Grizzlies crush Capitan, 45-14; move to state semi-finals

Another chapter in the Carrizozo-Capitan football rivalry was written last Friday night as the Grizzlies outscored the Capitan Tigers 45-14 at Laabs

Field. At first, it looked like it would be a grim night for the Grizzlies when, on the second play of the game, Carrizozo running back

Stevie Stearns took the handoff from Duane Zamora and scampered 60 yards to the Capitan 8 yard line only to have the play called back because of a

penalty. The penalty proved to be only a momentary setback as the Grizzlies maintained their composure and continued to play

determined football. The Grizzly offense generated a season high 456 yards against the Tiger defense. John Roueche gained 222 yards on 22 carries and

scored 2 touchdowns. Stevie Stearns gained 212 yards on 20 carries and scored 4 touchdowns.

Stearns is now the second leading rusher in the state with a season total of 1,156 yards. He has scored 20 touchdowns this year. Duane Zamora added to the total completing 2 of 5 passes for 18 yards and a touchdown. The touchdown pass was caught by Grizzly tight end Kenny Crenshaw.

"I think our offensive line of Daryl Lindsay, Charles and Gilbert Zamora, Robin Beltran, Juar Osorio and Kenny Crenshaw had their best night of the year. They really were quick off the ball and maintained their block well. Our offensive line coach, Hal Roueche, has done a

super job with these kids this year," said head coach Dennis Sidebottom. Defensively, the Grizzlies were again led by Senior linebacker Gilbert Zamora, who made 18 tackles, and senior defensive tackle, David LaMay, who made 12 stops for the Grizzlies. Charles Zamora, the Grizzlies' fine junior defensive tackle, James Guevara, a sophomore safety, and Gray Gallacher, a junior defensive end, also played well against the Tigers.

The Carrizozo victory over Capitan puts them in the state semi-finals this Friday night. The Grizzlies, who 7-2, take on the Tatum Coyotes, 9-0, at Tatum. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Malpais Grocery closes its doors

Another Carrizozo landmark disappeared last week with the closing of the Malpais Grocery on E. Avenue.

Bea Ortiz took over the little grocery store in 1945 from a Mr. and Mrs. Snow, who had operated it for many years. In 1962 Mrs. Ortiz gave the store, also known as the Little Store, to her son and daughter in law, Phillip and Georgia Ortiz.

For the past few years it was a "convenience store" operated by Bea and her family, including Alice Orosco, her sister. It was a hangout for school children who played video games and bought pizza, sandwiches, and cold drinks.

The owners may lease the building, which they own, Bea Ortiz says. She doesn't expect to

return. "We just couldn't make it any more with the store," she said. The hardest thing, she said, was giving up all the customers and friends she had made through the years. "We'll sure miss all the kids who came in for lunches," she said.

Phillip operates the Means Motor Supply and works at Camp Sierra Blanca. Georgia works at the Four Winds Motel.

An accreditation team from the New Mexico Department of Education gave high marks to the Carrizozo Schools in a recent evaluation visit of the local district.


The two-day visit by the five-member team is required by regulation to occur every five or six years. All areas of school operation were examined by the team, headed by accreditation

Among the areas highlighted in a Wednesday afternoon exit interview were the many areas for parent involvement in the schools, the extent of democratic decision making, and the strong relationship between the school and the community. Also praised

by the visiting team were the low drop-out rate, attractive appearance of the physical plant, rise in student test scores in the past several years, and the supportive atmosphere for students.

Deadline for filing mine claims in Wildernesses

ALAMOGORDO, NM Dec. 31 is the final date for filing mining claims on lands within the National Wilderness Preservation System, and is being pointed out by the Forest Service, US Department of Agriculture. For the Lincoln National Forest, this includes the White Mountain and Capitan Mountains Wildernesses.

said the Dec. 31, 1983 deadline for filing mining claims is one of the provisions of the Wilderness Act of 1964. Beginning Jan. 1, operations on mining claims in the two Wildernesses will be limited to those claims that are determined to be valid as of Dec. 31. A valid claim is one that is properly located, recorded, maintained, and contains a

discovery of a valuable, locatable mineral deposit.

