Special Town Council Meeting--

Severe Sore "band-aided" for New Council

"It's only a band-aid on a severe sore," stated Mayor Manuel Hernandez to the NEWS following the brief special town meeting last Friday. He was referring to the action taken by the council regarding his suggestion for keeping the golf course open.

Hernandez said he called the special meeting because it had been brought to his attention that the previous weekend many golfers had used the greens and that the town, "lost out in quite a bit of revenue." His suggestion was that they let George Serna, one of the town's employees work at the golf course after completing his assignments on his regular work schedule.

"That way we don't have to hire someone. Of course we have no funds to do so," Hernandez said. "I think that's the only way we're going to be able to afford to keep the greens wet and the tee boxes taken care of. After that I think it will be up to the new council."

Town foreman, Emilio Beltran when asked for his opinion, replied that summer work for his understaffed crew is always heavy, but, "we can give it a try."

Trustee Roy Harmon made the motion to utilize Serna at the golf course until the new council takes over next month. Serna is willing to work weekends until then.

"If we let those greens die, it's going to cost us a lot of money to redo," said Hernandez who did not run for re-election. He was first elected in 1976 as trustee.

Municipal judge, S.M. Ortiz had a suggestion regarding golf course revenue. His idea was that the police department be moved to the golf course control building. Police clerk Rosemary Gallegos would collect golfing fees.

Although willing to help the cause, Police Chief, C.A. Morales did not approve of the suggestion. He said it would be an inconvenience in the posting of bonds and handling of citations to travel out of the town limits where the golf course is located.

Hernandez said that Albert LaFave, deputy clerk is willing to take green fees at the golf course but not on the first and last week of each month when the town hall business is heavy.

Mr. Phillip Haseltine of Santa Fe, representative of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR) was on hand at the special meeting. He told the council that according to the agreement that was signed by the town and the National Resource Department, the facility is to remain open and a viable recreation area. He said the "federal people who put in 50 percent may request that the town reimburse approximately \$170,000" if guidelines determined when the project originated are not followed. The funding was for the acquisition and development of the project and does not provide for maintenance. The council learned from Haseltine that the program and his position will be phased out within six weeks.

Haseltine said that in talking with town clerk, Carol Schlarb and former Lincoln County Arriba, Inc. president, Bill Payne that the community has tried to support the project. Haseltine's advise was that the town keep the Recreation Area open part of the year or on a part-time basis. The area includes the golf course, two lakes, tennis court, baseball field and playground.

On the question of leasing the area, Haseltine said, "As long as it is maintained for outdoor recreation purposes it can be leased."

Mr. Ivan Hall of Roswell representative of South Eastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SEMEDD) was also present at the special meeting. Addressing the municipal candidates in the audience, he said that they should take note that the closing of the "golf course" could cause the town some problems in the future. "Some how you need to keep it open."

The Recreation Area, which includes the 9-hole golf course was recently returned to the town by Arriba. The non-profit corporation ran out of funds to continue the operation of the facility. Arriba will now focus their efforts on the Rec Center and swimming pool at Spencer Park. Carrizozo Schools managed the pool last year and indications are that they will do so again this summer. Arriba's interest now centers on the preservation of the Rec Center and its programs, Payne said last month.

Arriba's new officers are: Morgan Maxwell, president; "Bud" Payne, vice president; Jim Miller, treasurer and Johnson Stearns, secretary. Twenty area people serve as board directors.

At the town's special meeting last Friday, trustee Betty Fields, who heads the Streets and Parks department reported on the paving project: "I have bad news."

She said that Mr. Tony Lara of the State Highway Department had been to the town hall to meet with town foreman, Emilio Beltran and that Beltran was busy and didn't have time (or refused) to review the streets with Lara.

Fields said that Lara arrived at her office extremely unhappy saying, "If the city of Carrizozo didn't care about their streets anymore than that you can forget about the State Highway helping in any way."

Fields said that after an hour's discussion, Lara agreed to come back and talk with the new council. Lara pointed out that if local

streets were not any cleaner or repaired his department would not use any money on Carrizozo because it would be "like throwing it out the window."

