

# FFA chapter gets award, meets the president

Carrizozo FFA Chapter members, along with representatives from FFA chapters all over the nation, met with President Ronald Reagan in the Rose Garden of the White House last Tuesday at 11 a.m.

Due in part to tight security regulations, only John Hemphill, Matt Ferguson, Supt. Jim Miller and FFA Advisor Mike Gaines of the local chapter were allowed to visit with the president.

Other dignitaries present during the visit were John Blount, Secretary of Agriculture, and Terrance Bell, Secretary of Education.

The award presentation for the Carrizozo chapter was made Wednesday at a 6:30 p.m. banquet at the Hyatt Regency Hotel by Charles Seaton, vice-president for operations, Estech, Inc., the Chicago-based farm supply corporation which sponsors the

energy awards. Seaton is a former 1953 FFA president.

Making the trip to Washington were John Hemphill, chapter president, Melody Hefker, Mary Jane Ferguson, Roxanne Gabel, Stephen Payne, Joe Curtiss, Randy Hollis and Daryl Lindsay. Matt Ferguson, past president of the local FFA chapter and energy committee chairman; Mike Gaines, FFA advisor; Dr. Jim Miller, school superintendent;

Lyn Miller and Pagan Roueche accompanied the members.

During the seven-day trip the Carrizozo FFA members visited historic sites in Washington including the Smithsonian Institution, Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials, with a side trip to the World's Fair in Knoxville, TN.

The local delegation also visited with US Senators Pete Domenici and Harrison Schmitt before returning.

Outstanding efforts in energy conservation have helped four FFA chapters win regional awards in the 1982 FFA Energy Challenge.

The energy program sponsored by Estech, Inc., as a special project of the National FFA Foundation, is the FFA's response to a 1979 challenge from former President Jimmy Carter for the organization "to take the lead

## Multiple shootout

# 'Old Lincoln Days' begins Friday, unless . . .

Visitors to Lincoln's Aug. 6-8 Billy the Kid Pageant may get more shootouts than they pay for.

One involves the reenactment of Billy's jailbreak. Another may be between sponsors of the annual festival and a state agency that threatens to stop it. The third may be between Democrats and Republicans, expected to turn out in force to peddle their political wares.

This year, according to Sue Graham, corresponding secretary of the Lincoln Pageant and Festival Corp., the State Monuments Division which owns the pageant facilities, has demanded that sponsors pay a total of \$1,375 in advance, or pay over half the net gate receipts of the pageant. In the past, she said, a lease has been obtained for \$1 a year.

"They also wanted a full

accounting, and said the demands were non-negotiable. Graham told the News, "We are not going to give them (Monuments Division) half the proceeds and the pageant will go on. She said the state contends that sponsors are spending tax dollars that help the grounds and send four additional employees to Lincoln.

The LPFC retorted that tax dollars are not being spent and nobody asked for four state employees to police the Old Lincoln Days celebration.

Meanwhile, back at the courthouse, Attorney Bill Payne said he is prepared to seek a temporary restraining order to prevent the state from tearing down and dismantling the pageant grounds, as Tom Caperton, head of State Monuments, has

threatened to do. The order would permit the pageant to continue as scheduled with differences to be reconciled at a later date.

Attorney Payne said the state may tear down the pageant facilities after the pageant this year if an agreement isn't reached but doubted the state would interfere with this year's production.

When Dennis, a LPFC board member, said he hated to see this happen. We had such good relations with the state. He said the fault wasn't all with the state, however, as the board did neglect to sign the required lease when asked to do so.

He also said the Democratic Party was planning a big "Whoop-de-do" to coincide with the pageant and that Republican gubernatorial candidate John Irick and US Sen. Harrison Schmitt would come to Lincoln Sunday morning, Aug. 8, to observe the political day.

Old Lincoln Days gets underway Friday with the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" pageant at 8 p.m.

A 25-mile and 50-mile endurance race will begin at 6:30 a.m. Saturday and end with presentation of awards to winners at a Saturday night banquet.

Pony Express riders will leave White Oaks at 8:30 a.m. Saturday and arrive about 10 a.m. bearing specially-stamped US mail.

There will be a square dance exhibition by a Roswell group Saturday at 7:30 p.m., a fiddlers contest at 1:30 p.m. Saturday and continuous displays of blacksmithing and other historic demonstrations and displays.

