C'zozo, Capitan, Corona--

Municipal Election Candidates Off and Running

Three candidates for mayor, seven candidates for four seats on the town council and two candidates for municipal judge will draw for posts this Friday to determine placement on the ballot in the March 2 municipal elections in Carrizozo.

Mayoral hopefuls are Mrs. Welcom M. Armstrong (Ruth), William L. Hasenbuhler and Harold Glen Garcia. Armstrong, who finishes off her appointment as trustee, served as mayor pro-tem. In Carrizozo's history, no woman has ever been elected as mayor, but no woman has ever filed for the position.

Carrizozo voters will also select two trustees for two-year terms; two trustees for four-year terms; and a municipal judge for a four-year term. Filing for the two-year terms on the council were Bobby Dan Crenshaw, James Willie Silva, Lee Jacqueline Martin (Jackie) and incumbent, Roy Walton Harmon.

Those who filed for the four-year terms on the council are James R. Payne and incumbents, Shelia Elezabeth Fields (Betty) and Ernest R. Pittillo.

Incumbent, S.M. Ortiz filed for re-election as municipal judge.

Multipurpose Building--

Capitan School Bond Election-Tues., Feb. 23

On Tuesday, February 23, 1982 the qualified voters of the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28 will vote on the proposed bond issue and two mill levy to finance the completion of the NEW MULTIPURPOSE BUILDING, purchase needed equipment and do necessary work on the school grounds such as paving, parking, playground development and landscaping.

Through the generosity of the local taxpayers passing a \$860,000 bond issue and two mill levy in 1977 and the State of New Mexico furnishing \$1,755,896 a new elementary school, new high school and a vocational agriculture building have been completed.

The State of New Mexico has furnished a total of \$2,428,896 dollars in the past three years to finance the construction. This includes the \$673,000 for the NEW MULTIPURPOSE BUILDING.

In the fall of 1981, the State of New Mexico awarded \$673,000 of Critical Capital Outlay Funds to help build a new Multipurpose Building which is to include a stage, music and chorus room, new dressing rooms and showers, a multipurpose physical education gym and a student commons area.

The Board of Education, thankful to the school district patrons for past support will now ask the voters approval of the \$400,000 bond issue and a two mill levy for the following purposes:

1.) Complete the multipurpose building and student commons area.

The New Multipurpose Building will not only serve the students while in school, but will also be available for community functions and needs inasmuch as there is a shortage of facilities for community use now in the Capitan community.

2.) Do badly needed work on the grounds to provide paved access roads and parking; provide adequate playground areas; provide adequate drainage;

Former town attorney, Bill Payne also seeks election to the four-year position.

In Capitan, Richard R. Coons, Vernon Kelly Beavers, Alfred Montes and incumbent, Don Stark filed for mayor. In the event that

Montes is elected he will have to resign as municipal judge.

Capitan Village council seekers are Harold L. Shelby, incumbent Benny Coker, Frank E. Miller, incumbent Sharon L. Horton and Madison Cook, who are

all running for two four-year positions.

A lone candidate, Timothy Joseph Cancilla, filed for mayor of Corona. No one filed for the two four-year terms positions available on the village council.

Heads Cystic Fibrosis Walk-a-thon

Jane Allred has been appointed chairperson of the annual Walk-a-thon on April 17 in Capitan sponsored by the New Mexico Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The appointment was announced by Joel Cooperman, president, New Mexico Chapter, who noted that funds raised in the event will support research and treatment programs of the Foundation.

"We hope to get the full participation of Capitan in the event," said Mrs. Allred. "Together with thousands of other volunteers working on similar fund-raising events nationally, we can make a strong impact on the fight to conquer cystic fibrosis."

The principal goal of research is to find a cure for cystic fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic cause of death of American children and young adults in the

United States. At present, the disease affects one of every 1,800 births. Approximately half of those born with CF do not live past their teens.

After a \$400,000 bond issue and a two mill Capital Improvements Levy, the tax rate per \$1,000 assessed valuation, in 1982 will be approximately \$12.20 as compared to \$8.50 per \$1,000 assessed

(For Example: If a taxpayer's property has an appraised value of \$3,000 and as assessed value of \$1,000 'one third of the appraised value' the cost increase would be about 31 cents per month or \$3.70 per year.)

The tax increase will be shown in the November, 1982 tax notices. In any case the taxes for 1982 will be lower than those for 1980 due to

the reduction of property tax by the State Legislature beginning in 1981.

Those wishing to cast their votes on The 23rd must be a registered voter living in Lincoln County, and live within the boundaries of the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28.

Polling Place will be Fletcher Hall Arena and will be open Tuesday, February 23, from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., in Capitan.

Absentee voting will be handled through the office of the Superintendent of Schools, Capitan Elementary School.

