





Would Ferraro be an effective vice presidential candidate — in July of 1984?

WASHINGTON -- Given the alternatives, Rep. Geraldine Ferraro (D,NY) was about the most expedient choice that Walter Mondale could have made for a running mate.

She was the hand-picked candidate of that House of Representatives' Tower of Power, : Speaker Tip O'Neill. And since she is a female, Mr. Mondale has been able to mollify the ferocious feminists of the National Organization for Women, who threatened a convention revolt unless the former Vice President chose someone female.

Even Jesse Jackson voiced guarded approval, so that Mr. Mondale may have headed off two Convention Cataclysms.

Mrs. Zaccaro - that's her husband's name, incidentally is good looking and articulate, as a former assistant district attorney in Queens, on Long Island. She is a second generation Italian-American who is a graduate of two Catholic colleges, Marymount and Fordham University Law School.

The Catholic connection is not likely to be terribly significant, given her support for liberalized abortion laws. (On the other hand, such laws are supported by Vice President George Bush, in opposition to the public stand of President Reagan.)

As an assistant district attorney, Ferraro specialized in domestic problems, including child abuse and child molesting. Despite this searing experience, she is chairman of the Democratic Platform Committee, which calls upon the armed forces of the US to open their ranks to anyone, regardless of sexual orientation per se. This means that if an otherwise qualified applicant for enlistment is a member of NAM-BLA, or the Rene Guyon Society, or the Eulenspiegle Society (for child molesters, advocates of incest and sadomasochists). they should be enlisted, unless they are actually caught practicing what they publicly avow to adtheir sexual vertising preferences.

On April 29, 1984, The Washington Post quoted Ferraro as saying, in reference to the announced list of Mondale Vice Presidential possibilities:

"The only reason that I'm on that short list is because I'm a

This is an enormously notable statement of candor, of self-evaluation and of Mondale motives — which Republicans may well use to lead TV commercials or even feature on highway billboards.

Ferraro also infurlated her fellow backers of ERA by trying to disguise it on the platform by referring to it as 'HJR No. 1' instead of the same dead campaign that was unable to attract the support of enough states, despite the unprecedented extension of time. This effort to disguise evoked an explosion from the National Organization

for Women. Ferraro has told. The Washington Times: "There are very few issues - in fact no issues - in which I disagree strongly with Vice President

Well, the lady has been a strong opponent of forced busing by race - while Mondale could be called "Mr. Busing." She supports tuition tax credits, which Mondale opposes. (Maybe she and Mondale don't disagree strongly - they disagree quietly.)

In the House, Ferraro, during the Carter administration, voted to send \$75 million to the Marxist Sandinists regime in Nicaragua. She has voted to support a nuclear feeeze — which would leave the United States frozen into second place regarding nuclear armaments. She has voted against a Pentagon proposal that we rebuild our chemical warfare retaliatory capacity in view of the Soviet Union's massive buildup of its poison gas capabilities.

Ferraro has one of the lowest ratings in the House with regard to support of the programs of the Department of Defense, having voted against both the MX missile and the B-1.

Her voting record regarding domestic spending reveals her to be one of the really Big Spenders in the House, as well as a supporter of a \$50 billion tax hike and a doubling of gasoline taxes. She voted against the Reagan budget and against proposals to index income taxes. On the other hand, she voted to lift the cap on Congressional salaries, which means more pay for members of Congress.

Ferraro also voted against the bill which provided that those with an income which is 175 percent of the poverty level should be obliged to repay the government for their food

In 1978, she ran initially for Congress with the slogan: "Finally a tough Democrat." And she can be just that, as this writer discovered in an investigation of her decisive action the Washington National Airport.

This call driver, named Girma Tesfay, was one of those who used to prey upon visitors to our nation's capital, from which Ferraro commutes each weekend to be with her husband and three children back in Queens.

EDITOR-On behalf of the 12,000 members of the New England Anti-Vivisection Society, members located throughout the country, I would like to express gratitude to Senators Jeff Bingaman and Pete Domenict for their co-sponsorship of the Improved Laboratory Standards Act Senate Bill 657.