# Fiesta, Peoples Market Place draws its biggest crowd

An estimated 2,000 persons swarmed over Spencer Park Sunday to enjoy the annual Fiesta and Peoples Market Place.

Termed the biggest and best in its seven-year history, it was under direction of Mignon Sims and Rayne Greer of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce and Father Dave Bergs of Santa Rita Catholic Church.

Liz Beltran was named Fiesta Queen, with Christetta Chavez of Carrizozo and Nienfa Chavez of Capitan as Princesses. The queen contest netted approximately \$4,000 for Santa Rita Parish, which is \$600 more than last year, according to Fr. Bergs.

There were more than 50 vendors who came from such places as Lubbock and El Paso,

TX, and Carlsbad and Santa Fe, NM. They had a variety of booths offering everything from food to arts and craft items to antiques. Young children were entertained with pony rides furnished by Some and Frank Silva of Capitan.

Mass was held by Fr. Bergs at 11 a.m. Sunday under the shade trees at Spencer Park. Music for the mass was supplied by the church choir, accompanied by Joe Salazar of Capitan's Sacred Heart Church.

A Pretty Legs Contest featured 18 pair of hairy male legs, with first prize going to Lanny Roberts, a vendor from Carlsbad. Second place went to Attorney Don Wall, and sheriff's deputy Gilbert Archuleta came in third. To screams of delight from admiring females, they left with

prizes donated by Gamble's Hardware, Family Pharmacy and the Nike Bar.

A crowd-pleaser was an exhibition by the Spanish Dancers of Sacred Heart Church of Capitan. The group is directed by Rosemary Wolf.

During the afternoon, foot-tapping music was furnished by the Carrizozo Outlaws - Curtis Zumwalt, Louie Padilla, Linda and Doug Scoggins, and led by Glen Ellison.

Raffle winners claimed prizes all afternoon. From an oversize boxing glove made by Polly Chavez and autographed by Randall "Tex" Cobb to a large box of groceries donated by St. Rita Church to quilts made by the Zia Senior Citizens Center and Santa Rita Quilting Group.

among all youth groups in our war for energy security." During the past three years, thousands of FFA chapters across the country have conducted energy projects to make their homes and communities more energy efficient.

The 1982 Southern Region Award Winner is the Dorman FFA Chapter of Spartanburg, SC. Members of that chapter have conducted a community-wide energy awareness campaign to help convey the need for energy conservation.

FFA members have hosted an adult education program about the use of wood as a home heating source, and have cooperated with a local power company in holding an energy conservation program on National Energy Education Day. Members have also involved other community youth in their efforts by instigating an energy essay and poster contest in the school district's elementary and middle schools.

Dorman Chapter members themselves have strived to set a good example for conserving energy. They have established an energy reference file to aid in setting up individual conservation programs at home. They have also conducted an "energy survey" of all members, to monitor their own best efforts at efficient energy use.

The promotion of solar and wind energy as alternate energy sources has helped Carrizozo, NM, FFA Chapter win the Western Region FFA Energy Challenge Award.

Chapter members have involved both the town of Carrizozo

and local industry in a four-month project to install a solar heating unit in the Carrizozo Community Center. Members have built and installed 40 four-foot by ten-foot solar panels in the building. The switch to solar heat is expected to reduce the community center's energy bills by more than 30 percent.

Members have also cooperated with the New Mexico State University College of Agriculture in conducting a windmill and photovoltaic technology workshop for ranchers and general contractors. They have mailed information on windmill construction and maintenance to all area ranchers, and have reassembled an old windmill outside the school's vocational shop for use in teaching proper windmill mechanics and maintenance.

Promoting the use of alternate energy sources and encouraging energy conservation are the objectives of the Clinton, IL, FFA award-winning program from the Central Region.

Chapter members received federal funding to build their own grain alcohol still. They then conducted research to compare the fuel efficiency of 145-proof grain alcohol derived from artichokes, cracked wheat and corn. Results of their experiments have been publicized throughout the state.

Members have also experimented with solar energy by

building and comparing the energy efficiency of four different types of solar collectors.

And in an effort to cut the Clinton High School's energy bills, chapter members have undertaken a windbreak project, planting and helping maintain 200 young evergreen trees near the school building.

The James Wood FFA Chapter's comprehensive energy conservation plan has increased public awareness of energy use in Frederick County, VA. It has also resulted in an Eastern Region FFA Energy Challenge Award for the Winchester, VA, chapter.