A pizza party at Coronado Town Homes' party room was enjoyed by princesses and duchesses and their escorts mugging for the ever-present cameras. Many of the celebrants moved on to Miquel's for an evening of dancing.

The Royal Court enjoyed a "Circus-Circus Brunch" at Vista Hills Country Club. Coordinator Judy Ridley said it has been an unusual year in that all the escorts are happy with their royal assignments and vice-versa. The royal court moved on to the El Paso Country Club for the last party before the coronation.

"Vegas" was the 1982 Sun Bowl Coronation theme. A dinner crowd of more than 1,000 swelled by the several hundred spectators filled the entire Civic Center. "Well Shod"

In August 1981 a young couple with their two children came to Carrizo and with that unassuming event Tom Funk's Shoe Repair Shop was born.

Tom is a modest, intelligent young man who started learning shoe repair about ten years ago. At that time he was attending Oklahoma State U. and decided shoe repair work would provide an excellent supplement to any future teaching job. He didn't open his own shop, however, until moving to Corona about four years ago. In Corona Tom taught school until budget cuts cost him his job there. He landed a part-time teaching position in the English Department of Carrizo Public Schools and as a result Carrizo now has a small, clean shoe repair shop run by a young man doing a very conscientious job.

There are some quirks to the business. Even though a person can start in the shoe repair business for less than \$5,000 only one company in the United States makes shoe repair equipment. And if you buy foreign equipment you must also purchase foreign thread and other material that fits that particular machine.

However in spite of the problems Tom encountered along the way, he and his family like it here and feel right at home. Tom was born and raised in South Dakota. His folks raised corn, oats and Hereford cows. Tom said that most of the Quaker Oats seen on grocery shelves comes from around where he was raised.

Tom's business did not officially begin to operate until November 1981 and happily business has been steadily good. In addition to cowboy boots and shoes, Tom also repairs purses, chaps, belts, holsters and even replaces zippers on coats, both leather and cloth.

Talking with Tom while he worked provided a real liberal

education. Did you know lots of shoes cannot be repaired? Not that they are too worn but that the heel and sole are all one piece and made of plastic. Did you know that sharkskin is the toughest leather? This leather cannot be scratched by a knife blade or nail. Did you know that kangaroo is the softest? You can crack domestic kangaroo by kicking a chicken but wild kangaroo leather is very tough. Of course, we all know there is no market for women's heels in Carrizo (heels on shoes, that is).

Tom along with his wife Mary and daughters Amy (6-yrs.) and Sarah (4-yrs.) live at 1203 'C' Avenue. The shoe repair shop is in the rear at this address and it might be easier to get to the shop by going out Twelfth Street at Roy Dow's Gift Gallery and turning left at the alley between D and C Streets. However, either way you go, Tom has several signs out. He doesn't want you to get lost, as this writer did several weeks ago. Just remember, Tom Funk is here and hopes to see your smiling face in his shop, the hours are 1:30-6:00 p.m. daily.

Candidates at GOP Women's Tea

Min Grant, Gayle Irick, Irene Sego and Pat Pohlmann spoke on behalf of their gubernatorial candidate husbands before members and guests of the Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County (FRWLC) Sunday afternoon, January 31 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Rhonda Johnston, FRWLC president, began the program by outlining local group activities and recent successes. "Our group has long been active in county politics," she said. "We can take much credit for the many Republican victories this county has enjoyed."

"Our purpose is to elect Republicans," she continued, "and we donate many hours stuffing envelopes as well as lending financial support."

She also cited the fund-raising efforts and community relations projects undertaken by the group in recent months.

She then introduced Dorothy Barber, first vice-president, who introduced the four guests in alphabetical order.

Min Grant spoke first on behalf of husband Bob Grant, who himself recently spoke at the November meeting of FRWLC. Mrs. Grant, a realtor, mentioned her 28-year marriage and concluded, "I believe in New Mexico, the Republican party, and Bob Grant."

Pat Pohlmann, a former realtor from Farmington, mentioned her husband Hank's work in the campaigns of Senators Pete Domenici and Harrison Schmitt and U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen.

Irene Sego explained she saw "strong leadership in Bill" when she first met him. She cited his positive attitude and outlook and his ability to work well under pressure as points to recommend him.

Although the wives were the featured guests, two of the candidates themselves accompanied their wives and were allowed to address the gathering. Hank Pohlmann told the crowd, "This is a tough business and these people deserve credit."

Bill Sego emphasized that all four candidates were running a "campaign based on positive effort" rather than smear tactics.

Mary Helen Skeen, wife of Rep. Skeen, spoke briefly on the importance of "electing state officials we can trust to see that the money President Reagan is returning to the states will go where it is supposed to go."

"NFRW Today," a film narrated by Maureen Reagan, concluded the program. Featuring prominent GOP women such as Sen. Nancy Kassebaum of Kansas and others, the film paid tribute to GOP women's groups all over the country who donated millions of volunteer hours. Included on the film were tributes from Vice-President George Bush, Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker, and President Ronald Reagan.

