

Roueche powers 40-24 assault on Cloudfcroft

John Roueche returned to the Carrizozo line-up after a three-week absence due to injury, to power the Grizzlies to their fifth consecutive victory Friday.

Roueche gained 188 yards on 22 carries and scored two touchdowns on runs of 67 yards and 53 yards. Stevie Stearns wasn't far behind, turning in another strong rushing performance as he gained 96 yards on 19 carries and scored two touchdowns on runs of 13 yards and 7 yards.

Duane Zamora added two more Grizzly scores on runs of 9 yards and two yards to complete the scoring for Carrizozo.

Carrizozo totalled 340 yards on the ground against the Cloudfcroft Bears. Much of the credit for Carrizozo's fine offensive performance must go to the offensive line of Daryl Lindsay, Robin Beltran, Kenny Crenshaw, Juan Osorio, Charles Zamora and Bennie Zamora. They consistently tore large holes in the Cloudfcroft defensive front to allow the Carrizozo runners plenty of room to maneuver.

"Our offensive line is very small, but they have really improved their blocking technique through a lot of hard work and determination. I think most people felt we could only win one to two ballgames this season because of our size. It does hurt us against the big teams, but all the hard work has allowed us to be competitive," commented Grizzly Head Coach Dennis Sidebottom.

Defensively, the Grizzlies were again led by senior linebacker Gilbert Zamora who made 20 tackles, recovered two fumbles and caused two Cloudfcroft fumbles with hard tackles.

David LaMay also played well for the Grizzly defense, making 12 tackles and recovering two Cloudfcroft fumbles.

The Grizzlies are now 5-1 and have won more games than any Carrizozo team since 1978. The Grizzlies put their five-game winning streak on the line Friday night as they take on the Hagerman Bobcats at Hagerman. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Lawmen jail 2

Enrique Herrera and Jose Enrique, reported to be in the country illegally, are in Lincoln County jail on charges of larceny over \$100, aggravated burglary and aggravated assault on police officers. Bond is set at \$17,500.

The two were arrested by Ruidoso police and Deputy Chuck Flanagan Sunday night while attempting a robbery in Ruidoso. One of the three involved escaped, and the others were arrested after they wrecked a car they were using to flee the scene. One of the suspects fired at pursuing officers, Flanagan and Ruidoso Police Dept. officer Ron Hart, but neither was hurt.

Chief Deputy Charles Cox said one of the suspects in jail has sugar diabetes and must receive special treatment.

Arnold Boyce Jr. was arrested Oct. 5 on DWI and for speeding 70 in a 55 mile zone. He is free on bond. The same day, Tammie Raelene Loyd of Ruidoso was arrested on a felony warrant out of Texas, and is in jail awaiting transfer to Dalhart, TX.

Bert Lucero, San Patricio, was arrested Oct. 6 for driving on a revoked license and DWI, 2nd offense. He is free on bond. Fred Gimtham, Ruidoso, is in jail charged with issuing worthless checks. Jack L. Hobbs, Ruidoso Downs, is in jail charged with resisting arrest and being party to a crime. Robert Huddleston, Ruidoso Downs, is in jail, DWI, 2nd offense.

Great White Whales move on

Coach members loved everything in Carrizozo

Members of the Ultra Van Coach Club were impressed by the hospitality expressed by local organizations, churches, merchants, and Carrizozo folks in general during the club's week-long convention.

The coach club's annual elections were held Monday at Spencer Park and Carrizozo Recreation Center, the group's convention headquarters. Convention activity included investment seminars, van maintenance and craft sessions.

Local residents became accustomed to the sight of the 41 unique motor vehicles parked at Spencer Park or when the "great white whales" were on the road touring the surrounding area. Great White Whales is a more dignified nickname according to the proud owners of the aerodynamically designed vehicles. Coach owners do not take kindly to labels like "pregnant jumping beans" or "squatly potties."

Only about 360 Ultra Vans were produced from 1965 to 1972. The van was designed by an

aeronautical engineer, David Peterson, who built the original Ultra Van in his garage in Alameda, CA in 1961. It is powered by a Corvair engine and the body is aluminum except for fiberglass corners. The van has all the comforts of home, with each owner adding his own personal touches inside and out.

The 22-foot by 8-foot vehicle weighs about 4,000 pounds. Because of its light weight and its aerodynamic design, the van is more fuel efficient than other recreational vehicles. The Corvair engine is not produced anymore and most Ultra Van owners service the vehicles themselves. There is no central service facility. Some van owners are former pilots or aircraft mechanics.

