Attorney, Juvenile Probation Officer, Sheriff's Deputies and Nurse have been planned. The architects will keep future expansion in mind when working with the lobby area. The facility will include a general conference room, which will serve for commission meetings, as well

as for other county meetings.

The architects will make the requested changes in the plans and be present at the next commissioner's meeting scheduled for February 2. Subject to approval of proposed plans, construction bidding will occur sometime in March.

NEWS Briefs

Farmers and ranchers who purchase and apply restricted use pesticides or herbicides are known as private applicators and need to check the expiration date on their pesticide licenses. Many private applicator licenses, the category under which farmers and ranchers are certified by New Mexico Department of Agriculture to use pesticides expired in December, 1981. Private applicators need to be re-certified according to Lincoln County Extension Agent, Barry Herd.

Officers Elected--

Southeastern Economic Development District Meets

On January 20, 1982, the Board of Directors of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District held their annual meeting. At that meeting, John J. Fletcher, Jr., Hobbs City Commissioner, was elected Board Chairman replacing Arnold Crabb of Carlsbad. Also elected was former State Representative from Chaves County, Phelps Anderson as Vice-Chairman and Terry

Aiello, Chaves County Commissioner, as Treasurer. Also on the Board from Lincoln County are County Manager Truman A. Billingsley, County Commissioner Ben Hall, Carrizozo Town Councilwoman Ruth Armstrong and Sheriff Ernest Sanchez.

During the meeting, presentations were made to Poe Corn, Regional Director for U.S. Senator Pete Domenici, Betty King,

District Manager for U.S. Senator Harrison Schmitt and Alice Eppers, Field Representative for Congressman Joe Skeen, recognizing them for their interest and dedication to the people of Southeastern New Mexico.

Dan Watkins, Training Bureau Chief of the State Highway Department, reported to the Board on the new Highway Maintenance Academy which will be operating in Roswell. Mr. Watkins explained that over 800 State Highway Department equipment operators and road department personnel will be trained by the Academy in the future. Of interest to the Board was the possibility that the training could be expanded to include municipal and county road maintenance personnel. Mr. Watkins pointed out that the Academy stresses preventative maintenance and safety in its training as well as career

development.

The Board also heard from Ruth Armstrong, Carrizozo Town Councilwoman, regarding the progress of the Carrizozo Housing Rehabilitation Program, after hearing Mrs. Armstrong's presentation, members of the Board felt it was a model program for a small city. The \$235,000 project is designed to assist 25 owner-occupied dwellings this year. The average cost per dwelling is \$9,600 and provides both loans and grants or a combination of both based on the applicant's financial circumstances. It was noted that housing rehabilitation may be a new approach to housing and housing condition improvements in today's market where housing costs make home ownership almost prohibitive.

The next regular meeting of the Board is scheduled for April.

Vo-ag Barn Bid Goes to Ken Wells Construction

The Energy Challenge Committee of the Carrizozo FFA Chapter presented a slide show to the board of education last week. The presentation consisted of last year's regional winners and national winner in the President's Energy Challenge. The competition program originated in the Carter administration.

Carrizozo FFA president, Matt Ferguson, chairman of the committee told the board members about his Chapter's plans in this year's energy challenge. The aim of the Chapter is to make the community aware of the need to conserve energy. Next week they will distribute informative energy conservation literature.

The Chapter is in the process of constructing solar collectors which will be installed at the Rec Center. The project is one of several that the Chapter is involved with in connection with the national contest. Ferguson expressed appreciation to Belco, a local company for their assistance and loan of equipment and materials.

FFA advisor Mike Gaines and several members of the Energy Challenge Committee accompanied Ferguson to the board meeting.

Exchange student, Kjersti Boye of Norway was introduced to the board by superintendent, James P. Miller, Jr. Kjersti (pronounced 'Shasti') told the board that she enjoys attending school in Carrizozo. She answered questions about the Norwegian school system.

Schooling in Norway begins at age 7. English is taught from 3rd grade and up. Twelve years of education is available, with the last three being optional. Tuition is charged for those that continue their education after grade 9. Vocational schools and universities provide additional education.

Kjersti lives with Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cantrell and family. She will finish the school year in Carrizozo. Kjersti is an 11th grader at Carrizozo High School.

The board accepted the low bid of Ken Wells Construction on the Vo-ag barn.

The board granted Fourth grade teacher, Jolene Pafford, a 6 weeks leave of absence at the end of the school year.

The board was informed that Wini Wilmore, 3rd grade teacher, is the school's athletic director.

Twenty-two persons were asked to assist in an evaluation of superintendent Miller. The evaluation centered on 15 areas of performance determined in the fall of '81. Evaluation information was for period of July 1981 to January 1982.

