


Prehistoric road network found in Chaco Canyon

On Friday, Jan. 28, more than 100 field archeologists crammed into the auditorium of the Albuquerque Museum. Soon there is only standing room and the air is stifling. But the crowd is expectant. They have come to hear a Bureau of Land Management research team report new findings on the prehistoric road network that radiates outward

from New Mexico's Chaco Canyon National Monument.
The Chaco Anasazi once inhabited the northwestern quarter of New Mexico and adjacent areas of Arizona and Colorado. Their territory included nearly 30,000 square miles. So it has taken archeologists 50 years of tedious survey on foot to locate 6,000 Anasazi ruins. These were created in the 900 years between

A. D. 400 and 1300. But a stunning 43 percent (2,500) of these ruins were built in only 150 years, between A. D. 950 and 1100. This powerful surge in village construction marks the heyday of the Chaco Anasazi. Everyone agrees that the roadworks were developed at some time in this period.
Most of the Anasazi ruins are small, scattered masonry-based

pueblos of six to 20 rooms. Average ones have a floor area of from several hundred to several thousand square feet. These dot the basin lands and mesas of the San Juan country.
Areas of especially good soil and dependable water eventually drew more impressive concentrations of farmsteads. Some grew into extensive farming

Activity planned for 1983' FFA Week

The Carrizozo chapter, along with over 8,000 other FFA chapters across the nation, will celebrate 1983 FFA Week, commencing Feb. 19.

During the week the state's 65 chapters are planning to carry out activities in support of this year's FFA theme—"Vocational Agriculture, Educating Through Experience."

Vocational agriculture education and FFA has been a great success in American education with an emphasis on learning by doing. By giving experience to students in

agriculture, they have helped build a food force dedicated to meet the food needs of our nation and the world.

FFA Week has traditionally included George Washington's birthday in respect for his great leadership and his pioneering practices in agriculture. The National FFA Center, which houses the National FFA Hall of Achievements, is sited on 37 acres of the old Washington estate, near Alexandria, VA.

John Hemphill, president of the Carrizozo chapter, said members will participate in Food for America, Safety Program,

BOAC Program, and distribution of calendars.

The FFA was formed in 1928, and it promotes leadership, cooperation and citizenship among high school vocational agriculture students. Vocational agriculture education in high school prepares students for an array of careers in agriculture—production to processing, service to marketing.

Food For America is an activity to involve vocational agriculture students in communicating to elementary school

children the story of how food gets from farm to consumer.

The Carrizozo Farm for America Program will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 22, at the Vo-Ag Farm. All elementary students will visit the farm on Tuesday.

There will be many baby and adult animals: Pigs, rabbits, chicks, calves, and other animals on display.

"Anyone with pre-school children or anybody at all, would like to see the mini-zoo, all you have to do is come. There will be somebody there during the day at all times," Hemphill said.

How UDAG works

Proposed UDAG loan for motel draws fire at public hearing

Monday's regular town meeting included a public hearing on Carrizozo's Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG). Two men have applied for a loan to build a 22-unit motel.

Albert Romero and James "Willie" Silva, loan applicants, were present at the hearing. Romero, former finance administration director for New Mexico is now state auditor. Silva owns the Four Winds Restaurant and Lounge. Both men were born and raised in Lincoln County.

The purpose of urban development action grants is to assist cities and urban counties which are experiencing severe economic distress and to help stimulate economic development activity needed to aid in economic recovery.

HUD will allocate grant funds throughout the year to ensure that assistance is available for each calendar quarter.

Carrizozo has less than 50,000 residents and is designated by

HUD as a "small city" and therefore eligible to apply for UDAG money.

Cities participating in the Community Development Block Grant program (CDBG) are potential applicants. Carrizozo in 1981 received a grant to implement a housing rehabilitation program.

Money paid back by UDAG loan users becomes "seed money" for more local economic development, creating a revolving loan plan for community growth in business and industry.

No project is funded unless there is a firm private commitment to finance and carry out the proposed project. A "firm" private commitment means the agreement by which the private participating party agrees to perform an activity specified in the application and demonstrates the financial capacity to carry out the activity.