The members get together mainly to learn from each other. In addition to the yearly conventions, the members meet at quarterly east and west locations. The club's main purpose is to discuss technical matters and socialize.

Some Corvair parts are still available, but says club president

Robert "Bob" Franz, "We scramble for them." Franz, of Antioch, CA pointed out that Oregon club members Mr. and Mrs. Len Ryerson compiled a comprehensive manual for Ultra Van owners. The Ryersons attended the convention. The manual which took three years to compile, includes information on coach specifications, repairs, modifications, supplier's addresses and detailed drawing.

Ernest and Edna Newhouse, Whittier, CA, founders of the Ultra Motor Coach Club attended the convention in Carrizozo. The club, formed in 1966, has about 250 members. Newhouse, who owns the newest Ultra coach (13 years old), is executive director of the club.

The majority of club members are retired or semi-retired couples. Membership comes from all walks of life - salesman, electrical engineer, pilot, attorney, dentist, podiatrist, nurse, farmer, to name a few professions.

Of the group, Newhouse is the financial wizard in private life and conducted the in-

vestment seminars. Seventy-eight individuals representing 14 states convened in Carrizozo. Fred Leary, the McMinnville, OR mechanical genius in the bunch was in charge of technical sessions. It was Leary that scouted Carrizozo and negotiated with Woody Schlegel, Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, to hold the convention here.

Leary was this year's recipient of the coveted Ernie Award. The announcement was made last Monday during the group's general meeting. The award, named in honor of the club's founder, is a sterling silver medallion given to the member who has given the most service to the club.

Franz, re-elected club president, was host for this year's convention. Ike and Nell Morgan of Portales, NM were co-hosts. The Morgans, retired Roosevelt County dry land farmers, purchased their Ultra Van in 1969. Morgan, former New Mexico state senator and a self-taught mechanic, transplanted a used Olds Toronado engine into

his Ultra Van when it came time to replace the Corvair engine. Nell, his wife, a former executive secretary for Roosevelt County Farm Bureau, conducted craft sessions during the convention. Threasea Vandersteeg, Sun City, AZ was the other craft instructor. The two women directed needlecraft projects for the women members.

The theme of the Ultra convention was "This is New Mexico." Don Criss, public relations, Eastern New Mexico University, was a guest speaker.

He and the Morgans promoted the Land of Enchantment and encouraged Ultra members to tour the state.

Ultra members told the NEWS that Carrizozo is the first convention site where residents made them feel extra welcomed by inviting them to church potluck suppers and other get-acquainted local events. Carrizozo's Edna Greer was made an honorary Ultra member for her interest in the club's activities.

FFA tuning up for Kansas City meet

Carrizozo chapter of FFA will soon be on the road again, headed for Kansas City and the national convention.

While at the convention the chapter's agriculture mechanics team will compete with other state winners for the national title. The ag mechanics team won first place in the state contest held in Las Cruces in the spring. Members of the team are Melody Hefker, John Hemphill, Charles Zamora and Adrien Sanchez.

Also competing on the national level is the Malpais Colts 4-H meats team. Included in this team are Mary Jane Ferguson, Lynn Gallacher, Mike Curtis and Geneva Maxwell. These are the same people who will be in the FFA meats team for Carrizozo next season.

During the past week the Carrizozo FFA has been working on shop assignments and projects.

Daily assignments include

cutting and welding skills such as lap welds, fillet welds and welding pads. Students are allowed the first half of the period for their welding assignments, and then work on projects of their own for the second half. Some of these projects include saddle racks made by Daryl Lindsay and Mike Curtis. Many of the students who don't have projects do practice skills on their own, or help other students with their assignments. When they aren't

busy learning about safety skills and methods that should be used in the shop or at the vo-ag farm.

Also included in daily lessons are instructions in parliamentary procedure and practice for the judging contests that will be coming up in the spring. Parliamentary procedure is used in scheduled meetings of the FFA, and both the Greenhands and the chapter officers are able to participate in contests held in this subject.

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Angus church plans celebration

The Angus Church of the Nazarene, located at the New Mexico District Church of the Nazarene Center, Highway 37 near the Rio Bonito Bridge, will be among 7,000 churches worldwide celebrating the Diamond Anniversary of this young Protestant denomination on Oct. 18, according to Ken Frey, pastor.

The Church of the Nazarene comes from a series of mergers between many local and regional religious bodies in the United States and Great Britain which arose from the Wesleyan Holiness Movement of the late 18th Century.

