

# No opposition to increased fees for city services

Monday's regular town meeting included the passage of several utility increase ordinances. A special meeting had been scheduled for Aug. 19 to deal with the ordinances but was canceled due to the lack of a

quorum. Only two residents showed up to voice their opinion. Last Monday the only ordinance not adopted, signed and approved was that of increasing the water tap and meter fee from \$150 to \$500. The council did not agree with Mayor Harold Garcia

in the increase. They suggested \$300 as a more reasonable fee for the service. The ordinance will be re-worded and re-published to obtain public reaction.

Members of Monday's audience were encouraged to comment on all the ordinances

before they were approved. Only the one concerning the \$500 tap and meter fee drew brief comment.

Ordinances passed were sewer tap fees \$150; sewer charge per month \$3.75 (residential), \$5.75 (com-

mercial); garbage rates per month \$5 (residential), \$8.75 (commercial); water turn on fee \$5; sale of cemetery plots \$75 and an additional fee of \$75 for opening and closing of the grave.

Each new resident consumer will pay a deposit of \$50 prior to

water being furnished. Water rates are as follows: minimum charge of \$6.25 for and up to 3,000 gallons. The minimum rate per 1,000 gallons after the first 3,000 gallons will be \$1.25.

The increase were the result of budget expenditures being more than revenue. Travel and training money has been cut back and town employees were told that there would be no increase in wages.

Concerning the \$500 water tap and meter fee Garcia said the big increase was made so that the new people coming into town would bear the majority of the money needed to adjust the budget.

On the ordinances passed, Garcia said they would "not cause undue hardship to any of our citizenry," and that the

charges are still low compared to towns of the same size as Carrizozo. The increases will become effective Sept. 19.

School Supt. Dr. Jim, Miller told the board he has prepared a pre-application for Land and Water Conservation Funds (L&WCF) and New Mexico State Supplemental Fund in hopes of obtaining money for the renovation of the local pool, which has been under the management of the school district for the past two years.

The Jane Turner Community Swimming Pool is now 20 years old and is in need of major renovation of mechanical systems and structure. Operational costs have increased to the point where capital improvements money spent now will help contain or reduce operating costs.

Community members and clubs have assisted the school in keeping the pool in operation. Those involved in fundraising projects and volunteer labor have included the Fire Department, FFA, Zia Senior Citizens Center, New Horizons, 4-H and other groups, all who have written letters of support for the proposed \$12,500 project.

If funding money is approved, the project proposes to replace pumping and filtering systems, renovate the pool interior, exterior and security fence, building roof and the hot water shower system. The solar collection panels on the roof need to be re-positioned in order to function properly.

The application requests \$6,000 in assistance from the federal L&WCF and \$3,000 from the state. Miller asked the town to contribute \$3,000 and the community would come up with

**TRINITY SITE TOUR** — The world's first atomic device wired with detonation and measurement cables, awaits its detonation in a steel shed atop a 100-foot tower at Trinity Site in the northern portion of White Sands Missile Range. Exploded in the early hours on July 16, 1945, the tower was vaporized. Today a monument marks Ground Zero at the site where the tower once stood 38 years ago. This year's Trinity Site tour will be conducted on Oct. 1. Caravans will form in the Alamogordo K-Mart parking lot for an 8 a.m. departure. A second caravan will leave from the White Sands Missile Range Stallion Range center gate at 9 a.m. The Stallion gate is at the north end of the missile range, about 17 miles from San Antonio, NM on Highway 380. The Alamogordo caravan will make a 180-mile round trip to and from the site. The Stallion caravan will travel about 50 miles round trip. Visitors will be allowed to remain at Trinity Site about 90 minutes. During this year's ceremony, the featured speaker will be Dr. Marvin Wilkening, who was with the original Manhattan Project and part of the Fermi group at the startup of the first nuclear reactor in Chicago in 1942. ## Payne resigns as magistrate

Bill G. Payne, Lincoln County Magistrate, is resigning that office effective Oct. 1.

"I have written the governor and the administrative office of the courts advising them of my resignation," Payne told the NEWS. "Gov. Anaya will appoint the new magistrate."

The new appointee will be serving out Payne's elective term of office to which he was elected only last year, magistrate, Div. 1, Carrizozo.

Payne said he has gone to

work for the Lincoln County Abstract Co., Inc., in Carrizozo. He indicated the reason for the resignation is to devote full time to the abstract company. "That is why I am no longer actively practicing law," he said. "I am not taking on new cases or new clients."