With the organization of a chapter energy committee and the assistance of other community groups, FFA members have helped establish the Shenandoah Area Volunteers for Energy, Inc. (SAVE). SAVE have been instrumental in identifying and meeting the energy needs of the community, and in raising community consciousness of efficient energy use.

Chapter members have helped conduct seven no-cost-low-cost energy workshops, informing community members of inexpensive ways they can save energy in their homes. FFA'ers have also presented a series of energy "mini-demonstrations" at a local shopping mall, explaining to passers-by everything from how to weather-strip doors to how to construct a solar window box collector.

And during National FFA

Week, the chapter took advantage of the opportunity to draw special attention to energy conservation, by having the week officially designated as "Energy Awareness Week."

These four regional award-winning chapters will compete for the top FFA Energy Challenge Award, to be presented at the 1982 National FFA Convention in Kansas City this November.

going on all during the weekend.

A mini-parade for children will be held Sunday at 1:30 p.m., and a 3 p.m. matinee performance of the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" and another at 8 p.m. will close the festival - if the state doesn't close it sooner.

On another front, the Lincoln Pageant and Festival Corp. board of directors has unanimously approved issuance of the following statement:

"1. The pageant grounds, sets, lighting equipment were all acquired gradually by the Lincoln County Society of Arts, History and Archeology between the years 1945-61. This was a non-profit organization much the same as the LPFC.

"2. On July 12, 1961, these facilities along with the name, Billy the Kid Pageant, and the copyrighted script for the pageant were conveyed to the old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, a state-appointed agency. These were donated free of charge and in good faith with the understanding (in writing) that should the state not wish to produce the pageant in any given year, the private corporation would have the right to re-enter the real estate for the purpose of producing the pageant

and to use the facilities without rental or cost of any kind whatsoever.

"3. The state did produce the pageant from 1962 to 1977. During these years there was little or no improvements made to grounds, and all proceeds from the pageant went into the state's general fund.

"4. No member of the board of the present sponsoring group who attended the July 10 meeting with the state was aware that anything was said to indicate that there would be any change in the year's license agreement.

"5. Lincoln is the only example left of a typical Western town at the turn of the century. We feel the State of New Mexico was correct in maintaining and preserving this village. However, we resent the implication that our success in drawing people to this state monument is a nuisance to the state and a financial burden which they want us to shoulder.

"6. We, too, are sorry about the controversy. We felt we had a good relationship with the Museum of New Mexico Monument Department, and that we were working toward mutual goals; namely, to develop and maintain the historical and cultural activities in Lincoln and to give the people an opportunity to see and enjoy this unique town."

● **HODDLED OVER** my typewriter Sunday morning here in the Great Southwest, I would be expected to wax jubilant over recent rains and how much money will result in the local economy. Perhaps I should worry how the Peoples Market made out financially, and speculate upon prospects of the Carrizozo Grizzlies stomping the daylight out of surrounding teams come the jolly football season ahead. Instead, I find myself ruminating over things which I am admonished to leave to experts, even though every person in Carrizozo as elsewhere is directly and indirectly affected. For example:

● **WHAT'S SO important** about peace in Lebanon? Why is my country spending so much money and prestige running messages from the PLO camp to the Israeli camp; thence to Egypt, Saudi Arabia and other Middle East capitals? What does the US lose if the war goes either way — and what does it stand to gain? First, there is no Lebanon. It was wiped out by Syria and the PLO seven years ago. There is no Lebanese government in Lebanon. The Israeli Army is poised outside Beirut, waiting out endless peace ploys from Washington, instead of wiping out the PLO terrorists as it should. Israel has won its war but stands to lose it by the jawboning of US Envoy Philip Habib. In a regular war the Israelis would level the city and wipe out the PLO to the last man, including that grinning hyena, Yasser Arafat. How ignoble, to win a brilliant military conquest and have it lost at the end by the US passion for meddling in affairs patently none of its business.

● **THE PLO wants the US (and the world) to provide a homeland** for Palestinians, as it did for the Jews by stealing territory from somebody who wasn't looking. Fine. Then let the world do for Palestinians what it did for the Jews, steal territory from a weaker country, put the Palestinians in it, and wait 20 years for the dispossessed people to raise another PLO to fight for their homeland. This nonsense has been going on for thousands of years in the Middle East. Since there has never been peace in the Middle East, how the hell does the US know if peace would be a good thing for them or not?

