



C'zozo C of C Meeting--

"Health Center Contributes to Economy"

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce members at their regular monthly meeting last Tuesday, heard first hand from an administrator and two doctors of the many services provided by the Carrizozo Health Center and how it contributes to the local economy.

Dr. Sergio Huerta, Dr. Dale Goad and several members of the Center's advisory board attended the noon luncheon meeting, along with Mr. Tom Neff of Albuquerque, administrator of Carrizozo Health Center. Neff is also assistant administrator at Albuquerque's St. Joseph Hospital, which is committed to keeping the practice of medicine and dentistry in Carrizozo.

Neff said that the Carrizozo Health Center consists of a professional, para-professional and business staff. The professional staff is composed of a physician, a dentist and a certified nurse practitioner, Rosemary

Zink, who is "more than a nurse and less than a doctor."

Huerta gave a talk on his work at the Center and the training he received in medicine and in osteopathic manipulation therapy. Medical care provided by Huerta and Zink includes physicals, well-baby care and a wide variety of other therapeutic methods; among them, internal medicine gynecology, orthopedics, and pediatrics. Many serious conditions can be discovered during these types of exams and treated then or referred to appropriate specialists.

"Urgent care" or emergency care is also provided in the form of the separation of lacerations (cuts), and of broken bones, treatment of heart attacks and similar medical situations. When an injury or condition needs the immediate attention of a specialist, urgent care is in-

valuable in preparing the patient or patients for a trip by ambulance to the nearest hospital.

In the Center's dental section, Goad's primary care consists of exams, 6-month recalls, radiology, oral hygiene, fluoride treatment, oral and health screening. Secondary care includes emergency service, restorative procedures (fillings, crowns), endodontics (root canals), prophylaxis (teeth cleaning), prosthetics (bridge and dentures) and surgery. Referrals by Goad to appropriate specialists is called 'tertiary care'.

Huerta, Goad and Zink also provide medical and dental service on a once-a-week basis at a satellite clinic in Corona.

Neff told his Chamber audience that the Center staff is ready, willing and extremely capable of providing health care service.

He told the group, "We want to

be your health care provider. The Center can help the economy."

"We practice preventive, inexpensive yet quality medicine," Huerta said. "People just don't know what we can do." He said of the Center, "If you don't use it, you'll lose it."

A Chamber member asked Neff if the rumor is true that the services of Goad and Zink will be discontinued. Neff responded by saying that "Ergonomics have hit," that re-negotiations are in progress and that it is too early to predict what will happen.

Neff, who was in Carrizozo to participate in meetings with Center staff and the advisory board, stated that he would be glad to speak to clubs and other groups. His only request is that he be given a 2-week notice. Arrangements can be made by contacting the Center's business manager in Carrizozo, Mary Hernandez.

The 'John L. McCollum Permanent Scholarship'--

Scholarship Fund Established

A special scholarship fund has been established in the memory of a former high school principal, John L. McCollum. Recognizing John McCollum's life-long interests in Vocational Education, a scholarship fund is being formed to provide annual scholarships for students entering vocational careers after high school.

This special fund will become a large part of the permanent scholarship fund which is in the process of being established by the Vocational Advisory Committee of the Carrizozo Schools. All contributions toward this goal will be placed in a permanent endowment at the Citizens State Bank, the interest from it will go toward three Vocational Scholarships for graduating Carrizozo Seniors

The establishment of such a fund must have been certainly a dream of men like John McCollum. Throughout his career as a teacher in Carrizozo from 1953-61 and later as a principal and counselor, Mr. McCollum saw a number of Carrizozo students who had difficulty in securing advancement in vocational training because of the lack of financial support from others, the lack of support meant not only difficulty but actual prevention of attaining their career hopes and aspirations in vocational fields. John McCollum worked with students in

other areas such as Driver Education and sports. His most recent educational assignment was teaching Industrial Arts in the Deming Public Schools.

It is for the purpose of continuing the interest and abilities in students which John McCollum sought throughout his life time to develop that a permanent scholarship fund in his name has been established. Many adults presently living in Carrizozo knew Mr. McCollum as a teacher, counselor, principal, and

benefitted from his work with them. It is now for the children of his former students that a permanent scholarship fund is being established.

Commissioners Approve 4-H Leadership Training Program

Revised plans for two county administrative buildings were presented (by architects) at last week's Lincoln County Commissioners meeting.

Herkenhoff and Associates representatives, architects for the project, made the changes from the original plans according to suggestions commissioners had made at a special meeting two weeks ago.

Site for the county building in Ruidoso was moved from the original location near Highway 37 and the airport, to a site closer to the airport.

More work will have to be done to the plans for that building since the location has been changed, the architects said.