Payne has lived in Carrizozo and maintained a law office here for more than 15 years. "I guess this is the first time since 1912 that no lawyer has maintained a law office in Carrizozo," he said.

## Former resident leads winning musical group

LAS CRUCES Armada, a seven-member musical group led by WSMR scientist Ernesto Jose Sanchez, formerly of Carrizozo, and Raquel Roxie Chavez were winners from the 2nd Congressional District in the statewide Hispanic talent search held recently at the Pan American Center at New Mexico State University.

The two winners were each awarded a \$1,500 contract to perform with country music star Freddy Fender at the 1983 Hispanic Heritage Day program, Sept. 13, during the New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque.

Armada performed the songs "Margarita" and "Y Volvere" for the contest. The seven members of Armada are Bob Brown, a music teacher from Silver City; James Martinez, NMSU student from Espanola; David Montano and Kiki Trujillo, NMSU students from Santa Fe; Manny Sandoval,

NMSU graduate, Las Cruces; Mike Wakefield, Motel manager from Silver City; and Sanchez.

Miss Chavez, from Lovington, sang "Tomorrow" from the Broadway hit musical "Annie" and "Paloma Blanca." She was voted the best vocalist at the South Plains Festival in Denver City, TX.

Sanchez, who is manager, music arranger, lead guitarist and vocalist with his group, Armada, is a 1967 NMSU alumnus. He has received numerous awards for his scientific endeavors including a Special Act Award of \$500 November 1982.

The son of Salomon and Ramona Sanchez of Carrizozo, Sanchez graduated from Carrizozo High School in 1956. He is married to the former Bernadette Baca.

## Zia Steel finds home in Socorro

Zia Steel Co., which was practically chased out of Carrizozo earlier this year, has found a home—perhaps two.

Last week the Socorro City Council approved an inducement resolution for Zia which will allow Edward Bottinelli, president of Zia, to proceed with a feasibility study that precedes issuance of \$10 million in industrial revenue bonds. The proposed mini steel mill is to be set up in the San Antonio area.

The council overturned a previous 3-2 vote on Aug. 15 denying issuance of the bonds for the mill. Neil Mertz, city attorney, objected to passage of the resolution on grounds that were the company to default on the bonds it could adversely affect Socorro's ability to issue other industrial revenue bonds as well as general obligation bonds. The council voted 6-2 for the project last Tuesday.

Bill Payne, attorney for Zia Steel, told the NEWS Monday that the city of Raton had also voted to authorize industrial revenue bonds to assist Zia in locating there.

## Six local men get summons

Criminal summons have been served upon six Carrizozo men on charges of criminal property damage under \$1,000 as a result of the overturning of an automobile at Nike Tavern six weeks ago.

Sheriff's Deputy Guy Brown served the summons on Mario Leroy Zamora, 30, Barney G. Zamora, 45, Rito Samora, 27, Paul Samora, 26, Gabriel Samora, 20, and Victor Jaramillo, 22.

On Sept. 12 the sheriff's office was notified that Ray Surratt is being held in Lubbock, TX jail for return to Lincoln County. He was charged here with larceny and burglary, made bond and disappeared. Chief Deputy Charles Cox said an officer will go to Lubbock Tuesday to return Surratt to Lincoln County Jail.

Leroy M. Lopez of Carrizozo has been charged with aggravated battery in a criminal complaint filed by Deputy Guy Brown. The incident arose over a recent incident in which Robert Hemphill is alleged to have stabbed one Vedugo with a knife and sent him to the hospital. Then Lopez is charged with stabbing Hemphill in a kind of round-robin cutting affair. Lopez has been summoned to appear before Magistrate Bill Payne to answer the charges.

In other action, Ralph W. Lowry was arrested on a felony warrant from Albuquerque on charges of aggravated battery and larceny. He was transported to Albuquerque Police Dept. On Sept. 8 Andrew Young was arrested for being party to a crime and possession of a controlled substance. He is out on

bond. The same day, Richard Lopes made bond for DWI, reckless driving and resisting arrest. In jail is Gary Fulks on charges of larceny over \$100 two counts. On Sept. 9 Joe Day Padilla was given 90 days in jail for contempt of court, violation of probation.