● **ISRAEL IS entitled to take over Lebanon by whatever means.** I admire the Israeli military machine and I admire Israeli guts. Their refusal to sit on their collective haunches while an impotent United Nations bickers endlessly should be an example to the world, as was the British retaking of the Falklands. There is the usual whining in the US press about innocent civilians being killed in Beirut as Israelis go after the PLO. The press seldom mentions that the Israelis warned the civilian population of Beirut, again and again, to leave the city. Either they refused to leave or the PLO prevented an exodus. Either way, Israel is correct in reducing the city to rubble. Name one war, ancient or modern, in which innocent civilians didn't suffer and die? In this instance, however, the civilians were warned to leave. If they didn't they suffer the consequences. Nowhere in the annals of warfare has an army thrown down its arms and lost the war just to keep from killing a civilian who had no business in the crossfire in the first place. Is it too hard for us to understand that a war is for the winning, that innocent people always die, and that the truism is one to be weighed before the war starts and not after?

● **I WOULD appreciate it if the US would stay out of Middle East** affairs and let those people slaughter themselves according to customs of their respective countries — as they always have and as they always will. I know from sad experience the role and rewards of "peace keeping." I tried to break up a fistfight one time and the result was that both antagonists turned on me and kicked the unmitigated stuffings out of me. Unconvinced, I later intervened in an argument between husband and wife. Both turned on me. I was lucky to get away with a whole hide. People who want to fight should be left to fight. It is entirely too easy for one country to rattle swords when it is convinced that some idiotic third party will step in and keep them from hurting each other. The world may have changed since George Washington issued his all-but-forgotten admonishment about this country avoiding foreign entanglements, but people have not changed. They still disagree and they still resort to violence, and they will drag as many bystanders into the fight as are stupid enough to allow it. When people fight, people die, and all Jimmy Carter's silly "human rights" resolutions won't change a thing.

● **AND THAT'S another thing.** What is a human right; and whatever it is, who made it so? Human rights vary from one country to another, from one race to another. In the US, torture is a violation of human rights, but in three-quarters of the world torture is a legal, legitimate tool. Idi Amin saw no violation of human rights when he ate his enemies because his country's culture condoned the practice. What this country is doing is trying to force its own version of human rights on other countries. It is exporting, under penalty of capping the cookie jar, a version of human rights to bewildered countries where they are repugnant. Who are we to police the world's morals? If Russia is bent upon forcing its system upon the world (as it does), what can be said for the US in forcing its values upon the world? No country has a corner on morality, and human rights are what a sovereign country says they are. If we say it isn't so, we're dead. There are more of them than there are of us.

● **FURTHER GETTING things off my chest,** a word about international deadbeats affectionately known as the Third World. They are in fact, brigands and blackmailers. They have been allowed to take over the United Nations, which they run to their own advantage. They scare the Western world to death by promising not to attack us in exchange for money and goods. They avoid working for a living by playing the US against the Soviets. They come here with hand outstretched and offer to be less friendly with the Soviets and we send them home with another bundle of American tax money. Then they hasten to Moscow and offer to be friendly to communism and to hate the US, and they are sent home with Soviet gold. If the US and Soviet Union had all the money they've dumped down the Third World rathole, they could buy every inch of Third World real estate. The US media keeps us on the verge of tears about how Third World countries have been exploited by colonial powers and that redress is in order. We hear much about Third World countries being exploited by the West, which is what is supposed to make them the lazy, ignorant, starving people they are today. The media never mentions that there are Third World countries which were never colonized or exploited by the West — Afghanistan, Tibet, Nepal and Liberia, and of all Third World countries these four are the most backward and impoverished of all!

● **PRIME MINISTER Indira Gandhi of India,** a good friend of the Soviet Union who presides over the slow starvation of 700 million constituents, had a fortune lavished on her at a White House reception last week. We saw a chance to who her away from Moscow by unprecedented pomp and pageantry. How many millions of our tax money she went away with won't be known for a few days. Her next stop, Moscow. Whatever she got here will be topped there.

● **GRAIN SALES and Siberian pipelines.** I don't understand why (continued on page 5)

# Billy Graham, Mr. Bush and the religious right

Before he left the United States for Moscow, the Rev. Billy Graham was solemnly counseled by Vice-President George Bush about the risks of the Soviet government using his appearance at a church conference for propaganda purposes.