At a dinner session prior to the regular board meeting, the board was presented with a summary of the evaluation opinions. Discussion of the board's views will be presented at the next regular board meeting in February.

PTA: Serving Schools and Community

—February 17 will mark the 84th anniversary of the National PTA organization and its 29,000 local associations in all 50 states and several foreign countries. Your local PTA, started in 1979, was officially chartered in 1980, thereby joining 29,000 other local associations in a worthy purpose — service to schools and community. The interests of children have always been foremost in the hearts and minds of PTA members throughout the United States, and the Carrizozo PTA is no exception. Recently, for example, the PTA — meeting each second Thursday of the month — purchased student dictionaries for Elementary school students. An emergency fund for student food and clothing was also established. You will recall the colorful Halloween Carnival this past October 31 — that, too, was a PTA project.

—But the PTA is more, much more. The PTA presents parents with the opportunity to stay in touch with the many activities and events which take place at school, the opportunity to raise questions, and to make their interests and concerns known to school staff and members of the

Board of Education. Not only can communication take place in an active PTA, but there often is a good deal of parent education which happens when parents care enough to spend an evening a month working for their children. 

Winter enchantment on Lincoln National Forest is often made from turquoise skies, snowcovered slopes, and the shimmer of ice crystals on frosted trees, with mild sunny weather as an added attraction. The Ruidoso and Cloudcroft areas have all this right now, and more. However, visitors should always be prepared for sudden winter storms.

Skiing, tubing, and snowmobiling are in full swing. To check on current weather, driving conditions, and fuelwood areas, call the districts. Telephone

numbers are: Smokey Bear at Ruidoso 257-4995; Cloudcroft, 682-2551; Guadalupe at Carlsbad, 885-4181; and Mayhill, 687-3411. For skiing conditions, call 257-9001 at Sierra Blanca Ski Area, or 682-2587 at Ski Cloudcroft.

On the Smokey Bear District at Ruidoso, Three Rivers Campground is open. Snow remains in higher elevations and in shaded areas of lower elevations. Sierra Blanca Ski Area is reporting good conditions. Trails into the White Mountain Wilderness area are snowpacked. Roads at lower

elevations are beginning to dry out. Temperatures are ranging from the teens to 50's. All fuelwood areas are open; however, Area No. 1 is muddy in places due to drifts.

Cloudcroft Ranger District reported heavy use of Silver Snowplay Area on weekends, light use during the week. The parking lot is cleared and snow conditions are excellent. The Apache Loop Cross-country Ski Trail is receiving light to moderate use. Upper Karr Canyon is open to tubing, sledding, and snowmobiling, but parking is a problem as the lot has now be plowed.

Snowmobiling conditions are excellent and there has been heavy use of the area between Alamo Peak and Sac Peak. Main roads have been plowed and are open, but in many places the shoulders aren't clear. Many secondary roads are ice covered, with chains required. Fuelwood areas are closed. Temperatures are from low teens to high 30's.

GREEN AND GOLD RICE CASSEOLE

- 1 cup finely chopped parsley
- 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup
- 1/2 cup half-and-half (cream and milk)
- 1 teaspoon each garlic salt and seasoned pepper
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
- 3 cups cooked rice, chopped
- 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs

Cook parsley, green pepper, and onions in butter until tender crisp. Add soup, half-and-half, seasonings, lemon juice, and 1/2 cup cheese. Heat. Stir in rice and eggs. Wheeler Addresses County GOP Women

"Helping people, that's the best part of my job," said Magistrate Judge James Wheeler, speaking at the monthly meeting of the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County, Tuesday, January 19 at the Incredible Restaurant, Alto.

Judge Wheeler spoke on the functions of the magistrate court before a large group of members and guests, including County Commission Chairman Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen.

Laughingly describing himself as a "li'l ol' county judge," he explained as a state judge he is one step below a district judge.

His jurisdiction covers civil matters up to \$2,000.00, criminal cases for state and county officers and even city officers if it involves a felony, traffic offenses and second offender drunk drivers, whom he described as "deadly weapons driving down the road."

He processes all felons at a first appearance hearing as well as preliminary hearings to determine probable cause. From there the accused is bound over to a district court or released.

He has served for five years as Magistrate Judge for District 3 of Lincoln County and averages 2,000 cases per year. He attended the National Judicial College in Nevada.

"I spend a lot of time helping people," he said. "It's not just an 8 to 5 job. I get calls after hours and on weekends, too." When asked what types of problems caused people to be seen at his court, he replied, "Alcohol, drugs and lack of money."

On a brighter note, he also mentioned he also does weddings, which he described as "one of the better parts of my job."


Questions from the floor followed and covered topics as the state penitentiary, drugs, jury trials and drunk drivers.