Prospecting, exploration, and production of minerals, mainly gold and silver, has been a sporadic activity in the White Mountain Wilderness since the 1880s. However, production has never been very significant. There has been very limited mineral activity in the Capitan

Mountains Wilderness and most of this has occurred along the base of the mountain.

Next year Forest Service mineral examiners will begin inspections of claims

Pioneer pastor claimed

James L. Wells, former pastor of the Assembly of God Church, Carrizozo, died Oct. 26 in Roswell.

The Rev. Mr. Wells was born Jan. 2, 1898 in Lone, Arkansas. He and his wife Mennel and infant son James came to New Mexico in 1919. They lived in the Gran Quivira and Claunch areas where the Rev. ● "IN war-time, truth is so precious that she should always be attended by a bodyguard of lies." —A classic epigram from "The Bodyguard of Lies," a history of the Secret Service in World War II.

● MY colleagues in the journalistic field are in high dudgeon because the US invasion of Grenada came off without their having been provided an invitation to join the exercise, with accompanying VIP accommodations, and unlimited access to every detail of strategy involved. Because they were not so honored, the mission was accomplished quickly and successfully. Also because they were not, they are screaming "censorship" and "management of the news" by the Reagan Administration. Listen to fulminations of Tom Brokaw of NBC News: "I don't know how it can be called anything else but managing the news. It's fairly clear they want to keep as tight a lid on this as possible."

● YOU'RE so right, Tom, and so wrong at the same time. The success of a military operation depends on secrecy. A commander doesn't call in reporters and inform them that the US is invading Grenada at 0100 hours. To do so would alert the world and play into the hands of our enemies. Given the media's track record for keeping confidential information confidential, to have informed them would have meant our troops would have encountered stiff opposition upon landing, thus resulting in greater casualties. If there is a single national media person who does not oppose the Grenada takeover, I don't know him. All of those I know (ABC, CBS or NBC) make a living "managing the news" in the interest of their own political ideology. None should be trusted with vital information. It is a tribute to the military leadership that they kept the press away, censored and managed the news until the island was secure.

● WAR cannot be waged without news censorship, nor can it be done successfully without managing the news. Secrecy is one of the greatest military weapons. Without it people die needlessly. War is not an exercise in constitutional rights, civil rights, and 1st Amendment precepts. It is not conducted by holding public hearings on policy and tactics, and it is not waged by a show of hands. Wars are won by slaughter, maneuvering, lies and deceit.

● IF YOU are one of those who believe the media should become privy to the strategies of war and be on hand to film the actual drama, consider one single point. A platoon of Rangers hit the Grenada airstrip in a parachute jump from 500 feet. The cameras are rolling. They catch a paratrooper in agony, the result of a broken leg. Another is hit by Cuban fire, and the cameras zoom in on the dead man's face. The glorious story appears on the 6 o'clock news and parents recognize the dead man as their son—the one they thought was still at Ft. Bragg, NC. The callous media showed this film even before the Defense Department could notify the family of the son's death. Great stuff, huh? Tell it like it is, right? And don't forget to catch the media person's "editorial comment" on the horror of war and its leaders' lack of compassion!


● MEDIA people don't regard themselves merely as purveyors of news. They also interpret the news, including personal opinion formed along their own political bent. It never occurs to them that this is censorship. Media people usually have only 30 minutes (less 10 minutes for commercials) to bring us today's news. Obviously, nobody can cover news of the world in 20 minutes. So they select those items of news that (to them) represent the top stories. Again, it never occurs to them that this is "management" of the news. The ultra liberal media people appear in total accord as to the importance of some events. For example, top priority is given to demonstrations and protest meetings against nuclear weapons, anti-war demonstrations, and any crackpot with a formula for overthrowing the government. Just the kind of folks the army needs to "enlighten" the public on military matters!