Hernandez asked Fields, "You did tell him we were doing as much as we could with what we have?" She answered that she had and his response was that here is a lot of brooms and the town should go out and sweep the streets."

Beltran later stated to the

NEWS that street repair material is not readily available and that the red tape involved in obtaining needed supplies make for a long wait. Beltran also told the NEWS that he tried in vain to contact Lara the day the highway official arrived in Carrizozo. That same day an urgent problem at the water plant required Beltran's immediate attention. Beltran said he was not available to meet with Lara because representatives

from the Health and Environmental Improvement Service were in town regarding the repair of the floride pump. Beltran said his work at the water plant is his main priority. "I have the health of the town to consider"

Lara will return at a later date to meet the new council. He will study a street priority list and may consider funding for a portion of the streets instead of all 33.

Alabama goober-grabber--

Pallie Dishman Celebrates 90th

Pallie Dishman, a long-time resident of Corona, will celebrate her 90th birthday this month. There will be an informal reception from two to four P.M. in the Corona Recreation Room on Saturday, March 13th to celebrate this special birthday.

Pallie was the first child born to Lucy Edwards and W.T. Hester, making her arrival on March 16, 1892. Pallie spent nearly fifty years believing she had been born in Georgia. She tells of visiting an aunt during a trip back to Georgia. The two women were discussing when Pallie's parent's move across the state line from Georgia into Alabama. Pallie had assumed that the move had taken place after her

birth, a notion her aunt denied, stating emphatically that Pallie had definitely been born in Hoosier, Alabama. Pallie's comment was, "I spent fifty years believing I was a Georgia peach, only to find out that I'm actually an Alabama goober-grabber."

Pallie was the eldest child followed by seven more, two sisters and five brothers. When she was nine, Pallie and her family moved to Blum, Texas. It was here that she would later meet Wilbur S. Dishman. The two were married when Pallie was seventeen years old. They obtained their marriage license in Haskell, Texas, and were married in Weinert, Texas. Pallie

says she went into marriage believing she was grown up and knew everything, only to find out how much she DIDN'T know. Moving to New Mexico and settling on a homestead east of Corona soon taught her, out of sheer necessity to learn to do a little of everything.

In 1925, Pallie and Wilbur moved into the rock house on Main Street, where Pallie still lives. Pallie and Wilbur had two children of their own. Pallie says, however that she helped raise many more than her own two. Four of her sisters and brothers lived with them at different times, along with various other young friends and relatives. "Everytime we went visiting we'd bring home more than we started out with." Pallie remembers Pallie and Wilbur had been married for sixty five years at his death in 1974.

Pallie's hobbies are many and varied, and she still actively pursues many of them. Her first love would have to be her arrowhead collection. She started collecting arrowheads when she would take her granddaughter on picnics. The hobby soon turned into a full-time occupation. A beautiful coffee table, inlaid with a design made from some of these arrowheads graces her living room, and she has made several more of them to give to friends.

Pallie was a licensed beauty operator for many years, and did practical nursing as the need arose. She was also one of the original members of the Cedarvale Quilting Club, and would ride horseback half the way to Cedarvale and catch a ride with a friend who owned a car the rest of the way. She has a love for young people, and taught school for nearly fifty years. Pallie was always so active that her friends would tease her saying that she washed dishes with her bonnet on so that when someone came by and said "Let's go," she would be ready.

Besides collecting arrowheads, Pallie makes jewelry from snakebones, buttons and shells, and has done lovely flower arrangements using dried Bois'darc apples, turtle and coconut shells, buttons and cloth. She also has a large collection of dolls she has made.

Pallie's son William E. Dishman, presently lives in Corona, while her daughter, Zelpha Atkinson and husband Joe live in Belen, New Mexico. Zelpha and Joe have one daughter, Hester Joanne Stewart who lives in Claude, Texas with her husband, Sam and two children, Amy and Will. Their other daughter, Helen Kay Lindsey, lives on a ranch near Claunch, New Mexico, with her husband Wayne and their two children, Michael and Waynette.