Lincoln County authorities are assisting the Roswell Police Dept. and the FBI in a case of aggravated assault, kidnapping and conspiracy involving at least three suspects. One of the suspects, Roy E. Donley, a member of the "Devil's" motorcycle gang, was arrested Sept. 13 by Lincoln County sheriff's deputies while executing a search warrant at the suspect's Alto home and is being held for Chavez County authorities.

The Sheriff's Reserve unit at

Ruidoso was reorganized at a meeting at the new sub-station there Tuesday night. The group of eight members will meet the second and fourth week of each month at the sub-station. Other such units are in operation in Capitan-Ft. Stanton, 5 members; Carrizozo, 10; and Ruidoso, 34.

Cox announced that a Junior Deputy organization will be organized here from school students grades 1 through 12. The group will be instructed by the Sheriff Reserve unit and will consist of seminars on bike safety, drug, theft and other phases of law enforcement. The program is sponsored by the National Sheriffs Association and is intended to cut down on vandalism, drugs and theft in the nation's schools.

The unit is scheduled to be activated within a month,

## OUR DAILY BREAD

I left the extension office loaded with free literature as usual. Since I am on a bread-

making kick, I couldn't resist the pamphlets on bread making. According to one source I am a kitchen scientist. "The making of bread — the production of the finished, fragrant, delectable loaf from the living cell called yeast — is an adventure in science."

Then there is the creative satisfaction. Bread making offers an artistic challenge in the shaping of the breads and the final displaying of them. With seven bread fans in this household the displaying period is very brief.

In six easy steps a booklet, "The Young Cook's Bake-A-Bread Book," shows how to make dough. It has the story of how bread was born and the discovery of yeast by accident.

I use the more advanced "Fleischmann's Bake-It-Easy Yeast Book," which is filled with mouth-watering color photographs. The extension office has copies of this cookbook. I like to bake the foreign breads that are included in the book. When I mess up a recipe I hide the cookbook and tell the kids, "Eat it. Kids in Greece (Arabia, Mexico, etc.) love it!"

# Grizzlies wallop Ft. Sumner, 29-6

The Carrizozo Grizzlies got on the winning track Friday night at Ft. Sumner, defeating the Foxes 29-6.

Zozo got off to a good start against ex-Capitan coach Mel Holland's team by driving the ball 78 yards for a score the first time they had the ball. Stevie Stearns scored on a 2 yard run, John Roueche added the PAT to give Zozo a 7-0 lead that lasted through the rest of the first quarter.

The Grizzlies exploded for two more touchdowns in the second quarter. The first touchdown drive began on the Ft. Sumner 39 with Dominic Vega's fair catch of a Ft. Sumner punt. The Grizzlies ran the ball down to the Ft. Sumner 21 behind the strong blocking of Robin Beltran, Juan Osorio and Charles and Bennie Zamora. Stalled on the 21, Grizzly quarterback Duane Zamora dropped back and lofted a perfect pass to tight-end Kenneth Crenshaw in the end zone. John Roueche added the PAT and Zozo led 14-0.

Zozo ended the first half by driving the ball 55 yards in 7 plays with Stevie Stearns scoring from 2 yards out. John Roueche again added the PAT to give the Grizzlies a 21-0 half-time lead.

Zozo's last touchdown drive began on the Grizzlies' 23, where they put the ball in play following

the Ft. Sumner kick-off starting the second half. The 77 yard touchdown drive turned out to be the most exciting of the night, featuring a 25 yard run by Stearns, a Duane Zamora to Kenneth Crenshaw pass that covered 41 yards and a Zamora to James Guevara pass that covered 17 yards and put the ball on the Ft. Sumner 2 yard line where John Roueche took it over for the final Zozo score of the night.

The Grizzlies had to overcome two 15 yard penalties enroute to the touchdown. Roueche passed to Duane Zamora for the two point conversion to give the Grizzlies a 29-0 lead.

The Grizzlies rolled up 245 yards on the ground and 79 through the air for a 326 total against the Ft. Sumner defense.

Roueche was the leading rusher for Carrizozo, gaining 166 yards in 22 carries. He was followed by Stevie Stearns who had 88 yards in 18 carries.

The defense was led by Gilbert Zamora, who made 9 tackles and James Guevara, who also had 9 tackles and one interception. The Zozo defense intercepted Ft. Sumner three times with Crenshaw and Roueche adding one intercept each to the total.


Good defensive line play was

an in-kind donation of \$500 for a total estimated cost of \$12,500.