● WE are speaking of some million-dollar-a-year media folks who suppressed all damaging facts compiled by the government on the career of Martin Luther King Jr. In order to get a national holiday named for him. These are the "non-managers" of news who chose to ignore the volumes of evidence which, had it become public knowledge, would have destroyed Japanese-American claims of \$3 billion in "redress" money because they were ordered out of the West Coast War Zone following Pearl Harbor in 1941. These non-managers of the news, by print and electronic media, told the American public no citizen of Japanese-American ancestry had ever been found guilty of disloyalty to this country—while the FBI alone had dossiers on 7,125 Japanese-Americans who were conducting espionage activities on the fatal date of Dec. 7, 1941. These are the media morons who bought the Soviet story of KAL Flight 007 being a US spy plane, and who advanced the notion that the US deliberately murdered 268 people just to get Cong. Larry McDonald. These are the patriotic, non-partisan, informed, intelligent news managers who compare any US military action with Vietnam. It was these objective news jockeys who hounded Jim Watt from office, who invented the Gender Gap, and who consistently oppose the buildup of the nation's defenses. Just the kind of people the Pentagon should surrender its war plans to!

● CENSORED or not, the American people got all the news out of Grenada they were entitled to during the initial stages of the invasion. As quickly as security permitted, the media was invited in.

● I HAVE a great idea how the Pentagon can end the media's carping about being denied onsite privileges in Grenada. Next time there is a similar military operation, put these prima donnas of distorted news in the first wave of invading troops with their cameras and notebooks in hand. If they live they'll have one hell of a good story, the facts of which even they can't distort.

● I AM reminded of the words of Henry Cardinal Manning: "Honour makes men faithful in keeping secrets, and therefore unwilling to receive them, for secrets are like red-hot ploughshares. Only saints can walk safely between them." Saints, the US media are not.

Watch over Washington Reagan's 'swift, effective retribution'—where is it?

ANNAPOLIS, MD — The announcement over the loudspeaker at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium on Saturday, Oct. 22, is as somber as the lettering along the edge of the upper tier of the grandstand: a long list of battles, from Belleau Wood to Midway and Iwo Jima.

The day is perfect football weather for Navy vs. Pitt. Flags, including the blue of the US Navy and the red of the US Marine Corps, flutter in the breeze, which carries the tantalizing aroma of hundreds of tailgate parties. The Brigade of Midshipmen, an ocean of dark blue and white hats with anchors, parades impressively onto the turf. In the jammed stands, it is apparent that the class of '68 is volubly enjoying its quarter century reunion.

Suddenly, the loudspeaker asks everyone to stand for a moment of silence — for a member of the Naval Academy's Class of '77, Captain John Roemer, USMC, has been killed in action, by a sniper's bullet in Beirut.

The overflow crowd here at America's Naval Vahalla stands at attention as the announcer observes that this young man, who so recently was among those who marched onto this field, had, in John Paul Jones's classic phrase, gone "in harm's way" in the performance of his duty.

Only a few hours later, half a world away, a band of terrorists loads a ton of explosives onto a truck in Beirut. A suicide driver begins hyping himself up for the task ahead: to ram this truck through checkpoints and into the lobby of a multi-storied building; blow up more than 200 sleeping Marines; and bring mourning to Marine families all over the United States.

Three years earlier, when President Ronald Reagan welcomed the freed Iranian hostages to the White House, he said:

"Let terrorists beware that, when the rules of international behavior are violated, our policy will be one of swift and effective retribution."

At the White House daily news briefing on Oct. 25, this column asks Presidential Spokesman Larry Speakes:

"What swift and effective retribution took place after April 18, when the US Embassy in Beirut was blown up?"

That terrorist bombing, again with a car full of explosives, killed 17 Americans, including five Marine embassy guards.

Speakes, who has been wrestling for about an hour with questions about the invasion of Grenada, looks dumfounded and searches for another questioner. When we ask why he will not answer this legitimate question, he replies: "I'm not going to debate that with you."

Later in this briefing, we ask: "What did the President mean by 'swift and effective retribution'?"

WHITE HOUSE: Lester, you obviously want to debate, and I'm not going to...

Q: I don't want to debate. I just want to know what he meant.

