aking engagement, a bank vice president introduced hersel speaking engagement, a bank vice president introduced herself
and indicated that she had been delegated to greet and introduce me. She asked some questions to prepare an introduction. One of her questions, "Have you ever been to this part of the country,
before?" My response, "Back in 1950, when you were probably in grade school, I lived near here.
The young lady immediately let me know that she hadn' even been born in 1950 . I excused myself, took a look in a mirfor and fade spots that had been added to a more-than-50-year-ld face which I had been shaving, almost daily, for about 40 years The changes had been so graduăl that I hadn't noticed them as they ocurred.
Thls may explain why we don't solve problems as they appear, because they may develop so slowly that they aren'
noticed until a crisis arises. Furthermore, the definition of a crisis, a critical' moment, is really a matter of judgement varying with individuals.

For example, if you have read, listened or viewed the news, you have heard about the problems of American industries and the inability of many to survive. You are aware of the millions and billions of dollars in losses, the bankruptcies, and the eries of those who are hurting. Let's look at just one of those in
dustries, the airlines, who are luckier than most beacuse they have little foreign competition in their domestic flights. Over the years, with regulation of rates and routes, the
airlines automatically increased their costs, particularly wages and benefits and bought too many expensive planes. It is not uncommon to find pilots and stewardesses working less than 20 hours per week, with pilots earning up to $\$ 140,000$ per year and stewardesses earning up to $\$ 41,000$ per year
with mechanics putting in more hours and earn ing $\$ 30,000-40,000$ per year. 1 am told that the average
wage paid to all classifications of pilots for about a 10 hour weel in the major airines is more than $\$ 70,000$ in wages plus benefits. These major airlines have labor costs that average between $30-40$ percent of their total costs. They are competing agadrist
economy airlines where labor costs average about 20 percent and the employees have to work harder and longer for thel money. The pilots, for example, put in twice the hours, earn hal the pay, and help in all sorts of extra chores to keap costs down and rates low
Some say that the problem is de-reguation, letting competition work. That isn't true! The airline problems would exis with or without deregulation because the ticket prices kept
skyrocketing as cost increases were just passed along, so that rates got too high for us to afford alr travel. For example, on trip that cost me three years ago $\$ 352$ (both ways), today the comparable charge is $\$ 815$.
Even though our population keeps growing air traffic is no greater thap 1879. Even that traffic level is the result of bargain fares. At the right price, we can afford to travel by air. At the of bargain rates will just mean fewer customers and a con inuation of the airline problems. The answer is lower standard rates, and that transiates into lower airine costs.
Poor management and unton leadership together with a
lack of understanding on the part of airline emplose ack of understanding on the part of airline employees, con ribute to the present problem. We only have so much money to else. When the airlines priced themselves out of the market they asked for trouble and got it, about two billion dollars in losses since 1880. At the same time, the bargain rate afrlines with top safety records, are making money
What happened? The sttuation confronting the major
airlines changed. Instead of facing up to those changes and airlines changed. Instead of facing up to those changes and it won't! The airlines, with little foreign competition, pase an example of what is happening, industry by industry. We have to cut "fat" and get competitive, again! Just as there is no way for
me to be a kid, again, there is no way to get back to the "good old days" that I hear both airline union and management leader discussing.
Unless
Unless we can compete in the real world, the situation will not earning our way, today, and the world lin't going to give us ree ride with ever-increasing wages and benafits is something
we must accept, even if we don't like it. That's Straight Talk