The total cost of the proposed Four Winds Motel is \$476,843. A

UDAG loan of \$89,681 is sought.

The loan application must describe the number and the types of new jobs (construction and permanent) which will be provided.

Hubert Quintana of the Southwestern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) of Roswell, who presided over the public hearing, said the project will create 45 jobs during the construction phase and 7 to 9 permanent jobs when the project is completed.

Quintana said UDAG money is for water and sanitary sewer costs and for providing the "necessary gap financing."

He said during the hearing that his office does not approve grants and loans. They are merely consultants on behalf of the city.

Monday's public hearing was a requirement by HUD for obtaining the views of citizens, particularly residents of the area in which the proposed activities are to be carried out.

The motel venture is

something that Romero has dreamed and thought about often. Nearing retirement age, his plans are to move back to this area. Romero said during Monday's hearing, "I can assure you that I will do everything to promote and bring the county out of the depression which we've had so long and to better jobs for people to live and create."

"I think two boys from Lincoln County are really trying to do something now that will benefit all of us."

Ruidoso resident Weldon Spencer, owner of the Crossroads Motel in Carrizozo, believes that Silva and Romero are making "a business error in trying to put that establishment (motel) in."

He said that the big drop in motel trade does not justify adding another motel in Carrizozo.

"You're going to be robbing Peter to pay Paul," he told the council on describing the difficult time he says existing motels are experiencing.

"You're leaving the door wide open for everyone who wants to put in a business," Spencer commented.

Low rates at the Crossroads do not allow him to afford repairs. "I would love to have money at 6 percent to do this," he said, referring to the rate Romero and Silva have requested.

"They have an advantage which I don't have, borrowing at 6 percent when I have to pay 16 percent."

Spencer questioned Quintana about the 45 construction jobs quoted in the NEWS. Spencer said it would look good on an application, but that the information is incorrect.

Quintana went on to list the various types of construction workers which included truck drivers, loader operators, framers, finishers, electricians, painters, superintendents and many more.

Spencer said that because he is very knowledgeable in the motel field, he believes that the information on the operation of the prospective motel is "padded."

He stated that he runs his place with two managers and two maids. "Have the applicants owned a motel?" he inquired of Quintana. It was disclosed that the applicants correspond with a major chain.

Spencer in case of failure and the performance statement was questioned by Spencer. Quintana stated that the motel and property will become collateral, the city will not be responsible for the project fail, and that a performance statement is being prepared which will become part of the application.

"Mr Silva will have to run 100 percent occupancy to break even," Spencer told the council and advised then to go to similar sized towns and motels for comparisons. The city is sticking its neck out, taking the place of bankers."

At this time Spencer said, "I would like to go on record here as offering the city 8 percent on the same amount of money for a 10-year period of time. I will make out whatever application I need to; construct whatever type of business I need to, whether it be a new restaurant, or tear down part of the old Frontier (part of Crossroads). I'm offering the city 2 percent more. Let me have the courtesy of getting the necessary applications."

Trustee Bobby Dan Crenshaw asked, "Mr. Spencer, you weren't given an opportunity? You weren't contacted? Betty Fields is on record saying she has." (Former trustee Fields resigned in December.)

Trustee Jim Payne said that he understood that all motels were contacted.

Crossroads manager Earnest Pittillo said they were not contacted.

Jackie Martin, local cafe and bar owner said, "If the city wants to loan me some money, I want to borrow it," and added that she also wasn't contacted about the UDAG money.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce president, W. A. Schlegel said that Fields contacted some businesses.

Quintana read a list of clubs

and names that had written letters of support for the Four Winds Motel construction. The boosters included the Rotary Club, Carrizozo Schools, Zia Senior Citizens Center, Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, S. M. Ortiz, former municipal judge, and Nick Serna, postmaster.

A final public hearing on the motel loan for Romero and Silva will be scheduled. Application deadline is Feb. 28.

In other business, it was announced during Monday's regular town session that Carrizozo's 1982 CDBG application for housing rehabilitation did not rate high enough for funding.