The principal merger, which is regarded as the founding date

for the Church of the Nazarene, occurred 80 miles north of Dallas in Pilot Point, TX on Oct. 13, 1903. Nazarenes from across the country will return to Pilot Point for Diamond Anniversary celebrations on Oct. 13 of this year.

During Heritage Month celebrations, Nazarenes hope to receive 10,414 new members, equaling the original membership of the denomination at its founding in 1903. Today the Church of the Nazarene has grown to a constituency of more than 1.25 million, with an active membership of approximately 750,000. This growth has been a noteworthy characteristic of the denomination.

The Angus congregation will begin its celebration with a 10:30 morning worship service in the Church of the Nazarene. Music and sermon will emphasize the Wesleyan doctrine of holiness as a major part of the denominational heritage. During this service, guests born in 1903 (the anniversary year of the Church of the Nazarene), those present at the organizational service of the local church as the Providence Church of the Nazarene, in 1916, and guests who have Nazarene "roots" will be recognized.

Following the service, a basket lunch with 75th anniversary cake with candles will be shared with all present at the Fellowship Center. Immediately after the meal, Mr. LaMoyné Peters will show locally taken Aspen tree color slides. Mrs. Chloe Peters, church historian, will present a summary of local church and local church memorabilia will also be on display.

The highlight of the local church celebration will take place around 2:30 p.m. The congregation and guests will form a caravan and drive to the site of the former Providence Church of the Nazarene (between

Nogal and Capitan), which was organized in 1916. This brief heritage service will climax with a ringing of the Providence Church steeple bell by LaMoyné and Opal Peters.

Everyone is invited to share in all planned activities.

Blood drive Friday

Friday, Oct. 14, concerned people will gather at the Carrizozo Woman's Club to give blood for those in need.

Less than 5 percent of eligible people give blood, and rapid advances in medical technology are causing increased needs for blood donations. Six out of 10 people sometime in their lifetime will be in need of another's blood. This is why healthy people should give.

Giving blood is a simple 30-minute procedure. The donor is asked some questions about his medical history and his current state of health. The actual blood drawing itself takes approximately 7 minutes. The blood is then packed in United Blood Services boxes with an insulation using blue ice, sealed and taken to the bus stop for the trip to Albuquerque where it will be processed immediately upon arrival.

The blood crew consists of

Dorothy Turner of Roswell, who is donor resource technician, public relations. Her duties are to set up blood drives, educate the public with programs at civic clubs, newspaper articles, TV programs, etc. Donor technicians include Opal M. Deal of Roswell, who was in intensive care nursing for Southern Pacific Railroad before coming to United Blood Services; Pam Arney, who worked as a cytogenetic technologist at Kansas University Medical Center and as a lab technician in the Roswell hospitals; and Linda Fancher, who was a cardiovascular technologist at Stormont Vail Regional Medical Center in Topeka, KS before moving to Roswell. Sue Stearns is local Blood Drive coordinator and she will answer any questions. She urges local residents to take 30 minutes out of their day Friday to give blood.

Even more maddening has been the meek and cowardly acquiescence to Reagan's weak-kneed "sanctions" by leading Conservatives in Congress.

On Sept. 15 the Senate unanimously condemned the Soviet's criminal destruction but went along with the White House in opposing amendments offered by Senator Jesse Helms for economic and diplomatic sanctions. As usual, lots of rhetoric, no action.

Clearly what is needed now is a sustained expression of outrage from every concerned American if we are to bring about the necessary action from Congress. Tell them that we want our elected officials to recognize that the Soviet Union is and always has been a criminal regime—not a legitimate government. We must cut off diplomatic recognition and expel all Soviet personnel, and most of all we must cut off all aid and trade with Communists.

Alexander Solzhenitzyn, the exiled Russian philosopher now living in Vermont, has warned us to "stop sending goods." Let them stand on their own feet. Nonetheless, it has been detente and business-as-usual while the Communists build their superior war machine.

NASA's Weird invitation to 'Hanoi' Jane Fonda

WASHINGTON — While Congressman John McCain (R, AZ) was a prisoner of war in Hanoi in 1972, Jane Fonda visited that city.

Miss Fonda not only broadcast suggestions to American POWs that they cooperate with their Communist captors, she even provided them an example. She put on a North Vietnamese Army helmet and posed next to one of the anti-aircraft weapons which was being used to shoot down her fellow Americans.