WHITE HOUSE: Listen, I'm not in the mood to...
Q: You'd like to evade it. All right, Larry.
There is no known retribution

—swift or effective— which took place after last April's blowing up of the US Embassy in Beirut. The reaction of the Reagan Administration was to lower the flags, wring their hands, bury the dead — and wait for the nation's attention to wane.

The few reporters who asked about any such retribution (and most of the Washington press corps scoffed at such an idea) were told that the Beirut Embassy bombing was under investigation.

I persisted, asking during a State Department daily briefing if anybody had asked the Mossad (Israel's CIA) who was responsible for this April atrocity.

The State Department spokesman declined comment.

Since there was no such "swift and effective retribution" for the murder of these 17 Americans, it is understandable that the terrorists would try again — and succeed so spectacularly. This time they killed 45 times the number of Marines. And, inevitably, there is a chance that these men might be alive now, if Commander-in-Chief Reagan's announced policy of "swift and effective retribution" had not been sidetracked by an apparent legion of appeasers from the State Department and elsewhere in government.

Mr. Reagan may be heavily hampered, in that the CIA is still recovering from the effects of the Carter Administration. Mr. Carter's CIA Director, Adm. Stansfield Turner, sacked hundreds of experienced agents. And Turner is now calling for the pullout of Marines from Beirut.

A second and even more serious problem is the Democrat-controlled House of Representatives, which regularly waves the War Powers Act regarding Beirut, while at the same time undercutting the President's efforts to help Nicaraguan freedom fighters to regain their Marxist-occupied nation.

But President Reagan does have some effective CIA agents. And he has a number of good men in the Army's Special Forces, the Navy Seals (Sea, Air and Land — those who parachute with explosives), the Air Force Special Operations and the Marines Force Reconnaissance. Since our troops in Beirut were attacked, he has the right to respond. Indeed, Spokesman Speakes has declared: "We intend to respond to this criminal act — when the perpetrators are identified."

Judging from the timetable of no response yet to the first Beirut bombing last April, any such response may come sometime in 1984 — if ever.

Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger has announced that there is circumstantial evidence linking both of these bombings to Hezbollah, a Shiite Moslem sect with close links to Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini.

We ask Speakes just how much evidence is needed before Commander-in-Chief Reagan will respond.

The White House spokesman replies that they are working with other intelligence agencies.

When we ask what kind of response will ensue, Speakes replies: "Tell them to wait and see."

All over the United States, families of these young Marines, who are stationed in a narrow, sniper-vulnerable perimeter guarding the Beirut airport, are wondering (1) if their son-husband-father is still alive, and (2) if the Reagan policy of "swift and effective retribution" might have saved all those lives, if it had taken place last April, after the blowing up of our Embassy.

Eighteen years ago, some of them remember, Ronald Reagan, the semi-retired actor, had electrified a great many Americans in his speech on behalf of the candidacy of Barry Goldwater, in which he said:

"Alexander Hamilton said that a great nation which can prefer disgrace to danger is prepared for a master — and deserves one."

Hero of Chappaquiddick lectures on morality

It was only fair. Earlier this year, the Rev. Jerry Falwell had ventured up to Darkest Harvard, and had survived — even winning some rave press reviews for his speech and the masterful manner in which he had parried some hecklers.

Now Harvard's best known alumnus, Sen. Edward Kennedy (D., MA), ventured into the heart of conservative Fundamentalism: Falwell's Liberty Baptist College in Lynchburg, VA.

Here Teddy, at his oratorical best, gave a marvelously crafted speech on "Truth and Tolerance."

Without any apparent intention to riot, Sen. Kennedy craftily linked anti-abortion to Prohibition — which latter Noble Experiment no longer fires the consciences of very many Baptists at all. Kennedy also took the opportunity to roast Ronald

Reagan (one of the senator's favorites — outdoor sports) for having, in 1980, endorsed the strongly conservative Religious Roundtable:

"President John Kennedy said: I believe in an America where there is no religious bloc voting of any kind." (This was stated in 1960 by JFK to the Houston Ministerial Association — Protestants — in a largely successful effort to defuse the issue of Kennedy's religious affiliation. In Lynchburg, as well as on TV screens and page ones across the nation, there was wide public notice — and remembrance.)