The Urban Development

(HUD) received 77 applications with requests totaling \$22,513,511. The funds available for new programs for the fiscal year amounted to \$6,910,500.

Rating scores will be provided to permit the council to review rating and ranking of fiscal year 1982 applications for the CDBG Small Cities program.

The town, following an October public hearing, had applied for community-wide housing rehabilitation assistance. A first CDBG grant targeted for the southside area provided needed aid. The second application attempt did not have sufficient impact points.

Clovis Perry informed the council that gangs of dogs have

50 years in prison for Rickerson

Donald Rickerson, 36, former Carrizozo resident, was sentenced to more than 50 years in prison Thursday in Judge Robert Doughty's 12th District Court for the gun-slaying of service station owner Nick Dorame of Tularosa on Jan. 28.

Rickerson was sentenced to life on the murder count, 12 years for armed robbery, plus one year for firearm enhancement, and eight more years as an habitual offender. In addition, he will serve two years of a previous sentence, since he was on parole when the

murder took place. All sentences are to run consecutively. He will be eligible for parole in 30 years.

The robbery netted less than \$300.

Thomas Hurrelbrink, 20, also involved in the shooting death, was arraigned Thursday afternoon and entered not guilty plea to first degree murder, two charges of armed robbery, two charges of intimidation of witnesses and one charge of conspiracy. He is in jail pending a trial date.

No more new hook-ups will be made. It will be mandatory for current out of city water users to sign the contracts unless they wish to apply for annexation.



New Mexico ranchers and landowners will meet in Roswell Friday, Feb. 18, in an attempt to persuade the New Mexico Game & Fish Dept. that something should be done about the hunter problem.

The meeting will take place at the Roswell Inn beginning at 3 p.m.

Increased population has increased hunter pressures, and the indiscriminate issuance of

permits has resulted in damage to ranges from off-road vehicles, littered campsites, trespass and hunter-rancher confrontations and other violations.

"Unless the hunting problem can be brought under control," a spokesman for the cattle and wool growers associations said, "there is going to be bloodshed, and it can be prevented before the problem worsens."

centers, with dozens of free-standing pueblos, or roomblocks, scattered over a square mile, or so.

Archeologists have never been surprised to find large, distinctive masonry buildings erected at many of the farming centers. These "Great Houses," often multi-storied, vary in size. But most are massive sandstone strongholds enclosing circular ceremonial chambers, or kivas. The number of kivas may be few or many, but two are commonly found enclosed in rectangular, monolithic cells of outcasted rooms. These rooms are often without cooking hearths and artifacts. Some appear to have been purposefully kept free of debris and clutter. So archeologists disagree whether these were used as granaries, barracks, or as the private apartments of local elites in Chacoan society. They are clearly a form of public architecture, and not ordinary housing units.

Other "Great Houses" were built in unlikely places—smack in the middle of nowhere. The farming centers that should have grown to require public facilities just were not there. One example, the huge rectangular citadel of Pueblo Pintado, lies over 20 miles east of the major sites in Chaco Canyon. It once stood at least three stories tall and 60 large ground floor rooms enclosed seven kivas. Yet, tree-ring dates

suggest it was constructed in A.D. 1080-81—quite a public works project on Chaco's isolated eastern frontier!

We know that a prehistoric roadway connects Pintado to the large towns in Chaco Canyon. From the ground, no roadway can be seen today. Only a faint line of sagebrush runs into the distance. But the birds have a better view. Like the "east road" to Pintado, most of the several hundred miles of suspected prehistoric roadways were first located on aerial photographs. "Remote sensing" specialists at the National Park Service's Chaco Research Center in Albuquerque began to identify possible roads a few years ago. They learned quickly that aerial photographs taken in the oblique rays of early morning sunlight made the ancient linear roadways stand out. But when photographed in mid-day sun, the roads were usually invisible.

Two years ago the BLM team decided to find out which of the "roads" were real and just how old they were. Segments of suspected roadway were surveyed on foot, test trenched and analyzed geologically.