McCain, then a Lt. Commander in the Navy, was informed that an American actress had arrived in Hanoi and was asked to appear with her. Realizing that this was for the purpose of anti-American propaganda, McCain refused to cooperate.

His captors promptly cut his rations to one bowl of soup per day and put him in solitary confinement for four months. The only interruption to this kind of solitude was the recurrent beatings.

McCain, who is one of some 500 American POWs who were tortured by Miss Fonda's friends in Hanoi, was therefore deeply concerned when he learned that the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) had invited "Hanoi Jane" to the Space Shuttle launching last summer on which Dr. Sally Ride became the first American woman in space.

So on behalf of all his fellow POWs, on June 21, Rep. McCain wrote a letter on this subject to NASA Administrator James Beggs. For more than two weeks, this letter was unacknowledged. Beggs had not even the courtesy to respond himself — instead, he turned it over to one of his subordinates.

In the meantime, reporters were beginning to ask questions, so that Beggs's press aide, Brian Duff, declared:

"I am particularly pleased that Jane Fonda is coming. She is considered to be a role model by a lot of young women."

Two weeks later, this Duff statement had been modified by NASA News Chief James Fitzpatrick, who said: "Some young women regard her as a role model."

Q: Some young women regard Angela Davis as a role model. Would NASA invite this communist leader?

NASA: It's hard to say.

Q: Undoubtedly there are some young women who look up to Klanners and American Nazis. Would NASA invite these people?

NASA: Probably not.

Q: Will Fonda be invited again?

NASA: There is no decision. Actually, she wasn't invited.

Q: She wasn't invited?

NASA: Her husband, Mr. Hayden, is an elected member of the California Legislature representing the district where Dr. Sally Ride's father lives. Mr. Hayden is on the Economic Development and New Technology Committees of the California Assembly. His office requested an invitation for him and his family. We processed over 3,500 of these invitations, and they were provided no travel or pay.

(I was about to ask about that emphasis on Mr. Hayden being AN ELECTED MEMBER OF THE CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE — and how many members of this California Legislature were NOT elected members. But instead I asked:)

Q: If a Chicago Congressman asks you to invite his constituent, Tokyo Rose, would you do so?

NASA: Hasn't she been cleared?

Q: Cleared? NASA: Well, we will certainly go through our lists of invitations carefully in the future.

Q: Has NASA apologized to all of the surviving American POWs who were tortured by Fonda's friends in Hanoi?

NASA: Well, Mr. Hayden is an ELECTED OFFICIAL.

Q: Is NASA sorry about inviting Hanoi Jane?

NASA: We are concerned about the reaction.

Q: How are you concerned?

NASA: We are concerned that some people are disturbed.

Two days after this exchange, Congressman McCain finally received an acknowledgement of his letter — from one of NASA Administrator Beggs's subordinates, named John Murphy.

"I appreciate why you were

upset," wrote Murphy — in the best bureaucratic style of polite condescension — and without a word of apology.

At the White House, and at the Department of State, spokesmen Larry Speakes and Alan Romberg both brushed off the question about Fonda being invited — when McCain and others were tortured. "It's not a State Department matter," replied Romberg — as some reporters laughed. Speakes said he couldn't remember Mr. Reagan saying anything about this. No other reporter asked anything about this outrage, so Speakes went rapidly to the next question.

Jane Fonda deserves to be remembered not only for her trip to Hanoi and her propagandizing for the enemy but for her references to the POWs as "hypocrites and liars." There was also her classic statement: "I would think if you understood what communism was, you would hope, you would pray on your knees, that you would someday become communists."

The Reagan Administration owes an apology to Rep. Crain, Sen. Jeremiah Denton (R, Ala.) and all of the other tortured American POWs, who were as loyal to this country as Fonda was disloyal.

Nazi war criminal is high church official

When Allan Ryan of the US Department of Justice announced that for 33 years the US Army sheltered Gestapo leader Klaus Barbie, the "Butcher of Lyons," this admission and apology to the people of France made page one headlines all over the world.

Barbie murdered thousands of French Jews as well as French resistance fighters during World War II German occupation of France. Among Barbie's methods of treating prisoners was application of acetylene torches to their feet.

The US Army Counterintelligence Corps not only sheltered Barbie in Germany (where he was a source of information) but they also smuggled him into Bolivia under an assumed name.