Mary Ellen Payne and Barry Herd of the Lincoln County Extension Office presented a report to the commissioners on the previous year's activities and also proposed a personnel change in their staff.

E.H. Wallace, representing N.M.S.U. was on hand to present the idea of using half of Payne's time to work with a special project sponsored by the Kellogg Foundation.

The project will deal with coordinating and providing leadership training.

It was then suggested a full time 4-H aide be hired to coordinate that program, since Payne will not have as much time to devote to the 4-H segment of the Extension's services. Herd would then be director of that program.

The Commissioners approved plan with hope that the idea would help with the development of the county's 4-H program.

Other commission business included:

--Request that county sanitary landfills near Lincoln and Hondo

be bulldozed and covered once every two weeks. The County road department to see to the maintenance of the landfills.

Acceptance of the School Bus Road Improvement Program for fiscal year 1982-1983, with Captain district listed as first priority. Commissioners agreed that the first priority for each district will be next on the list.

Approval of a resolution approving the prior year's bills.

Approval of a resolution for budget increase to pay architects in the county administrative building project.

March 2nd Municipal Election Candidates

This week, the NEWS features statements from each of the 10 Carrizozo candidates running for the six positions to be voted on in the March 2 municipal elections. James (Willie) Silva and Lee Jacqueline (Jackie) Martin, both which had filed for 2-year trustee terms have withdrawn their names.

Last Friday, the remaining candidates drew for position listed in the order that they will appear on the ballot, the candidates give an insight on their experience, background, opinions and families.

Carrizozo voters will have a choice in the contest for mayor, William L. Hasenbuhler (Bill), Mrs. Harold Garcia (Ruth) and Welord Glen Armstrong.

Hasenbuhler has been a resident of Carrizozo for four years. When the candidates drew for position last week, he was unable to participate because he was snowed-in at St. Louis, Mo. A Belco Industrial employee, he was headed for Milwaukee, Wis. with a delivery when he was forced to remain in St. Louis for several days. Town Clerk, Carol Schlarb drew for him, placing him in the number one position.

Hasenbuhler and his wife, Mary, who is employed at the Sunshine Day Care Center, have two children, ages 7 and 5. They moved to Carrizozo because they wanted to raise their family in a small town atmosphere.

"I would like to see Carrizozo develop into a better community,"

Hasenbuhler stated. "The town has room to develop and I would like to take an active part and being a mayor is as active as you can get," he added.

Hasenbuhler encourages the community to exercise their right to vote for the people of their choice.

Mayoral candidate Armstrong said, "I believe that no town or city stays the same, that it either goes forward or backward. I believe that we should work to maintain our present facilities, namely the golf course, Rec Center, swimming pool and airport, if possible, while striving to get industry and jobs for our people." She further stated, "I believe we should continue our efforts for pavag and rehabilitation of homes."

A 29-year resident of Carrizozo, Armstrong is currently serving on her appointment as trustee and mayor pro-tem. She is a board member of Eastern N.M. Economic Development District and is active in the Carrizozo C of C. She is also a board member of the Area Agency on Aging.

The mother of four grown children, she has been active in the past in PTA, Cub Scouts and the Youth Commission. She is a long-time member of the Carrizozo Woman's Club, and has always been interested in industrial development. Armstrong is a retired U.S. Postal employee.

Garcia, the third candidate in the race for mayor status, "If elected Mayor, I pledge to keep the

citizens of Carrizozo informed of every significantly important subject that will affect the people and, or the town of Carrizozo, thus allowing the citizens more of a say-so in such matters."

Garcia, age 35 holds a Bachelors degree in science from New Mexico State University, as well as a Masters degree in Science. He and his wife, Anita Faye have two sons, a three-year old and a 3-month old baby. Garcia, a businessman is co-owner of the Outpost Bar and Grill.

The four-year terms on the town council attracted three candidates, James Payne (Jim), Ernest Pittillo (Ernie), and Shelia Elizabeth Fields (Betty).

Payne was born in Carrizozo and graduated from Capitan High School. He spent four years in the Marines. Prior to returning to Carrizozo he lived in Phoenix, Arizona. Payne and his wife, Billie are parents of two daughters attending Carrizozo High; a son on the Carrizozo Town Police Department and a daughter, who lives in Oklahoma. The Paynes have three grandchildren.

The Monte Vista Service State is owned and operated by Payne. "As a businessman, I have a great concern in the development of our community and also a very high interest in the future of our recreational facilities," Payne states as he pursues a seat on the council.

Pittillo was appointed to the town council around October 1981. He serves as Police Commissioner on the council. He has lived in Lincoln County for about thirty

years. He and his wife, Fran are managers of the Crossroads Motel. They have lived in Carrizozo for the past three years.