The world-famed evangelist expressed warm appreciation for this high level advice — which he proceeded to ignore almost as soon as he landed in the Moscow Airport.

"I saw no evidence of any religious repression in Russia," announced Billy to reporters.

This and other absurd statements made by Dr. Graham led famed cartoonist Jeff McNeely of the Chicago Tribune to portray Graham emerging from a large door and raving to his limousine chauffeur about the high rate of church attendance and asking what church that was. But the huge KGB-type chauffeur replies: "That was the jail, you idiot." Graham was strongly criticized all over the nation. But then, at the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans, he was on the same speakers platform with Vice-President Bush — who proceeded to salute him.

Appearing before some 20,000 delegates ("messengers"), the vice-president, who had pleaded with Graham not to let himself be used by the Soviets, hailed Graham for "taking the Lord's message across the world" — where Graham was mightily used by the Soviets.

Part of the "Lord's message," as Bush termed it, is "I was in prison and ye visited me." But the Rev. Billy Graham didn't even mention any of the considerable number of concentration camps in the Soviet Union. Nor did Graham bother to inquire which jail or prison was the destination of the Russian Christian lady who quietly displayed a banner noting Christians who are imprisoned for the faith before she was dragged out of church by the KGB.

Vice-President Bush provided another surprise for the assembled Baptists. He told them that "careful analysis of the (religious right) movement as a whole does not justify a conclusion that the religious right has a serious intention to impose its own moral activity in any way."

Mr. Bush did not tell the Baptists precisely which sector of the religious right it is that he has discovered to be without "any serious intention to impose its own moral activity (on such issues as abortion and public school prayer) in any way."

Does Vice-President Bush's notable analysis of America's religious right wing, along with his salutation of the Billy Graham report on Russian Religious Freedom, constitute a Reagan Administration reassessment of the degree of religious freedom in the Soviet Union?

At the Pentagon, and later at the State Department, the official spokesmen for Secretaries of Defense Casper Weinberger and,

at the time, of State Al Haig were asked about this. They reacted with such skittishness as if to suggest that they wished Billy Graham had never existed.

At the White House on June 22, Deputy News Secretary Larry Speakes was asked:

"Can you assure us that Vice-President Bush's rather startling support of the religious right wing, and his saluting of Billy Graham, is not any kind of indication of Mr. Bush's intent to run for the presidency in 1984?"

WHITE HOUSE: If he is declaring for the presidency, he is leaving himself open to the equal time rule. I don't think he'll declare this early.

Q: Did the president know about this Bush speech to the Southern Baptist Convention?

WHITE HOUSE: I don't know whether he did or not.

Q: Has the president expressed any dissent with the Bush statement?

WHITE HOUSE: I haven't seen the statement, Lester, I don't know.

Q: I have it right here in my hand.

WHITE HOUSE: Don't read it. (Laughter) I am sure the vice-president wouldn't say anything untrue of a bunch of Baptists! (Laughter)

Q: Does the president agree with the vice-president's praise of Billy Graham, or not?

WHITE HOUSE: I'd have to look at the text of the praise. (Laughter)

# Are UFO creatures mutilating cattle?

WASHINGTON — The Albuquerque Journal reported recently:

"At least two helicopter sightings have been connected to the recent (cattle) mutilations, all of which have been declared genuine by State Policeman Gabe Valdez of Dolco."

Such reports on previous occasions moved the Carter Administration to appropriate \$50,000 to investigate suggestions that the phantom cattle mutilators might be air-borne Satan worshippers or even UFO extraterrestrial creatures.

One skeptic in the Land of Enchantment is Mark Acuff, editor of the New Mexico Independent, one of the state's feistiest weekly newspapers.

"Valdez is the only state policeman ever to have had such visions," writes Acuff, "and according to the in-depth (\$50,000) investigation by (former FBI agent) Ken Rommel, Valdez was wrong about nearly everything."

Editor Acuff suggested that Officer Valdez "suffered hallucinations in the night" and he lampooned reports of "mysterious green helicopters" and their involvement in the cattle mutilations. He also noted Rommel's report that many of the mutilations were done "by coyotes with the help of ravens. It appears some of them died of blackleg, a common cattle disease, before the scavengers got there."