Miller suggested that the council use the town's portion of the Lodger's Tax for a money source to help finance the project. The council approved setting aside the tax money for the pool project. The mayor said that the pool is utilized by the community more than any other facility and agreed that the tax should be put on freeze for the pool project.

The mayor announced that the golf course has been "semi-closed." He said the facility is \$1,300 "in the hole," and added that it has never been self-supporting and never will be. He pointed out that only 2 to 3 percent of local residents use the golf course.

The town will continue to water the greens and keep them mowed. The facility can still be used by golfers but no carts will be available and the pro shop will not be in operation.

Airport Committee member Scott Shafer approached the council and received approval on a \$3,000 cash commitment and \$11,200 in kind (goods and service) for municipal airport renovation. Shafer said the State of New Mexico Aviation Department would help with \$175,000 if the committee's application is accepted.

Harold F. Olsen, director, Department of Game & Fish, wrote to the mayor that he learned that funding for the maintenance of the local airport has become "somewhat of a problem." He states on the letter that his department uses the airport on a regular basis for numerous wildlife activities.

Olsen said the airport is the only improved airport in the area north of Alamogordo that provide them access to the Nogal Lake-Capitan area. The department utilizes the airport on a regular basis for law enforcement work in the area. They conduct night patrols and fly in and out of

Carrizozo. Since it would be a hardship to go to Roswell or Alamogordo, they also fuel in Carrizozo during these flights.

Carrizozo is also the county seat where many of their court cases are held. The ability to fly in and out of the airport is needed night and day. He added that the airport also can be used for rescue work when an air ambulance is needed.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce president, W. A. "Woody" Schlegel, said the Ultra Motor Coach Convention will take place in Carrizozo. The group will convene Oct. 5 through 12 at Spencer Park. The group's president has contacted Schlegel and informed him that 200 people are expected to gather for the convention and that local merchants should anticipate an increase in business during the group's week-long stay in Carrizozo. The Rec Center will provide a place for the group to hold meetings. The mayor said he would personally donate wood for the fireplace at the Rec Center.

Hubert Quintana, SNMEDD, was present at Monday's meeting to tell the council, "It's time for CDBG again." He explained changes in application and eligibility procedures in the Community Development Block Grant program. The council has scheduled a hearing to gather public input as in past CDBG projects. The hearing is set for Thursday, Sept. 22 at 6 p.m. at the town hall. In the event that there is no quorum the hearing will be held Monday, Sept. 26, same time, same place.

The town plans to pursue funds for a \$200,280 water storage tank project. A separate CDBG project will be sought on behalf of the town by Schlegel and Miller. They will try for \$380,000 in funds for a housing rehabilitation program for a specific area of town—the south side again. Both projects will be on the agenda at the hearing Sept. 22.

**What ever happened to WW II's Tokyo Rose?**

WASHINGTON — Iva Ikuko Toguri, who is better known to history as "Tokyo Rose," is a heroine rather than a traitor — according to the Japanese Americans Citizens League (JACL).

In a 36-page booklet published by the JACL's National Committee For Iva Toguri (1785 Sutter Street, San Francisco), Toguri, now living in Chicago, is described as "a victim of World War II fantasy" who was "trapped in Japan" and was later "consumed by a fictitious image created by American soldiers."

The JACL booklet describes Toguri as "a casualty of the prejudices, stereotypes and social mores of that era." The booklet also contends that after her release from federal prison, "the United States government continued to persecute her with deportation threats and property confiscation."

Iva Toguri d'Aquino (she is

separated from her husband, Portugese-Japanese Phillip d'Aquino) has inherited the Toguri Mercantile Co., an Oriental gift shop at 851 West Belmont Street in Chicago.

She has declined comment even when asked by The Chicago Tribune about a wire service report in 1978 that she would be making a return visit to Japan. A nephew told reporters that she would make no such trip.

Two years earlier, the JACL published the second edition of the booklet, "IVA TOGURI (d'AQUINO): VICTIM OF A LEGEND." Currently, the JACL is strongly campaigning for passage of a bill introduced by Sen. Alan Cranston, California Democrat and Presidential candidate, which would appropriate \$1,300,000,000 in order to pay a reparation of \$20,000 to every Japanese-American, either living or dead, who was relocated or interned during World War II.

The JACL booklet on Toguri

has a number of notable reports. But these claims contrast sharply with the actual court records in which she was found guilty of treason and sentenced to 10 years in the Federal Reformatory for Women in Alderson, West Virginia.