Kennedy deplored those "who may be tempted to misuse government to impose a value which they cannot persuade others to accept" — which, come to think of it, could accurately describe almost the entire agenda of such liberal organizations as the Americans

Letters to the Editor A blow to area economy

EDITOR—During the last few months I have been following closely the developments concerning the closing of the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center as a facility to treat the developmentally disabled. The hospital is located near Capitán in Lincoln County.

I was born and raised in the Town of Lincoln which is approximately 10 miles from Fort Stanton. Fort Stanton, since I can remember, has been the economic lifeline of this area. The proposal to transition the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training Center by Secretary Robert McNeill is not consistent with Governor Toney Anaya's concern for the high unemployment and declining economy of this area.

The current budget for Fort Stanton is approximately \$4.8 million of which salaries and fringe benefits amount to \$3.5 million. Approximately 60 percent of the employers are female whose earnings are needed to supplement husbands and/or family income for cost-of-living necessities. Most of these women employees could not possibly fit into an environment such as an alcoholism treatment center.

On Aug. 31, 1983, Secretary McNeill and several of the Health and Environment staff members held meetings with employees of Fort Stanton and also conducted a public hearing at Capitán High School to explain and receive comments on the transitional use of the facilities at Fort Stanton. Interested individuals attending the hearing have indicated that they had no opportunity to hear and/or express input on the pros and cons pertaining to the proposed transition. In fact, Secretary McNeill informed the public that the final decision had been made on the transition and relocation of the Fort Stanton handicapped population. I would consider this decision to be arbitrary and capricious, taking into consideration the adverse impact on the clients, employees and the citizens of Lincoln County.

The New Mexico Legislature has appropriated considerable sums of money for renovation of existing and construction of new facilities during the past several fiscal years. The appropriations are as follows:

—66th to 69th fiscal years — \$1,100,000 — renovation of residential cottages.

—70th fiscal year — \$1,326,000 — for construction of a multi-purpose facility (swimming pool and gym), and upgrading of electrical and sewer system.

—71st fiscal year — \$880,000 — construction food service center.

—72nd fiscal year — \$880,000 — water system replacement. The total appropriation by the Legislature amounts to \$4,271,000. \$2,426,000 of the amount has already been completed and the remainder is currently in progress.

The facilities available at Fort Stanton for developmentally disabled clients are Medicaid certified. It becomes very apparent that the Legislature by approving improvement and construction appropriation in the amounts outlined above intend for Fort Stanton to remain as a developmentally disabled facility for New Mexico's handicapped population. To divert the use of this facility for any other purpose is a deliberate violation of legislative intent.

This statement is being made by me as a concerned citizen and taxpayer of this state and not as State Auditor. As State Auditor, I will have an additional news release in the very near future. I shall be addressing such matters as the waiting list at Los Lunas Training School at Fort Stanton and the under-utilization of the Health and Environment facilities at Roswell and Carlsbad.

Selling the rope to hang us

Call it a mistake, if you must, in the first instance. But having seen the fruit of that error in the hundreds of billions of dollars it's costing to defend the United States against Soviet weapons, can we really believe that our policy people are making the same mistake again? Or is someone, somewhere, doing it on purpose?



New Mexico women hear Reagan

"Economic recovery will produce more opportunities for women than any other program," declared President Ronald Reagan in Louisville, KY Oct. 7.

"He echoed the theme of the convention, 'Closing the Economic Gap,'" said Yvonne Lanelli, Lincoln County delegate to the 22nd biennial convention of National Federation of Republican Women.

Lanelli addressed the regular meeting of Federated Republican Women of Lincoln County in Ruidoso Oct. 18.

"You will hear, if you haven't already, that there is a 'gender gap' between the president and women," she said. After hearing top women political leaders from national and state governments, I can say not all women would agree."

Citing the president, Secretary of Transportation Elizabeth Dole, NFRW president Betty Rendel, NFRW first vice-president Judy LaMora and several others, she recalled. "This president has appointed more key women to high positions than any other president. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, Secretary Dole, UN Ambassador Jeanne Kirkpatrick and Lenora Alexander, the Director of the Women's Bureau of the Department of Labor, are just a few examples.