Acuff also cited similar conclusions by the Colorado Bureau of Investigation as well as James Stewart of the University of South Dakota, who "examined the cattle mutilations in his area and reached the conclusion that they were typical examples of 'mild mass hysteria.'"

Acuff also recalled: "By far the most fun of this whole episode came when Sen. Harrison 'Jack' Schmitt spent public bucks to hold a whole convention of cattle mutilation freaks, plus every UFO buff and assorted cultists from all over the country. Staged in the Albuquerque Public Library . . . there were people with diapers on their heads, guys with crew cuts and hobnailed boots, men with briefcases bulging with incomprehensible charts and diagrams of the conjunction of the universe and an admixture of pseudoscience beyond belief. It may have been the strangest hearing ever held in the State of New Mexico. We would have been rolling in the aisles except for the . . .

sobering thought that we were actually paying for it."

The Lincoln County News interviewed Sen. Schmitt in his senate office on July 16, during which we asked the senator and former astronaut who heads the senate space subcommittee about the Albuquerque Journal's report and its reliance upon Officer Valdez's experiences as a criterion for what is genuine.

SEN. SCHMITT: I have not talked to Gabe recently about mutilation incidents. It is not unusual in the past to have had simultaneous, or nearly simultaneous, reports of unmarked helicopters. This does offer one explanation for some of the reported technical aspects of the mutilation problems, namely that there seems to be no movement of the cow.

Q: They didn't take the cow away in the helicopters?

A: Well, they may have utilized the helicopter for whatever purposes that they wished to have the animal for and then dropped it back into the fields.

Q: Do you think this merits another public hearing, such as the one that you and R.E. Thompson, the US Attorney for New Mexico, held in Albuquerque on April 20, 1979?

A: Well, I think that depends upon whether a pattern of mutilations starts to develop again. And I think we'll know in reasonably short order whether this is an isolated circumstance or whether it's a reversion of the problems we had a few years ago. Clearly right after that conference we found that there was almost no mutilation activity in the State of New Mexico. So that if nothing else, it appears that the conference had the purpose of protecting the property of many small ranchers and farmers for that period of time. Now if these individuals have returned to New Mexico and are continuing to violate federal law and state law, then clearly it would warrant . . .

Q: "Individuals"? You mean individuals in the helicopters mutilated the cattle?

A: Yeah, whatever it is.

Q: You think it's "individuals"?

A: Well, that's my presumption since I've seen no definitive evidence of non-individuals.

Q: Why would individuals want to land and mutilate cattle? — and then leave?

A: I have no idea. That's why we need to try to catch some of them and ask them.

President Reagan opposes a gas pipeline from Siberia to Western Europe and still thinks it's right to sell grain to the Soviets. The pipeline will furnish energy to Western Europe and make bucks for the Soviets, which the president doesn't like because he foresees eventual dependence on Soviet energy. ● I AIN'T through. Why does nuclear power get such a bum rap, as the American Spectator points out, when statistically it's a lot safer per billion megawatt-hours of electricity than conventional sources, considering that 3,900 persons died of coal smoke in London in 1952; 5,000 persons died in dam failures in Italy and India; hundreds of workers have died in the collapse of oil rigs in the past few years; and US taxpayers are paying out hundreds of millions of dollars per year to compensate coal workers suffering Black Lung disease. Why, when there hasn't been a single death attributed to nuclear power production?

● AND HOW come the US guarantees, through federal price supports, a profit for the dairyman, peanut grower, tobacco grower, sugar producer, steel producer and a host of other endeavors — but leaves farmers and ranchers, the greatest producers of food for the world, to sink or swim while the government cheerfully approves every wage hike and inflated cost of everything a farmer buys? Why is a farmer or rancher the only major producer to be left to the mercy of the marketplace!

● ONE MORE time. I can't understand why Walter Cronkite is one of the most respected and trusted men in America, by anybody's poll, even though his CBS broadcasts have been proven to be biased and supportive of the Soviet Union. He has never written a book, produced an essay, quipped a memorable epigram, revealed in a heroic moment, or left one solitary word as a contribution to the nation's intellectual storehouse.

● WHAT A lousy Sunday.


followed by a brief recorded announcement noting the dialing instructions. Billing will be handled quickly and automatically without any delay in reciting the number to an operator."

The club held its July meeting at the Valley of Fires, July 23.



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