The JACL reports that Iva Toguri was born on July 4, 1916, in Los Angeles, of Japanese parents, her father having obtained Canadian citizenship. She was educated in the public schools of Los Angeles, Calexico, San Diego and Compton.

For the first 16 years of her life, she held dual citizenship, as a citizen of both Japan and the United States. But in 1932, her father cancelled her Japanese registration. Iva attended Compton Junior College as well as UCLA. The JACL reports that she graduated from UCLA with a bachelor degree in zoology in June of 1941. But court records note her graduation from UCLA with a BA degree in January of

**US Methodists ignoring attack on African Bishop**

At one time, Methodist Bishop Abel Muzorewa attracted the attention of the world's media, as well as the leaders of his own and other liberal denominations.

He was a leader of the opposition to Rhodesia's Ian Smith government, which was predominantly white, although allowing a minority of blacks in the legislature. Later, the Bishop became the first black Prime Minister of the nation, which was renamed Rhodesia-Zimbabwe. Then, after a second election brought in Marxist Robert Mugabe, Muzorewa plummeted from the headlines, and from any apparent concern of the international ecclesiastical establishment.

On July 10, in the town of Hunyani, near the renamed capital city of Harere (formerly Salisbury), Bishop Muzorewa and a group of worshippers were attacked by a mob of more than 1,000 of Comrade Mugabe's ZANU-PF party youths and adults.

This mob, noted the Bishop, was led by a motorcycle bearing government license tags. They disrupted the dedication of a new church building — by stoning the Bishop and his congregation.

Bishop Muzorewa told a news conference in Harere that this was only one of a number of widespread attacks on churchgoers in the newly named nation of Zimbabwe. He also noted that the attack was a "definite illustration of suppression and oppression of freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, freedom of association and freedom of worship — which is growing worse by the day in this country."

With regard to the former white-dominated government which he once opposed, the Bishop observed: "The Rhodesian Front never went into church and drove people away from the communion table and from funerals. We never heard of Rhodesian Front youths stoning

churches." And he added that in some areas of Zimbabwe, blacks are more oppressed than before that nation's independence.

Bishop Muzorewa's statements — reported in the Religious News Services but hardly any other US media — were made just one day before the Roman Catholic Zimbabwe Commission For Justice and Peace declared that there was a rising level of violence in the southwestern Matabeleland province (the stronghold of Mugabe's former ally in terrorism against the Smith regime, Joshua N'komo, who fled for his life to Britain and but recently returned.)

Earlier this year, this Catholic commission produced evidence that the government troops were committing atrocities and engaged in intensive slaughter of civilians. There were even media photographs of Mugabe's black troops beating other blacks — but these, too, were not widely published in the US.

Prime Minister Mugabe replied to these charges by denouncing the commission as "sanctimonious prelates" and threatening to close down any church which he regarded as insufficiently loyal to his administration. This threat was reported by the news service of the All-African Council of Churches.

Twenty-four days after this mob attack on Bishop Muzorewa, the World Council of Churches was into its 10th day of its 8th General Assembly in Vancouver,

British Columbia. This ecclesiastical version of the United Nations has passed innumerable (and usually controversial) resolutions. But there was no word of concern about this mobbing of an African bishop and his flock. For having financed Comrade Mugabe for so many years, the World Council of Churches would look rather foolish if they spoke against the recipient of their money, whose mass murder of civilians, including Catholic and Protestant missionaries. They so often explained as the actions of "freedom fighters" and thus forgivable.

At the national headquarters of United Methodist Communications in Nashville, TN, which issues over a thousand news releases each year (most of which are about social concerns from an ultra-liberal point of view), there has not been one word of concern about the Methodist bishop whom they so recently portrayed as a hero.

At the White House, Deputy News Secretary Larry Speakes said that he had never heard about the attack on the Bishop but that he is sure that President Reagan opposes any such violence.

At the State Department, which once feted Muzorewa as a hero, there was no comment — even though the State Department has arranged for the US Treasury to provide \$75,000,000 to Comrade Mugabe's government.

**MLK's Communist connections**

EDITOR—It is very ironic that one of the most outspoken foes of Communism in the US Congress, Dr. Lawrence McDonald, should be murdered by the Communists.

When the House passed legislation to establish the third Monday in January as a legal public holiday memorializing the birthday of Martin Luther King, which is being pushed so hard by the left, Dr. McDonald was one of the few who spoke out against it.