In addition Reagan is reducing the marriage tax and eliminating the estate tax for widows and widowers. "But perhaps the most significant accomplishment was lowering the inflation rate. Dr. Doris Drury, an economist from the University of Denver, made this point," said Lanelli. "Dr. Drury also predicted a strong economic recovery for 1984." The president also stated that September unemployment dropped to 9.1 percent. "The president also men-

tioned facts about GOP history of which I was unaware," said Lanelli. "Such as the Republicans were the first to back women's suffrage and were the first to elect a woman to Congress in her own right, Senator Margaret Chase Smith of Maine."

Seeing the president "live and in person" was a thrill for the 1714 delegates, especially for the 15-member New Mexico delegation in the third row. "We had a great view."

Hall, Louise Joiner, and her daughter Patsy Racher and daughter from Hondo and grandson Paul Bonnell from Glencoe, traveled together by car to the reunion. A

son of Louise, Pat Joiner and wife Betty Lou and three of their children from Capitan went by way of the National High School Rodeo in Douglas, WY to attend the Hall gathering.

Mary Elizabeth Cook from Albuquerque, daughter of the late Fletch Hall, who homesteaded north of Capitan in 1914, boarded AMTRAK to get to the reunion. From Superior, AZ came a son of Edgar (J.E.) Hall who homesteaded near Ancho in 1917, Halley Hall and wife, the former Edith Dudley of Carrizozo, brought their daughter Hallie Jo Davis along in their camper. The oldest son of J. E. Hall, 86-year-old Brian Hall from Anthony and Sacramento, NM made the long trip by bus and was the life of the party.

More Hall descendants drove all the way from Austin, TX. These ladies were Lillie Mae Rogers, 83, daughter of Lillie Mae Hall Boone, who was a sister of L. P., J. E., and Fletch Hall. She brought two daughters, Gwen Becker, of Austin and Nancy Gilliam of Kingsville, TX. Nancy says she lives across the street from the famous King Ranch. From the suburbs of Dallas came Jayme Racher Miyajima and her husband Ryoji. Jayme is a great-granddaughter of L. P. Hall.

Trinka Waltner, daughter of Wallace and Ghenna Hall, traveled from Marion, SD with her four children to join relatives. From Sidney, Mont., came Martha Lou Hall, daughter of L. P. Hall, Craig Hall, son of Donald and Joan Hall, and wife Peggy and their two children. Leonard Hall, postmaster and only resident of Trotters, was at the ranch visiting and enjoying himself every minute that he could be away from his post office and small store.

Living on the ranch are Donald and Joan and daughter Carolyn Hall. In their home nearby lives Donald and Joan's son, Doug Hall, wife Jeannie and small son. Across Beaver Creek from Donald lives Wallace and Ghenna and two sons Keltz and Karstin Hall.

All ranch work was suspended for four days and the host families entertained the visiting relatives. Many rode horseback, others toured the ranch to see the beautiful quarter horses and exotic cattle. Other groups were taken a few miles to see unusual petrified tree stumps

and logs while others toured nearby caves and viewed outcroppings of coal and a number of oil wells in the area. Most all of the group drove to Medora, ND one evening to see the famous musical which pays tribute to Theodore Roosevelt, who had a homestead near Medora. A picnic in the park and sightseeing and picture taking preceded the musical.

All friends and neighbors were invited to the ranch for a pit barbecue and picnic Sunday in honor of all visiting relatives. A large number of people joined the Halls for this pleasant feasting and fun time.

Monday morning very early everyone gathered at Donald's and Joan's home for a farewell breakfast. Everyone joined in flipping pancakes, cooking bacon and eggs, piling suitcases, bedrolls, and souvenirs into vehicles for the return home. All agreed the transplanted New Mexico Halls were super hosts along with their wives and children.

Hunting ethics very important on public lands

For hunters the arrival of fall signals a long-awaited return to their sport. But there's more to this annual rite than bagging game.