DID YOU KNOW?

"TLC"

When you enter the Sunshine Day Care Center on C Avenue, Carrizozo, you are immediately impressed by the youngsters, usually sitting in a circle with a teacher leading them. What are they doing? These youngsters are in a learning process. They learn to tell time, to read, answer questions and a host of other things; not only in English but some of these things are also taught in the Spanish language. In addition, some part of every day they participate in some type of arts and crafts activities. Children enrolled in the Day Care Center have a schedule of

classes, snacks, meals, naps and also plenty of play time every work day hour 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM. Most children have usually arrived by 8:00 AM. At 9:00 AM they have a snack of toast and/or muffins and fruit juice. At 11:15 AM a varied well-balanced lunch is served. At 3:00 PM a snack of Kool-Aid, crackers and fresh fruit is again provided. Children are usually picked up by 5:30 PM. Incidentally, the State of New Mexico must approve of everything the center does. This includes approving a license to go into business, hiring of employees and to the size of the bathrooms and the quality and quantity of the diets.

The Sunshine Day Care Center is owned by two of the fairer sex in our community. They are Charlotte Wall and Carolyn Cantrell. Charlotte Wall is the wife of Carrizozo Attorney Don Wall. This young couple arrived here about 3 years ago from Louisiana. Carolyn Cantrell is the wife of Jim Cantrell. This young couple have been in business several years in the only manufacturing industry Carrizozo has - they own BELCO Industries. While Charlotte Wall was a housewife she saw a real need for a day care center. It became more apparent to Charlotte when Ryland (now 2½) joined his sister Courtney (now 5).

Plans materialized and soon Jim Cantrell designed and was putting up this modern 1820 square foot building. In December, 1981 this solar heated, 3 bathroom, one kitchen and two nursery room Center opened its doors. The day this writer visited, employees Mary Hasenbuhler and Charlene Brown had the 18 tots entranced during story telling time. Also one 6-month old was sleeping

peacefully in the nursery. The Center also has a fenced yard in the rear for outside activities, weather permitting.

The Day Care Center has an allowed maximum of 40 children. To give you some idea how well the State of New Mexico monitors Day Care Centers the State requires the Center to keep copies of their menus for one year in case anybody wants to see them. In addition, the State requires children two years and under must be kept separated from the older children because of health and other reasons.

Charlotte Wall, who does the day-to-day operating, says she is very pleased with community response. Not only does she have 18 children enrolled but a Child Development Class from Carrizozo High School, with Laura Jones as

teacher, comes over one hour every Monday thru Thursday. This class not only participates in the daily activities but it is also a learning experience about children this age. Charlotte says she visited a number of Day Care Centers between here and Louisiana and tried to adopt the best features from the Centers she saw.

The Sunshine Day Care Center provides your child with clean, well-disciplined and healthful care and training by conscientious young mothers. In addition, the Center pumps money back into the economy of Carrizozo in the form of purchases, salaries, taxes, utilities, etc.

Kids from six weeks to nine years are welcome here. They can be full-time or drop-ins when Mom has an emergency or just wants to go shopping. Here they'll celebrate birthday parties, Valentine's Day or just go for a walk. The freezer is always full of food and the three bathrooms are usually available. And Charlotte will welcome anybody, enrollee or visitor with a great big smile.

Cheryl Hiltzley Heads Walk-A-Thon

Cheryl Hiltzley has been appointed chairperson of the Walk-a-thon on April 17 in Corona sponsored by the New Mexico Chapter Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The appointment was announced by Joel Cooperman, President, New Mexico Chapter, who noted that funds raised in the event will support research and treatment programs of the Foundation.

"We hope to get the full participation of Corona in the event," said Ms. Hiltzley. "Together with thousands of other volunteers working on similar fund-raising events nationally, we can make a strong impact on the fight to conquer cystic fibrosis."

The principal goal of research is to find a cure for cystic fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic cause of death of American

children and young adults. At present, the disease affects one of every 1,800 births. Approximately half of those born with CF do not live past their teens.