S. 657, which would amend the Animal Welfare Act to ensure the proper treatment of laboratory animals, establishes principles already recognized by responsible scientists and administrators. It would direct that investigators:

- Consider the use of alternatives to animals and to strive to use the least painful procedures.

- Avoid repeated use of the same animal for painful procedures. - Use arresthesia when an animal has been paralyzed by a

curare-like drug. Consult with a veterinarian in planning potentially

painful experiments in order to minimize pain. - Never withhold painkillers or euthanasia any longer than

strictly necessary.

-Avoid unintended or otherwise unnecessary duplication of experiments.

S. 657 would provide an information service at the National Agricultural Library of Medicine in order to prevent unnecessary duplication of experiments or tests and to give information on alternatives to laboratory animals. In addition, it would require each institution to form an animal-studies committee, including at least one member not associated with the institution to be responsible for representing community concerns for the welfare of the animals.

Senators Bingaman and Domenici are to be commended for their support of this bill which promotes progressive and humane research methods.

Save billions . . .

DEAR EDITOR-"the Navy paid \$100 for aircraft simulator parts that cost a nickel at any local hardware store."

"the Pentagon bought three-cent screws at \$91 each." "the Navy's Training Equipment Center in Orlando paid \$511 for light bulbs that cost sixty cents in the grocery store." Those three quotes were taken from a recent report reveal-

ing the findings of the Reagan appointed, "Private Sector Survey on Cost Control," now known as the Grace Commission. Organized in January of 1982 and headed by industrialist, Peter Grace, a Democrat, the Commission was divided into 36 specialized tank forces. These tank forces have now submitted 47 thick volumes disclosing some 2,478 specific recom-

mendations that could save the government billions without cutting welfare services : or weakening the nation's defenses. The 47 volumes have been condensed into a 591 page paperbound book entitled, "War On Waste." (McMillan, \$9.95) The purpose of the Commission was not only to discover the

waste, but to recommend ways to eliminate it. Take for example, military commissaries. The Grace Report points out that hundreds of millions of dollars per year can be saved by merely contracting out these stores to private enterprise.

Grace comments: "these savings, if fully implemented, could virtually eliminate the reported deficit by the 1990s versus an alternate deficit of \$10.2 trillion in the decade of the 1990s if no action is taken."


Drugging the world . . .

--- ASK DR. DAN

Q: I am 62 years old and am in good health except for high blood pressure. Last week I had some bright red blood in miy howel movement. Should I see my doctor about this? R. B.

A: Yes, rectal bleeding should always be investigated by a physician in order to find out the cause. There are many causes of bleeding from the

gastrointestinal tract, some are serious and some are not. The most common cause is hermorrholds. These can be removed surgically if bleeding persists or if they become symptomatic.

The most serious cause of such bleeding is cancer of the colon and rectum, About 60,000 people a year die from this cancer, ranking it second to lung cancer as the leading cause of cancer-related deaths. Fortimately, early detection and treatment of colon cancer will cure up to 75 percent of people, while late diagnosis will lead to a very low cure rate.

Improved methods of detection of this cancer allow earlier, cheaper and improved diagnosis. The simplest method is to test stools for blood which is invisible to the eye. This can be done at home by collecting ... stool and putting a small amonut on a chemically treated card. Flexible tubes with lights and

biopsy forceps have been developed which makes it quick, safe and comfortable to look intoand sample any the colon suspicious areas. Barium x-rays of colon can be used to outline suspicious areas for further evaluation.

Colon cancer is usually

without symptoms in the early stages, Suspicious signs include unexplained weight loss, fatigue, pain in the rectal area, blood in your stools, black stools, and a change in the character or pattern of your bowel movements. People over the age of 50 are at higher risk for getting this cancer. Other risk factors include a family history of colon

cancer, a history of colon polyps,

familial polyposis (a genetic

disease), and inflammatory

bowel diseases such as ulcerative

colitis or Crohn's disease.

The fact that early detection. of this common and highly fatalcancer can lead to surgical cure has led to recommendations for screening. The American Cancer -Society guidelines are yearly tests for occult (invisible) blood in the stool, starting at age 50. In addition, a screening sigmoldoscope exam (looking into the colon with a lighted tube) is recommended at age 50 and every 5 years thereafter.