Some "roads" turned out to be fencerows. Others were recent. The team's Fred Niles cleverly showed that pressure of wagon and auto wheels on historic roadbeds compacted underlying mud into distinctive semicircular soil plates. Though easily visible, no plates were found in trenches which crosscut roads connecting the ruined Anasazi towns. These were the real thing.

The Chaco roads were originally 10 to 30 feet wide and had raised shoulders. Uniformity was important. Some sections were excavated, or graded, while others were built up. Their earthen surfaces were cleaned regularly and repaired when damaged by floods or erosion.

Archeologist John Stein led the ground survey. In only a few places did the roads still look like a road. Most days aerial photographs guided his survey crew. By following these, previously unknown ruins were found. Some were "Great Houses"; others were new and puzzling. Several dozen small, semicircular stone walls were located along roads on high vantage points. Called "Herraduras" (horseshoes), these often marked places where two roads diverged. They may have been windbreaks, or stopping places.

Most Chacoan roads ran straight and did not curve with the terrain. Stone steps were cut into unavoidable cliff faces and detours were marked by double grooves chiseled in bedrock. Some road segments were dual, like divided highways. In places these were also marked by stone grooves.

BLM scientist Chris Kincaid said the great North and South roads from Chaco Canyon are best known. The first runs 50 miles north to Salmon Ruin near Bloomfield. The other runs south to the Chacoan towns between Grants and Gallup. Pottery found along the South Road averaged A.

D. 981, but the North Road pottery averaged A. D. 1087.

Archeologists currently believe over 70 Anasazi towns were connected to Chaco Canyon by roadways. The oldest farming district was between Grants and Gallup, NM. In the 11th century, new towns were built and roadways extended north to the Colorado frontier.

It will take years to completely investigate the first road system in the US so archeologists do not yet know what combination

'Trust no Bishop,' a rector warns

By REV. LESTER KINSOLVING According to the rector of San Francisco's historic Trinity Church, the oldest Episcopal parish on the Pacific Coast, all Episcopal priests should "Beware of Your Bishop."

In an article which Cromey told this column had been mailed to "two church magazines and about nine bishops," this rector, age 52, declares: "Clergy lose their jobs or are suspended because they give bishops information in a personal, pastoral, confessional or counseling way."

"Theological students, clergy and lay church employees must be very careful about what they tell their bishops. Too many have lost jobs or been suspended because they confirmed rumors about themselves, discussed their personal lives or their sexual activities in such a way that the information is used against them when judgments about employment are rendered."

"We must get over the sentimental notion that bishops are good pastors. People are pastors; people are counselors, confessors and therapists. Being a bishop does not qualify a person to be a pastor. Some are good. Some are terrible." (Some years ago, the ultra-liberal Episcopal Diocese of Missouri discussed a

resolution to abolish bishops for the sake of better relating to other denominations.)

Father Cromey also contends: "There are no canons (church laws) of the Episcopal Church against fornication, adultery, homosexual activity, etc. There are only traditions against this behavior."

When asked about the Seventh Commandment which was frequently cited by Jesus Christ, Cromey chuckled and replied: "I prefer to describe those as the Ten Suggestions!"

Father Cromey goes on to describe (but not identify) one priest who, he writes, was "suspended for two years" merely because he "lied to his bishop" in trying to "protect his lover and himself. The bishop's whimsical notion of lying was enough to suspend."

Therefore, Cromey advises: "Do not tell your bishop anything he can use against you. Do not expect fairness and justice when you deal with one individual bishop."

In whom, then, can the faithful put their trust?

Why, they can trust those priests who lie a little in order to protect their fellow sodomists, that's who.

Father Cromey (who is one of this writer's most entertaining personal friends) does occasionally have a sensible thought. He maintains, for example, that any charges made by the laity against a priest should be required by the bishop to be in writing, with the priest allowed to confront his accusers. He also advises bishops to deal with "specific behavior, not generalizations," such as: "The priest seduced me," which, he notes, "is specific."

And what does he believe is offensive about a priest seducing, we asked.

"Nothing," replied the Rector of Historic Trinity. "It depends on whom, when and under what circumstances."