Ryan, who has headed the Justice Department's Office of Special Prosecutions, charged with ferretting out Nazi war criminals in the United States, declared during a news conference that the Army's sheltering of Barbie was "an obstruction of justice and an unlawful act" which resulted in "justice delayed is justice denied." But under the statute of limitations, none of the Army officers responsible for this outrage can now be prosecuted.

Another Nazi war criminal whom Ryan has been working to bring to justice is Valerian Trifa, of Grass Lake, Michigan.

As one of the leaders of the pro-Nazi Guard in Rumania, Trifa led a 1941 program which resulted in the murder of thousands of Jews — 200 of whom were taken to a Bucharest slaughter house, stripped, killed

and hung on meathooks, with their bodies stamped "Karne Kosher" (Kosher Meat).

Trifa spent much of World War II in Germany as guest of Adolf Hitler. After the war, he escaped to the United States, where he became active in the Rumanian Orthodox Church. Finally, with the assistance of former Guardsists, he forcibly ejected the incumbent archbishop and subsequently became archbishop himself.

For years, this Nazi war criminal was a member of the Governing Board of the National Council of Churches (NCC), whose officers were shown evidence of his murderous past by New York dentist Charles Kremer. But only after this column nationally exposed the membership of Trifa in the NCC's governing board — followed by demonstrations in New York — did the NCC finally plead with Trifa's denomination to ask him to become inactive as a board member.

Since Allan Ryan had spoken so strongly about the US Army's sheltering of Barbie, we telephoned Ryan to ask him what he thought of the NCC having sheltered Trifa.

"The Council of Churches ain't the US government," he replied.

Does he expect the US Army Counterintelligence Corps should be more moral than the churches?

"I don't think the government should say anything about how moral the churches should be."

We tried to elicit further comment along this line by noting that the government extends the benefit of tax

exemption in the expectation that the churches will have a salutary influence upon the community. But Ryan moved away from this minefield with the same alacrity as the Secretary of Defense.

The Hon. Caspar Weinberger is not only in charge of the US Army, but he is also an active member (and formerly a diocesan officer) of the Episcopal Church, which belongs to the National Council of Churches.

During a Pentagon news conference, we noted the enormous media coverage of the Army-Barbie scandal as compared to almost no such media coverage of the NCC scandal in having sheltered Trifa. So we asked:

"In your connection with both the Army as well as the media, do you suppose that the media believes that the Army should be more moral than the churches?"

For a split second, the usually imperturbable Weinberger looked aghast. Then he evoked a big laugh by replying: "Well, I thought I'd be prepared for anything, but..."

He then said he's like to take the question under advisement and went quickly on to another question.

At least Ryan's section of the Department of Justice is trying to do something about Trifa, who has been ordered deported, having been found guilty of lying to obtain American citizenship.

No country so far has been willing to take Trifa — who will otherwise go unpunished for his mass murder of Jews. Even the Government of Israel cannot make up its mind whether to take Trifa, especially because he would have to be put to trial, since there is no Israeli statute of limitations for the crime of genocide. If Israel decides against receiving Trifa, and providing the means of bringing him to justice, they will in effect be closing their consciences to the thousands of Jews massacred by the Butcher of Bucharest.

The French readily accepted the Butcher of Lyon. How can the Israeli government consider being Jews dedicated to justice than the government of France?

● IF YOU lust to live forever, plan to move to Chico, CA. This town of 27,000 may become the nation's first municipality to ban nuclear attacks. The city council is pondering an ordinance making it a misdemeanor for any person to drop a nuclear bomb on Chico. Anyone who does will be fined \$500 or sentenced to six months in jail. Left unexplained, however, is what the Chico authorities will use for a jail once the bomb is applied, or who will be around to administer the \$500 fine. That appears to be of little consequence; the law's the thing. The proposed ordinance has been referred to the city planning commission, which has instituted the required environmental impact report to ascertain whether or not the nuclear explosion will have a negative effect on wildlife, clean air, cultural tranquility, and the number of cakes in the ovens that may fall as a result of shock waves. Public hearings on this legislation will be held in November, and you are urged to attend and provide your input. With all the legal and procedural niceties attended to, the City of Chico will be prepared to disintegrate in a proper and legal manner. If Chico is successful in outlawing use of the nuclear bomb, the city may wish to start environmental impact reports as prerequisite to ending the floods, herpes and AIDS outbreaks that have upset the serendipity of that area during the past year. If the impact statement is negative, the "terribly right-wing" California Supreme Court is expected to declare all three unconstitutional, brutum fulmen.