The New Mexico Chapter is one of 72 Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Chapters in the country. The Foundation's mission is to find the means for prevention, control, and effective treatment of cystic fibrosis. In addition to providing annual research grants to study the causes of the presently incurable disease, the Foundation also supports a nationwide network of 127 CF centers. These Centers specialize in diagnosis and medical care for patients as well as services for CF families.

The first New Mexico training sessions will begin March 20 after the contingent of Extension professionals and adult leaders return from the regional training institute. The Kellogg Foundation grant is also supporting Family Leadership Projects in Colorado, Oregon, Washington, Alaska and Hawaii.

"We will work through the existing Cooperative Extension Service network in New Mexico to get women involved in the public policy decision making process, or to get them back into it," she said.

The major focus of the project will be in the fields of housing, health services, educational opportunities and the fair sharing of community resources, Mrs. Payne said.

The group that will attend the Portland training session represents all areas of New Mexico.

The Extension professionals in the group are Mrs. Payne, Carrizozo; Dina Chacon, New Mexico State University at Las Cruces; Jewell Limacher, Roswell; Virginia Jones, Lordsburg; and Margaret Dines, Silver City.

The adult leaders in this group are Blanche Wagoner, Bloomfield; Marcia Fitzer, Estancia; Margaret Hough, Deming; Germaine Werner, Roswell; Doris Greig, Hobbs; Kay Lowrey, Roswell; Lynda Small, Las Cruces; and Evelyn Davis, Tucuman.

In addition, Dr. Kathryn Treat, assistant dean for home economics at NMSU, is a member of the project's regional policy board.



Attend Funeral

Mr. and Mrs. Leandro Vega, Jr. attended the funeral of state Sen. Willie Chavez, R-Valencia last week. He was a first cousin of Mrs. Vega (Delfina). Other first cousins who attended the burial service were Mr. and Mrs. Richard Vega, Carrizozo; Mr. and Mrs. George Mendoza and Sheriff and Mrs. Ernesto Sanchez, San Patricio; Mr. and Mrs. Brezel Sanchez, Roswell.

Sen. Chavez, 40, died February 22 at Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque. His body lay in state in the rotunda of the Capitol in Santa Fe on February 24. Members of the N.M. National Guard provided an honor guard. He lived in Belen and was buried in nearby Tome.

Chavez was elected to the Senate in 1974 from Valencia County's District 29. He was re-elected in 1978 and recently announced he would seek the Republican nomination to Congress from the state's new 3rd Congressional District.

Cubs Celebrate

Sir Robert Baden-Powell of Great Britain started the Boy

Scout Movement in 1904, when he organized a camp for 20 boys. The movement spread to the U.S. as the result of a "good turn" performed for William D. Boyce, an American businessman, in 1910. A British Boy Scout helped Boyce find his way in a London fog. Boyce and others founded the Boy Scouts of America. More than 8 million boys and adult leaders now belong to the Boy Scouts of America.

Any boy from 8 to 18 years old may become a Scout in a program designed for his age level: Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting and Exploring. Cub Scouting began in 1980. It is for boys from 8 to 10 years old.

Carrizozo's Cub Scout Pack 153 celebrated the 72nd year of Scouting with a pot-luck banquet last Saturday. Cub Scouts of Den I, II, and III and their parents enjoyed a variety of delicious foods.

The evening's program began with Den II leader Bill Portio narrating a play, 'Unknown Scouts Good Turn.' The play was about the start of Scouting in 1910 in the U.S. Cub Scout Paul Herrera played the part of the British scout who helped William D. Boyce find his way in a London fog. The boy refused a tip, saying he was a scout and could not receive payment for a good deed.

Christopher Schlarb was cast as Boyce, a Chicago publisher. Boyce's interest in Scouting grew out of this incident which is now a highlight of scouting history. Others who took part in the performance were Damien Luna, Michael Chavez, Rongi and Rodney Serna.

During the banquet, Den I and III, whose leaders are Cherylne Tyree, Wayland Hill and Lou Beltran, participated in other program activities which made the event an enjoyable time for all.