Bishops "are advised that 'Priests are your field workers. Your job is to protect them.' (No matter how many parishioners they seduce. They won't tell you anything, bishop. They will lie to you. But you, bishop, have the duty, according to Cromey, to support them and protect them, no matter how many times they break the Ten Suggestions and violate the expressed ideals of Holy Matrimony. And since Father Cromey also advises priests to threaten any of their accusers with slander suits, one can imagine a San Francisco newspaper ad: "The Episcopal Church Welcomes You - And Your Attorney, If You Chance To Stimulate Any Clergy Lust.")

Father Cromey's own bishop, the Rt. Rev. William Swing, formerly of comparatively sedate Washington, DC, is one of the bishops to whom Cromey sent his article. When asked about Swing's reaction, Cromey recalled:

"His secretary, Binnie Graham, called me up one day and said: 'What are we supposed to do with this?'"

"I told her that they could do anything they wanted with it," replied Cromey. "I haven't heard anything from his office since."

Apparently Bishop Swing (who writes a monthly column for his dreadfully dull newspaper, The Pacific Churchman, called "A Swing Around The Diocese" has little desire to either join, or tangle, with the Bigger Swinger At Historic Trinity.

Bingaman on nuclear and other defenses

By LESTER KINSOLVING WASHINGTON - During the Lincoln County News' first interview with Senator Jeff Bingaman, he was asked about his views on the extent of the KGB activity in the United States and what he thinks of US intelligence capacity.

The new Senator said he had not been briefed by the Senate Intelligence Committee and that he has only a smattering of information on the subject, based on his reading of newspaper reports. So we asked:

"What about the nuclear freeze?"

SEN. BINGAMAN: I said during the campaign that I would support the Hatfield-Kennedy freeze.

QUESTION: Are you opposed to the (Sen. Henry) Jackson proposal?

SEN. BINGAMAN: Well, not opposed to the Jackson, but I support the Kennedy - if the two were offered.

QUESTION: Do you find a similarity between these two?

SEN. BINGAMAN: Not much. As I understand the two, the Kennedy-Hatfield essentially commits us to agree to a freeze, if and when we can get the Soviets to do the same and if we are satisfied it's verifiable. And I think that's

an appropriate posture for us to be taking.

QUESTION: What do you believe is necessary for it to be verifiable?

SEN. BINGAMAN: Well, I'm not sure there. Again, I have read various articles about the need for on-site inspection. And I haven't gotten into it in enough detail to know whether on-site inspections are required or not.

QUESTION: Is there not some imbalance between nuclear freeze movements in the US and those in the Soviet Union?

SEN. BINGAMAN: Obviously their system of government is very different from ours and they react to stimuli differently than we do. Issues in our democratic form of government tend to percolate up, and that's what is happening with this concern. And I really see the nuclear freeze movement as really a manifestation of concern about people. It's something of a code phrase; it's easy to latch onto for a lot of people who are basically concerned that we are not giving it enough high priority; the American government is not giving it enough high priority in their dealings with the Soviets.

QUESTION: About a biological and chemical warfare;

So you sense anything along that line to even approximate the nuclear freeze? Considering that the Soviet Union is using at least one, if not both?

SEN. BINGAMAN: I don't know in that area, quite frankly. I've heard the argument that we've needed some kind of chemical warfare in order to deter the use by the Soviets of their chemical warfare capability. And I don't know whether that argument holds water or not.

QUESTION: Are you like President Reagan in one respect, an admirer of President Roosevelt?

SEN. BINGAMAN: Yes. I think my views of a number of issues are probably more akin to President Roosevelt's than the President's.

QUESTION: In 1943, President Roosevelt announced that if the Axis powers used any more poison gas, as they were doing, as the Japanese were doing against the Chinese and the Italians, earlier, had used it on the Ethiopians; if there is any more use of poison gas, we will blanket the Axis powers with poison gas. Do you think that was wrong?

SEN. BINGAMAN: I don't know. I really don't know enough about the dynamics to say.

You also looted the contents of my husband's trunk. You spread his things all over, tore up the box that housed his medal from Vietnam, and you stole his 1st Infantry Medalion. He spent almost a year with that unit about 10 kilometers from the Cambodian border. Do you really think you deserve it more than he does?