At the conclusion of the program, Johnston presented each of the guests with FRWLC personalized pens as mementos of their visit.

Members of the organizing committee for the tea included Johnston and Barber of Ruidoso, Dorothy Smith and Lois Aldrich of Capitan, Pat Hume of Nogal, and Ann Denton and Yvonne Lanelli of Alto.



After a delicious friend chicken lunch at the school cafeteria Mrs. Stowe and Mrs. Horton of Captain demonstrated Russian punch work.



Celebrate The International Month Of The Potato




February is Potato Lover's Month, and this year the event honors the international status of the potato. To celebrate, here's a recipe for traditional Norwegian lefse.

POTATO LEFSE

2 cups plain mashed potatoes 1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons milk Flour
1 tablespoon melted butter Vegetable oil
or margarine

In large bowl, mix potatoes, milk, butter and salt. Mix in 1/4 cup of flour. Knead briefly on lightly floured board, adding flour to make a non-sticky dough. Divide into 12 equal balls; roll each on a lightly floured board into a circle about 7 inches in diameter. Lightly oil a heavy skillet or crepe pan; set over medium heat. Cook one at a time, until lightly browned, about 1 minute on each side; stack. Serve hot, buttered, or flled. Lefse may be prepared in advance, carefully wrapped and frozen. Makes 1 dozen.

Yam-Coconut Custard Pie



CAROLINA YAM-COCONUT CUSTARD PIE

3 large North Carolina yams 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
3 eggs 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 cup granulated sugar 1 cup evaporated milk or light cream
1/4 cup packed brown sugar, firmly packed 1 1/4 cups freshly grated coconut, loosely packed, divided
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

To prepare yams, bake in a 350°F oven 45 minutes or cook in boiling water 25 minutes, until soft. Cool, peel and mash. (You should have 2 cups.) In large bowl, beat eggs with sugars, salt and spices. Add mashed yams and evaporated milk; mix well. Fold in 1 cup grated coconut. Turn into unbaked pastry shell. Bake in a 350°F oven 30 minutes. Sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup coconut over filling. Bake 30 minutes longer or until tip of knife inserted into center of pie comes out clean. Serve warm or cooled with whipped cream or ice cream, if desired. MAKEUP: 6 to 8 servings.

Southeastern N.M.--

Leads State in Public Revenue Payments to State and County Governments

More than one-half of all public resource payments made to state and county governments in New Mexico came from a nine county area where public lands are administered by the Roswell District Office of the Bureau of Land Management. Over seventy one million dollars was distributed to the State of New Mexico and the counties of Chaves, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Guadalupe, Lea, Lincoln, Quay and Roosevelt. The payments were made by the Bureau of Land Management out of revenues produced by public land resources during fiscal year 1981, starting October 1, 1980 and ending September 30, 1981. These revenue payments represent 51 percent of the total payments made statewide by BLM to the State of New Mexico.

"We are pleased to see the public resources generating substantial revenues for the State of New Mexico and the Counties that make up our State," said Roswell District Manager John Gregg. "I am particularly pleased to see the Roswell District Accounted for more than half of all

BLM revenue payment during fiscal year 1981 which demonstrates multiple use management is in place." The Roswell District is one of four BLM districts at work in New Mexico.

Payments to state and county governments are made from receipts earned from mineral leasing, mineral sales and grazing fees. Payments in lieu of taxes to offset local property tax lost due to federal land ownership are included in total payments received by county governments.

The leading revenue producer in the area served by the Roswell District Office was mineral leasing. This was also true statewide. A major share of revenues from mineral leasing came from oil and gas activities. The sale of minerals, such as sand, gravel and caliche and grazing privileges made up the total source of revenues. From these public resource programs, \$138,685,342 was paid to state and county governments by BLM in New Mexico. Of this total, the Roswell District Accounted for

\$71,188,145, or fifty one percent of the state total. A large part of this figure, sixty eight and one half million dollars, was earned and distributed from mineral leasing.

As the demand continues to grow for public land resources and use in southeastern New Mexico, current indications are that even greater revenues are possible for fiscal year 1982 ending in next September. Oil and gas activities will again play an important part in this growth.

It was very exciting - when Grandfather gave us all a horse to ride. We played hide-and-go seek on horse back a lot - but our favorite sport was to go rattlesnake hunting - we would choose up in teams and ride opposite directions, then the first one to come back with a dead rattlesnake didn't have to do any chores for the entire visit at the ranch. While many of my cousins took different kinds of weapons to kill the snakes with - I generally threw rocks at it until it died. My Grandfather always said, "Now Robie be sure and hunt for the snake first - you need to see him before he sees you", if he spies you before you spy him - your in trouble." 1. Most of the thirty species of rattlesnakes are found in the Southwest - but the numbers have been reduced in populated areas.




