The blessing and dedication of the new church doors and church hall at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Capitan took place last Sunday afternoon, February 21. Robert F. Sanchez, archbishop of

Santa Fe conducted the ceremony. Deacon Steve Sanchez, who will be ordained in May accompanied the archbishop to Capitan.

Mr. Kevin Wolff of Capitan, parishioner and parish council

member, carved and donated the art work which he created on the double doors leading into the church. The left door features a cross, the right door a life size figure of Christ. Wolff is a

professional wood carver.

Inside the hall, Archbishop Sanchez addressed a standing-room-only crowd. He commended the people involved in the planning and construction of the church additions. The church itself was built in 1950. The new hall includes a kitchen and restroom facilities. The hall, a multi-purpose room will be used for meetings, classes, and receptions.

Sacred Heart of Capitan is a mission of Carrizozo's Santa Rita Catholic Community, whose pastor is Fr. Dave Bergs. Other missions include Sacred Heart in Ft. Stanton and St. John the Baptist in Lincoln.

Volunteer labor plus \$21,000 was required to make the Capitan church hall dream a reality. During the dedication, engraved plaques were presented by Fr. Bergs to the building committee. This committee consisted of William Allred and Joe Salazar, co-

chairmen; John Wilson and Emetiro "Hoppy" Gutierrez.

Gutierrez is administrator at Camp Sierra Blanca, Adult Rehabilitation Center at Fort Stanton. He acknowledged five men from the Camp who worked on the hall roof and were present at the dedication; Pedro Tartaglia, Manuel Silva, Tito Martinez, Phillip Rael and Ruben Savedra.

In addition to the plaques, Fr. Bergs also distributed 30 certificates to various people who were instrumental in the hall building project.

Among the speakers at the dedication were parish council president, Christobal Zamora of Lincoln and Fr. Kevin Moynihan of Assumption parish in Roswell. Fr. Moynihan is a former Santa Rita pastor.

Following the dedication ceremony, a pot-luck supper was enjoyed in the new hall, a source of

pride to Capitan parishioners. Frank Miller of Capitan wrote the following poem for the occasion of the dedication:

## Carol Schlarb Heads Bike-A-Thon

Carol Schlarb has been appointed chairperson of the annual Bike-A-Thon on April 17 in Carrizozo sponsored by the New Mexico Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The appointment was announced by Joel Cooperman, President, New Mexico Chapter, who noted that funds raised in the event will support research and treatment programs of the Foundation.

"We hope to get the full participation of Carrizozo in the event," said Mrs. Schlarb. "Together with thousands of other

volunteers working on similar fund-raising events nationally, we can make a strong impact on the fight to conquer cystic fibrosis."

The principal goal of research is to find a cure for cystic fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic cause of death of American children and young adults. At present, the disease affects one of every 1,800 births. Approximately half of those born with CF do not live past their teens.

The New Mexico Chapter is one of 72 Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Chapters in the country. The Foundation's mission is to find the

means for prevention, control, and effective treatment of cystic fibrosis. In addition to providing annual research grants to study the causes of the presently incurable disease, the Foundation also supports a nationwide network of 127 CF Centers. These Centers specialize in diagnosis and medical care for patients as well as services for CF families.

## Bond, Mill Levy Approved

The majority of Capitan's residents who live within the boundaries of the school district voted "yes" for the proposed \$400,000.00 bond issue and the two mill levy to finance the completion

of the multipurpose building, purchase needed equipment and do necessary work on the school grounds.

On the bond issue, 183 voters were in favor and 46 voters against. The two mill levy brought in 178 'yes' votes and 45 'no' votes.

The Capitan municipal school district will now put out bids for the

construction of the new facility. The site where it is to be built is being prepared; an old building there will be razed.

New construction is scheduled to begin in about 45 days or so. The new multipurpose building will be used for school and community functions.

## Church Name Changed

Kenneth O. Frey, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene located on the denominational New Mexico District Campgrounds at Angus, announces a change in the name of the church.

The new name is the Angus Church of the Nazarene. The Church was first organized in 1916 and was known as the Providence Church of the Nazarene during the time the group worshiped in its first building located between Nogal and Capitan. In 1921 the congregation relocated in Capitan as the Capitan Church of the Nazarene and remained there until it moved to Angus in 1976.

Under the new name, the church is described as "The Friendly Intermountain Fellowship." This characterizes the purpose of the church as

providing not only a place of worship for members and friends but also as offering a fellowship center to accommodate a variety of related community activities (social, musical, recreational) through extensive use of Campground facilities.

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## CAPITAN VOTERS



KELLY BEAVERS

Let me introduce myself. I am Vernon Kelly Beavers, candidate for Mayor in the upcoming city election. I live in Capitan with my wife, Bart, and son, David. David is a Junior at Capitan High School.

I retired from the Air Force in November 1974 and moved to Roswell. In 1977 we purchased a lot in the Big Country Subdivision and in 1979, became residents of Capitan.