The Pittillos have owned their own businesses since 1959. Before coming to Carrizozo he was the manager of a propane gas company in the northern part of the state. He was appointed fire chief of the Eagle Nest Fire Department. The couple have four grown sons and a daughter. The youngest son is a teacher in Dallas, Texas. There are eight grandchildren.

Involved in Lions and Lionesses Clubs and the Chamber of Commerce, the Pittillos say that their work in Carrizozo has been most enjoyable.

Incumbent Fields, was appointed to the town council in May 1981 to fill the vacancy of Ruben Zamora. Fields, in charge of Streets and Parks, seeks election to the council to continue the work she has accomplished in this area.

"To complete the plans I am now involved in with the State Highway Department for the paving of all Carrizozo streets," is the reason given by Fields for seeking the four-year post on the council.

During the 'Trustee Reports' portion of this week's town meeting, Fields gave an update on the progress of the street paving project. State Highway representatives will be in town soon to confer with Fields and town superintendent regarding a survey, estimates and bid planning.

Fields is the daughter of former Carrizozo resident, Mildred Moore, now of Florence, Alabama and the late, J.G. Moore, former State Senator and Carrizozo insurance businessman. Fields has one son, an engineer in Huntsville, Alabama.

Raised in Carrizozo, Fields graduated from high school here. She holds a Bachelors degree in Accounting, a Masters degree in Business Administration and a doctorate in Business Administration. She is the owner of Field's Accounting Service.

Seats on the council for 2-year terms for candidates Bobby Dan Crenshaw and Roy Walton Harmon appear promising after Silva and Martin disclosed that they have pulled out of the race.

Crenshaw is self-employed as a rancher and co-owner of the Outpost Bar and Grill. He and his wife, Mary, Income Support Division supervisor, are the parents of a daughter, 18 and a son 14.

A Zozo graduate, Crenshaw graduated with a BS degree from

BVFD Regular Meeting

New boundaries, firefighting techniques and equipment dominated the agenda of Bonito Volunteer Fire Department at their regular meeting Tuesday, February 2.

Chief Howard Puckett introduced Chief Chet Southard and Roger Riley of Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Dept. Both men attended the New Mexico Area Field Program in Roswell this weekend along with five BVFD members. They discussed redrawing boundaries between Alto and Ruidoso Downs. Changes in population have made existing boundaries obsolete. Also affected are boundaries between Alto and Ruidoso. Don Rash of BVFD is working on redistricting. Final plans will be submitted to the County Commission for approval.

Highlight of the meeting was hearing reports from the five BVFD members who attended the field program.

Larry Montero spoke on the handling of hazardous materials. Although this field covers many possibilities, he said, a problem likely to occur in this area would be accidents involving propane trucks or home propane tanks.

He said in the event of the possibility of such an explosion, the best course of action for volunteer firemen was to control crowds and evacuate everyone from the scene

of the accident, including themselves.

To prevent the likelihood of home propane tank accidents, he recommended having the tanks checked regularly for dents, stress or metal fatigue.

Steve Hezmall, Phil Onsrud and Ed Pennington spoke on what to consider in purchasing new equipment. "This is of particular value to us since we will purchase a new pumper this year," said Puckett.

"Before I attended this class, I looked at brochures and decided what we needed," said Hezmall. "After taking this class, however, I found out there was a lot more to consider. We'll make a more informed decision now."

Among suggestions offered, the most valuable one was to send a fire department representative to the factory to personally select the vehicle and all its equipment, he said.

Puckett attended the management class where he was shown how to structure and organize a volunteer fire department.

Following the presentation, all seven round-tabled ideas with their audience. Among ideas brought forth were joint training sessions with BVFD and RDVFD. In addition, both departments have been invited to a forest fire training session in February or March to be hosted by James Canyon VFD near Cloudercroft, whose chief and members also attended the Roswell school.

Concerning new equipment, Puckett reported that discussion with the telephone company revealed that a phone-activated siren which BVFD owns could be operational within the month. The siren would be located on a high point in Alto and would emit sounds which could be heard a great distance. This would be a supplemental alert in addition to the present telephone-calling system now in use.

In addition to the siren, the possibility of using a radio-activated paging system was discussed.

Proposed was the purchase of an air compressor and various pieces of equipment for vehicle maintenance as well as the construction of a work-bench and storage cabinets in the Alto station.

Next meeting of BVFD is Tuesday, March 2. Anyone living in Alto, Angus or Bonito is invited to join the visitors.