"Knowledge of the rules and sensitivity to the ethics of hunting are likely to ensure that hunters may return to their favorite spot in subsequent years," said Earl Cunningham, district manager for the Bureau of Land Management in Roswell.

The BLM manages 3.8 million acres of public lands in southeast New Mexico. While most of this land is open for hunting during the seasons established by the New Mexico Game and Fish Department, these lands are primarily used for livestock grazing, oil and gas development and other uses.

Land ownership can be confusing with the BLM, state, and private landowners owning bits and pieces of land intermingled with each other.

"First and foremost for a hunter should be respect for private property," said Cunningham. "Hunters should always check with ranchers for

permission to go on or across private lands in order to reach public lands."

Private landowners have the right to control access across private lands unless it is via a public road. Where hunters encounter locked gates on roads on public lands, they should advise the BLM in Roswell at 622-7670 or 624-1790, or in Carlsbad at 887-6544.

The BLM will have patrols out to assist the hunting public during the hunting season and will open an information station near Dunken during deer hunts.

Access to state lands for hunting is available on public roads. Hunters with access problems on state lands should call the Game and Fish Department in Roswell at 622-2681 or in Carlsbad at 885-8274.

Maps are available at BLM offices to assist hunters in determining land ownership status. In late October, the BLM will have for sale special edition maps of the Salt Creek, Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad and Alamogordo areas. These maps are color coded to distinguish legal access roads (federal, state, county and other public roads) from private or closed roads.



restrain one's feelings when moral principles are at stake — for they go to the deepest wellsprings of our being. But the more our feelings diverge, the more deeply felt they are, the greater is our obligation to grant the sincerity and essential decency of our fellow citizens on the other side."

This noble ideal, which he so eloquently expressed, surely suggested that Senator Kennedy had apologized for what he had said only six hours earlier about one of Jerry Falwell's closest friends and political allies. This was one of Teddy's "fellow citizens on the other side" — the other side of the aisle of the United States Senate.

For the Senator from Massachusetts had hardly "respected the motives" of his colleague, the Senior Senator from North Carolina — as he had counseled the Falwell Baptists to do with regard to their political adversaries. For Sen. Jesse Helms (a Baptist) had "exercised his right to disagree" with Kennedy-backed legislation to provide a national holiday to observe the birthday of the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. (another Baptist).

How did Senator Kennedy manifest his own devotion to his call for the development of "our ability to live together" by not "readily questioning each other's integrity"?

Why, Senator Kennedy told the Senate and hundreds of reporters that he was "enormously distressed" by Helms, whom he (charitably?) characterized as an "heir of arch-segregationists bent on retaining the rule of racism."

Moreover, Teddy described Brother Jesse's expressed convictions as not being "worthy of response" and "I will not dignify them with a reply. They reflect no credit (i.e. they reflect discredit) upon the Senate, and I'm sure they would be shunned by the vast majority (a moral majority) of American people, including the citizens of his own state."

(As Senator Helms put it: "Senator Kennedy never misses a political opportunity.")

The Senator from North Carolina evoked this example of Sweet Teddy Tolerance because he dared to raise precisely the same concerns which were raised 20 years ago by the then President and Attorney General of the United States. For the President invited Dr. King to the White House to warn him about associating with known Communists. And the Attorney General, after King seemed not to heed this warning, ordered the FBI to conduct an extensive surveillance of Dr. King.

Were these two American leaders either "arch-segregationists" or "bent on retaining the rule of racism"? Well, of course not. They were Senator Kennedy's brothers, Jack and Bobby.

Obviously their having put Dr. King under surveillance (with the results now sealed in the National Archives until 2027 AD) is an acute political embarrassment to Senator Kennedy today. So he decided to attack. He tried interrupting Helms, twice, until ruled out of order by the chair (a fact not reported by Big Media.) When finally recognized by the chair, he devoted a full measure of his oratorical prowess as well as his mesmeric effect upon almost all reporters to an eloquent smear of Senator Helms — because Helms had dared to express the same concerns about King as Jack and Bobby Kennedy had.

Such is Teddy's magic with the media that any mention of what it was that concerned the older Kennedy brothers is now as unmentionable as Chappaquiddick.
