



US WAR DEAD The nation celebrated Memorial Day weekend by remembering veterans of wars ranging from the War of 1812 to the Vietnam War by attending ceremonies and placing flowers at monuments and graves.

Thousands of veterans and visitors in Washington filed through the US Capitol to view the casket of the nation's Unknown Serviceman from the Vietnam War. A procession and burial on Monday followed at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington Cemetery.

Memorial Day or Decoration Day is a patriotic holiday in the US. It is a day to honor American servicemen who gave their lives for their country. Originally, Memorial Day honored men who had died in the Civil War. It now also honors those who died in the Spanish-American War, World Wars I and II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. Since the end of World War I Memorial Day was also Poppy Day. I remember when the late Mary Johnson of Carrizozo sold the small, red artificial poppies to help disabled veterans.

May 30 became the official date for Memorial Day in 1868, but Congress changed the official celebration in 1971 to the last Monday in May for honoring all-US war dead.

Spruce budworm spraying begins

ALAMOGORDO, NM-The Mexico Division of Forestry began spraying for the western spruce budworm Tuesday, May 22, 1984. The spraying should continue for another two weeks, The areas to be sprayed are federal lands on the Lincoln National Forest, state and private lands in and around the Forest, and Mescalero Apache Tribal lands.

The project calls for the use of two insecticides; Sevin and Bacillus thuringiensis (B.t.). Sevin, a chemical insecticide will be used in remote areas of forest land. Sevin, is a non-persistent pesticide and is used most often in house and garden pest control. There have been no observed effects on livestock, birds, mammals, or fish when used as directed. However, it is toxic to honey


JAMES IRA STEPHENS



Another opinion

DEAR EDITOR-After reading the ROSWELL DAILY RECORD Editorial on May 9, along with other articles on the subject of the Ruidoso Airport relocation, I submit another opinion, one based on twenty years of experience as a Navy carrier pilot without scratching an aircraft except in combat.

First, I disagree that the mesa at Fort Stanton is the best site available for a replacement airport. The Carrizozo area would be safer. Engine failure is most critical in take off and landing. On the mesa, a pilot in trouble might be fortunate enough to glide to one of the few flat spots void of trees, but he also risks the extreme hazard of many canyons, and the topography causes unpredictable winds. Carrizozo has a relatively flat valley all the way to Alamogordo towards the south and at least twelve miles towards the east, and the long wide valleys make wind direction and velocity more predic-

Next, the argument that Carrizozo is too near a restricted area isn't logical. It is at least ten nautical miles from the nearest restricted area and outside all military operating areas. Both the Ruidoso Airport and the proposed mesa lie under military operating areas. This is not a problem, but it is pertinent to the argument.

The third item concerns the question of how many people will die before human safety takes precedence over grazing studies. That question is followed with a statement concerning the necessity for grazing studies. The two cannot co-exist on the mesa for the following reasons: (1) Any disruption of grazing habits will invalidate all studies past the time of disruption. Low-Hying aircraft will disrupt animal habits, evidenced by the lawsuits filed against the military by angry ranchers. (2) Accidents will probably happen regardless of where the field is relocated. Statistics now indicate that the accident rate per man mile of general aviation flying is at least ten times that of the accident rate per man mile of automotive travel. (AVIATION CONSUMER, May 2, 1984, Page 7) If one of these inevitable aircraft accidents happened on the mesa and started even a moderate grass fire, present grazing studies would cease. Future studies would not be possible for years.

The fourth item is the last accident. Wind velocity on that day was reported by the news media to be around 40 mph at the surface. The AIRMANS INFORMATION MANUAL (on which pilots are tested) tells us: that we shouldn't fly in mountainous terrain when winds at proposed altitudes exceed 35 mph; to expect winds to be of greater velocity over mountain passes; that downdrafts of 1500 to 2000 feet per minute are not uncommon on the leeward side; that we shouldn't fly near or above abrupt changes in terrain as severe turbulence can be expected. The mesa is in mountainous terrain. I do not have accident reports on other fatalities in Ruidoso. but general statistics show that a majority of the pilots violated standard safety

My reason for this letter is to bring attention to possible misconceptions about the relocation as transmitted by the news media. I have no monetary or political interests in the airport or the proposed location. It would be wise to relocate since the governing powers have allowed development so close to the airport. If the mesa is chosen for relocation, a ten-mile green belt around the perimeter, where no structures would be allowed, might preclude future problems of over development, complaints, and relocation arguments as are now occurring.

This is my first and last opinion on this subject to be submitted to a newspaper regardless of the jabs I'm bound to receive in the "letters to the editor" column.