You took all of my jewelry. The earrings, except the rhinestone ones, are for pierced ears. Do we have something in common?

Most of it doesn't have much monetary value, but it holds a value much greater for me. Most of the things you took are gifts from my loved ones—special and irreplaceable. The little gold bird with the drop pearl on the gold chain was a gift from my grandfather, who has been dead for many years, to my mother on her seventh birthday. Mother gave it to me when she discovered she was dying from cancer. I've promised it to my granddaughter. You've robbed us all, four generations, our link from the past to the future.

The cameo necklace you took was small and has little value. My stepfather gave it to me when he returned from working in Africa. I was 15 then and have treasured that memento for many years. He's dead now, and you have stolen my connection.

Do you like the little gold heart necklace? It was a thank-you gift from a close friend after I had helped her through a crisis, her brother's suicide. It was a gift of love given in a time of pain. What does it mean to you?

The silver seagull necklace you stole was a gift from my sons. It isn't real silver, but it was meaningful to me. The small gold earrings you pilfered were a gift of love from my husband.

Obviously, I can't list each item here, the rhinestone dress jewelry, the real estate pin (do you plan to wear it often?), all the rings and earrings. The sheriff will have a list, and, of course, you already know what you have.

Do you plan to wear the silver fox cossack hat with my gold metallic, Full-Bore, motorcycle jacket? I'm certain you wouldn't go unnoticed. You should stay warm in all my sweatshirts. You did leave some clothes. Didn't they fit, or is that they just aren't your style? I understand why you left the shoes. Your feet are smaller than mine.

Yes, you did leave something — a multitude of foot and finger prints and a ton of mud.

Well, look at the positive side. When you get all decked out in my clothes and jewelry, you can take turns taking pictures of each other with my Polaroid camera. You could see, as you browsed through my picture albums, that we've preserved the memories of a lot of family fun with that camera.

After you looked at all my pictures and every personal thing I have in this world, did you feel like you were stealing from a friend? Certainly, you knew me well by then, even well enough to wear my clothes.

Did you look around to see who you were stealing from? Did you notice the worn furnishings, and see that there are no floor coverings, no ceiling over the living room insulation? Did you observe that there is no running water and no bathroom? You must have noted that while this writer may not be starving, you left the beans, rice and flour even though you took the bag of chocolate chips, a couple of jars of jam and peppermint candy, I'm certainly not living in luxury. 

Crime of the week

This week a new member of the Crime Stoppers family is asking the public's help in solving an armed robbery to a Ruidoso liquor store.

Crime Stoppers of Ruidoso, the state's newest program, is offering up to a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of the Dec. 1, 1982, robbery of Billy the Kid Liquors.

Ruidoso Police Lt. Dave Pfeffer said that around 6 p.m. on Dec. 1, a man wearing a navy blue ski mask, faded Levi jacket and pants, a kelly-green shirt and beige leather gloves entered the liquor store, which is located next to the Pizza Hut.

The man walked around the store for about 18 minutes, picked up a case of Budweiser beer and placed it on the counter. Pfeffer said at that point, a white female of Hispanic descent pulled up to the drive-up window in a beige Chevy Blazer.

As the clerk turned from the window, he was confronted by the robber, who was holding a handgun. The gunman ordered the clerk to hand over the money from the cash register and when he complied, the suspect fled on foot. It is possible he entered a small red vehicle parked near the store.

The robbery netted the offender about \$700, police say. This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is matching the Ruidoso program's \$1,000 reward for information leading to the solution of this crime.

Anyone with information about this crime, or about any unsolved crime committed in New Mexico, is asked to call State Crime Stoppers at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933, or their local Crime Stoppers program. The telephone number for the new Ruidoso program is 257-4645.

In all cases callers do not have to reveal their identities. There now are 35 Crime Stoppers programs in operation throughout New Mexico. Combined these programs have assisted in the solution of 4,910 major crimes and have recovery of \$14,484,790 worth of stolen property and narcotics. A total of 1,919 persons have been prosecuted in court, with 1,883 of them being convicted.