He pointed out that that Attorney General Robert Kennedy, certainly one of the most liberal men to hold that high post, had authorized wiretaps and other forms of surveillance of Martin Luther King after the FBI developed evidence King was associated with and being manipulated by Communists and Communist agents.

The FBI learned that a "Communist agent" named Stanley Levison was a major influence on King. Indeed, Mrs. King acknowledged in his memoirs that Levison, for a least a dozen years, was always there to offer assistance... always working in the background, his contribution had been indispensable.

During the Sixties, a famous photograph featuring King appeared on billboards throughout the country. It was taken during the 1957 Labor Day weekend at a seminar which King attended at the Highlander Folk School in Tennessee. The "school" had been described by a Joint Committee on the Tennessee Legislature as "a meeting place for known Communists and fellow travelers." And sitting with King in the widely publicized photograph was Abner Berry, a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party, USA.

Evidence gathered during the FBI surveillance ordered by Bobby Kennedy also confirmed King's Communist connections (as well as his amorous escapades). The full contents of those tapes and documents are today unknown because in 1977 US District Judge John Lewis Smith ordered the material sealed in the National Archives for 50 years, "except pursuant to a specific order from a court of competent jurisdiction requiring disclosure."

It would be irresponsible for the Senate to pass final judgment on the King holiday bill without first gaining access to the explosive data contained in these FBI files.

Please write to your Senators and President Reagan asking that a final vote be postponed pending release of these files.

**An insidious law**

EDITOR—Do you love your son enough to keep him out of prison? Or your father? Or husband? Or anyone close to you, male or female? Did you know that anyone, even yourself, could be sent to prison without committing any crime whatsoever, just because a New Mexico law, statute 30-9-15, allows it?

Any person can accuse another person of the crime of rape in this state, and the accused can be tried and imprisoned without any evidence, simply upon the testimony in court of one individual who says this crime happened.

This allows conviction of innocent people by others who want to "get even" or for any other reason, thus placing any resident of the state in constant peril of losing reputation, family, friends, and belongings, simply at the whim of any other.

Even if a person is eventually exonerated of this crime, the judicial process is extremely slow, and the accused can be jailed for six months before a trial. If the jury is swayed by the testimony of the accuser, a sentence of nine to 18 years is the result, with a felony record, which prevents any meaningful employment and marks a person as a criminal for the rest of his life.

Is this justice? Do you believe such a law should remain in effect? If you believe, as I do, that this law should be nullified and common sense should be restored to New Mexico, join me in an effort to have this law changed. Don't let uninvolved and inaction allow someone you love be destroyed by this law.

enemy. Mexico is no friend of the US but has maintained friendly relations with Cuba and other Communist satellites. Mexico was the only Latin American nation that refused to support US-led efforts to break diplomatic ties with Cuba during the missile crisis of the 1960s. If the Communist effort in Central America succeeds, does anyone doubt which side Mexico will come down on?

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1940, after which she spent six months in a graduate school program leading to a master's degree.

Why Iva Toguri went to Japan is another point at issue. The JACL reports that she was sent to Japan to take care of an aunt who had become afflicted with both diabetes and high blood pressure and that Iva arrived in Yokohama on July 21, 1941, "with practically no knowledge of the Japanese language or customs."

But earlier in this JACL booklet, it is noted that in the Toguri home in California "English was the primary language (not the only language) spoken at home." Court records (but not the JACL) report that after she arrived in Japan, she attended the Japanese Language and Cultural School in Tokyo, until December of 1942.

The JACL's report of this American citizen with practically no knowledge of Japanese being sent to take care of a sick aunt contrasts sharply with the court records. For the court records reveal that she told friends in California that she was going to Japan to study medicine, because she had relatives in Japan who were in the medical field.

The JACL reports that on the day after Pearl Harbor, Iva was visited by "the Japanese Army Thought Control Police (Kempeitai) who demanded that she renounce her American citizenship. . . She flatly refused. . . her movements were restricted and she was constantly harassed."

But court records (US Court of Appeals, Ninth District: Iva Toguri d'Aquino v. United States, Brief of Appellee) including two volumes of sworn testimony and documents, from dozens of witnesses, reveal that Iva was employed as a typist at this language school until July 1942. At that time she took a job monitoring foreign broadcasts for Domei News Agency, until 1943, when she went to work for the Broadcasting Corporation of Japan (Tokyo Radio) at a monthly salary of 100 yen.