Dawn Eaker, who attends Albuquerque's Del Norte High School was featured in the sports pages of the Albuquerque Journal last week. Dawn is the daughter of former Carrizozo resident and graduate John Eaker, son of the late "Red" Eaker.

Dawn is following the footsteps of her grandmother, the late Grace Taylor Eaker, who was a member of the 1923 Carrizozo girls' basketball team. "Carrizozo won what passed for the state title that year," wrote Journal sports writer, Kevin Buey. To duplicate the feat in her senior season is what Dawn is quoted as saying. A third-year varsity player, Dawn is the captain of the Knights and helped guide them to a third-place finish in District 2AAAAA this season.

24 Years Ago

The following was culled from the April 4, 1959 files of the Lincoln County News:

Two faces will be around the Carrizozo town council meeting table as a result of Tuesday's election. They are Austin Wooten and C. D. May. The latter led all candidates in vote compilation, receiving 178 votes. Mr. Wooten's total was 151 to win a place on the council over incumbent A. T. Roberts who had a total of 137 votes.

Paulina Aldaz was successful in his bid for police magistrate, winning 173 to 93 for over incumbent John Mackey.

Wayne C. Withers, unopposed for his second term as Carrizozo's mayor received a vote total of 197. Numerous write-ins appeared on the ballots cast. For mayor Jimmy Lucero received 3 votes and Vernon Petty and Welcolm Armstrong 2 each. One vote each went to Gwenth Petty, R.M. Shafer, Will Ed Harris, Ignacio Sedillo, Fred English, Johnson Stearns, Walter Burnett, Cliff Zumwalt and Otto Prehm.

Write-ins for trustees were Marvin Roberts 2, Dan Luera 1 and Ward Leslie 1.

Mrs. Minnie Reil received one write-in vote for police magistrate.

Capitan's voters swept a "Citizens Ticket" into office in Tuesday's election. Joe Rench was elected mayor with a vote total of 116 over incumbent mayor D.O. Murphy, with 44. Joe Bert Cheney led the Citizens Ticket in the race for one of two-council positions, with 136. Joe Otero with 122, followed by Joseph P. Randle with 44.

Forty-two votes were cast in Carrizozo's municipal election. Incumbent mayor Cleve Brown received 37 votes, with 1 write-in vote each for Bud Bagley and Jesse Wade.

For councilman (two to be elected) the totals were: Lee Thomas 21, I.H. Carnell 19, Ernest Luera 15, Bud Bagley 14, Ernest Yandell 4, and 1 each for Archie Perkins, Bill Winchester, V.C. Waldon, Jack Chancey, W.S. Dishman and Wm. Pfeiffer.

And defeat a good Weed team the girls did do Saturday evening in Weed to become the Regional Champions for the second year in a row. "That was a tremendous effort that was put forth by the girls," commented Coach Koller. "We knew it would take a good effort to win and we did play well except for a brief period in the second half especially the third quarter. They outscored us, but we did not fold, " THE COACH CONTINUED.

Denise Vega again led in scoring with 14 points, 1 assist and 2 steals. Once again Lisa Crenshaw and Christetta Chavez were close behind. Lisa had 8 points, 12 big rebounds, 2 assists and 5 steals. Christetta also had 8 points, 7 rebounds, 1 assist and 1 steal. The defensive performer Mary Jane Ferguson, again played very strong until foul trouble and eventually fouled out. "Mary did not score but played Tami Van Winkle very strong" said her coach, "with 3 very key steals and forcing several turnovers. I don't care if she never scores as long as she continues to play defense as she has" her coach continued. Rosie Lueras came through in some very clutch plays scoring 10 points with 2 assists and running

the offense very well.
Coach Koller commented, "this is what it is all about. This is what we have worked for all season long, another trip to the state tournament. I felt that we could accomplish this feat for another year and that's why I pushed the girls so hard. There were probably times that the girls disliked me

pretty much during the season, but I think they will look back at all the hard work and see why I pushed them so hard.

The State Girl Basketball Tournament begins March 3 - 6 with Class A beginning the tournament at 9:00 a.m. The two teams that start the tournament out are Carrizozo and Reserve.