IT'S THE LAW

New Mexico State Police compiled by officer randy rhue

The laws this week are some that are disregarded alot by almost everyone. They are laws that cause accidents if not obeyed at all times. So please pay good attention to the following laws.

66-7-331: VEHICLE EN-TERING HIGHWAY FROM PRIVATE ROAD DRIVEWAY:

The driver of a vehicle about to enter of (or) cross a highway from a private road or driveway shall at all times yield the rightof way to all vehicles approaching on said highway:

This law applies anytime you enter a highway from any road, driveway, or parking lot, even if there aren't any signs or markers telling you to yield or stop.

66-7-332; OPERATION OF VEHICLES ON APPROACH OF AUTHORIZED EMERGENCY **VEHICLES:**

A.) Upon the immediate approach of an authorized emergency vehicle, equipped with at least one lighted lamp exhibiting RED light visible under normal atmospheric conditions from a distance of five hundred (500) feet to the front of such vehicle other than a police vehicle when operated as an authorized emergency vehicle, and when the driver is giving audible signal by siren, exhaust whistle, or bell, the driver of every other vehicle shall yield the right-of-way and shall immediately drive to the position parallel to, and as close as possible to the right-hand edge or curb of the roadway, clear of any intersection and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle has passed, except when

So any time you see a police vehicle, ambulance, or firetruck with at least one red light flashing to the front and hear a siren, whistle, or bell sounding, you must pull your vehicle as far to the right-hand side as possible and stop until the emergency vehicle has gone by you. (no matter which direction

the emergency vehicle is coming from). Always remember that if you see an emergency vehicle approaching with it's emergency equipment on it is because someones property or someones life may be in grave danger.

66-7-233; PEDESTRIANS SUBJECT TO TRAFFIC REGULATIONS:

A.) Pedestrians shall be subject to traffic control signals at intersections, unless required by local ordinance to comply strictly with such signals but at all other places pedestrians shall be accorded the privileges and three weeks. shall be subject to the restric-

I'm Sandra Grisham, a candidate for District Judge, Division I. I view the position of judge as an opportunity to make a contribution to our community, and I intend for my compaign to make a contribution as well.

For a campaign to be a contribution it should inform the community not only about the candidate but about the position as well. To achieve that goal, I will be writing this column between now and November. Through sharing some of my knowledge of the law with you along with some of my thoughts about how our legal system could serve us better, I hope to let you know who I am and what you can expect from

My family moved from Colorado to Albuquerque when I was five, and I have been a New Mexico resident ever since. I graduated from UNM Law School in 1973, a class that produced over twelve percent of the present state district judges in New Mexico, including our own Judge Doughty. I am admitted to all state courts, our federal district and

appellate court, and the U.S. Supreme Court. I have been in private practice representing a broad range of clients and concentrating on the area of "people law" - representing individuals, families, and owneroperated businesses. I was also a special assistant district attorney for three years, and I served as chair for the Alamogordo City Charter Commission. I was the New Mexico member on the Steering Committee for the Regional Resource Center on Child Abuse and Neglect in Austin, Texas, and presently chair the Mayor's Committee on DWI.

I wanted to let you know a few things about myself today, but future topics will be on various aspects of the law, including wills and probate, the Children's Code, child custody, DWI laws, community property, and our court system. I also want to discuss some of the latest developments in criminal law, including alternative sentencing, restitution, and the new Supreme Court case on the exclusionary rule.





This week pertains to bicycle riding in town:

Lamps and Other Equipment-5-11-18: Every bicycle when in use at nighttime shall be equipped with a lamp on the front which shall emit a white light visible from a distance of at least

five hundred feet (500') to the front and a red reflector on the rear of a type which shall be visible from all distances from fifty feet (50') to three hundred feet (300') to the rear when directly in front of lawful upper beams of headlamps on a motor vehicle. A lamp emitting a red light visible from a distance of five hundred feet (500') to the rear may be used in addition to the red reflector.