The JACL booklet reports that she tried to become repatriated to the US through the Swiss Legation, which was arranging such return voyages for American nationals caught in Japan. But court records include Iva's written statement on September 2, 1942:

"I hereby express my wish to remain in Japan for the present, and hereby withdraw my request to be evacuated."

The JACL report (under a section headlined "Abandonment and Survival") that Iva Toguri was taunted by neighbors of her aunt and uncle — and finally asked to leave the house and reside elsewhere. The JACL reports that she soon ran out of money; that she had no ration card; that she faced starvation; that she was turned down when she asked to be imprisoned along

with other Americans. Again the court records are markedly different from these claims. For they report that after going to work for Radio Tokyo "Several times she sought and received pay raises" and that she was paid more than most of her fellow workers: 180 yen — plus an additional 100 yen for secretarial work at the Danish legation; plus another 100 yen earned by Philip d'Aquino.

Lt. Col. Shugetsu Tsuneishi, Iva's supervisor on "The Zero Hour" program, described this program as "an instrument of psychological warfare, to cause Allied troops to be homesick, tired and disgusted with the war."

Iva, who had a rich and charming voice, testified that she knew the program was broadcast for propaganda purposes. For the scripts contained insertions from the Japanese Army General Staff.

By striking contrast to JACL claims that Iva was coerced into such broadcasting, the court record contains her admission that no physical force, duress, coercion, pressure or threat was exerted on her by the Japanese government. She also testified:

"That she knew that the purpose of the broadcasts was to lower the morale of American troops.

"She liked her job and it paid more than the salary of typists.

"She was thrilled at hearing the recorded sound of her own voice.

"While her husband warned her about doing such broadcasts, she replied, "You just can't quit."

One of the many witnesses against her was a Filipino named Vilarin, who had been captured at Bataan and brought to Japan for indoctrination. He testified as an eyewitness who watched her broadcast:

"Hello Honorable Enemy! Why do you have to stay in the foxholes of New Guinea when your girlfriends back home are running around with other men? It's about time you fellows went back home."

The sexual theme was frequent in Iva's broadcasts. In the spring of 1945, she told her audience: "Well, fellows, I have to be going now. I am going to get my loving tonight. How about you?"

On another occasion, she broadcast: "Welcome to the First Marine Division, the bloody butchers of Guadalcanal, who have just landed on Cape Gloucester, New Britain."

Good manners can pay off

LAS CRUCES — The fall hunting seasons are opening in New Mexico, but hunters need to remember to get permission before they hunt on private property.

Jim Knight, Extension wildlife specialist at New Mexico State University, said, "We all have the right to hunt, but to hunt on somebody else's property is a privilege extended only by the landowner."

Knight said a recent study showed that seven of 10 landowners feel there are landowner-hunter problems each hunting season. They said

they either had a problem personally, or knew of a neighbor who did.

About half the landowners who reported problems with hunters have since posted their land; however, more than a third of those whose land is now posted said they would still allow hunting if the hunter asks permission.

"Remember, a hunting license is not a key to every ranch gate. Take the extra time to show good manners. Ask permission, and even where land is posted, the results may surprise you," Knight said.

Engineering scholarships for high school seniors

ROSWELL — From now until Dec. 15, the National Society of Professional Engineers' (NSPE) Educational Foundation will accept applications from high school seniors for its 1984 national engineering scholarship program. It is the largest of its kind in the US.

The scholarship program begins with Southeastern chapter of the New Mexico Society of Professional Engineers (NMSPE). Applications for scholarships will be supplied to area high school guidance offices by Southeastern chapter, with a deadline of Dec. 15 for completion and submittal. The Chapter Scholarship Committee, chaired by Kathryn Byrd-

Humphreys, will evaluate the applications, interview selected applicants, and by Jan. 9 1984 submit the qualified candidates to the NMSPE Scholarship Committee. Selections from the State Society will be forwarded to the National Society by Jan. 31, 1984. Announcement of winners will be made in March 1984.

The Educational Foundation will award scholarships and grants worth more than \$902,000 in 1984. Awards range from \$1,000 for one-year grants to four-year full-tuition scholarships in excess of \$20,000.

Students are selected for the awards on the basis of academic standing, participation in extracurricular activities, evidence of leadership, character and self reliance, comments of teachers and administrators, and in some instances, need. 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