I was manager and an administrator for most of the 27 years that I was in the Air Force. Many times I had over a hundred people working under my supervision, both military and civilian. I prepared budgets, justified these budgets and operated on the funds that I was given. I am fully aware that there is no substitute for systematic planning if you are to obtain the most from money, manpower, materials, and equipment.

I also want to take this opportunity to state a few of the issues and my position on them.

ISSUE: It is a genuine feeling among the citizens of Capitan, that our accelerated growth over the past eight years has exceeded our water resources. But contrary to how the people feel, more land is being annexed into the village at our monthly council meetings.

POSITION: Stop annexing land into the village and make a study to obtain a reasonable estimate as to how much water would be available in any given year. If our growth has exceeded our water resources, then a large problem, one that will seriously affect all of us, is being magnified by each additional annexation.

ISSUE: Some of our streets are in bad need of repair. But gravel purchased for roads was erroneously put in alleys. There are no street signs in some of our subdivisions and this could cause an emergency vehicle to be delayed in getting to a fire or reaching a person who is seriously ill or injured.

POSITION: Limited funds will not allow us to do everything at once. But a plan should be developed and priorities assigned to the various tasks to be accomplished. When funds are available, this plan would show where the money is to be spent and what is to be done. The safety of our citizens should be number one priority.

ISSUE: You have been told that improvements have been made to our water system and that they were funded in part by grants from the State of New Mexico. But you have not been told that some funds had to be borrowed and that we will be paying this money back thru July 1, 2000. Tax dollars are being spent to retire these debts.

POSITION: There is no news paper in the Village and it is difficult to obtain information by this media. But I as mayor, would call a special meeting to inform citizens of important topics, such as hiring a Village manager, building a new village hall, construction of a raw water storage facility, etc. These topics are presented at monthly council meetings, however, there is limited seating capacity and not many people attend. The agenda is not publicized and no one knows what is going to be discussed at any given meeting. Therefore, special meetings are needed to inform citizens of major improvements and changes that are going to be made in the community and what these will cost in terms of tax dollars. These meetings should be advertised at least a week in advance and held in the Fair building or some other area with ample seating.

I will be available at all times to all citizens and ask you to join me in making Capitan a better and safer place to live.

### HOW ABOUT SOME CHEESE CAKE

- 2 1/2 C. Iowleback crumbs
- 1/4 C. butter melted
- 2 T sugar
- 1 Tsp. cinnamon
- 1 Lb. cream cheese
- 1/2 C sugar
- 1/2 Tsp. vanilla
- 1 Tsp. grated lemon rind
- 1 T. Lemon juice
- 2 eggs separated
- 1 C sour cream
- 1 T. sugar

Blend crumbs, butter, 2 Tablespoons sugar, and cinnamon. Reserve 1 Cup crumbs for the topping and press the remainder onto the greased bottom and sides of a 9 inch form pan. Bake 5 minutes in a slow oven, 300 degrees, cool.

Have cream cheese at room temperature, then blend with 1/2 cup sugar, vanilla, grated lemon rind and juice. Add egg yolks, one at a time, mixing well after each yolk is added. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and pour the mix into the cooled crust. Return to slow oven, 300 degrees, and bake 45 mins. longer, or until done.

Remove from oven and spread the top of the cake with sour cream blended with the remaining 1 Tablespoon sugar sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Return to oven 10 min. Cool cake on cake rack before removing to platter. Serves 8.

### New Lock Program

There have been a number of incidents involving the theft of personal articles from Carrizozo's students gym lockers this year. The thefts have occurred when a visiting athletic team uses the Carrizozo lockeroom facilities to dress for an athletic event, many articles such as gym shorts, tennis shoes and shirts are reported missing. Carrizozo principal, Dennis Sidebottom, said, "Yes, it is becoming quite a serious problem. We have decided to take some action to help solve the situation. From now on we will require that all students have locks for their gym lockers. To make it easier for them to do this, the school will purchase enough combination locks out of their Physical Education teacher for gym lockers, and from the office for hall lockers."

The students will be required to leave a deposit to cover the cost of the lock if it is lost. At the end of the school year the deposit will be returned to the student when he or she returns the lock. Only school issued locks will be allowed on lockers next year. This will help in many ways. Since the school has a record of all combinations, should a student forget his combination, he can come to the office for it rather than going all the way home. We always have to cut many locks off lockers through the course of a year because of lost

keys and lost combinations. Our new lock program should alleviate these problems."

### Host Families

The Carrizozo schools are seeking families to host foreign exchange students for the school year 82-83. The lengths of host periods are 3, 6, or 9 months. There is no cost to the family, however, room, board and laundry accommodations must be provided. Students will be of high school age and will be assigned to host family in ample time to permit correspondence between themselves and the foreign families. For further information contact Mr. Roueche (counselor) or Dr. Miller.

### Scholarship Drive

The annual scholarship drive for academic and vocational scholarships in Carrizozo schools has begun. Last year ten scholarships were awarded to graduating seniors. This year due to the cutback in higher education funds for students, additional scholarships are being requested.