● CHICO is a long way from the US Senate, and it has no monopoly in the salvation business. Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Florida, recently made a Senate speech urging that every marijuana cigarette carry a mandatory, 79-word warning on health risks of pot smoking. How would it work? Well, if her plan is enacted, those who sell marijuana cigarettes would be charged with failure to include the warning on each cigarette sold. Uh... could I buy you a drink?

● IT TAKES a lot of fancy footwork sometimes to create a judge. Take Bill Payne. He is a friend and supporter of Gov. Toney Anaya. He recently quit his law practice and bought an interest in an abstract company. He resigned as local magistrate judge, a position to which he had just been elected. Anaya appointed Mrs. Payne to the New Mexico Commission on the Status of Women. There is a district judge appointment coming up for Lincoln County and the 12th District. Now who do you think will get the appointment.

● SPEAKER Tip O'Neill killed the Simpson-Mazzoli immigration bill without even giving Congress a chance to see it. For one man to hold power to keep the entire Congress from considering a bill is not only obscene but an arrogant exercise of power by any one person. It is also undemocratic, something his party is always twiddling about as being unfair to the poor. His act is also 100 percent political. Nobody knows better than the speaker that from one to two million Mexicans crossing the border into the US each year constitutes a grave danger to the nation. But politics come first. He wanted Democrats to get credit for killing a bill that would establish control of US borders and cut the influx of aliens. Such a move would make the Hispanic voters beholden to Democrats and insure their votes for that party, he reasoned. That was useless, considering that Hispanics are overwhelmingly Democratic in their voting already. Mexicans of Republican persuasion seldom wade the Rio Grande at night seeking work. O'Neill's act was a classic case of "what can I do for my party," not "what can I do for my country." Even the New Mexico delegation opposed the bill, and for the same reasons. The first reason is false and the second is moot. The bill states that an employer who "knowingly" hires an illegal is subject to punishment. There is still a difference in being guilty and being innocent, you know. As for the identification card, US citizens carry them already. Don't leave home without your social security card, or its number written on your person. You can't even open a bank account without it, and the time is near when you can't buy a hamburger without one either. So, it's to hell with the country and let's get on with the partisan politics!

● HARD times have hit the confessional. Last week, Pope John Paul II and 200 Roman Catholic Cardinals and bishops approved a program calculated to bring sinners back to the confessional where they can confess their guilt and reconcile themselves with God. The confession is an important element of the Catholic faith. One church dignitary observed that more people are confessing their sins to psychiatrists and astrologers than to their priests. He did not venture a guess as to why this is true, but let me guess. It was predictable when some priests, bishops and cardinals abandoned their traditional spiritual role to lead anti-nuclear protests, crusade for abortion, demand that our government disarm unilaterally, seek special privileges for homosexuals and lesbians, defy the church dicta regarding ordination of women, and send money to finance campaigns of murder by African terrorists. In these incredible departures from church policy, the Catholic Church is not alone. Episcopalian, Methodists and other protestant sects are equally guilty. But take the good Catholic in the confessional. Once he realizes that he may be unburdening his soul, not to just his priest, but to a social and political activist fresh from an assault on a nuclear power plant or to an ideological blood-brother of Yuri Andropov, he might be justified in taking his confidence to his astrologer or to a sympathetic bartender. For thousands of years the Catholic Church has had ways of dealing with its dissidents to the end that it strengthened the church by assuring its parishioners that there are such things as eternal verities.

Rosemarie Lopez Stuyck displayed and sold her oil paintings and santos this past summer at the People's Market Place. Rosemarie, originally from New York, now resides in Alamogordo. Her work brought fond memories of my roots and the santos my grandfather had in his ranch home in Trujillo, just outside Las Vegas, NM. My brother George has the santos which once were in my mother's side of the family. George is the historian and antique collector of the family.

Santos are symbols of holy people to whom an individual's prayers are addressed. It is believed that the santos or saints then pray to God to grant the person's request. In the early 1800s when New Mexico's

dependence on Spain ended, settlers were forced to develop their own resources, including the creation of their own religious images. Religion played a very important part in the people's lives, and the occupation of the santero or saintmaker grew.

New Mexico santeros were usually village men. Their unschooled works took the form of retablos (pictures painted on wooden panels) or bultos (figures carved from cottonwood or pine). Santeros usually copied the image of the saint from black and white line engravings in missals. They often invented their own color schemes. Santos are indisputably the only Christian native American folk art.

Tours to points of interest in the county were on the motor coach club agenda.



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
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