Bill Payne Announces Candidacy

BILL G. PAYNE, Carrizozo, has announced his candidacy for Magistrate, Division I (Carrizozo). Payne, a Democrat, previously held this position for two terms - 1970 through 1978. He has maintained a law office and has lived in Carrizozo for some fourteen years. He is a member of the Law Firm of PAYNE, MITCHELL & QUIGLEY which also has an office in Ruidoso.

Bill and Mary Ellen, Lincoln County Extension Home Economist, are the parents of Mona, a sophomore, Philip, a freshman, both at New Mexico State University, and Stephen, a senior at Carrizozo High School.

Mr. Payne is a member of St. Rita's Church, Carrizozo Rotary Club, Knights of Columbus and Elks. He formerly served as Mayor of Carrizozo, Carrizozo City Attorney, and Carrizozo City Judge. He is currently serving as President of New Horizons Development Center, Inc., a non-profit corporation, assisting in the development, training and education of mentally retarded persons.

Payne is outgoing president of Lincoln County Arriba Inc.

NMSU and with an MA degree from Highlands University. He began playing college football at NMSU. In 1968 he was drafted to play pro ball. After five years he ceased playing because of injuries. Prior to becoming self-employed, he worked 10 years as program director at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School. He has been a member of the Governor's Man Power Board District VI for 8 years. He also serves on Highway 70 Feasibility Study Committee.

In 1977 he was appointed as Carrizozo's mayor, filling in the vacancy created by Floyd Segrist. Crenshaw lists his past municipal work as experience for serving on the council. He said that he enjoyed and learned alot as mayor and would like to "do my part to insure the progressiveness of the town."

He stated that the town was in a financial crisis in 1977 and credits the council under him for pulling the town out of the red.

He believes that in the past candidates have sought municipal positions to terminate people on the town's payroll. He says he has "no axes to grind with anyone." Crenshaw's stand in seeking election as a trustee is to "promote Carrizozo and stimulate the economy."

A familiar face on the town council, Harmon is going after another term. His service on the council began in 1974 and continues to this day. His desire is to keep town government "solvent" and to work for the good of Carrizozo.

Harmon was born near White Oaks, came to Carrizozo in 1925 and graduated from Carrizozo High in 1928. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He retired as Carrizozo's postmaster after 34 years of postal service. Harmon, a widower has one son, a major at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. There are three grandchildren.

Last, but not least are Billy Gene Payne (Bill) and S.M. Ortiz who are opponents in the municipal judge contest.

Payne is a member of the law firm of Payne, Mitchell and Quigley with offices in Carrizozo and Ruidoso. Rotary and Elks Clubs and the Knights of Columbus are among the organizations that Payne is a member of. He is outgoing president of Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. and currently serves as president of New Horizons Developmental Center Inc.

Payne and his wife, Mary Ellen, home economist of Lincoln County are the parents of three - a son in the 12th grade at Carrizozo High; and two NMSU students, a daughter in her sophomore year and a son, a freshman. The Paynes have lived in Carrizozo 14 years.

Payne, a former Carrizozo mayor, town attorney and municipal judge announced this week his candidacy for magistrate Division I, a position he also previously held.

Asked to comment on the municipal office which he seeks, he

simply stated, "If elected I'll do the best job I can."

A resident of Carrizozo for over 50 years, incumbent Ortiz is seeking another term, saying, "If re-elected, I will not betray your confidence and I will continue to give you competent service and protection you are entitled to."

Ortiz recapitulated his public service: "I have served Lincoln County faithfully - 8 years as sheriff; 1 term in the State Legislature; 10 years as District Court officer, an interpreter and bailiff for the 3rd and 13th Judicial District; Juvenile Probation officer for 5 years; over 13 years as a Municipal and Magistrate Judge, positions I presently hold."

He has been certified by the N.M. Law Enforcement Academy. He has attended over 14 training schools for judges at state expense. "The taxpayer has an interest in my judicial education," he adds.

Ortiz and his wife, Cecilia are the parents of four sons and one daughter, all UNM graduates. The sons, a Lt. Colonel in the Air Force serving in England; a solar system school student; a professor at the State University in North Carolina and an acting director for the Housing Authority, City of Albuquerque. Their daughter is a dental technician in Santa Maria, Cal.

Ortiz said about his work, "I don't have any outside interests, so I devote more time to the administration of my office than the law requires. I hold court sessions 5 days a week at City Hall at 8:00 P.M. to whatever time it takes to dispose of municipal court business, plus 24 hour availability."

"In my position of trust, I have had numerous audits and never has there been a deficiency found, financial or otherwise. In my position of municipal judge I would say that there hasn't been over 3 or 4 appeals on my decisions in over 13 years."

Recreation Area Back to Town

LINCOLN County Arriba held a general membership meeting Feb. 7. 


